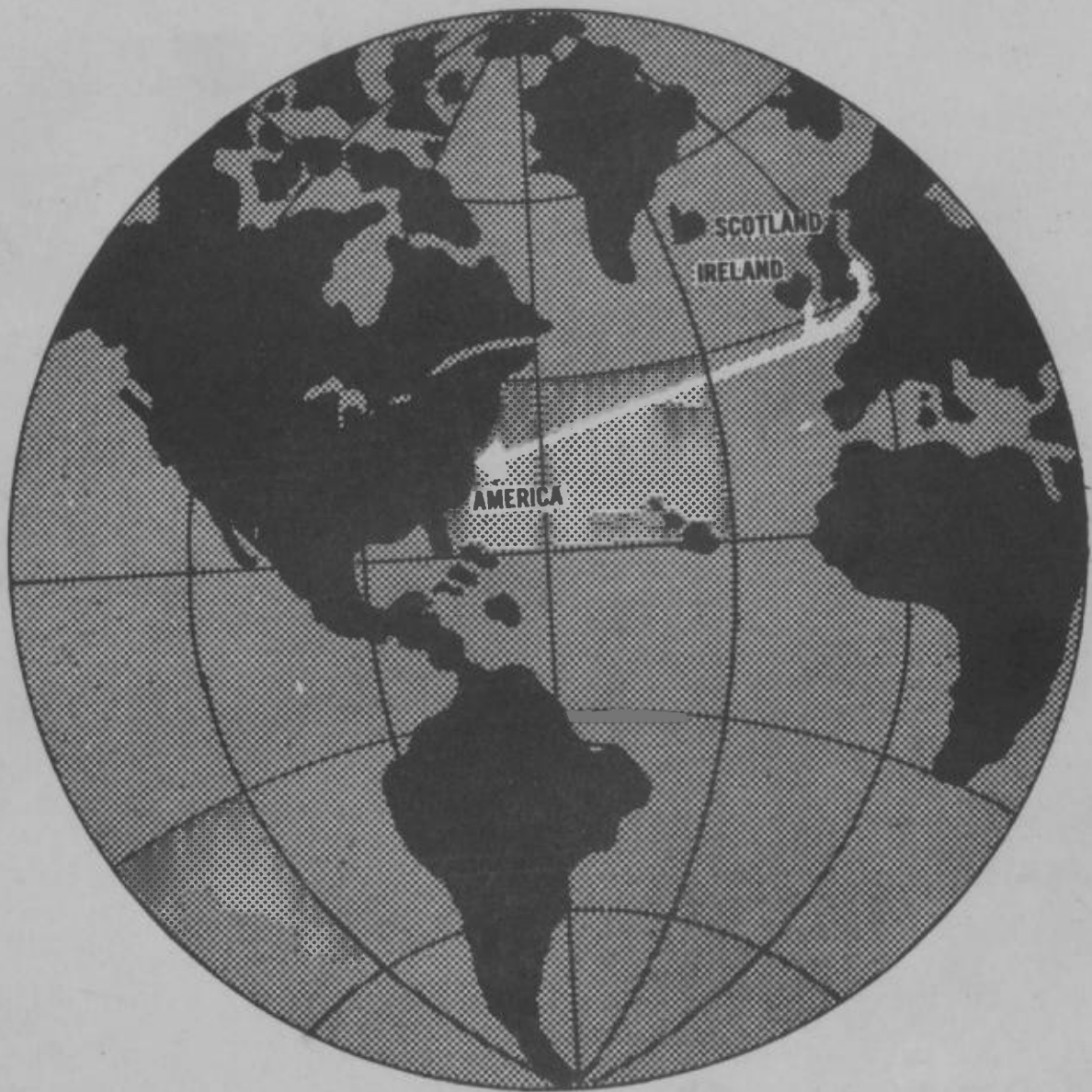

- 1961: McConnaughey Society founded by Pat McConnaughey Gregory with assistance from Samuel Chalmers McConahey [1876-1971], Kenneth Earl McConnaughey [1899-1975], Stuart Allyn McConaha, and others.
- 1963: First Bulletin published, 32 pages, paid for by voluntary contributions.
- 1964-1971: Collecting, researching, & assimiatling material from SCM above into the records in Indianapolis, IN, including the previous collection of Dr. David McConaughy [1860-1945] + trying to raise seven youngsters then (in 1971) 11-21 years old.
- 1971: Second Bulletin, which has been an annual publication since that time.
- 1976: First Annual Gathering in Indianapolis, IN -- annually since on the 2nd Sat. in August (see over).
- 1977: Incorporated as a non-profit organization for the purpose of preserving & publishing information about McCONNAUGHEYS and the variant spellings.
- 1980: First 'bonus' book for members [Report of Research in Ulster, Ireland, 1979], 1st 'extra' publication, 100+ pages of records of McCONNAUGHEYS, etc. in the Mormon Library in Salt Lake City, UT.
- 1981: Prepared 2nd 'bonus book' for 1980 members [2nd volume of Salt Lake City records].
- 1982: Prepared McCONNAUGHEY's, etc. recorded in the 1900 census as a 'bonus book' for the 1981 and 1982 members, accelerated collecting Civil War records.
- 1983: August -- Spoke on BBC by phone talking about the McCONNAUGHEY Society.
- 1984: Monthly newsletter increased from 2-4 pages to 6-8 pages.
- 1985: TENTH ANNUAL GATHERING HELD AUGUST 9-11, 1985, INDIANAPOLIS, IN.



There were some articles I really hoped to include; so, if your offering was not included, watch for it next year. If you have something to add, try to send it in early and maybe I can get ahead of the game.



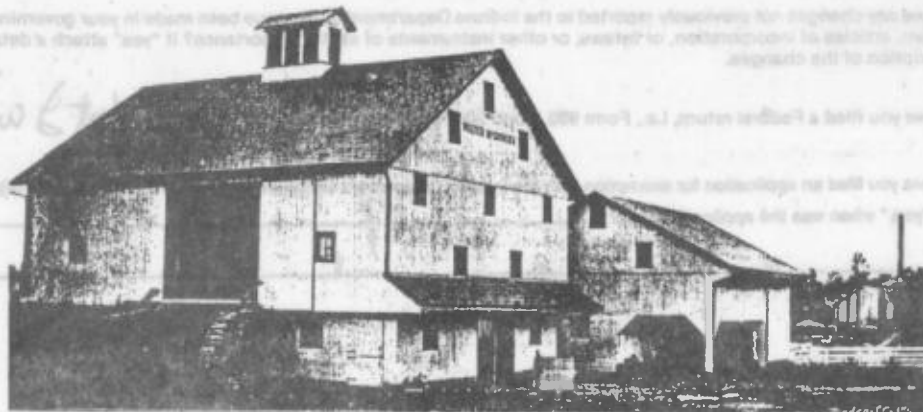

Friends give weight lifter a lift

Bob McConaughey gets by with a little help from his friends.

The 27-year-old Gillette man is the 1987 Wyoming powerlifting champion in the 181½ weight division and recently tied for first in the North Central United States Championship.

According to McConaughey, he owes a lot to his friends.

"Loren Gill got me into lifting," he said. "Now, he helps me when I practice and supports me at meets. I've got friends all over Wyoming I've met at meets and they all help me out." Gill also is a state lifting champion.

McConaughey, who has been competing

since 1985, said lifting is a challenge which builds confidence.

"You're challenging yourself and others," he said. "It gives me confidence to do other things. It motivates me to stay with things ... you stick to things more."

McConaughey, employed by Burlington Northern Railroad, lifts five to six times a week in order to compete at least four times a year. Although he doesn't have a special diet, McConaughey said amino acids, vitamins and minerals are important.

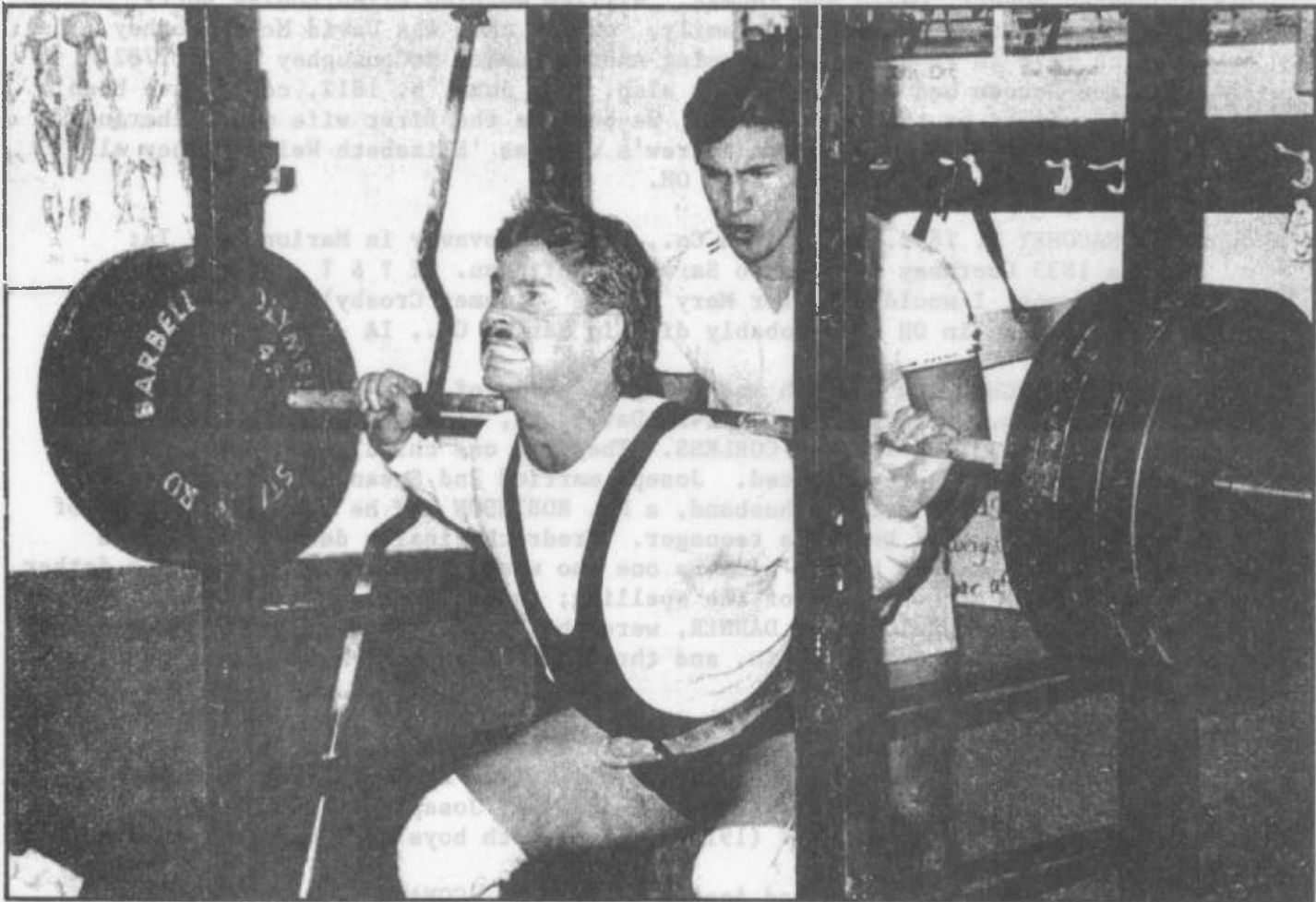
"I pretty much eat anything I want to," he said. "I don't pig out on junk food or anything, but I do take vitamins."

McConaughey's routine, sent to him by a friend in Iowa, consists of strength building over a 12-week period. McConaughey does most of his lifting at the Gillette Fitness Center.

"I do a low number of reps (repetitions) and heavy weights," the Iowa native said. "It's a 12-week program. I have a meet coming up Feb 20 at the Air Force base in Cheyenne, so right now, I'm in my sixth week."

McConaughey's best lifts include 500 pounds on the squat, 345, bench; and 485, dead lift.

McConaughey encourages others to lift. "It's good to build strength, especially if you're in football or wrestling," he said. "It also builds size and challenges your spirit. That's the best thing about it."

Bob is a fairly new member of the Society and is a descendant of the William McConnaughey/Ellen Berry line and most closely related to former Society Pres. Randall McConahey of Illinois. Since one is from a 1st marriage and one from a second marriage, they didn't know about each other until now. Bob's teen-afe brother, Richard Ralph McConaughey, sent this clipping to us.

FILLING OUT ANOTHER BRANCH

WHEN Bob McConaughy of Gillette, WY first contacted us it was all by phone and, believe it or not, it took longer that way! I finally had enough information to dig in the work-sheets and come up with the answer --- almost a surprising one--- as he was one of my own cousins, among the 'missing links' in the William McConnaughey/Ellen Berry line. It was almost a 'repeat performance' of my first contact with Randy McConahay, then of Libertyville, IL. He wasn't sure of the spelling, let alone the lineage. So, I guess I wasn't too surprised when it developed that Randy and Bob were fairly close cousins. [See chart showing their lines and my own]. I lean heavily on Thelma Elliott's genealogy of the family for the early information. Bob furnished the names and dates for the present generations.

William Timothy McConnaughey [1739-40 Ayr, Scotland] came to America ca 1755 with his brothers, Robert, David and Thomas. William married Ellen Louise Berry [b. 1742 VA] and they had a large family, one of whom was David McConnaughey, b. 11 March 1776 in PA and another veing Andrew Duncan McConaughy b. ca 1782, PA?. Andrew Duncan had a large family also. Son John, b. 1812, could have been a son of the first or the second wife. We believe the first wife was Catherine, the 2nd Elizabeth, who is named in Andrew's will as 'Elizabeth Weir'. They all died and were buried in Guernsey Co., OH.

John McCONAUGHEY b. 1812, Washington Co., PA; d. provavly in Marion Co., IA; m. 15 June 1833 Guernsey Co., OH to Sarah CROSBY, dau. of ? & ? (From their children's names, I would vote for Mary _____ & James Crosby). Sarah was born in 1813 or 14 in OH and probably died in Marion Co., IA

Josephus McCONAUGHEY was the 9th and youngest child of John & Sarah. b. 25 June 1856 in Marion Co., IA: d. 12 Jan. 1942, Davenport, Scott Co., IA; buried Cedar Rapids, IA; married 1st Kathryn CORLESS. They had one child, Fredrick Eugene McCONAUGHEY and then were divorced. Joseph married 2nd Susan CHAPMAN. Fredrick lived with Kathryn and her 2nd husband, a Mr. ROBINSON and he went by the name of Fredrick ROBINSON until he was a teenager. Fredrick finally decided he wanted his birth name back, but by the time no one who was well-acquainted with his father was around and no one was sure of the spelling; so he spelled it McCONAHAY. Fredrick and his wife, Bessie Marie DANNER, were the grandparents of Randy McCONAHAY. Fredrick had one son, Guy Franklin, and three daughters Lula Marie, Lwona May, and Hildreth Maude.

Josephus and Susan had Daniel C., Frank, Minnie, and Madge. Daniel C. (1886-1943) married 1st to Nell _____ who died in childbirth when Emma was born in 1911. Daniel's 2nd wife, Armada (Mid) White 1890-1979 had Joseph S. McCONAUGHEY (1915-1978) and Richard J. McCONAUGHEY (1918-____) -- both boys were born on January 12th.

Minnie had no children; Frank had Agatha & Earl Mc CONAUGHEY; and Madge had 2 children.

Joseph S. McCONAUGHEY (1915-1978) married 1st Louise HOCKSEY and had Donald Mc CONAUGHEY. Joe married 2nd Evelyn _____ and had 2 children, Joe Richard and Sandra who is married and has a son Kevin _____. Joe Richard has a son named Rick McCONAUGHEY

EARLY INDIANA ATTORNEY

While searching for another line, Mary McConaughy, Frankton, IN, 'met' this early Indiana attorney and couldn't rest until she identified him, as follows:

"You know me --- when I get hold of something I worry it like a dog does a bone. Still couldn't get that Robert McConaughy off my mind that I ran into down in the Clark County, Indiana history. You said he was possibly already down but in case he isn't, here it is.

"From -- History of Knox & Daviess Co., Indiana, (p. 179) --
'Vincennes: ROBERT F. McCANAGHEY was a judge who presided over probate court for the July term 1841. He was a lawyer - came from western Pennsylvania where he was born and educated - died during his term having presided only at the July term 1841.'

"So while searching thru the bulletins I ran across this on page 20 of No. 2: 'Robert the eldest son read law, and was admitted to the Bar at Gettysburg, removed to Indiana and died there in 1840.'

"He was the eldest son of John and Margaret (Patterson) McConaughy of the line of Robert & Elizabeth Dinsmore McConaughy.

"The death date is up for grabs - one says 1840 and the other 1841. Wondering if he is buried in Indiana and if he had married. Well, just answered the last part of that question - page 42 in bulletin 5 says never married."

Well, Mary, I appreciate your confidence in me, but I think I would like to see a will or probate record for Robert before swearing he was NOT married. I agree on who he is and I did know he was in Indiana and died here, etc., but it would be nice to dig a bit further. Another reason being the elusive George N. McConaha who lit briefly in that part of Indiana, who came from Ohio, and who was also a lawyer!! I really WANT to track George N. to his roots!

ADAMS MC CONNAUGHY LINE
BY CLAUDE L. ROE

The McConnaughy lines XII and XX are combined and expanded to accommodate new information as it may be received. The numbering system used, is compatible with computer use. Basically, number "1" is assigned to the earliest member of the generation traced farthest back. The children in each family are listed in order of the oldest first, and sequentially by date of birth, so far as may be known. If the number of children in a family exceeds nine, this system places a dot in the place of "10", so that the double digits from 10 to 19 will be treated as though they were single digits. This practice will preserve the use of the number of digits to designate the number of generations, starting with James McConnaughy, the beginning of the line.

McConnaughy Named 'Coach of Year'

WLS Opponent Set

Bo McConnaughy isn't one to sit back and rest on his laurels. And it's a good thing, because his streaking West Liberty State baseball team won't let him.

The Hilltoppers, in the midst of final exams week, are preparing for the NAIA Area 7 tournament which will begin next Thursday, May 19, in Bluefield. The West Virginia Conference champs will be making their fourth straight appearance in the four-team, double-elimination tournament at Bowen Field.

Their first-round opponent will be Francis Marion, S.C., which upset perennial Area 7 entry South Carolina-Aiken over the weekend. Aiken had been rated in the NAIA Top 10 this season.

Marion, 33-11, presents a problem with outstanding team speed.

"They're very quick," said McConnaughy. "Everybody that gets on (base) runs. That's a big part of their offensive scheme."

West Liberty will take a school-record 29 wins into the tournament, with 13 defeats. McConnaughy plans to send either Tim Mattern or Jim Monnot to the mound against Marion.

The sixth-year coach says his team's defense against running teams "hasn't been too bad. We've had a few games where we didn't do well against running teams. But they've got to get on first."

Meanwhile, the WVC continues its curiously staggered march of releasing all-league honors, and the latest report brings news that McConnaughy has been chosen by his peers as the conference Coach of the Year.

McConnaughy's teams have won 133 games in the six seasons, and have captured the WVC title the past four seasons. He also won the award in 1985.

"It just means that your fellow peers recognized that you did a pretty good job," he said. "It wasn't expected. I thought four or five coaches did a real good job this year."

Player of the Year went to senior DH/hurler John Priddy of W.Va. State, who outdistanced runner-up Mattern in the voting. Mattern, of

course, won Pitcher of the Year honors.

McConnaughy, meanwhile, is concerned about the long layoff between games. The Hilltoppers will have been idle for 12 days when they play next Thursday.

"I don't like it," the coach said. "I think you need to play to stay sharp. Of course, we had a long layoff before the Charleston series, yet some of the guys were hurt and we needed that time off. I think now a layoff might hurt us."

West Liberty, which has won six straight in impressive fashion beginning with the Charleston twinbill, will be trying to snap a perplexing run of bad luck in the Area 7 event.

"Last year we led 7-5 in the last inning with two outs (and lost), so I'm sure the guys will remember that," McConnaughy said.

"One thing in our favor, though, is we've got three years' experience. Hopefully that'll pay off for us."

There are two games scheduled for May 19, three the following Friday, then the championship round on Saturday.

Three more Rhode Island players have earned rank of Life Master

The annual census of the American Contract Bridge League membership is taken each year with the September computer cycle. As of last September, there were 659 ACBL members registered in Rhode Island.

Of that number, 96 members had attained the coveted rank of Life Master. Since then, however, three more members have completed their gold card requirements. Jack LaHoud of Newport and Sue McConaughy of Bristol both earned Life Master status during the latter months of 1987.

More recently, Dot Wilmot of Warwick earned her gold point requirements to make her the unit's first new Life Master of 1988.

Jack LaHoud, a self-employed Newport businessman, went over the top at the Albany, New York, Regional late last summer where he earned his last few gold points.

He is a regular at the Viking Bridge Club in Newport run by Tom Stetson, though he plays frequently around the state as well. LaHoud has served on the unit's board of directors.

LaHoud's favorite partner is his wife Alice, who is herself very close to earning her gold card. LaHoud also plays frequently with Bill McNally of Newport. LaHoud's best tournament performance to date came at a regional in Swan Lake, N.Y., where he finished second overall in a knockout team event.

Sue McConaughy, owner and operator of a quilt shop in Bristol, was first introduced to bridge as a child and had been a social bridge player for years before being introduced to duplicate bridge in 1984.

It was McConaughy's son Mark, one of her five children, who first encouraged her to play duplicate and eventually to join the ACBL. The two became regulars at Bob Garfinkel's Warwick Bridge Club. While Mark put bridge on the back burner to raise his family, Sue hit the tournament trail, and her game steadily improved.

McConaughy won her first regional championship last summer in Manchester, N.H., finishing tied for

first in a Swiss team event. She also has two regional second-place finishes to her credit. These successes gave her all of her gold-point requirements, and it was just a matter of acquiring the 300-point minimum for Life master. She accomplished all this in less than four years, an unusually short time.

Besides Mark, McConaughy's favorite partners include her niece, Debbie Fowler of Ohio, and Sheila Halperin of Cranston.

Dotty Wilmot is another successful tournament player who started playing bridge on a social level. About eight years ago, she and her regular partner, Sylvia Thompson of East Greenwich, decided to give duplicate a try.

They became regulars at Eugenia Tellef's St. David's Bridge Club in Cranston as well as the North Kingstown Bridge Club run by Mary Pea. Today they are both Life Masters and have developed a strong partnership.

Wilmot, a retired Avon district manager, is the mother of one son. She has enjoyed using her retirement to pursue her interest in bridge.

At one point last year, she thought she had earned her last few gold points, but a late point-award adjustment left her 25 hundredths of a point short of her goal.

Wilmot finally went over the top at the Boston Individual last January. She has one regional championship to her credit, as well. She was a member of the same winning team as McConaughy at Manchester, N.H. last summer.

The third annual **EPSON WORLDWIDE BRIDGE CONTEST** is scheduled for Friday, June

3. Last year's contest attracted more than 70,000 players worldwide, 36,000 of whom were ACBL members.

Optimistic organizers are hoping to set a record for the most actual participants in a sporting event by surpassing the 104,000 participants in a recent San Francisco footrace.

As in past years, every competitor will receive a souvenir book of hands played with analyses by bridge celebrity and actor, Omar Sharif. The Epson Computer Corporation is offering more than \$40,000 in prizes for the best performance worldwide.

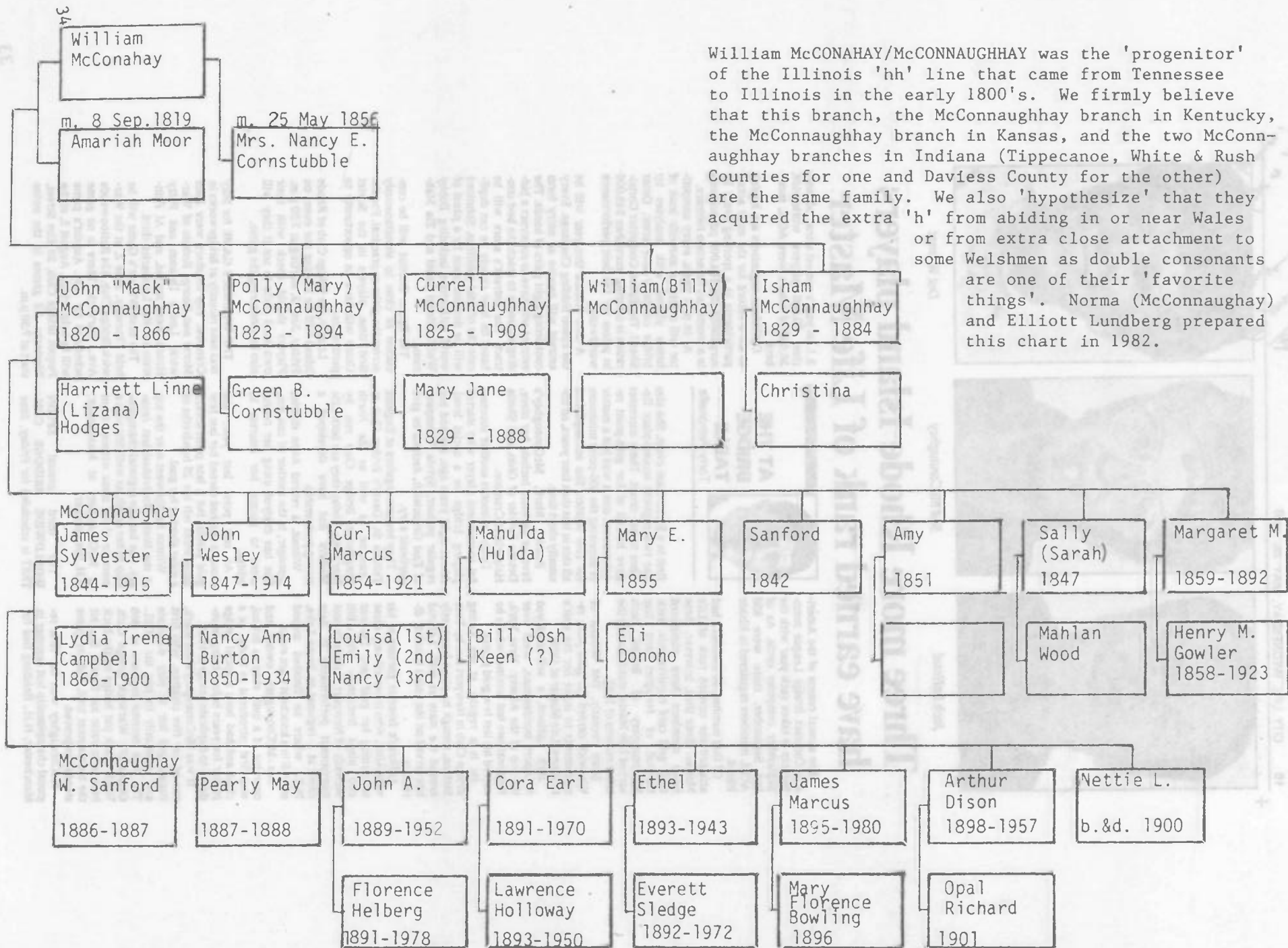
A new feature this year will be the Epson Bidding Challenge. Every entrant will receive an entry form containing eight pairs of hands. The entrant will have to construct a bidding sequence to reach the best contract. The entrant's score will be based on how closely he can duplicate the official solutions. Solutions will be decided upon by a panel of world authorities including Bobby Wolff, Michel Lebel and Zia Mahmood.

The Epson Contest will be conducted as close to simultaneously across the globe as practical. For the first time, players in the Soviet Union will have an opportunity to participate.

Locally, the Bridge Club of Rhode Island will be hosting the event on Friday, June 3, starting at 7:30 p.m. Players should check with their own local clubs to see if they will also be sponsoring the game.

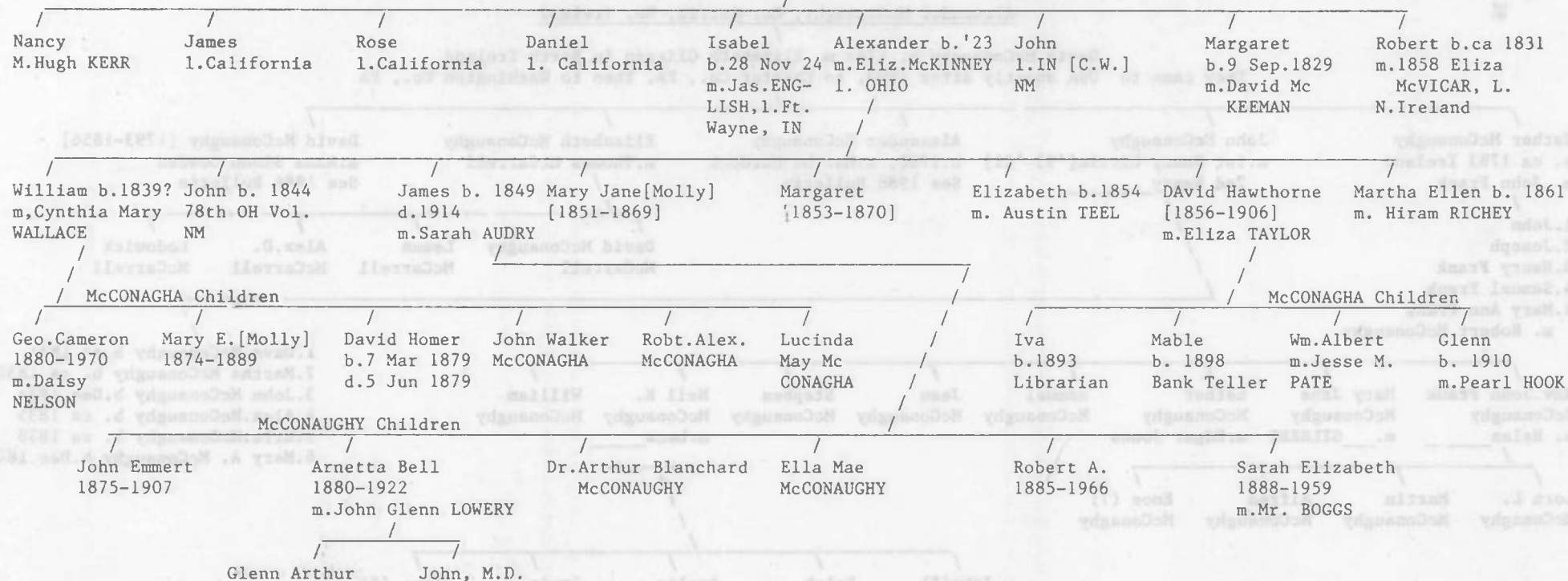

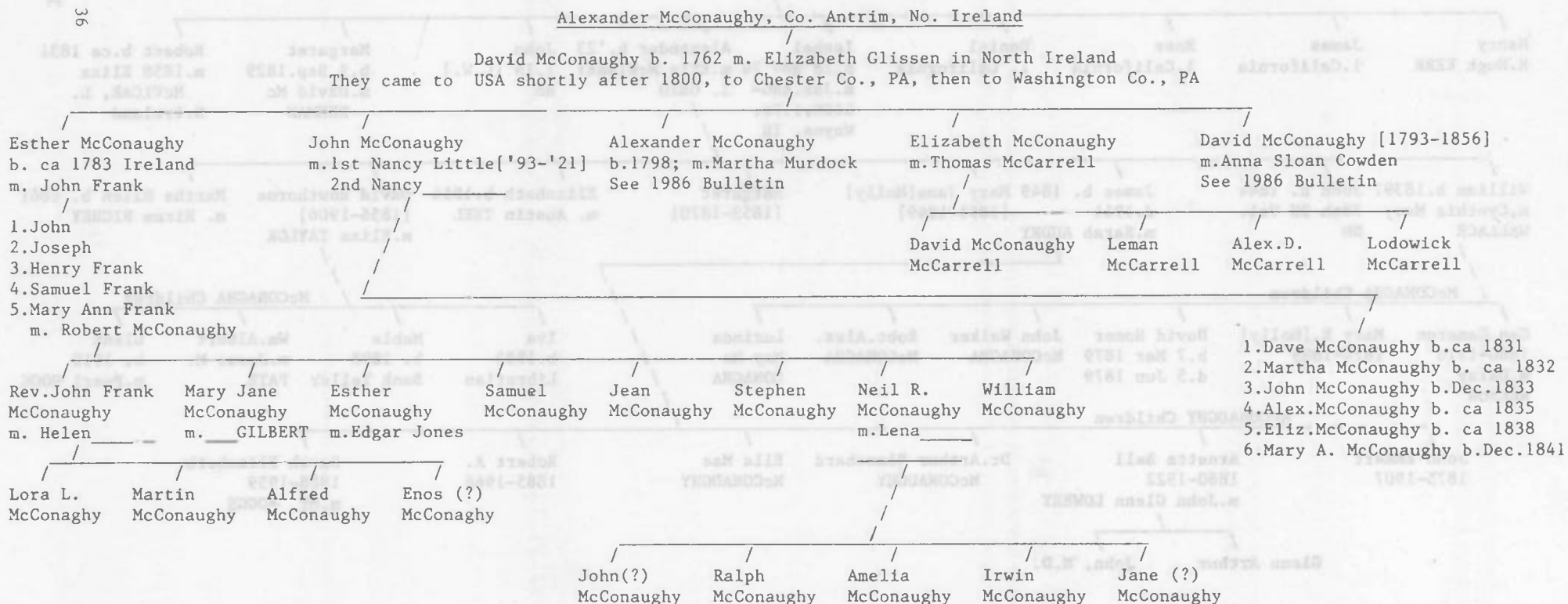
William McCONAHAY/McCONNAUGHAY was the 'progenitor' of the Illinois 'hh' line that came from Tennessee to Illinois in the early 1800's. We firmly believe that this branch, the McConnaughay branch in Kentucky, the McConnaughay branch in Kansas, and the two McConnaughay branches in Indiana (Tippecanoe, White & Rush Counties for one and Daviess County for the other) are the same family. We also 'hypothesize' that they acquired the extra 'h' from abiding in or near Wales or from extra close attachment to some Welshmen as double consonants are one of their 'favorite things'. Norma (McConnaughay) and Elliott Lundberg prepared this chart in 1982.

Letter Written by Mary Elizabeth Baldwin McConney, wife of Walter Trotter McConney

b. Dec. 20, 1849

Thursday, April 7, 1935 or 1938?

Dear Cousins,

I took the morning train to Alliance last Thursday morn -- returned yesterday. Was glad to get several letters, especially yours. Found Mrs. Fording not as strong as when I last saw her. Said she had only been out twice this winter. Two weeks ago one of Mrs. F.'s nieces took her for a ride, but she was so tired when she got home. It is so hard for her to get in and out of the auto. I made foudn calls on others while there going when she took her nap. The first place I went at her urging to see a special friend of hers whom I know slightly. She had been talking over the phone with her a Miss Baugh, the day before and Miss B. hoped I would call on her. She has a severe heart trouble, is confined to her bed all the time and she cannot read as her eyes are so weak. Had a very pleasant call and the minister called while I was there. I remarked that he made me think of our own and spoke of the resemblance. "Oh," he said, "I know him -- we were pals in school and always called each other by our first names. I know Jim very well." When I left he insisted on taking me in his car and the top was low, and I think the stone step was high. So I got a bump that made me see stars, if that is what makes things hurt so. And I've had a badge of blue on my forehead since then that causes comment. I tell folks I go5 that by going for a ride with a preacher. So will be careful after this. Everyone speaks of the bruise is why I think about it.

Mrs. Fording is lonesome and depressed. Is just waiting and anxious for her "Last Clear Call."

I went to call on a first cousin. A man who has been in bed eleven weeks. Has had a bad heart trouble, and for six weeks he thought from day to day would be his last. Dr. says he may ? live quite a while and may go any minute, but I only saw him five minutes. There are so many fine people in the world. Then I went to call on Celia and Esther Hartzell and had supper with them. And saw the three cornered cupboard that Peter Mason made and recalled seeing it in their grandmother's home.

I felt so sorry for Mrs. F. She said "Oh, I wish I could go with you." And I wished so too. It's hard to leave her alone, but I am not in physical condition to take care of her.

Pardon me for the jumble I have made of your letter and questions. Hope you can come again before long. Daughter expects to reach her home latter part of 1'st week in May. Will come here to spend mother's day with me, but will only make a short visit. Do hope you are well. With love and best wishes. M.E.McC.

Andrew Kennet, son of John B. and Mira Douthitt McConney, first wife, was born Dec. 5, 1906. He was married to Loretta Barber. Baldwin's 1st wife wanted a divorce, but he had no grounds against him. He was alone six years then married Zella Barber, mother of his sons wife. No children in second marriage. She had been a widow 14 years

Kenneth's sons, their children are: Walter Glenway born May 30, 1929 and Boris Eugene, born July 23, 1933.

Esther Jane, First child of John and Mary Trotter McConney was born on the home farm near Deerfield June 27, 1845. She was married Oct. 5, 1870 to David FORDING who was born near Salem, O. July 8?, 1842. They made their home in Alliance, O. Where her husband practiced law. Mr. Fording was a trustee of Mt. Union College and a prominent citizen of that town. Their children are: Chas. Edna Gertrude, third child of Walter and Mary BALDWIN McCONNEY was born May 11, 1880. She was married Nov. 5, 1902 to Leon Melville HUNTER. Mr. HUNTER was fatally injured in an automobile accident. He died Oct. 6, 1934 in Willard, O. Mr. HUNTER was a hardware merchant in Willard, Ohio. Their only child Walter Alson was born June 18, 1904. He died Oct. 4, 1927. Did he graduate from high school? Yes, also from Oberlin College. Walter Alson was a very personable young man who gave much promise for future success in life. His death was due to an electric shock he received when working on a radio aerial.

Elmer Leon fourth child of Walter & Mary BALDWIN McCONNEY was born Oct. 19, 1884. He was married to Edna Jane LYTLE in 1909.

Father McCONNEY's brick house was built the summer of 1850. Walter was a baby that summer and the men said they never knew such a good baby. One of them came into his drugstore and told him about it, after we came to Ravenna. Tho we had known it for years. I am sure the house, brick parts, was all built at that time. Later years they had cows and made cheese. There was a frame addition north side of house. That was built for the cheese vat. I saw that when I first knew them. Then after that, they quit making cheese and the boys made it over into a kitchen. That was done while Doc was still at home. There had been a small pantry in north west corner of the brick part and a flour room. That partition was taken out to make a larger pantry and the door taken off which was an improvement. I papered the large room soon after we went on the farm. 'That room was 16' x 18'. A large fireplace to the west that made an inset for a window on each side of F.Place. The southwest corner was a bedroom 11' x 9' and on either side of the main room was a porch open only at the end between those rooms and the brick wall of the main porch of house. Father planned the northeast corner room for his mother and a smaller room was back of that; it had a small closet that was in it under the stairway. The entire southend of house was the parlor.

We came back from Missouri and Father came for us, to Alliance, March 1st, 1879. We staid there till Sept. 1881. Our daughter Edna was born there on farm May 11, 1880. Balwin was about nine months old when we went on the farm. After the sale we went to Deerfield where Walter went into partnership with my niece's husband who had gone into the drug and grocery biz -- the the Big Brick on north east corner of the public square. But finding there was not enough Business to keep two families, they bougft a Drug store in Atwater Station, lived there 9 years then sold store and moved to Ravenna in 1891. Store was opposite Court house. 13 years later he moved to the Knisely store room as it was vacant, and more convenient and carried on there till his death in 1916. Left the store to me. Our oldest son was with him most of the time, and he and I ran the business till I sold to Knisely a year later.

We went to housekeeping in Alliance. He was clerking in a Hardware store -- was there about 4 years. My home was a few doors west of store where he clerked, but on other side of street. But the Depression cost him his job in the late summer of 1875. At the time our first daughter Edith was born. He had no work for 3 months. Then on coal train for two months, then on through frieght till fall. Our Baby died Oct. 7. His brother and wife had come east on a visit and was with us the day, Sunday, she was taken worse. It seemed to be a paralytic stroke. Died the following Sat.

He had always wanted to go West and his brother gave him a better wage so he left the 7th of Nov. I staid with my sisters till the following April then followed him. He had bought a lot and we built a small house and lived in it till Sept., 1878. Then we packed our goods and shipped them to Father's farm. I took our three months old Baby and spent the time with my sister, aunts, and cousins in Iowa till Walter came then came back to Ohio. This is ridiculous to send such a letter as this to you who are so busy. But you don't have to write anything you do not feel should not be in the genealogy.

ALMOST 50 YEARS LATER, WE WOULD LIKE TO ADD --

Some of you will remember I have often remarked on the FACT that some of the 'o' McConoughey's pronounced it 'McConney', some still do, and some even spell it 'McConney'. Add to that mystery the fact that the above McConney line started from a Gettysburg McConaughy line!

Letter from Jim Miller, May 27, 1984: ".....the John McConaughy who was my ancestor -- that he was of the Gettysburg clan there is no doubt as I have the notes of Levi [Miller] of over 80 years ago that claimed kinship and cousinship to the David who was Pres. of W. & J. College [Washington & Jefferson] - I am confident that John was a son of Robert b. 1691 as the will of Robert was administered by the widow of John! This a result of work of Ruth Cummings"

Letter from Jim Miller, June 10 1985: "....Your 'Salt Lake City' vol. 1, 1980 also provided some interesting clues. See page 87 f899084; 48:278. It is here that we can see how the name change came about as the item is close by noting that David and John made their mark!" The Salt Lake City book shows the McConoughey becoming McConney and McConer and shows a David and Isabelle McConney, which must be David & Isabellr Sawhill Miller McConaughy!! This David left items like a Bible record for posterity showing the McConaughy spelling. Regardless of the comment that David & John left their 'Mark' -- there were very few Gettysburgers who couldn't read and write. Again from Jim's letter: "I am very confident of my facts here that David (1775-1865) was a McConaughy from family records as well as a Bible from 1803. That the son John became a McConney is also for sure. I have viewed the old townshipplats and they likewise show this same story."

By the way, the Salt Lake City book also showed some of the Gettysburg McConaughys in the area i.e. Robert of Northfield as well as McConougheys. I theorize that John took the McConney spelling and pronunciation used by some of the McConougheys as a simpler way of life. I know that thought has crossed my mind when faced with signing my name several times over!

Continuing from Jim Miller's 1985 letter: "The David McConaughy was the brother of my ancestor Sarah and was also the second husband of my 3x great grandmother Isabelle Sawhill Miller. See page 2 of my Levi Miller History sent to you some time back and you will see where this chart fits in. There should be McConneys in the Akron area today as can be noted from the bottom of the chart. As a youngster I can remember my Dad talking about the Fordings of Alliance and knew there was a relationship of some sort." The chart will follow.

Doctor depends on friends here to support African work

In the poverty-stricken African nation of Transkei, after a day of tending to limbs, hands and spines, Dr. Chris McConnachie relaxes in his study, made of straw and mud.

"It's actually quite comfortable," McConnachie said Tuesday. "In the middle of a 100-degree day, it's relatively cool under the straw in your mud hut."

McConnachie gave up his Hendersonville medical practice three years ago to work in Transkei, a South African homeland for blacks where he is the only certified orthopaedic surgeon for 3.5 million people.

Back home for a visit Tuesday, McConnachie addressed the Hendersonville Rotary Club and sought funds for the Hendersonville-based African Medical

Mission, which helps finance his medical work.

He'll return here Feb. 18 for a 7:30 p.m. reception at First United Methodist Church. The reception, featuring African and folk music by Asheville musician David Wilcox, is open to the public.

Had he stayed in Hendersonville, the 50-year-old Scottish-born doctor would likely be treating people with foot or arthritic problems — routine ailments in the United States.

In Transkei, he treats disorders nearly unheard of here, like tuberculosis of the spine, a paralyzing disease that affects 2 percent of the population.

Leprosy is a problem, he said, and malnutrition is widespread. Polio cripples thousands each year and

half of all children die before their fifth birthday, he said.

Most of Transkei, where the average wage is \$60 per month, lacks electricity and running water. It is a land with few natural resources. Most of the men move away to work in the gold mines of South Africa.

"It is an extraordinary decision for an accomplished surgeon to give up a lucrative practice and commit himself to a destitute people," said Frank Huyler, executive director of the African Medical Mission.

Monday is "surgery day" in Transkei. That day McConnachie operates all day, as well as assisting less-experienced doctors with surgery. Lots of coffee, tea and sandwiches keep them going. He performs up to 50 operations each week.

"It is a little bit like *M*A*S*H*," he said.

McConnachie works in hospitals that were built by missions, but have been taken over by the Transkei government. Many claim the government is controlled by South Africa. Transkei has experienced two coups in the past six months.

"It really doesn't make much differ-

ence to me," he said. "We try to stay out of that stuff. If you get involved, they would send you home."

The desire to give up a potentially posh life here for a hard life in Africa began in 1967, when McConnachie and his wife, Jenny, went together to Africa as medical missionaries for the Episcopal Church's United Society for the Propagation of the Gospel.

"The thought of going back to Africa was always in the back of our minds," he said. His religious beliefs, he said, keep him motivated.

He lives in a cramped house with his wife and four of his six children (two of his daughters attend the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill). In the backyard are two mud and straw huts, one of which is the study. They live near Durban, about 1,000 miles from Capetown, South Africa.

Medical facilities in Transkei are lacking, he said. That's why he returns to the United States at least once each year, to solicit private donations, foundation grants and church donations.

Earlier this week he was in Atlanta, meeting with foundation officials. In Atlanta, he also attended the annual meeting of the American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons to learn new medical techniques.

Medical equipment is so rare in Transkei that it is being "used to death," he said. Doctors are rare, too. In the United States, there is one doctor for every 1,000 people. In Transkei, the ratio is one doctor to every 50,000 people, he said.

The African Medical Mission recently began an \$850,000 fund drive that would pay for operating room construction and the purchase of medical equipment, medical instruments, medicine, ambulances, and wheelchairs.

Numerous local churches and groups have donated money to the medical mission. McConnachie said St. James Episcopal Church has been especially supportive.

McConnachie thinks of Hendersonville as a well he dips into for emotional and financial support. Without local support, he said, the work he does in Transkei would be impossible.

When the work becomes overwhelming, or when he relaxes in his study, his thoughts are often of Hendersonville.

"This is where it all began," he said. "The support is essential. The friends I have here are what I miss the most. I could not do it alone."

Dear Pat,

Please forgive me for using your first name without even knowing your family name. I was sent a copy of a letter which you wrote on the 23rd of March to Mrs. Richard (Mary) Toerner who represents the Clan Campbell Society (USA) in Arizona and you had signed yourself "Pat".

Although my father's family were known as MacConnochie (often spelt different ways in different documents, even McCondochy) and my mother is descended from the Clan Donnachie Robertsons of Struan in Perthshire, our family have long been Campbells. However I have wondered whether it would be possible for me to become a member of your Society owing to my ancestors having used MacConnochie as a "patronymic" from the fourteen hundreds to the early 18th century?

Some of our family began to use MacConnochie (or similar spellings) as a family name. The ones I know of were the sons of John Dubh MacConnochie who died about 1607. He was a younger brother of Dugald Campbell of Inverawe in Argyll and when his brother died he was in charge of the place while his nephew was a minor and so was known as the "Tutor of Inverawe". He is said to have been shot with an arrow by the boy heir after he was going to kill him and take the place for himself. Archie (Archibald) the boy was told by his servant man "If you do not shoot him, he will shoot you". There is a cairn (pile of stones) called Carn MacDonnachaidh not far from the river Awe where he is said to have been buried. Anyhow John dubh (black haired John) had been in Ireland with the Islemen and his MacDonald friends fighting against the English army of Elizabeth in the 1590s. He was with Tyrone and Angus MacDonald and must have been quite a leader because the Irish were sending to Argyll to get him to come back with a thousand men.

At the same time the English chief minister Burghly (Cecil) kept writing to Bowes, the English Ambassador to Scotland, to get "macondochy" into his pay to go back to Ireland but to then turn his coat to the English side. He kept playing them for land but all they would come up with was cash so he never went.

Anyhow John Dubh MacConnochie married Barbara Graham. She had been married to a MacKerlich but they ran off together and had quite a few boys who appear in later records, all calling themselves MacConnochie and one marrying the daughter of MacLellan of Bombie. He was also known as John MacConnochie. Bombie is I think in Ayrshire.

No, I see that the marriage contract dated 6 Sept 1623 was at Kirkcudbright so it may more likely be in Dumfriesshire. This was the younger John and Margaret McClellan or MacLellan. Anyhow it is possible that any MacConnochies in that part of the world might be descendants of the John and Margaret.

On the whole, doing research into both the Inverawe MacConnochies and into the Robertsons of Clan Donnachie it does seem that most often the former used a "C" and the latter a "D" to begin their patronymic, however I have found one document where brothers were called one MacConnachie and another MacDonnochie, just a variation in spelling. But Connachie was far the most common for the Inverawe clan Connachie, and Donnachaidh more common among the Robertsons.

John's boys got into big trouble with the law for a raid which they carried out against the Colquhouns on Loch Lomond. There was the suspicion that it was their chief Argyll who had put them up to it but more likely they were just following their father's tradition of cattle reiving which was the way boys proved their manhood in those days.

I too have run across the Bute McConnochys but did not know that they were Robertsons. It is more likely that they were either independently descended from a Duncan who was neither Campbell nor Robertson or from one of the Inverawe family I would think, unless they have actual proof of Robertson descent. In the 19th century, since the Robertsons were better known in literature than the Inverawe family, many concluded that if their name was MacConnachie they must be descended from Robertsons. But they may just as likely be Inverawe descendants or, as you so rightly say, descended from the son of some quite different Duncan, Duncan being such a common first name in the Highlands for so long. I believe that it was the difference in the local Gaelic dialect which may have resulted in the use of Donnachie in Perthshire and Connachie in Argyll, both, as you say, meaning Duncan.

It is highly likely that John Dubh MacConnachie had offspring during his campaigning in Ireland and there is nothing to say that he did not have an earlier wife before Barbara. The women usually went along on the campaigns in those days so that he could have had sons in Ireland.

As you know the use of gh replaced ch when one crossed to Ireland so that there MacConnachie could become McConnaughey very easily. Again there is nothing to say whether one of the latter name would be descended of a Scottish MacConnachie or an Irish Duncan, but curiously the name Duncan appears far more commonly in Scotland than in Ireland in my experience, although I have not researched that subject.

One comical thing about the MacConnachie raid against the Colquhouns is that today the wife of the Duke of Argyll is the daughter of Sir Ivor Colquhoun of Luss and is a direct descendant of those who suffered in that raid.

As I expect that you know, it is a rough rule that those who came to this country from Ireland and were protestants and with Scottish type names were generally of Scots descent. Those who were Catholic were most often native to Ireland originally. Since the great library in Dublin was burnt in the "troubles" the best place for research is in the library in Belfast where copies of many of the older Irish documents had been sent. However until the people of Ulster can be persuaded to vote for those who will agree to a united Ireland many of the records in Belfast are restricted I understand. It always bugs me that the US media never make it clear that the only reason that the British are in Northern Ireland is owing to the Northern Irish having voted for representatives who would keep them British, the good old democratic system.

I once met an Irish man from Ulster in Scotland and asked him whether it was true that the IRA and the protestant extremists met behind the scenes to keep the troubles going in Ulster. "Oh yes" he said "Everyone knows that"! Well, I sure did not. Later I got documentation of them both meeting in Libya.

I know for a fact that most British taxpayers outside Ulster would far rather see a united Ireland without bloodshed and without their having to fork out for the army and police there. But again, the US media never gives that side of the tale. The news stories always make out Ulster to be a "British Colony" which it once was but you cannot say that when free elections have been held and the majority voted to stay British. Which is sad. I have cousins in both Cork and Ulster. Both write they would like to see an end to the IRA and of course the protestant extremists. The IRA have blown up too many banks in Eire (Southern Ireland) to be popular there any more they tell me.

Well, forgive me I did not mean to get into politics but it is relevant to the research capabilities for work in Ulster and Eire. Belfast is the best place but is restricted, but maybe you knew this. However Trinity College Dublin has some of the best historians in the world when it comes to the national scene beyond the details of genealogy.

I was fascinated to hear that you had got a copy of the arms on the tombstone of Robert McConaughy b. 1691 from County Tyrone. As you know, the Highland Chiefs were not too particular about going along with the laws from Edinburgh all the time so that they often used heraldry which was not registered with the Lord Lyon King at Arms there. Some of the earlier tombstones of the Inverawe family in Argyll have arms quite different from those registered to the family, however all recognisably Campbell and it sounds as though the Tyrone stone may be of that type. I would love to see a copy if you had one available.

There was the one branch of the Campbell family of Loch Awe who gave the MacGregors a very hard time. They were the Glenorchy Campbells, ancestors of the Marquis of Breadalbane and for quite a while they worked together with the MacGregors, living in the same glen of Orchy, some of them. But you are right that after a raid that the MacGregors made upon the Colquhouns (them again!)

the government "proscribed" them and they had to use different names. Since many were married to Campbells and Murrays they took those for their names. Rob Roy McGregor's mother was a Campbell for instance. My great great grandfather's great uncle Duncan Campbell was in the cattle trade and his partner was Mr. Murray of Glencarnaig who it turns out was a close relative of Rob Roy's and was actually a McGregor. This was in the 1730s. I am attempting a biography of Duncan and that is why I got into researching those mentioned in the documents of his time but I am afraid that otherwise I am not strong on McGregor history yet.

The two MacGregor MacConnachies I came across were at the same time as John Dubh MacConnachie, Tutor of Inverawe, and seem to have gone raiding with him so I was confused and thought at first that they were relatives since there was no MacGregor name used and it was before the time of prescription. However I have been assured by others more qualified than myself that they are in fact MacGregors. Then there is also a MacDonnachie in Glenorchy about that time who was a descendant of the Glencoe MacIans or McDonalds who also went raiding with John Dubh (if I remember rightly) but he was just a son of a Duncan MacDonald.

There must be many other Scottish Highland MacConnachies and MacDonnachaidhs I have not come across, but since the chieftain of the Inverawe family has always been known as MacConnachie of Inverawe, I have always kept my eyes open for variations of the name in the hope that I will find more descendants who took that name. However I have not had much luck so far. The easiest of the early members of the family to trace are undoubtedly those who got into some trouble with the law and so were recorded in the Privy Council records or the courts. Most of the correspondence about John Dubh was found in the Catalogue of State Papers Relating to Scotland, a British Government publication.

I have a draft of a paper on John Dubh with all the references but have not published it in the hope that I can come across something on his time in Ireland. However I have not had time to go to Belfast or Dublin yet.

Your people are in much the same situation as the MacArthurs, an old name but likely coming from a number of sources, a number of different Arthurs. The best documented was Sir Arthur Campbell at the time of Robert the Bruce who Bruce granted many of the lands of the MacDougalls who they had defeated. However his son was about to marry a MacDonald heiress and the King beheaded ^{her} ~~all~~ her suitors except the one he chose so the lands were back with the MacDougalls within two generations. The Loch Awe MacArthurs seem to have been descended from a younger son of Arthur and they certainly used the Campbell "gyronny" (gold and black windmill shaped triangles on their shield). But of course there are those also descended from other Arthurs and some would like to find a descent from the legendary (?) king of that name. All this makes it hard for them to decide on a Chief.

While the Robertsons of Struan have been recognised officially as the Chiefs of Clan Donnachaidh, the MacConnachies of Inverawe have never applied to be officially recognised as Chieftains of Clan Connachie yet although I am sure that there would be no difficulty in their being so recognised by the Lord Lyon since the proof stretches back to the fourteen hundreds.

The MacCallums (Malcolms) are in something of the same position in that (my son's Godfather) Robin Malcolm of Poltalloch in Argyll is considered Chief of the MacCallums, yet there is another branch of that clan, presumably descended from quite a different Calum, who are in another part of Scotland and they share no common ancestry they can find. I would think that in those cases the only way would be for the clan organizations to decide who to recognise as Chief. As you may know, in the older Irish and Pictish annals and genealogies it is clear that each Chief or King was chosen from among the chiefly Kin by their senior followers, and not always the eldest son. In the days when a King actually led in battle or in defence of the tribe his age and stature and strength were more important to the people than the concept of primogeniture.


Anyhow, I would be most interested to know more about your Society and whether you restrict it only to those of Irish origin or have a wider application. If I can be of any help in terms of research on the Scottish MacConnachies or the MacDonnachaidhs please do not hesitate to let me know.

My family are cadets of cadets of the Inverawe family, a junior branch you might say, my father and his father both having been younger sons of the family. The present MacConnachie of Inverawe no longer lives there (although his sister's son, Alastair Campbell of Airds Yr., Chief Executive of Clan Campbell and Unicorn Persuivant does) but lives in Riccall in Yorkshire.

Well, I have bent your ear enough with our branch of the MacConnachies and hope that it is of some interest.

They trace themselves back to the Inverawe family but while they are probably correct in the assumption, their connection is without any proof in any documentation I have seen or found.

These show the possibilities for locating/differentiating our surname use of ubiquitous Christian names like Benj-Franklin, Geo.-Washington, and Thos-Jefferson, not to mention the Davids, Johns, and Elizabeths. These are not complete, but being filled in after each library trip. I've found an LDS library branch where I can access some of the later indexes that I found Clayton has not yet acquired, so hope to get back to that. All blessing for your family in Thanksgiving Celebrations."

I second the motion to caution you about 'completeness' --- the list is still not complete, in spite of Thelms's hard work, and Maxine's hard work, and my work since 1960.

William McConkey 1786-1873

William McConkey was born in County Armagh, N. Ireland in 1786. We believe his father was John Edward McConkey (1762-1851) also of County Armagh.

William came to Canada in 1818 from Ireland. His brothers John, George and James came over at about the same time. Thomas (1781-1862) came to Canada in 1823. Another brother also came but didn't like it and returned to Ireland. We do not know his name. According to family lore, their farm in Ireland was known as "Cherry Valley".

Thomas settled finally in Simcoe County, Ontario where his son, Thomas D., served as reeve of the town of Barrie and warden of Simcoe County. T.D. was later elected to the old Canadian Parliament and was elected to the first House of Commons of the Dominion of Canada. He was a Justice of the Peace and served as sheriff there until the time of his death.

James went to Charleston, South Carolina before the Civil War and George went to Wisconsin.

William settled in what was then called Upper Canada about nine miles north of Brockville, Ontario near New Dublin. About 3/4 mile east of New Dublin stands the old house built by William.

We haven't been able to learn much of William's personal life except that he was a farmer and a VERY strong Protestant. In 1823 he married Margaret (Peggy) Tackaberry who came from County Down, N. Ireland. He and his family were members of St. John's Anglican Church, Lamb's Pond, New Dublin. The tombstones of William and his wife both lie right by the door to the church. Several other McConkeys are buried there as well.

William and Peggy had ten children; Susannah, James, Benjamin, Martha, Deborah Ann, William Hudson, Thomas Henry, Margaret and John and Samuel (twins).

All of their children were born in New Dublin but as the generations have passed there remain very few McConkeys in the New Dublin-Brockville area.

William died December 7, 1873 at the age of 86. Peggy McConkey died in March of 1902 at the age of 96.

Benjamin McConkey 1831-1899

Benjamin (son of William) moved his family to Michigan around 1877. There he bought a farm four miles west of Cass City in November 1877 which is still being run by McConkey descendants named Loomis (Cecil McConkey Loomis' sons). The farm was named a Centennial Farm by the Michigan Historical Commission, an honor given to farms that have been owned by the same family for over 100 years.

Benjamin and Jane Maud McConkey had seven children; William, Ella, Robert, Benjamin Franklin, James Hudson, Hannah and Henry.

Benjamin Franklin McConkey 1872-1954

B.F. McConkey came to Montana from Cass City, Michigan in the spring of 1891 at the age of 19.

He learned the sheep business after being hired to manage several sheep ranches. Eventually, by 1901, he and his brother Rob were in partnership, owning a large sheep ranch near Raynesford, Montana where they ran around 2800 head of sheep.

Then, in 1910, Rob decided to return to Michigan to live. He was concerned with the health of his son, Kenneth, and felt he would be closer to doctors there. Ben and Rob sold their ranch property and Ben moved his family to Raynesford. There he, in partnership with Walter Kennedy, A.J. Stough and John Strump, established the Raynesford Mercantile Company. He managed the business until 1917 when it was sold to Henry Livix.

In 1917 Ben purchased the mercantile business of Philip Leveille in Belt, Mt. The family business operated under the name of the McConkey Mercantile Company.

Later, the mercantile business and the ranch holdings of Ben's sons Leon and Lorne (in the Bears Paw Mountains near Warrick, Mt) were incorporated and operated as the McConkey Livestock Company.

From all accounts Ben had a very sharp business mind. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge in Belt and also a VERY strong Protestant.

Ben and Effie McConkey's second son, Alton, died of Diphtheria on February 27, 1918, shortly after their arrival in Belt. Mrs. McConkey passed away on March 30, 1924, in Belt, at the age of 54.

Mr. McConkey continued to live in Belt and maintained his business interests there until 1931 when he sold the mercantile business to B.J. Kennedy and his son-in-law Joe Morris. He continued his partnership in the ranch holdings with his sons. The last six years of his life he spent with his daughter, Inez, and her husband, Joe Morris, in Belt. Ben passed away March 6, 1954 shortly after his 82nd birthday.

Leon McConkey 1894-1982

Leon was born at Stanford, Montana and raised there and at Raynesford. He went to the Belt Valley High School. Around 1911 he attended the Business College in Great Falls, Montana where he studied Business Administration. But his greatest interest was in ranching.

In 1910, Leon, his brother Alton, and another boy that Ben McConkey raised rode horseback from Belt to Havre to Malta (a distance of about 130 miles) to check on some property near Malta. On this trip Leon first saw the Bears Paw Mountains.

He married Ruth Atkinson of Cora Creek, Montana in Great Falls, Mt on Nov.6, 1916 and they moved to Leon's homestead near Warrick in the Bears Paw Mt. the spring

of 1917. Later that year Leon and his brother Lorne bought another ranch nearby and ran cattle on about 3000 acres.

Leon and Ruth had three children; Royal, Inez and Robert.

In 1935 Leon sold his share of the ranch to his father and brother and he and Ruth bought a ranch about 23 miles east of Big Sandy, Montana.

Royal and Robert were both in the Army Air Force during W.W.II and when the war was over they went into partnership with Leon on the ranch.

In 1958 Robert released his interests and bought a ranch near Ronan, Montana. Royal and Leon continued their partnership until 1964 when the ranch was sold. Royal moved to Missoula, Montana where he became manager of the Production Credit Association.

Ruth and Leon retired to Big Sandy. Ruth passed away in 1969 and Leon in 1982.

Grandpa Leon was an excellent story-teller and he had a large repertoire of experiences from his past which he used to keep us all entertained.

He was an active member of the Masonic Lodge in Big Sandy for over 30 years and also took part in Shriners and Scottish Rite.

GI BRIDE RETURNS FOR BALLYMONEY FAMILY'S REUNION

WHEN sisters Mary Nellis and Fanny Stretton returned to their native town of Ballymoney from their homes in the United States, a rare opportunity was presented to the McConaghie family to have a heart-warming reunion.

And this week in the home of brother Sam, a member of Ballymoney Borough Council, they met up again with their brother Jim, who flew in from Manchester, and sisters Rachael Fernihough, now living just outside Birmingham, and Annie Nicholl, who is still a resident of Ballymoney.

Despite the enormous distance that separates the sons and daughters of Jim and Elizabeth McConaghie, from the townland of Dunaghy, they have remained a close-knit unit and thoroughly enjoy their get-togethers - infrequent as they may be - when they recall childhood memories and their days at Land head Primary School.

Mary, the eldest of the family, was first to leave these shores when she became one of a group of ladies fondly remembered nowadays as the GI brides. She met her husband Chuck, who sadly died in May last year, when he was one of the American soldiers stationed in Ballymoney.

He arrived at Belfast har-

bour in January 1942, as part of the first contingent of American troops to land in Ireland, and after a short stay in Ballyclare, was stationed in North Antrim. Their bases were spread throughout the town with Chuck at a barracks in Queen Street.

"I was working as a waitress in Hughes's restaurant when we met," recalls Mary. "We were married the following year on February 6 at St. James's Presbyterian Church by the late Rev. R.H. Wilson."

A few months later, in the Autumn of 1943, the young couple moved to England, as Chuck was stationed firstly at Bristol and then in various parts of southern England. Eventually he had to leave his bride to go to Southampton to prepare for the American landings in France in June 1944, an event of historical importance that became known as D-Day.

"I wanted to return to Ireland during this time but it would have meant staying there for six months due to war-time restrictions, so I stayed in England," reveals Mary.

While engaged in this dangerous exercise, Chuck sustained a serious lung injury and after spending time in a French hospital, he was returned to England. "I was informed by the Red Cross

that he had been wounded, but they were unable to tell me which hospital he had been sent back to. I searched for him all over England before eventually finding him in Yeovil," Mary says.

During this recuperation period, the Ballymoney lass received word that there was room on one of the hospital ships in February 1945 for GI brides, and as this was the only means of getting to America, she decided to go, even though her husband would not follow for a number of months.

"The boat left from Glasgow and arrived in New York nine days later. There was little comfort on board and I was ill throughout the trip," she remembers.

Chuck's family came from a town outside New York called Lyons, where Mary still lives today. When she arrived in New York she contacted them and travel arrangements were made. "His father was a railroad man and was able to work out a schedule to get me to Lyons. When I arrived there the family met me. We knew each other to see through photographs," she states.

Despite being in a strange place, Mary settled in relatively quickly with the help of her new family. They showed her around the area and in-

troduced her to a number of local people. "I had to change my lifestyle in many different ways. The first thing I noticed was the cold as the snow was up to my knees. The food was also very different and I missed the soda farls and potato bread!"

Chuck was eventually sent home to Long Island five months later in July, but as he was still in the army the couple were only able to see each other at weekends, so they continued to stay in Chuck's parents home.

When he was discharged, he attained a post as a director of a recreation centre, before beginning a career in the Post Office where he reached Post Master General before his retirement in 1977.

Mary also held down a number of jobs, beginning her American working life with a seat belt firm and then moving to a telephone company. She eventually landed a job in the New York State School, a development centre, where she also stayed until her retirement in 1978.

The couple also had two children, Jim and Diane, who visited their mother's homestead in 1956, but have not been back since. However, Mary and Chuck made a number of return visits, notably in 1964 when

have one daughter Lori, who has not yet visited the "ould sod."

CHANGES

Both ladies have noticed a number of changes in Ballymoney over the years. "If I was here on my own I would not know where to go," says Mary. "There are so many new roads and buildings. When I lived here it was impossible to get around to different places as no-one had cars. On this trip I have been to places I never knew existed. The only other thing that has changed is my family, who have got older, just like myself!"

they came to Ballymoney for Mary's parents' 50th wedding anniversary.

Councillor Sam McConaghie, Mary's brother, recalls their visits and particularly the impression made in Ballymoney by Chuck, who also served on the local council in Lyons for a number of years. "He always enjoyed his trips to the town and made a lot of friends, with whom he remained in close contact for many years. He was also an excellent host as my wife Ellen and I discovered when we visited America 12 years ago," he says.

Accompanying Mary on this current month-long trip, which started at the beginning of July, is her sister Fanny, who has lived in Waterloo, New York State for the past 31 years. "I worked in a shirt factory in Society Street in Coleraine before emigrating. Mary and Chuck sponsored me and I stayed with them when I went out in 1957," she reveals.

Fanny also landed a job in the seat belt factory where Mary worked before moving to school suppliers and eventually to the Goldpumps waterpump company, where she is still employed today. She met and married Homer L. Stretton there and they

The main change Fanny has noticed is that the people she grew up with are no longer about the town. "All my friends seem to be living in and around California, after emigrating for a multitude of reasons."

Having lived so long in the United States, neither Mary or Fanny would contemplate returning to North Antrim permanently. "I really enjoy my trips home and family reunions, but I would not like to live here again," Mary states.

One member of the McConaghie family who is to the forefront of their minds during reunions is their sister Jannie Skelton, who died as a relatively young woman in her thirties. Her son Billy is a well-known figure in the Ballymoney community.

While emigration can often lead to severing of family bonds, the opposite is the case with the McConaghies. And although four of the family decided to spend their lives away from Ballymoney, brother Jim sums up their feelings by saying - "I can think of no better place to come back to."

McConnaha Research on the McConnaha line was very successful, and there are ample clues with which to follow up in further research sessions. The name McConnaha was originally spelled McConnaughey, and an interim spelling was found to be McConahey. The spelling used in this report will reflect that used in the records.

The first step in the research was to find the John Elmer McConnaha family in the 1900 census of Nebraska. This was easily done, as family information provided the names of John Elmer's wife and children and the fact that they resided in Herman, Washington County, Nebraska.

The family of Elmer and Estella McConnaha was found in the 1900 census of Herman, Washington County, Nebraska. (Document 1). They had children Evert and Jerold born at that time, but not Beulah. Elmer (or John Elmer) was born in Pennsylvania in 1864. Estella was born in Iowa in 1870, but her parents were born in Tennessee. Living next door to Elmer was an Ernest McConnaha, born in 1868 in Nebraska. This was probably Elmer's younger brother.

Since Elmer's parents had apparently moved to Nebraska from Pennsylvania by 1870, the 1870 census of Washington County was searched for any McConnaha families. The family of John McConough with wife Mary and sons John A. (John Elmer, probably the "A" was a mistake) and Ernst (Ernest) C. (Document 2). The ages and birthplaces for the children matched the information from the 1900 census. Living next door to the McConough family was a John and Mary Latta, age 70 and 65 respectively. Since Estella or Stella, the wife of Elmer McConnaha was supposed to have been Latta by birth, it seemed possible that this couple might have been her grandparents. This supposition was proven, by further research, to be incorrect.

County histories for Washington County, Nebraska were checked for John McConnaha, since he was an early settler, but no biographical notices were found. He was found in the 1900 census of Blair City, Washington County, Nebraska with children born after 1870. His occupation was listed as a physician. (Document 3).

John McConnaha was born in 1838 and evidently not married until 1863 or thereabouts. Being from Pennsylvania, it seemed highly likely that he might have served in the Civil War, as that state provided a higher number of soldiers for the Union cause than most any other. Several sources which might have revealed such Civil War service were checked, but none of them showed the name of John McConnaha, under any spelling. It was hoped that Civil War records might help to locate the family in Pennsylvania.

John McConnaha's family was found in the 1880 census of Cass County, Nebraska (Document 4) and it was by checking records available for this county that a great deal of information was uncovered. He had evidently moved there from Washington County by 1880 and was still residing there in 1889. A biography for John McConnaha, M.D. was found which gave an abundance of family information. (Document 5). His place of origin in Pennsylvania was given as Crawford County, and his ancestry given back another two generations. In addition, maiden names of wives and some of their relations were given. This information has been plotted on the pedigree chart.

A very interesting piece of information contained in the biography was that John McConnaha's wife was Mary, the daughter of John and Mary (McConnaha) Latta. It is quite possible that the name Latta enters in to the family here and not with Estella. Family tradition may have confused the two generations. It is also interesting that Mary Latta's mother's name

was McConnaha and that she and her husband were also from Crawford County, Pennsylvania. Further research would show that the McConnaha family in Crawford County may have been descended from one immigrant ancestor, so it is quite possible that John McConnaha and Mary Latta were cousins, maybe in the first degree.

Research proceeded in Crawford County on the family of Robert McConahey, the father of John McConnaha. He was found in the 1850 census of South Shenango Township. (Document 6). His wife Margaret was listed with him as well as his three children. Cemetery inscriptions for Crawford County revealed that Margaret (Lackey) McConahey died in late 1850. (Document 7). The cemetery records also showed that the parents of Robert McConahey died in 1844 and 1845. These were Robert and Margaret (Story) McConahey. According to the Nebraska biographical sketch this Robert McConahey was the immigrant ancestor from Scotland, but further research showed that he was probably Scotch-Irish, and that his family had resided in Ireland for some generations before coming from Scotland.

Robert McConahey (1767-1846) came to Pennsylvania after the Revolution but before 1798, when he arrived in Crawford County to take up a grant of land. (Documents 8 and 9). It is therefore curious that next to Robert McConahey there is a grave for a James McConahey "born in Ireland in the year 1807." This James may have been a nephew of Robert, and following up on him may allow for the family to be established in Ireland.

Further research on the younger Robert McConahey showed that he married again after the death of Margaret, this time to a Martha. They had another five children (at least). Robert lived until the 1900 census, and he stated that both his father and his mother were born in Ireland at that time. (Document 13). He was 86 years old at that time, but his death did not occur

until after 1905 and he had evidently died by 1910. (Document 14). His second wife Martha was still living in 1910, but Robert was no where to be found.

The clues contained in the biographical sketch of John McConnaha, M.D. are ample enough to follow up on all of the lines mentioned; the Story's, Lackeys, and Lattas. The Genealogical Society has many records for Crawford County, Pennsylvania which can be consulted in order to find out more about these ancestors. In addition, D.A.R. records for Beulah McConnaha can be consulted for further information on these ancestors and their service in the Revolution. It will be necessary to find out her married name before these records can be consulted.

As for Estella, the wife of John Elmer McConnaha, a request for their marriage record has been sent to both Washington and Cass Counties, Nebraska. This will not only provide her maiden name, but the names of her parents. In the event that it is not Latta, this record will provide the true name to trace.

The prospects for further successful research on all of these families are excellent.

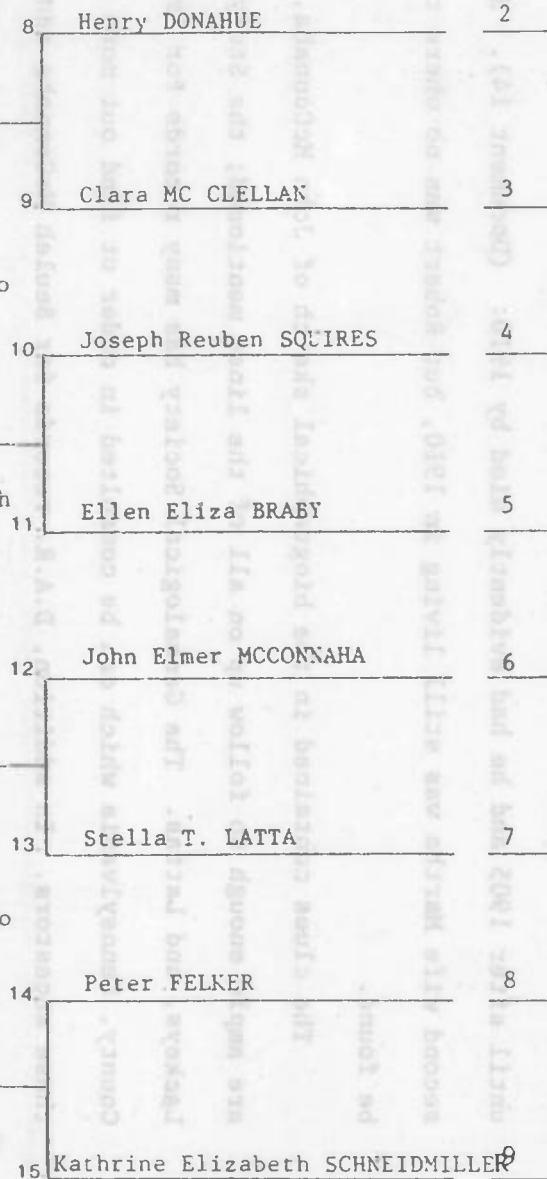
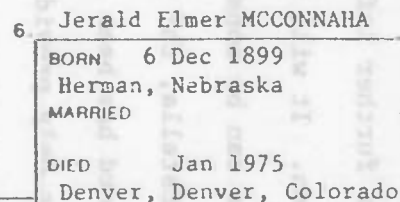
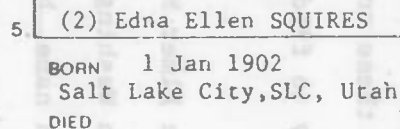
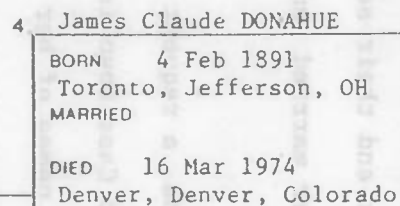
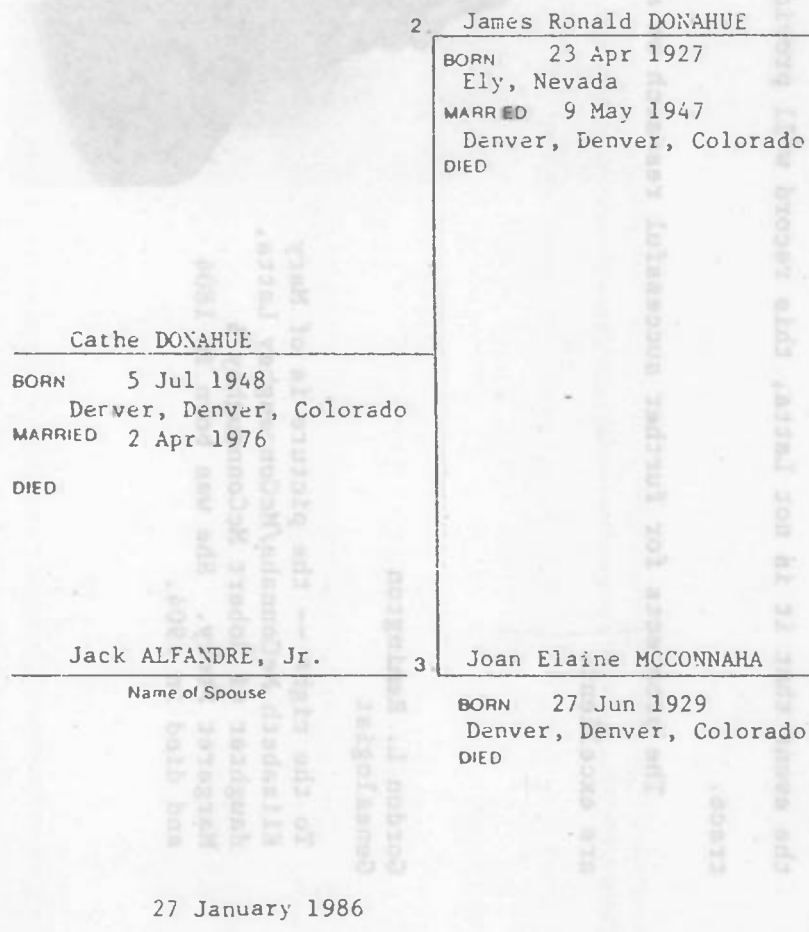




PEDIGREE CHART

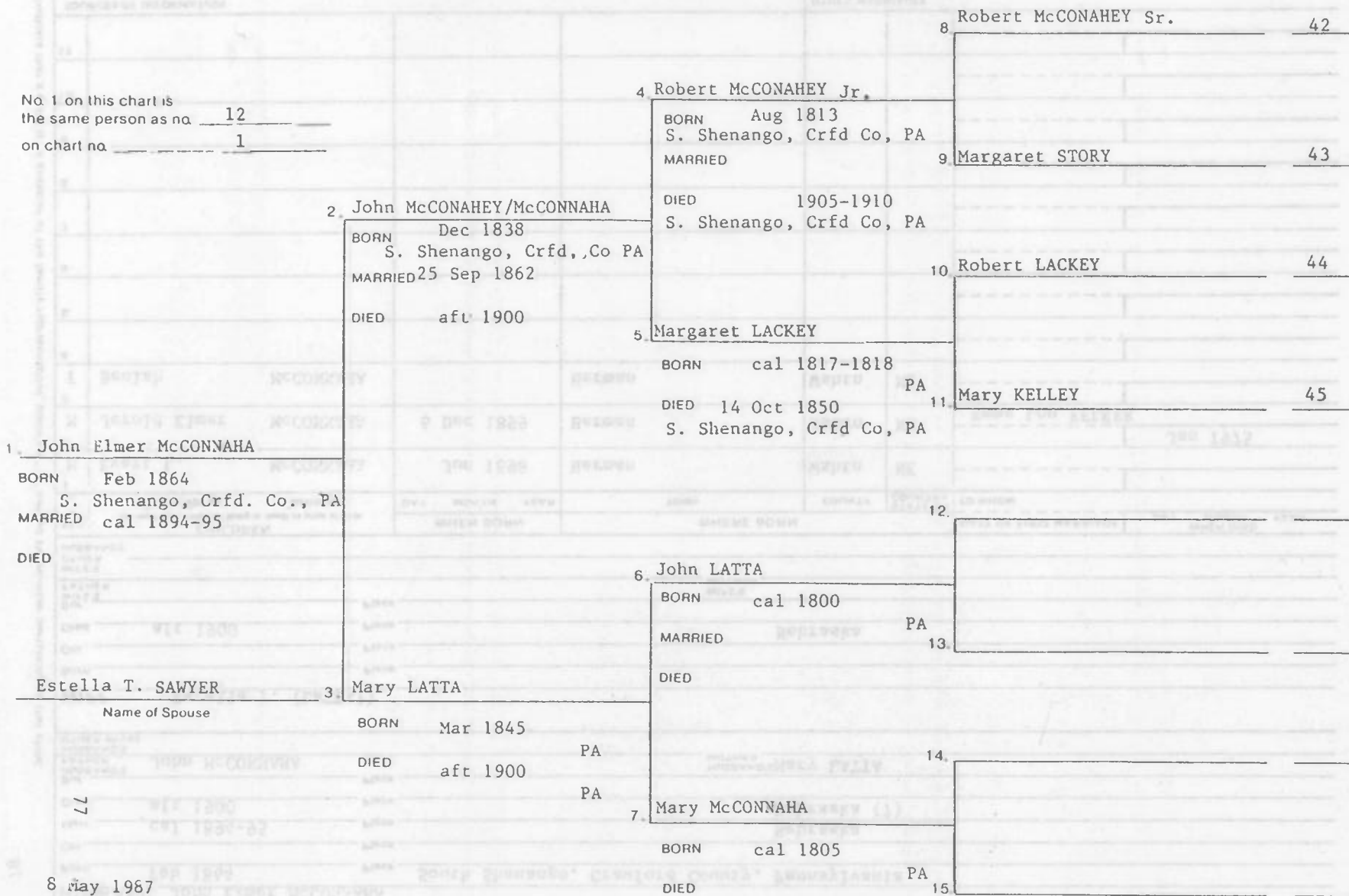

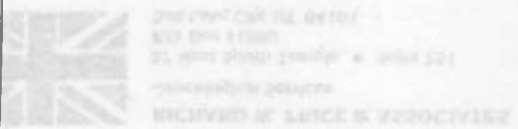

Five farm generations going on six

McConaha homestead dates to 1834

CENTERVILLE — Tim McConaha grew up on a farm, yet his parents never encouraged him to get into agriculture.

His mother, Elinor, taught Spanish at Hagerstown, and she felt the 320 acres wasn't enough to support two families.

"From sunup to sundown (my parents) said, 'Don't farm, don't farm,'" McConaha said. "They said, 'you can't make a living on the farm.'"

But McConaha felt the need to keep one boot in the soil.

"I loved to farm," he said. "I was an only child, and I knew someday the farm would surely be mine. I wanted to take care of it from the beginning."

Today he's the fifth generation McConaha to occupy the farm at 7104 McConaha Road. His great-great-grandfather, Samuel McConaha, bought the original 160 acres in 1834.

When McConaha isn't driving a tractor and wagon, he's at the wheel of a tractor-trailer for United Parcel Service. He's worked there full-time for 10 years while trying to keep up with the 400 acres he now owns.

His wife, Wanda, and their three children, David, Daniel and Kimberly, help with the chores.

When looking at career plans for his children, McConaha tries to stay neutral.

"I wouldn't encourage them away from farming," he said. "I want them to explore all possibilities. They have to learn to be happy with themselves with whatever they do."

Still, McConaha hopes someday one of his children will take over ownership of the farm — especially since the family received a Hoosier Homestead award from Lt. Gov. John Mutz for having a family-owned farm for more than 100 years.

"Wanda's the one who initiated this project," McConaha said. "And Centerville historian Inzetta Stivers did most of the paper work."

The family received the award March 3 at the Indiana War Memorial Auditorium, along with 46 other families.

More than 2,608 families have received the award since the Indiana Department of Commerce initiated the program 11 years ago.

The McConaha farm started two years after Indiana became a state. In 1818, President James Monroe deeded the 160 acres to Isaac Williams, who later sold it to James Ray.

In 1828, Ray sold the land to James Rariden for \$500, or \$3.13 an acre. Six years later, the McConahas moved in.

When Thomas McConaha bought the farm in 1842, he built the house that still stands.

A hint to the first homesteading was found on a log cabin next to the house. Carved in one of the logs was the date May 1822. The log cabin has since been moved to Hagerstown Park by the Jaycees.

The McConaha farm grew to 640

acres at one time, occupying one square mile.

"One of the past generations had 10 to 12 kids, and when each one turned 17, he'd give them 80 acres, a bed and bedding, and some money," McConaha said. "If the kids moved away, he'd buy the land back from them."

Walter McConaha, who served as state senator at about the time of World War I, lived on another part of the farm. His house on Centerville Road had a unique feature.

"He had a windmill that pumped water into a big, wooden tank, and it would run out of that into the house."

McConaha said. "They had running water before the time of electricity."

McConaha said the family farm will not die.

"I'm sure they'll definitely exist, but they'll have to be diversified," he said. "People talk about the size of a farm and how big it has to be to work. I think it's determined more on how much work you want to put into it."

McConaha's wife added her approval of the country environment.

"I grew up in town, and after living on the farm, I wouldn't move back in town for anything," said Wanda McConaha.

Robert Allen McConaghy

"What profit hath a man of all his labour which he taketh under the sun? One generation passeth away, and another generation cometh, but the earth abideth forever." The Preacher.

It was a grey February day^{in 1931.} The sky was dull grey, the garden was grey, empty. Grey lichen hung from the bare apple trees, and the steps I sat on were grey. Daddy had gone to the grey skies. Mother had gone somewhere, too, leaving me alone and small in an empty world.

It was just a year since we had emigrated to Victoria, B. C. -- but that is the end of a long story.

Daddy was ten when his father died in 1883 leaving Granny and four children at Tullydonnell, a farm in a fertile valley near Convoiy, village, County Donegal. Daddy attended Royal School, Raphoe, three miles away. He walked, or rode on the horse, along the country road. Daddy was to be a doctor like his Navy father before him.

In due time he entered Edinburgh University. But when the lectures progressed to the "cutting-up" stage, he decided blood and gore were not for him. He wrote home explaining that he had transferred to civil engineering. And civil engineering turned out to be his "cup of tea" as they say. It was an exciting era for railroads and bridges out there in the world.

Railways were the "in thing" particularly in South Africa at that time. First there had been the sensational discovery of diamonds at Kimberley in 1869, and transportation more reliable than the pioneer farmers' carts had to be found. Then even more dramatic, gold was discovered in 1886 in the Witwaterstrand -- ironically on the site of peace-loving pastoral farmers who had trekked north in search of a place to settle far from the English government in the Cape. Thus it was that the first train from the south steamed into Johannesburg in September, 1892, three years ahead of a Dutch line.

With a letter of recommendation from the Duke of Abercorn in 1896, Daddy was off to South Africa in great excitement with prospects of a good job. Perhaps his mother was a little sad. Perhaps she remembered the day when her brother William left to seek his fortune in the Bombay (India) Medical Service in 1869 -- just as the Suez Canal, that shortcut across the world was opening. He was followed by another brother, John, in 1873.

Daddy did very well, rising to the position of Divisional Engineer, Central South African Railways. He lived in Pretoria after the Boer War (1899-1902) having been captured by the Boers and held for a short time in a tent. The Boers treated him kindly, and he was allowed to escape. After the War, he wrote to his sister, Maggie, back home in Convoy, inviting her to move to Pretoria. But then he met Kate Pretorius, a vivacious Dutch nurse whose blue eyes twinkled with mischief under her mop of brown curls.

Daddy and Kate were married in March, 1905, and left in a train for a honeymoon in Durban on the sandy beaches of the east coast of Africa, and visited Capetown. Later that year, Daddy took Mother home so that the first son, Charlie, would be born in the old family home at Tullydonnell. Imagine the long sea trip back to South Africa with a small baby! Snapshots show little Charlie dressed in white skirts in a beautiful garden at their home in Waterwal Boven.

Wasn't all that enough? There was much railway work at the end of the Boer War until the lines of the four states were finally consolidated in the Union of South Africa in 1910. But no. Excitement called from a newspaper advertisement. A civil engineer administrator was required by a British firm for a coal port which was opening up in North China. This was successfully applied for, and off they sailed in November, 1907, to faraway Chinwangtao (now spelled Qinhuangdao on the maps).

Chinwangtao was no Shanghai. Bitter winds of cruel winter blew dry dust from the Gobi Desert and froze the sea far out into the wide bay. But after the spring Festival of the Excited Insects, cicadas sang shrill in the hot noonday sun. Summer thunder rumbled until the sky cracked open and poured down the rain in sudden short deluges. At night we sweltered under mosquito nets. But Mother was not one ever daunted by primitive obstacles encountered in life. Father observed the world with equanimity and an unquenchable humour in his steady blue gaze from his six-foot height.

Many to be were the adventures awaiting them. Chaos flowed and ebbed around North China in the years after the Boxer Rebellion of 1900. Civil wars swept across the country.

Wu Pei Fu, warlord from central China, moved his troops northward with greedy eyes on Tientsin. But Chang Tso Lin, the Manchurian warlord, considered Tientsin part of his domain. Soldiers came daily by train through Shanhaikwan, "the pass between mountains and the sea" at the end of the Great Wall, just a few miles north of Chinwangtao.

Bombs fell from hired Russian planes, Italian and American gunboats stood by to evacuate the foreigners. Mother, the intrepid, chased off

a Chinese corporal and his troop from our gates with an umbrella, while our ten servants shivered with chattering teeth in the farthest corners of our house on the cliff above the sea. Later, a friend in London who was watching the newsreel movies suddenly recognised Mother taking a shortcut crawling under a train. "Good God!" he exclaimed aloud, "It's Mrs. Mac."

Beggars, filthy, ragged and diseased, were ubiquitous, unfortunates dispossessed by famine, flood and war. Problems were of catastrophic dimensions, beyond private amelioration.

In more peaceful times, Daddy who had built the long breakwater that formed the harbour at Chinwangtao, built a hydro-electric plant to serve the area, did some surveying to the north for an American company, and took over the glassworks from the Belgians who could not make a go of it.

In his official position as Port Administrator, Daddy had to entertain many people at our house. Among these were Mr. & Mrs. Buchart (of the famous gardens in Victoria, B.C.); Sir Matthew Nathan, Lt. Governor of Queensland, Australia, 1920-25; Lord and Lady Willingdon, Governor-General of Canada 1926-31; and Dr. Sun Yat Sen himself, just before his death; not to mention the very Russian pilot whose bomb had barely missed our house when he was aiming at shipping out in the bay. At dinner, he decorated his menu with a small sketch of a plane dropping a bomb over its side, in memory of that day, and presented it to Mother, saying, "fizzzz-boooooom!" with a wicked grin.

In the winter of 1915, a telegram came from Tullydonnell with the sad news that Granny was dying. There was a quick dash on the Trans-Siberian Railway, ten days across vast bleak stretches of country to Finland (War was raging in Europe), a sleigh ride in Norway to Bergen to catch a boat across the storm-tossed North Sea to England. But, alas! Granny had died. About the same time, Daddy's young brother, John, a mining engineer in South Africa, had also died.

It was a distressing time. Ireland was full of troubles. Charlie, now ten, was entered in boarding school near Rhyll in north Wales.

There was another trip to England in 1920 when Charlie was entered at Radley College to prepare him for Cambridge, and a career in civil engineering. Indeed, when Daddy's life story is compressed into a few pages, it seems full of trips hither and yon. Holidays were compulsory every three years. Travel in steamships of that era was marvellous -- Monaco, Monte Carlo -- business trips to London, to Japan, and visits to

the medical doctors in Germany who were renowned in the world of 1925.

Daddy's last and most unique experience came in 1929. In July, a Spanish cruiser came into port, the Blas De Lezo, it was called, and the sailors being hot-blooded Spaniards, whooped it up, shall we say, with the women in the old Chinese village of Chinwangtao. The Chinese were not amused. Daddy, the diplomat, was able to cool the ruffled feathers and literally avert an "international incident". For this, with gracious thanks, he was awarded the Naval Order of Merit by Don Alfonso XIII (por la Gracia de Dios, Rey de Espana) -- the last King of Spain. But British subjects were not permitted to accept foreign awards. It all had to be OKed by the King of England. So Daddy received a long document signed by His Majesty "George V, by the Grace of God of Great Britain and the Dominions beyond the Seas, King, and Defender of the Faith" to "Our Trusty and Well-beloved Robert Allen McConaghy, Esq." with greetings.....

"We being graciously pleased to approve thereof....grant to you our Royal Licence....that you may wear the Insignia of the Order of Naval Merit."

We left Chinwangtao in late November, 1929, walking to the Company ship, the Kai Ping, behind Daddy, over whom was held the Red Umbrella of the highest order the Chinese could award him. He was draped with the satin Red Gown of honour hung with numerous ribbons of signatures. A barrage of ear-splitting firecrackers around us chased away any lurking devils in a thunderous farewell.

Early in December we sailed from Shanghai in the Empress of Russia bound for Canada with all our worldly goods and chattels packed in a multitude of large wooden packing cases, arriving in time for Christmas in Victoria.
