APPROVAL OF FINANCES AND REPORT FROM FISCAL OFFICER

Financial Reports for April 2020 were provided to Council members for review. Motion to approve financial report moved by Tammy Hawk and seconded by Evelyn Nagy. All in Favor – Yes. Motion carried.

Fiscal Officer provided loan information for the Council. Chauncey currently has 8 loans.

ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS

Resolution 2020-5 – A resolution approving Public Defender Contract. Resolution is to be tabled for deliberation until next month's meeting.

Resolution 2020-6 Amendment — A resolution declaring a necessity of emergency for the appropriation of funds into the sewer fund. Another amendment needs made for this resolution. Resolution is to be tabled for deliberation until next month's meeting.

NEW BUSINESS

Property Tax Information Presented by County Auditor Jill Thompson:

Chauncey's inside "millage" is maxed out with 7.1 going to 5 different institutes. Chauncey has the highest "millage" for property taxes in the County. 20% of Chauncey's property tax is exempt. The Chauncey property tax levy expires this year so it needs to be renewed. Renewing is more beneficial than replacing. Property taxes are re-assessed every 6 years. The County is up for reappraisal in 2021 (Please review the attached documents starting on page 5 for more detail on Chauncey tax information).

The Mayor asked Auditor Jill Thompson about verifying a tax exemption property. Jill Thompson stated that local government can bring these to the attention of the Auditors office at any time and they take steps of verifying their exemption and/or remove them from the list. The property owners would need to reapply for exemption once these steps are taken. Jill Thompson will gather the Village's tax exemption list for the Council to review.

A property tax levy is an option Council is reviewing for a possible way to pay for a Police Marshal. Decision will need to be made by the next Council meeting. The Mayor will also provide information on Police Marshal costs other municipalities in Athens County pay.

The Solicitor stated that former Mayor, Bob Matty, contacted him and said the Village of Chauncey was over charged and we would be receiving a check for \$5,400.

RESIDENTS COMMENTS

Rob Delach – Memorial trail work day will involve the Λthens Bicycle Club and other volunteers cleaning up the trails. Baileys official opens for bikers on May 29.

VILLAGE ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

Village Administrator, Chris Russell, gave a report on the collapsed sewer line projects. They are nearly completed. Just need to pave the road which will be done once the weather is better. The 1st and 2nd collapse will be paid in one invoice and the 3rd collapse will be billed in July.

Village Administrator said there are 11 accounts on the finals list. Due to the fact that these accounts cannot be disconnected per Governor DeWines orders, we are having a hard time receiving payments from residents. Need to contact these residents and let them know that paying something is better than paying nothing. As long as they pay something, we can work with them to create a payment plan after the COVID-19 crisis is over.

SOLICITOR'S REPORT

The Solicitor is working on reformatting the FEMA Floodplain Ordinance. The Mayor designated the Planning and Development committee to sit on the Appeals Board just in case there's a variance request or other situation, needs to be established for the Floodplain Ordinance. Council members can act in a limited circumstance.

The Committees that were appointed require a rule change because they no longer comply with the current set. Will need to redo the Committee rules.

The Solicitor was contacted by a lawyer in Birmingham who has a buyer interested in purchasing the Green Meadows property. This is an indicator that the Baileys is making an impact. Need to work on completing zoning laws for the village. Village Administrator asked the Solicitor about the water and sewer maintenance at Green Meadows. Solicitor stated a land search would need to be done to know this information.

MAYOR'S REPORT

ODNR – Input on playground equipment which will be purchased with the Abandon Mine Grant. Council discussed tiered playground equipment for various ages.

Internet – Nelsonville TV Cable doesn't have any rights over this area. The Solicitor looked it up and there are no restriction in our area as to who provides cable/internet.

ORCA – Working on hiring an Executive Director for the Baileys trail.

Hunter's Garage – Bill Hunter wants \$10,000 for the property. The Mayor discussed this with Land Bank chair, Ric Wasserman, and he said that the property value is \$4,000. Bill Hunter will accept \$4,000 for the property. Ric Wasserman believes that's a fair price. No results on the contamination levels yet.

COUNCIL MEMBERS REPORTS

<u>Joe Canter</u> – The Hunter Property on Lexington needs cleaned up. Mayor – has been discussed in the Planning & Development committee meeting. Village Administrator intends on sending out a letter.

<u>Connaught Cullen</u> – Look into possibly creating a neighborhood watch. Join The Plains meeting to get crime reports and steps on getting started.

<u>Tammy Hawk</u> – Curious about the restroom situation at the park. Mayor - the project was expected to be complete by the end of August. COVID has slowed things down.

Evelyn Nagy - Nothing to report

Larry Pierce - Nothing to report

John Canter - Nothing to report




