Restlessness – a Spiritual Gift?

Dear People of Grace;

I believe there is a spiritual gift of restlessness. It does not appear on a biblical list of spiritual gifts, but I think there is something about being restless in spirit. It is akin to a sense of urgency to be closer to God, to be part of a greater mission, to be part of the ministry God is placing before us in our faith-filled, free response to the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Restlessness spurs an older parent to stay connected in love to their grown children. Restlessness drives learning in children. A measure of dissatisfaction in the way things are now produces restlessness to be part of a better future. I saw a video of a 1960 televised presidential debate between John F. Kennedy and Richard Nixon (yes, long before I was born), in which candidate Kennedy said repeatedly, “I am not satisfied...”, then giving examples of what a future America could be. I thought it was an effective way to begin a debate for the office of the presidency.

In a different context, Christ seemed quite restless when he declared, “I have come to bring fire on the earth, and how I wish it were kindled” (Luke 12:49). Is there such a thing as holy or divine restlessness? Restlessness may be a way to describe the season of Advent, which is right around the corner. Is there restlessness in God? I honestly hope so.

I hope God is restless to enter our hearts and refine our mission. I hope God is restless to meet us each in the quiet, in the small moments of our meditations. I hope God is restless to reveal hope and life to us as we listen to one another. I hope God is restless to meet us while we sleep, while we rest. I hope God is restless to be in front of us as we encounter the neighbor.

As we remain restless for the completion of our renovation, I hope God will grant us a glimpse of the finished project, will give us a vision, a palpable vision of what can be. I hope the common vision of a renewed church will become our collective heartbeat, and that we will be able to hold on as we work together for a new day for our church.

Certainly, there are frustrations along the way. If you were able to attend the October 19 congregation meeting, you heard an excellent recap by Mark Woolsey of surprises we needed to address. I would like to add my voice to his great report and say that blessings and joys have been discovered as well during this past year. God is at work, right alongside our construction company and subcontractors.

As we see progress, we long to gather in renewed spaces, to feel the promise of what’s to come. But perhaps this very longing is a sign of our deep love for this community and our hope for what God is building among us. In the waiting, may we find grace. Restlessness is not just an individual experience – it is something that can be shared in community as a whole congregation. I believe it is a gift of the Spirit, balanced with contentment and patience.

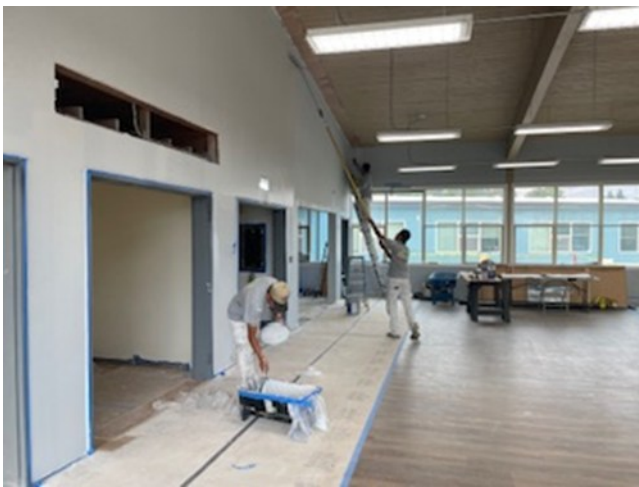
A new handicapped parking area takes shape.

Edgar and Nate put the finishing touches on acoustical tiles in the Fellowship Hall.



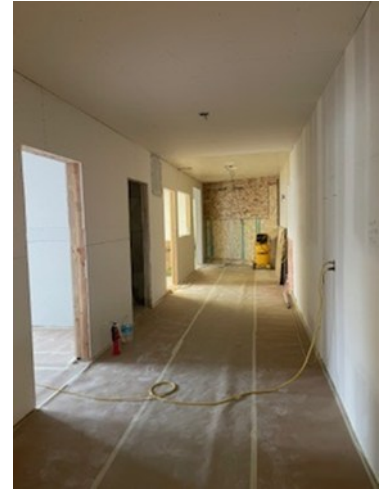
The front entrance doors and drywall are installed.

FROM THE DESK OF INTERN LAURA

Generations in Grace - Belonging through Faith Connections

In recent years, churches in the Pacific Northwest have noticed a pattern. What you may not have noticed is that the trend is also playing out across the wider church — attendance is shifting, families are busier, and generations don't always cross paths the way they once did. Yet when we read stories of faith, we see again and again that God forms community through shared life across generations. The authors of *"Intergenerational Christian Formation: Bringing the Whole Church to Life"* (Allen, Ross, and Seibel) remind us that faith is best nurtured through belonging. Not just belonging within the silos of age groups or with like-minded people, and not just belonging within nuclear families, but *interrelated* belonging as a community of faith — when children, youth, adults, and elders learn, serve, and worship side by side. This approach strengthens not only faith but the bonds that hold congregations together. Intergenerational faith formation is less about creating another program and more about recovering what the Church has always been: a spiritual family, gathered in many ages and stages, learning from one another in Christ.

That's the vision behind our new "Generations in Grace" time at 9:30 a.m. before worship. We're gathering on the 1st and 3rd Sundays to sing, wonder about the day's scripture readings, and share prayers — pairing an "older" and a "younger" participant to pray for one another during the week. Early sessions have already sparked beautiful moments of connection: a song sung by all ages, stories shared across decades, laughter, and mutual encouragement. As we continue, we hope more of our church family will join in. Each person adds a unique voice to the conversation, and together we're building faith and connections that grow stronger when we learn and live it *with* one another.

So far, we've explored "A Seed of Faith" (Luke 17:5–10) by writing on the chalkboard together — things we wish we could do, things we're learning to do, and things we can do — and then adding a new column: "Things Jesus has done for us." We learned a song, read the mustard seed story from the *Spark Bible*, and traded prayer sheets across generations. Two weeks later, we had a lively time with "Jacob Wrestles," complete with everyone's new "wrestler names", reflections on what we're wrestling with and what God has blessed us with.

For All Saints Sunday (November 2), we'll remember and talk about the saints of God who have inspired us in faith, which is how intergenerational faith formation manifests – the saints gathering to nurture and strengthen one another in the faith – past, present and future.

We are excited to explore more activities when the church renovation is complete – art-making? Movie night? Communion bread baking? What are your ideas? If you've been part of these first sessions, we'd love your feedback. If you've been thinking about how the church can do ministry in new ways (we are "resurrection people" after all), come join us for faith, fun and building connections!

warm-up 4:30-4:40

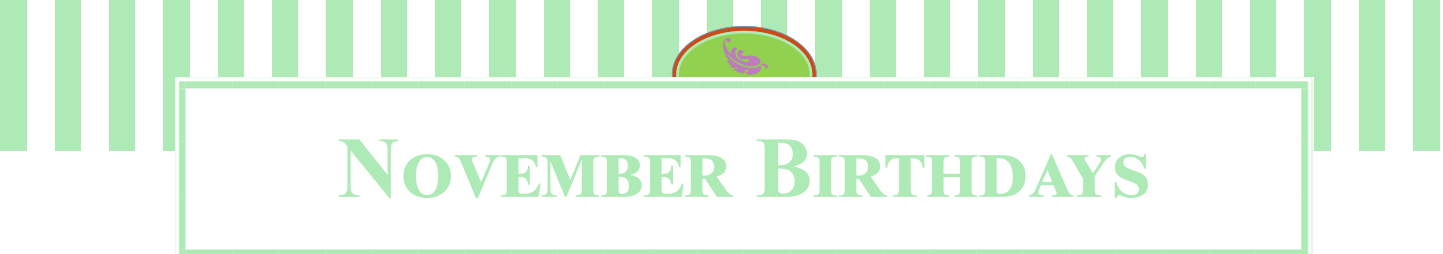
Prior to each Sunday morning offering, we will meet in the Rehearsal Room at 10:15.

Offerings for the first nine months totaled \$306,455. This is \$31,045 under budget. Offerings for the first 9 months compared to last year are down by \$31,020. Interest income for the first 9 months totaled \$56,237 This is over budget by \$33,737. Expenses were \$385,53 which is \$26,690 under budget. Net Margin is (\$22,81) compared to the projected deficit of (\$52,213).
