People of Grace;

As I prepare for my sabbatical renewal, I would like to share with you what you can expect before, during, and after.

- Before
 - Some of my itinerary has changed. It does not look like a pilgrimage in Scandinavia and a visit to our partner synod in Tanzania will take place. A guided retreat with my wife in Ireland entitled "Rediscovering Meaning and Purpose" is the biggest travel element of my sabbatical as it stands now. I am planning to spend the bulk of the rest of my time resting in the Pacific Northwest and delving into readings on spiritual direction.
 - I have been in conversation with retired pastor Keith Garness and have planned with interns Anna and Dane about how it will look for Pastor Keith to work on staff as an added support for the congregation.
 - The Council has finalized a compensation plan for Pastor Keith for his ministry.
 - Funding for the sabbatical has been set aside since before 2020.
 - Intern Anna has designed her internship project which will take place during the sabbatical, as a way for the people of the congregation to re-engage with one another.
 - I have invited you to write a seven-word prayer that you can send with me to keep our connection. If you are interested in doing this, I encourage you to write it in my "voice". Example: "God just give me a little space."
- During
 - The first day of sabbatical is May 9. I will start back in the office July 25 so I can help Anna finish her internship well. Her last day of internship is July 31.
 - I have not yet decided, but I may be periodically posting on the Pastor's Blog on our website so you can get a sense of how the time has been for me. This is part of what makes "vacation" and "sabbatical" different experiences. From a book titled "Clergy Renewal": "Just like the soil,' writes (David Ellingson), 'we humans need a sabbatical, a time to lie fallow. We require a time to receive rather than give, to get input rather than give output, to carefully nurture and cultivate our lives so that the soil of our spirits might be rid of weeds and have an opportunity to receive nourishment.' A sabbatical is a life- and soul-changing time a time when perspective and the Holy Spirit can come together."
 - I am not available for pastoral activities or other duties during this time. Please do not reach out to me with news or requests.
 - When you want to reach out to a pastor at Grace, I encourage you to first reach out to Intern Anna. She is excited to step into this role of being the first "go-to" person. Pastor Keith is going to be around and available (about 20 hours per week) and Anna will ask him to step in as needs arise. Intern Anna is very capable of being in the leadership position.

 - You can expect some form of written or in-person reflection after my return.
 - I hope there will be an opportunity to celebrate in the company of one another.
 - I envision inviting you into spiritual practices that might be new experiences for you, since my sabbatical will involve intentional practices in receiving from God and others.

God bless you as we enter the season of Resurrection. May new life spring forth from our hearts and minds.

Community Holy Week Services April 11 - 15 at 12:00 p.m.

Noon community services will be held at **First United Methodist Church**, 941 Washington Street. Grace Lutheran will not be involved in leadership this year, but we encourage you to join in Christian fellowship with your neighbors! The services will be Monday through Friday.

Maundy Thursday Thursday, April 14, at 6:00 p.m.

We gather around the rite of confession and absolution, and we participate in the Lord's Supper. Our service concludes with the stripping of the altar, and the congregation will be invited to participate in the removal of items from the chancel. We are also conducting a food drive that day for our Little Free Pantry, with a special focus on breads. Our Holy Communion celebration will include using one of the bread offerings.

Good Friday

Friday, April 15, at 6:00 p.m.

We gather to hear scripture, sing together, and ponder the crucifixion of Christ. We will each be invited to place a large nail on the floor before the cross as a sign of our own brokenness.

Easter Vigil Saturday, April 16, at 6:00 p.m.

We start our worship around a fire in our Memorial Garden, remembering the time after Christ's crucifixion. We process with candles into the sanctuary and welcome the joy of Easter through scripture, song and baptism. This service will include the baptism of Kelsi Davis. Welcome, Kelsi!

Easter Sunday

Sunday, April 17, at 8:00 and 10:30 a.m.

We gather to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord. Our worship will be supported with scripture, song and instrumental music, preaching and holy communion. Our early service will be in the Grace Memorial Garden. An Easter brunch will follow (location to be finalized soon!), and our later service will be in the sanctuary.



From the Desk of Intern Anna

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness on them light has shined. - Isaiah 9:2

Good Friday has been one of my favorite services, falling second only to Christmas (Easter is third), I love that it is so different from all other services throughout the year. I love that it is a service that invites us to mourn, mourn for the death of Christ, mourn for the sin of the world. Growing up, we had a candelabra with 7 candles on it that we would slowly extinguish as we went through the service. We usually would have two acolytes for the service, one to extinguish the candles and one to turn off lights. When I would acolyte, I would turn off the light and turn it off at the exact moment the bell of the extinguisher would go over the flame. Growing up, this service would be reading of the passion and either singing hymns, listening to the choir sing an anthem or listening to the choir sing from different Requiems. As the service went on, it got darker and darker as we read up to the last moments of Jesus. Then in darkness, Jesus would be sealed in the tomb, with the slamming of the large Bible, scaring many in the congregation, and we would leave in silence, not to come back 'til Easter morning. There are a lot of theatrics in this service, which may be part of my love for the service, but I think also having a service where there is a supposed finality to it that isn't a happy ending has a sacredness in it.

Planning for Good Friday this year, there isn't the turning down of lights, or slamming of bibles as we seal Jesus in the tomb, but there will be the passion story dotted with hymns and anthems, there will be the dropping of nails in a bucket, and the bidding prayer. There is an Easter Vigil service on Saturday, where we sit in the liminal space between the closing of the tomb and the women finding it open and empty and where we practice the ancient tradition of baptism after a Lenten break. It isn't what I am use to, but there is a tradition and sacredness to it. It looks similar in some ways to the old, but is very different in other ways. It's not what I am use to, but I am excited to see in what ways these services fill my being.

My hope for you all this Lenten season is for you to embrace the changes and differences that may be there this year, as we remember and discover how to be church again. My hope is that you are able to find meaning in doing things in ways that are similar to the past and in ways that are different. I hope you are able to give us and each other grace as we continue to rebuild and remember what it means to be Grace Lutheran Church; that we can be light to one another as we continue our Lenten journey.

I will be out most Saturdays and Mondays and am taking vacation from April 18-26th.

May God's light shine in the dark places.

Packing Friendship/ Little Free Pantry Food Drive

As part of Lent, the Social Concerns Team will be collecting food items for GLC Packing Friendship and the Little Free Pantry.

Packing Friendship is a weekend backpack program for students who may rely on school lunches during the week and are at risk of hunger on the weekends. Grace Lutheran is currently serving 47 students from three schools in the Wenatchee School District on a weekly basis.



GLC Little Free Pantry is an emergency pantry that is stocked with food, cleaning supplies, feminine hygiene products, and other essentials. We serve those in our community who are struggling to make ends meet. It is estimated that the pantry serves 20-30 families/individuals per week.

During Lent we are collecting items for both groups before and after Sunday Worship Service. Then on Palm Sunday there will be a blessing for all the items we have collected. There are containers in the narthex to put the items in.
