Pastor's Message

Dear friends,

The Via Francigena is a trail of ideas, and it helps to walk with eyes open—otherwise you miss the bread crumbs of epiphany along the way.

Bread crumbs of epiphany. Being on a pilgrimage, a journey, whether you are walking an actual trail, can have bread crumbs of epiphany. What is your trail of ideas? Where is the trail bending for you, now? I have been thinking a lot about pilgrimage and my sabbatical theme of "Grace's Table". I have been worried about whether covid will let me have sabbatical as I have been planning.

Here is one way you can help me. Here is one way you can accompany me. Would you write a prayer that I can take along with me on sabbatical? Here are the guidelines:

- Write the prayer so that when I pray it, I am praying first-person. So rather than "Jesus give Pastor James new inspiration today", it would be "Jesus give me your new inspiration today".
- Once you give me a prayer, I will hand copy it on an index card. I want to add your name to the prayer card so I can also think of you while on pilgrimage.
- I might use one card per day, or several, depending partly on how many prayers I receive.
- The prayer you write must be seven words. Keep it to seven. You may find this a difficult, or creative, or imaginative exercise, or all of the above.

My sabbatical begins May 9. There is time. Please do not have undue anxiety about this invitation. I would love to take your prayer with me. I would love to pray a prayer you have given me. I would love to pack you along through that simple little gift.

What Grace Lutheran has taught me so far

Well, we are coming up to the 6-month mark of my internship year and I wanted to take some time to reflect on the lessons you all as Grace Lutheran have taught me so far this year. As a student, I am still learning what it means for me to be a pastor, something I hope to continue to do even with my first and however many other calls I get afterwards. Here are a few of an exceptionally lengthy list of things I have learned or have been reminded of so far during my time at Grace.

- 1. Effective communication is hard but needed: This is something that has been a major importance for me the last few years, especially with all things COVID, whether that is getting information out to the congregation about quick changes or events coming up, communicating to my colleagues, or listening to the needs and stories of the congregation. And doing it well can be hard and may never be perfect.
- 2. Flexibility is key: Sometimes we suddenly need to switch to online. Sometimes a gas leak means we need to cancel things and reschedule them. Emergencies come up and as a pastor, I need to be able to respond to them. So, making sure that I am not overscheduling myself so that I can have time to respond to the sudden changes that come up is important and being flexible is the name of the pastoral game.
- 3. I love working with youth: From the many youth activities that happen here at Grace, I am reminded again I have a passion for working with kids. I have done it a lot in my past, in my home congregation, at camp, in the AmeriCorps program I served with after college, and with the congregation I served with in Minnesota. I am always drawn to help with the youth programs and have met many awesome youth ministers along the way that I have looked up to and Beth is no exception.
- **4. I have a passion for worship, preaching, and teaching:** Some of the projects that I have most looked forward to doing are the couple of classes I have taught and the worship services I have planned and led. I have found I like preaching which a younger me with a fear of public speaking would have been very confused about.
- 5. We crave community: I have seen here at Grace that there is a call for reinvigoration in community, especially with COVID. I have heard from many people that they want to be together and in community with each other. My plan for my internship project is to respond to this need in the church (more information to come. Be on the lookout and get excited.)

In looking at this small sampling of the lessons of this year, I also wanted to take a moment to thank Pastor James for all his work, to guide and reflect with me, to show me how he does things and talk through how I may do them, for supporting me and being one of the many in the cloud of witnesses I have with me. I also want to thank the staff here for their support and help. And finally, I want to that you all as a congregation. Thank you for teaching me so much, thank you for your love and support of me and my pastoral formation. Thank you for all you do, not only for me as an intern, but also for every intern that walks through these doors. Thank you all for the last 6 months and I am excited to see what the next 6 have in store for us.

A Message from Beth and Intern Dane

At present, there are two distinct projects (though, at times interconnected). The first is the Wenatchee Youth Community (WYC), and the second is the Inclusive Youth Drop-in Center (which we will call 'the drop-in center' but has also been referred to as a 'youth house'). Given that these projects are the organic outgrowth of genuine relationships and mutual desire for wellness in our community, it has taken us some time to gain clarity on how these groups are organized. Here's what we know so far!

Wenatchee Youth Community:

Currently, several main-line protestant churches within Wenatchee/East Wenatchee are gathering their middle/high school youth together monthly to create an inclusive space for LGBTQ+ teens and allies to belong in community and learn about and participate in socially just movements. This relational, ecumenical youth community is needed due to

queerphobic sentiment circulating within several more conservative churches in Wenatchee. We currently meet the Second Sunday of each month from 6pm-7:30pm at the YWCA.

The WYC is collaboratively run by an Ecumenical & Community Leadership Cohort which includes staff from four churches and leaders from the community. All ecumenical and community leaders are background checked and each congregation maintains their own distinct youth ministry whose youth are invited (not required) to participate. There are potential future partners, but here is a list of who currently participates:

Currently, there is a visioning team which is working dedicated to the formation of a safer space for marginalized youth (especially those who are LGBTQ+, BIPOC, differently abled, and/or experiencing housing insecurity or unsafe home environments) in Wenatchee. This visioning team (also called 'the brain trust') includes congregational member and local realtor Kelly Thompson, Wenatchee Valley Intern Dane Breslin, Intern Anna Ferro, Community Member Dusti Mahoney, High School Senior Molly Salter, Youth & Family Ministries Director Beth Smallbeck and Pastor James Aalgaard.

This visioning team has been working to create a safe place for marginalized youth to find safety, resources, friendship, guidance, and welcome. Due to there being hurt and distrust toward churches among the population we wish to serve, it is imperative that this space not be housed in a congregation. Beth and Dane have been in communication with the city, our ecumenical partners in the valley, and the youth that participate in our monthly community youth program- there is excitement and support on all three fronts! Given the nature of this project, there is great potential for diverse and sustainable avenues of financial support via grants, gifts, and other resources.



To date we have toured 6 properties varying in size, location, and cost. There has been a great deal of excitement around most of these properties only to encounter obstacles from city codes, logistics of remodeling, or cost. The visioning team has spent a great deal of time discussing our demographics, programs, staffing, and possible community partners. Potential partners have been identified and expressed real interest (including FUMC, the Children Home Society of Washington, we have two individuals, Dusti Mahoney and Kelsi Davis, with experience in Grant writing and willingness to do so, and others).

A great deal of passion, time, and energy has been focused on this project with the running assumption that the Fox Trust funds could/would be used to help secure a property as there is great need in this community for this resource. We are actively seeking ways to move towards the creation of this space and in lieu of purchasing a property are considering lease options in order to provide a necessary safe space for youth who are in need.

We are currently providing 43 bags of food each week to students at Washington and Columbia Elementary Schools and Foothills Middle School. We have eight regular volunteers who help sort, pack, and deliver the food each week. Many people also support us with financial contributions and donations of food. COUNCIL CORNER

- 1. A Proposed budget was approved to be presented to the congregation at the semi-annual congregational meeting January 30, 2022.
- 2. The lighting project in the choir loft will be completed the week of January 24, 2022.
- 3. The Council accepted a \$1,000 donation from congregation members directed to Packing Friendship.
- 4. The council accepted a \$10,000 donation from congregation members as a restricted gift to the Lutheran College Scholarship program.
- 5. The council discussed ways to enhance the communication with non-digital users, particularly if council is making decisions about information. Pastor has a list of people who would likely need written or verbal communication. Others can be added by request. Discussion and ideas were discussed for increased participation in the semi-annual congregational meeting.
- 6. The council is seeking ways to publish committee and council member names for the congregation.

TREASURER TALK

12/31/21 Results. Offerings reported at \$383,394. This is the lowest level since 2013. Deficit is (\$74,184) for the year. 2021 approved budget did consider a deficit with anticipation from SBA PPP loan \$56,244. The loan was forgiven and helped reduce year-end loss to (\$17,940).
