Notes for our Lenten season: Lent is a time to consider more deeply the effect of sin in ourselves, our community, and the world as together we look toward the cross of Christ and the promise of resurrection. Watch and listen for ways we will mark the season, such as planned time of intentional silence, and the omission of the postlude.

On Wednesdays, we are gathering at 5:15 p.m. for simple suppers of soup and bread. Please consider this one of your faith practices, as we are also called to hold in our hearts those who often do not have enough food to remain nourished.

Our Wednesday vespers service is adapted from the Iona Community of Scotland. We have opportunities to hear healing stories from the Gospel of Mark, and are invited for the laying-on of hands with prayers for healing. Please join us!

Lenten Soup Suppers Wednesdays at 5:15 p.m.

Join us for our weekly Lenten Soup Supper each Wednesday during Lent. Volunteers are needed to provide soup and bread or rolls. Sign-up sheets are just outside the main sanctuary doors in the narthex. Meals will be served at 5:15 p.m.





EASTER FLOWERS

The worship team invites you to participate in Easter worship by bringing flowers to the church that can be added to the chancel and other areas of our worship space. We are asking for a variety of flowers, potted flowers, including single stem. We ask for a variety, as some people have strong allergic reactions to Easter lilies. We ask that you bring the flowers to the church starting Maundy Thursday, which is March 28.

Prayerfully consider singing/ringing for a season: Easter (including Pentecost), from March 31-May 19



WEDNESDAY, MARCH 8, 6:00-8:30 PM

We will be joining First United Methodist Church (and perhaps others) for Holy Week this year. We hope you can join us as we walk together in our common faith in Christ.

Maundy Thursday (6:00 pm, March 28), we will be at First United Methodist (the corner of Miller and Washington). We will begin with a meal in their fellowship hall, proceed to foot-washing (which is an act of service and love to one another), then proceed to the celebration of Holy Communion. We will close the service by witnessing the stripping of the altar.





Good Friday (7:00 pm, March 29), at Grace, we will be invited to ponder the crucifixion of Jesus and its meaning for us and for the world. We will hear the Gospel writer John's account of Christ's passion, witness the procession of the cross, and (using a nail as a symbol) be invited to place at the foot of the cross our failings and the ways that sin has an impact on our lives.

Easter Vigil (7:00 pm, March 30), we will light the first "Easter Fire", sing our first Alleluias, and hear the story of God's saving acts throughout history. We will also celebrate the gift of Holy Baptism and are invited to reaffirm our baptismal covenant.





Easter Sunday - We will gather for worship at 8:00 and 10:30 a.m., celebrating together the resurrection of Christ in Word, Sacrament, music, and prayer. Please join us for food and fellowship between services. Watch for a signup in the narthex (church entrance) where you can let us know how you would like to contribute to the meal.

An enthusiastic audience of nearly 80 enjoyed the music performances along with fellowship and refreshments afterward.





Little Free Pantry Food Drive

There has been a high use of the pantry this winter, and since we are no longer able to acquire food from Chelan Douglas Community Action, we are in need of donations more than ever before. So, during Lent to go along with our hunger emphasis, we will be collecting food items for our Little Free Pantry. We appreciate all the items you are providing, and we make them stretch as far as possible. For example, if you leave a box of 12 Top Ramen packages, we break down that box and just put out one or two a day. We have found that the Dollar Tree is an economical place to purchase toiletries, cleaning supplies, and milk that doesn't need refrigeration. Another bargain place is the Franz Bakery Outlet where bread products are very reasonably priced. During Lent we would like to emphasize the following items: toilet paper, diapers (all sizes), baby wipes, peanut butter, rice, and beans.

What I do in a typical week

Maybe it's not particularly exciting, and I wasn't sure if this was what I wanted to write about in my newsletter. After all, social media and the nature of a newsletter back home in general make it very easy to appear happy when you actually are not, or to only showcase the best parts of an experience. But my social media presence is pretty slim to begin with, and honestly I'm proud of how genuine I have actually been able to be with the newsletter. That certainly doesn't mean I'll air out any personal grievances here, but I think I've been very forward with feelings of grief, loneliness, and confusion in my past editions and it seems only fair that I also highlight the points in my journey where I am genuinely doing quite well. At the very beginning of this journey, I was certainly a lot more lost and disoriented. To deal with this, I made a list of the little things about my old life that I missed. While I still visit the page every now and again, the time before Hungary almost feels like another lifetime ago. My time here is half up, and I can already come up with a long list of things that I know that I will miss terribly when I go. Actually, I might be late in sending this newsletter out because of some health issues that showed up lastminute, but I know that recovery from any of the hardships that come with being in a new place-physical or otherwise- would be much, much harder without community, and especially without the friends and mentors that I've made here.

I realized recently that while I have been calling my loved ones and updating them with my weekly activities, I have yet to actually put my typical week in a newsletter. That said, if you have any questions about any of my placements or weekly activities, I would much appreciate a response via email and I would be happy to write back or include the answer in a future newsletter!

Located right in the middle of Budapest, this is a Lutheran secondary school that ranges from teaching 5th through 12th graders. However, most of my classes tend to be the 9th, 10th and 11th graders, since the young ones have had less language learning and many of the 12th graders have passed their language exams and no longer need to be in the classes for them. I come here for mornings/afternoons on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays. My day is divided into seven lessons, each lasting around 45 minutes, and usually I will take two or three students from each lesson and talk with them for the duration of the lesson. Sometimes I will also join them in classes to participate in activities, watch students present on topics, or be a member of a discussion group. There is also a debate club that I sometimes attend with students for Monday afternoons, and I enjoy hearing the students' opinions on different topics. When I have a free hour, I can explore the surrounding downtown, grab lunch, or talk with the five English teachers that I work alongside. I come to Dévai Fogadó on Wednesdays and Fridays, both in the mornings. Most days are based on the conversations described previously, but in the past I have also directly been part of the English lessons or even running other tasks in whatever way is asked of me. My favorite thing about Dévai Fogadó is getting to know the attendees, the same way it is with the students in the school or the congregation members in the church. However, even when I'm not talking to anyone, Dévai Fogadó is filled with so much liveliness and activity that I'm never bored or unhappy when I've got a spare minute to just be there. While Mandák-Ház is a church, not all of my time there consists of actually going to church service on Sunday-although I do go to those, followed by coffee/tea and conversation after church with the other congregation members of course. Bible studies are on Wednesday, Some days, we rotate through understanding different passages, liturgies, and other practices, such as the Lord's prayer. Other times, we have weekly activities where we watch a movie or play board games together. Fridays are community dinner nights which are usually preceded by having an activity involving the kids of the congregation. The activity is usually making some type of craft or artwork, which my friends and family will know I love being a part of very much. Out of the three placements, Mandák-Ház is probably the one that I spend the most time at, and I'm about to spend more time there- some of my new friends from the congregation expressed an interest in Dungeons and Dragons a while back, and next week is when my Star Wars themed campaign for them starts.:)
