A Message from Marianne Seeber, Our President

Hello and Happy Spring!! The warming weather here in CT signals that our Annual Meeting will be upon us in just a few weeks. As I end my tenure as president, I want to offer a brief synopsis of changes to the board and committees that we have made this past year:

- We created a new Communications Committee to manage all publicity, social media and website, which is continuously updated by Patti Hamaguchi. If you haven't yet checked it out, it's worth a peek: https://litchfieldlwv.org/
- Last fall we emailed a survey, to learn how to better serve our membership. I hope we met some of those needs and expectations that you offered.
- This past November we held our first day-long retreat for board members. This allowed us the time to consider the need for some reorganization of positions, the creation of new positions and ways to better engage you, our members that we serve.
- We have moved the documentation of all activities, job descriptions and league communications to an electronic portal, which essentially has eliminated the position of Archivist.
- We renamed 'Hospitality' to *Special Events Committee* to best describe the work that the committee takes on throughout the entire year.
- We created a new board position for the Nominating Committee, believing it is essential for the person holding this position attend regularly scheduled board meetings, seeing up close and personal the work entailed for specific jobs.
- We voted to expand our Scholarship Program to include all 13 public high schools throughout the county. We have increased each scholarship to \$400 per student and will be including a copy of the book *In the Founders' Footsteps* by Litchfield-area author Adam Van Doren. To support this ongoing mission, please be generous with your financial contribution to this fund.
- Finally, with these expanded positions, we will be taking a vote at the Annual Meeting to expand the number of directors to 17. This change, along with expanding of committees, allows for all members to be more fully engaged in the mission of LWV.

Make your plans now to attend our Annual Meeting on June 14 at 5:30 PM at the home of Bibby Veerman. The invitation and details can be found on the front page of this issue. Annual Dues of \$55 are due by July 1. By attending the Annual Meeting and paying your dues that evening, you will automatically be entered into a drawing for a gift card!! Don't miss out on this chance to see old friends, make new ones and to hear LWVCT outgoing president Laura Smits speak about the progress we are making at the state level.

I wish to thank this year's Nominating Committee, chaired by Judi Armstrong, and supported by league member Tina Bernacki and board member Rosemarie Greco for their work in creating the new slate for this year's board. As of this writing of the newsletter, we are still seeking a nominee for vice-president, and directors to chair Programs, Scholarship and Book Awards position and Nominating Committee. We will be accepting nominations from the floor at the Annual Meeting, so please consider taking on one of these roles. Look for the official notice for this slate in an upcoming email.

There is a national campaign to celebrate our nation's upcoming 250th birthday. This initiative is referred to A250, with cities, towns and organizations around the country being called to collaborate in celebrating this special anniversary. Stay tuned for opportunities for how you can be involved with this league's events to celebrate!

Finally, as I step down as president, I wish to thank you for your participation, attendance and support. This past year has been great learning experience for me and I hope to continue my league involvement as a member as we all witness the new board taking over the reins!

This year, 2023, we mark the 15th anniversary of her reception of the Wisdom Award in 2008. The "Wisdom Award" is given to community members who have dedicated significant volunteer service to improve the lives of people and the environment in the community.

The community of Litchfield and the State of Connecticut have been the environment where Joyce's influence for good has been experienced by many.

Under Joyce's leadership, she has been a key figure in helping the Litchfield Housing Trust create 47 units of affordable housing that have allowed young families, individuals and senior citizens of limited financial means to live in town.

She was elected to the Litchfield Board of Education for multiple six year terms. She has served as President of the Litchfield League of Women Voters and as Government Director of the State League of Women Voters. It's said that if you need something done in Litchfield, you "call Joyce".

Joyce has witnessed in her life what the author Alice Walker once wrote, "It is clear that you have to cherish everyone...that every soul is to be cherished, that every flower is to bloom."










Some of the many accomplishments of Susan B. Anthony:



The "Rebel with a Red Shawl" was NOT a dour old lady despite the photos we've all seen. Those of you who came on May 10th know the "rest of the story".

- She worked tirelessly to change the laws that did not allow women to own possessions or keep the money they earned.
- She, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, and Lucy Stone started the first national women's rights associations
- She started the first labor unions in NYC for women for garments and publishing
- She ran a women's rights newspaper
- She helped the University of Rochester start accepting women and helped fund their first residence halls for women
- She spoke an average of 75-100 times a year throughout her life on behalf of ending slavery, temperance and mostly women's rights, especially suffrage!

On Friday May 5th, Bibby Veerman hosted a session to train Debate Moderators. Jean Rabinow, a person with vast LWV experience explained the process, the 'do's and don't's, the League rules and format as well told us how to do question screening. One thing we learned is that there is not only one way to have a debate. She also stressed the importance of strongly maintaining our non-partisan stance throughout the process, from planning to conclusion.

The people who attended the training were Patti Hamaguchi, Denise Butwill, Krista Rizzo, Susan Kennedy, Margaret Hunt, Bernie Harrington, Kerry Mayers, Judi Armstrong and Bibby Veerman. Now our League is proud to be able to provide trained moderators for our Litchfield County elections as well as offer this service to neighboring Leagues. We are very grateful to our long-time moderators, Christine Horrigan, Pat Donovan and Bernie Harrington who will be happy to share the responsibility.

Providing services to the voters is the primary mission of the league of Women Voters. During election time we need about 10 people for each debate and 3 people for each voter registration session. If many of our members did not volunteer more than once, it would require every single member to fill these slots.

Proposed Changes in Bylaws for our June 14th Annual Meeting

Our bylaws require us to have a membership-wide vote at the Annual Meeting to amend any current bylaws. As we move forward with creating specific committees, as well as some board members wanting some co-chair positions, we would like to amend our bylaws by the following:

ARTICLE IV Board of Directors

Sec. 1. <u>Number</u>. This Board will consist of the officers as enumerated in Article V, Sec. 1, and a minimum of five other elected directors to a maximum of seventeen (17). The number of officers and/or directors may be increased or decreased within the above limit by resolution of the Board.
