I had already reached the point in my studies to know that Jesus promised to build only one church (Matt. 16:18). Paul and others only speak of one church (Eph. 4:4; 1:22-23). Paul even wrote in the same context of one faith—the body of doctrine that is to be believed and obeyed (Eph. 4:5). On Pentecost, people that submitted to God were added to the church (Acts 2:41-47). I was still wet behind the ears, as they say. I had lots more to learn in life. But even in my youth I had enough experience to know, especially from the military, that people can be sincere and wrong at the same time. I had even seen people die from acting on misinformation, even though they were sincerely convinced they were correct at the time.

That meant I could not find who was right until I knew what was right. Jesus said that we love Him by keeping His commandments (John 14:15). He also said that truth sets us free (John 8:31-32). There is simply no way I could be convinced that I could just accept a faith based on my personal preferences. I had no personal animus toward the people I had been talking to about religion. I just knew that I would find the church when I listened to what God had to say about it. One of the memories that helped so much was the story of Noah and the flood. I read and reread that story a few times as a way of understanding that God's plans for people always involve a pattern. God specified the wood, the number of stories, the dimensions, the number of windows and doors and the requirements for animals (Gen. 6:14-22). Noah is said to have acted in "faith" (Heb. 11:7) because He did what God said (Gen. 6:22). I also remembered how God planned all the details for the Tabernacle (Heb. 8:5). I read the words of Moses as he described the arrangement for the Tabernacle's construction, adornment, and service (Exodus 26ff.). If God is the same yesterday, today and forever (Heb. 13:8), then I knew He would still have a pattern today—especially in the church, since it is the place of redeemed people. If inspired writers could characterize the church as the pillar and ground of the truth (1 Tim. 3:15), then I would have to follow the truth to find the church. Remember that I wanted to know for myself what was right. I did not want the church of my parents unless I knew beyond doubt, they were doing what God wanted. The Bible had to be the only authority. It had to be my only guide. Otherwise, I would just end up in a place based on my personal preferences. I had been a doubter. I had wondered aimlessly without an objective quide. I already knew the danger of that. Now I wanted truth and all the consequences that would come with accepting truth. Jesus built one church. He built His church. How could I find it? How would I know? What is the truth? I found the pattern for His church in the New Testament, and here is what I found.
