There are plenty of verses that call for Christians to defend the truth. Jude writes that we should "earnestly contend for the faith" (Jude 3). We are to "be ready to give a defense to everyone who asks you a reason for the hope that is in you" (1 Pet. 3:15). In his admonition to elders, Paul told them to watch for "savage wolves...that draw away disciples after themselves" (Acts 20:29-30). <u>Anniversaries</u> 26 – Tommy & Kathy Douglas seems there are regular occasions in our culture to defend the truth. It is under attack every day and in almost every way. But the Bible also tells us there is more to defending truth than having the right answer. The method in which the answer is delivered matters just as much to God.

Take, for example, the church in Ephesus. When John addressed them in the Revelation, they were doing some things well (Rev. 2:1-7). They were extremely committed to the work. They were patient in trials. On top of that, they were dedicated to defending the truth. They withstood false teachers, even challenging those that claimed an equal authority to the apostles. Still, they were guilty of leaving "their first love" (Rev. 2:4). In the context, it appears they had lost their passion for souls. They forgot that love for people should motivate all of their opposition to error. This means that there are two requirements in making our case for Christianity: truth and a proper attitude. Here are a few things for us to consider:

- **1.** We must give an answer, but with "meekness and fear" (1 Pet. 3:15). This means we must be gentle and respectful. Though we cannot agree with error, we can be decent in the way we respond with truth.
- **2.** We must be gracious in our speech and use righteous-living to influence others (Col. 4:5-6). Christians will never win an argument through a shouting match. Instead, we must live consistently with our claims. The world needs to be influenced by the light of God through us, not a fiery tongue.
- **3.** We must put ourselves in the shoes of the people we are trying to help (Gal. 6:1; Matt. 7:12). How would we want to hear it? What argument would make better sense to us? In other words, we should always consider how we would receive the truth if we were in the other position.
- **4.** We must mimic the behavior of Jesus under pressure (1 Pet. 2:21-25). Jesus was mocked and mistreated, yet never lost His composure or acted ugly. He did not return insult for insult. Instead, He maintained His integrity and trusted the will of God.

If we are willing, God will use us to help defend His cause. But we must remember that He also expects a certain behavior with the right answers. Let's rise up and stand for truth, but with decency and humility
