something. The term *literal* isn't supposed to mean something figurative. Other words we've changed completely, like the word *gay*. The term actually means happy or carefree, but today means something entirely different. This is also true of the word *hope*. Today, we hope it works out. We hope we get to take vacation. We hope we get good grades. We hope we don't owe taxes. We hope we get a raise. We hope we get over our cold. We hope she marries a good man. In sentences like these, how do we mean it? We mean a remote possibility. We are expressing uncertainty about the outcome.

This is not how the Bible uses the term. In fact, it's just the opposite of the way we use it. Hope, in the Bible, is confident expectation of eternal salvation. There is no uncertainty, only assurance. We are convinced of the outcome God promises. Paul speaks of the "hope of eternal life which God, who cannot lie, promised before time began" (Titus 1:2). According to Hebrews, hope is an "anchor of the soul, both sure and steadfast" (Heb. 6:19). Because of this, we are saved by hope (Rom. 8:24).

How is it possible to be so convinced of heaven? How can we expect something we haven't seen? How can we wake up every day, looking forward to something better after this life? Interestingly, in at least two passages that discuss hope, Bible writers connect our confidence to God's trustworthiness. We are able to lay hold of hope because "it is impossible for God to lie" (Heb. 6:18). If God tells us that there is a "far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory" (2 Cor. 4:17), then that is exactly what is waiting for us. When Jesus tells us that He is preparing mansions for us (John 14:1-3), we are convinced that is what He is doing. There is no room for doubt in the promises of God. He never lies. We are therefore convinced, beyond question, that there is a reward in heaven for us.

This is how we keep hope alive in our hearts. We must daily remind ourselves that God's promises are true. Hope is based on reality (Heb. 11:1), on truth, and God is the God of truth (John 14:6). Let's listen to God and be filled with hope.
