In our language, love is a generic term. As mentioned, this accounts for some of the confusion. In the language used in the New Testament, several different terms denoted specific relationships or responsibilities. You could say "love," and based on the word used, mean something distinct. Here are four terms worth knowing:

- 1. The Greeks often spoke of *eros*. Though we don't see the specific term in Scripture, it referred to sexual or erotic desires. When Paul talks about the works of the flesh (Gal. 5:19-21), some of the activities mentioned fall within the category of *eros*. Lust, fornication and unbridled passions are forms of erotic love. The natural desire of the husband and wife toward each other also falls within the meaning (1 Cor. 7:1-6). So the term is neutral. The application would determine whether the love was pure or not.
- 2. Another is *storge*, which is a more generic term for affection. Greeks sometimes used the word to describe the feelings of family members toward each other. A form of this appears in Romans 1:31, where Paul spoke of people "without affection." Based on his reference to their rejection of parental authority in the same context, he might be referring specifically to their abandonment of family. They were callused to the needs of their own, hence "unloving."
- 3. We are more familiar with *philia*, which we appropriately identify as brotherly love. This refers to the deep affection generated through friendships. In the places where it is used in the New Testament, the word describes our care and respect for each other. Our benevolence is a form of this love. We are to love one another with brotherly love (Rom. 12:10). We are to let brotherly love continue (Heb. 13:1). As an example, consider the ending of almost every letter from Paul. He pauses to praise, pray for, congratulate and encourage his co-workers. The church was Paul's social network.
- 4. The last is *agape*. This is the one that will determine how we apply all the rest, because this is the love that comes only from God. "Beloved, let us love one another, for love is of God; and everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. He who does not love does not know God, for God is love" (1 John 4:7-8). We will spend our time in the next article exploring this beautiful and necessary love.
