I've noticed that I and many others in my life are feeling this more acutely than ever this year. We celebrated the start of a new year, bidding good riddance to 2020- a year that held much difficulty

and heartache. But now, the reality has set in that despite the change in the calendar year, many of our struggles remain. It is easy, and even natural, to feel exhausted by it all.

And, I offer you a word of encouragement from the letter to the Galatians 6:9 (NIV):

Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up...

Of course, we know that the people of Galatia were facing an entirely different set of struggles, but I still find this verse helpful when I need to refocus my heart and mind.

I resolve not to give up on continually tracking infection rates, reading research about best practices for mitigation when we gather, continue brainstorming ways to share old rituals in new ways that do not endanger our community, and I will remember that sometimes doing good doesn't look like rushing into a burning building or stopping a runaway train. Sometimes doing good means strapping on our masks, watching another week of YouTube church, signing on to zoom... again... or picking up the phone to call one of the saints of the church we would have said hello to on Sundays. Our church council will continue assessing infection statistics to determine the best time to allow those who are ready to gather in the sanctuary again while continuing to make worship available to those who choose to stay home. I pray that in these long dark winter weeks, that you will join me in praying for God to grant us the courage and stamina to continue to Do No Harm, Do Good and Stay in Love with God. As part of The United Methodist Church's Dismantling Racism: Pressing On To Freedom initiative, church leaders conducted a service of lament, inviting United Methodists across the connection to join in a time of repentance, communion, and commitment as the church examines racial injustice.

Martyrs to racism

During the past 100 years, too many people have been Martyrs to Racism. We pay respects to this Cloud of Witnesses as United Methodists across the globe work to dismantle racism.

In a multi-language and multi-cultural time of worship, a representation of our global church, United Methodists pray, sing and share communion with one another.

The service concludes with church leaders challenging every member of The United Methodist Church to a four-part call: pray, connect, show up, act.

What does the United Methodist Church say about racism?

The <u>United Methodist Social Principles</u> state: "Racism, manifested as sin, plagues and hinders our relationship with Christ, inasmuch as it is antithetical to the gospel itself. ... We commit as the Church to move beyond symbolic expressions and representative models that do not challenge unjust systems of power and access."

The church recognizes the existence of white privilege as an underlying cause of inequality. It supports the concept of affirmative action to guarantee more opportunities for all to compete for jobs. It opposes racial profiling, mass incarceration, targeting of migrants, and sentencing that disproportionately penalizes people of color.

We recognize racism as a sin. We commit to challenging unjust systems of power and access.

We will work for equal and equitable opportunities in employment and promotion, education and training; in voting, access to public accommodations, and housing; to credit, loans, venture capital, and insurance; to positions of leadership and power in all elements of our life together; and to full participation in the Church and society.

WHAT CAN I DO?

Pray. Ask God to show us the truth of our sin and how we might become agents of God's justice, mercy, love, and re-creation. Cry out to God for guidance. Listen for the voice of Jesus in meditation, Bible study, worship, and conversation to guide our ways. Proclaim release, recovery, and liberation for the oppressed.

Connect Talk to people within and beyond the church who are doing anti-racism well. Ask questions. Listen to and respect diverse voices. Learn how and where racism shows in your community and how others are harmed by its effects. Harness United Methodist and other resources that address institutional racism.

Show up Be present to the pain of another. Attend a prayer vigil. Join a demonstration. Organize a church school class to read, discuss, and respond to institutional racism. Tell church leaders, community leaders, and elected officials that you want to learn and help with dismantling racism in your community.

Act Support cross-racial/cross-cultural ministries in your area. Preach and teach about the harm racism does and how it offends our God. Harness the Holy Spirit anointing to rid all vestiges of institutional racial bias. Challenge your bishop, mayor, governor, police chief, or other elected officials to encode anti-racism policies and practices. Join the ongoing work for racial justice in the church and world.

LENTEN STUDY – Lent begins on February 17th and Missions will be offering a Lenten Study. The curriculum has not yet been selected, nor the dates/times. The February VINE will reflect the curriculum and times. Missions will purchase the study books and lead the study groups. FOOD PANTRY - THANK YOU to all who provide financial support to the food pantry. The funds allow


the pantry to remain active during COVID and supportive of those experiencing food poverty through the distribution of grocery vouchers for purchases at the local market.
