As I see it . . .

Ilt is time to prepare for "The Journey - Walking the Road to Bethlehem." As the days grow shorter and the nights stretch long, the Christian calendar enters one of its most beautiful and reflective seasons—Advent. Marking the four weeks before Christmas, Advent is a time of waiting, hope, and preparation for the coming of Christ—both His birth in Bethlehem and His promised return in glory.

The Spirit of Expectation

The word Advent comes from the Latin *adventus*, meaning 'coming' or 'arrival.' Just as the people of Israel waited with longing for the Messiah, Christians today use this season to prepare their hearts for Jesus' coming into the world. Advent invites us to pause amid the busyness of December and reflect on the deeper meaning of Christmas: God coming to dwell among us.

The Four Candles of the Wreath

One of the most recognizable symbols of Advent is the Advent wreath, a circle of evergreen branches symbolizing eternal life. Four candles—three purple and one pink—surround a central white candle known as the Christ candle. Each week, a new candle is lit:

- 1. Hope (Prophet's Candle) reminding us of the prophets who foretold the coming of the Savior.
- 2. Peace (Bethlehem Candle) symbolizing the peace Christ brings to the world.
- 3. Joy (Shepherd's Candle) represented by the pink candle, calling us to rejoice in God's promises.
- 4. Love (Angel's Candle) celebrating the boundless love revealed through Christ's birth.

On Christmas Eve or Christmas Day, the **Christ Candle** is lit, signifying the light of Christ breaking into the darkness.

<u>A Season of Preparation</u>

Advent is not only about looking back to the manger but also looking forward to the future. Christians await Christ's return when He will make all things new. This dual focus—past and future—invites us to live faithfully in the present, ready to welcome Christ into our hearts each day.

In a world filled with noise and haste, Advent teaches the holy art of waiting—waiting not with frustration, but with hopeful expectation. It reminds us that God's promises are sure, even when fulfillment seems delayed.

Feel free to observe Advent by lighting candles each Sunday, reading Scripture, or setting aside moments of quiet reflection and prayer. Some families create Advent calendars or perform small acts of kindness daily to share Christ's love in tangible ways. In our church, we will be having Advent Study for the four Sundays from 4-5 p.m. in the Library starting Sunday November 30 and finishing on December 21. There is a sign-up sheet in the narthex area.

As we journey through the weeks ahead, may our hearts echo the ancient cry of the Church: "Come, Lord Jesus."


