



The 2025 Annual Conference Session will be in session June 5 - 7 at Kansas Wesleyan University in Salina, KS. Our theme this year is "Loving God," and it is the first of several years of themes keyed toward the greatest commandment shared in Deuteronomy 6 and Matthew 22.

Why is "Loving God" the theme for Annual Conference this year? Loving God is both the beginning and the end of a relationship with God. It is what it is to be a believer in God. It is what it means to be a Christian, to be a lover of God. It is the most defining attitude that we can express in

explaining who we are. We are those who love the true and living God, the one true God who is not only the God and Father of the patriarchs, but who is the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, God the Trinitarian, true God. We love God. So if someone were to ask what does it mean to be a believer, what does it mean to be a Christian; it means to be a lover of God. And though we love Him imperfectly, we seek to love Him perfectly and long for the realization of that perfect love in the glory which is to come.

Then this, is a definition of what it means to be a believer and to have a relationship with God, but it is also a universal command and it must be stated that disobedience to this command is why hell will be forever populated. The world has been, is and will be full of people who refuse to love God. This is the great consummate command, disobedience to which brings about divine and eternal judgment and punishment. Nothing is more critical than this command.

When my wife and I were raising our kids, one of the things we did when they were very young was teach them a catechism. Catechism is a pattern of questions and answers that are memorized. It is the same as confirmation class questions. I still remember the beginning of the catechism, and the first question that we would ask is this: Who made you? And the answer would be given: God. The second question: What else did God make? Answer: God made all things. The third question: Why did God make all things? Answer: for His own glory.

What does that mean? God chose to put himself majestically on display in creation, and in history, so that we could see His greatness and marvel at it and love it, that our hearts would be kindled with love for Him because of His greatness. I will share more after I have attended the Annual Conference. Please pray for travel mercies and for the session to go smoothly.

Bishops Unveil Vision for United Methodist Church

United Methodist bishops, in collaboration with other church leaders, have made public a new vision statement for The United Methodist Church that has been years in the making. Ultimately, the goal is for United Methodists around the globe to unite in living out the vision to "love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously.

Church leaders also drew on the counsel of Bible passages, in both the Old and New Testaments, with an eye toward following Jesus' example.

- The new vision aims to complement The United Methodist Church's longtime mission to make disciples, and, like that statement, the vision draws on Scripture.
- Bishops also hope the new vision, years in the making, will inform the work of the Leadership Gathering planned next year.
- Ultimately, the goal is for United Methodists around the globe to unite in living out the vision.



The United Methodist Church forms disciples of Jesus Christ who, empowered by the Holy Spirit, love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously in local communities and worldwide connections.

The new vision statement aims to complement the denomination's nearly 30-year-old mission statement, <u>based on Matthew 28:18-20</u>: "The mission of The United Methodist Church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."

Baker Chaplain Retires

After 40 years in ministry, the last 11 as campus pastor at Baker University, Rev. Kevin Hopkins is retiring. His final chapel service last Thursday morning included farewells not only for "Rev Kev," but the graduating seniors.



To the 1,200 students and the faculty and staff on the Baldwin City Baker campus, Hopkins is almost never addressed by his last name. He is known as "Rev Kev."

Abbie Jones, a Baker senior from Parsons, said her faith journey began the first time she walked into Clarice Osborne Memorial Chapel.

"I found a home here," said Jones, who was baptized in the chapel two years ago. "Rev Kev always remembers where I sat and always had really great messages that resonated with me. He's just an incredible mentor and someone I can really look up to and see his kindness and how welcoming and loving he is to everybody," she added.

Saphina Achi spent the last two years of her college career at Baker. "It's become a place of comfort, and a big part of that is the chapel and Rev Kev," said Achi, daughter of Rev. Gideon Achi, pastor of Salina First UMC, and Esther Achi, pastor of Lindsborg Trinty and Salina Grand Avenue UMCs.

Seven graduating seniors received a print of Osborne Chapel and a small bag of the rocks that were left over from the chapel's move, stone by stone, from the village of Braxton, England, and dedicated at Baker in 1996 by Margaret Thatcher.

"I want you to carry a piece of the chapel with you wherever your road may take you," Hopkins told the seniors. Darcy Russell, retiring dean of the college of arts and sciences, also received memorial stones.

Rev. Blake Stanwood, a Baker graduate currently serving Humboldt-Big Creek UMCs, will be pastor at both Baker University and Garnett beginning July 1.

Hopkins and his wife, Dr. Carol Ann Eades, plan to remain in Lawrence and perhaps travel more — between them, they have eight children around the world, including one in Grenada, one in London and three in New York City.

Missions Team


