We are a nation who loves to admire those we consider great, be it a singer, basketball player, NFL player, movie star, or even a politician. We also have a habit of imitating those we celebrate, sometimes taking on their 'swagger', and even arguing over who is the greatest

The habit of imitation appears to be human nature. Even in Jesus' time, his disciples did the same. The gospel of Matthew says, "...came to Jesus and asked, 'who is the greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven?" (18:1) The gospel reports that Jesus calls a child to his midst and says, "I tell you the truth, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the Kingdom of Heaven. Therefore, whoever humbles himself like this child is the greatest in the Kingdom of Heaven." (18:3-5). You mean humble? Seriously? In American culture today? Where foul language and trash-talking to put another down is not only accepted, but thought of as a "respected" art form? Yes, the sin of pride is rampant and, in many ways, we seem to celebrate the cultures' 'heroes' victories more so than Jesus' victory on the cross over sin and death. And children learn what they see and live. Therefore, it's important to make sure that they see and live in the Light of Christ. And speaking of Christ, Jesus would go on to say

that if you cause even one of his little ones to sin, it would be better for a large millstone to be tied around your neck and for you to be drowned in the depths of the sea. (18:6) Jesus then goes on to say this: "See that you do not look down on one of the little ones. For I tell you their angels in heaven always see the face of my Father in heaven." (18:10-11).

Children were and are important to Jesus. And as the 'body of Jesus' in the world today, we, too, must take on the mantle of both protecting and teaching children. Below are some ways we might join together as God's people to do so.

- 1. Encourage kids you know to come to church on Sunday.
- 2. Talk to Jill Dodge at Baldwin First UMC or Kathleen Winkleman at Ives Chapel, or me about how we might help those children and youth in need.

More than 100 people from Baldwin City and beyond got a literal and figurative taste of east Africa during the first Kenya Night at Baldwin First United Methodist Church on February 1.

"We are celebrating diversity," said Rev. Koech, the church's pastor since July. "We were celebrating Martin Luther King a few weeks ago and we thought this would be a good time to start celebrating diversity. "And let's start with the Kenyans, since I'm here," the African native added with a laugh.

The two-hour celebration began with a cafeteria-style meal served by members of Baldwin First. It included samosas, a triangular pastry filled with beef or vegetables; mandazi, fried sweet bread infused with coconut and cardamom; and other foods that were given a Midwest translation: "barbecue beef," "fried chicken" and "beef stew."



Participants in Kenya Night enjoyed an authentic meal prepared by a Kansas City caterer. The food was prepared by the only Kansas City-area caterer who could cook Kenyan food, Koech said. "The cuisine, he said, is "kind of spicy'."

"We kind of borrowed it from India," Koech said of the cuisine. "If you've been to Indian restaurants, you might see some of this Kenyan food. Indians came to Kenya in the 1950s to build the railroad and ended up staying. They came with their culture, and they have influenced us."

Share Your History Night

The music started off with Galen Schmidtberger, a Russell singer, accordionist, and pianist that Koech knew from Koech's time as pastor at Russell Trinity UMC.

It segued into a choir of singers and dancers from Ushindi United Methodist Fellowship in Kansas City, Kansas, which includes many Kenya natives and one of three churches in the area with Kenyans worshiping.



Among those in the audience singing and dancing with the Ushindi group was Mel Gettler, a Baldwin City yoga instructor. A California native, Gettler lived in Kenya for a year with a friend during a gap year between high school and college.

"It was cool to be here and hear the Swahili and see all the food," said Gettler. "It was nice to have a little reminder of a good year."





David Pendleton, a member of another of Koech's former churches, Lenexa UMC, told of that congregation's mission trip to Kenya, building a youth church, and improving a water filtration system.

Pendleton shared his experiences as a newcomer to the country, including being greeted by members of Koech's family and being served meals.

"They're big on hospitality over there," he said. "If you clean your plate, it means you want more." Pendleton's PowerPoint slides showed how the motorcycle is the main form of transportation, transporting six children to school, a couch, and an animal carcass by various drivers.

Kenya Night, Koech said, was not only a way to expose the churches in the area to his culture, but for some members to come together as a whole. "In this crowd there are people who have been worshiping online and haven't been to church since COVID. This was our way of getting them out," he said. "People are disconnected with the church, and this is helping them come out.

"It was a little bit challenging," Koech added. He hoped the night, partially compensated by freewill offering, could become a tradition. "Maybe next time we'll be celebrating another country," he said.


Vintage Park Baldwin City

Welt felting most likely began in Central Asia in the first century CE. It was used in clothing and in the creation of yurts or tent-like structures that were warm and waterproof because of the qualities of wool. These items were often decorated and embellished. The structure of lambs wool allows for the fibers to create beautiful pieces for the home, art, or wearable. I will demonstrate how to create a wall piece using the wet felting technique along with how to embellish details with the technique of needle felting. Come and enjoy a fun and informative demonstration. There will be some opportunity to participate, touch and feel the processes that I use to create some of my artworks.






