Check. A whiteboard full of deadlines for music choices, bulletins, poinsettia orders, and checking candles for Christmas Eve? Check. More checklists for packing small children to travel to see family? Check. A multi-color calendar crammed to the gills with holiday parties, programs, and events.... So many checks.

By Christmas morning, I was exhausted. Mentally, Physically and emotionally wiped out. Feeling anything but Joy, Hope, Peace, or Love. yes. Even as a pastor who preaches that the advent season is one for slowing down, for focusing on what matters.

So how do we choose a different way?

Perhaps we begin with embracing the messiness of it all.

The birth of Jesus was not perfect and serene. It was a young mother, praying her betrothed could somehow believe that the child she bore was of God. It was a young couple, making a journey to be counted for taxes to a greedy government. It was a search for lodging in the third trimester of pregnancy. It was a birth in a stable, an announcement to those at the margins, an insecure monarch, a genocide, and a flight into Egypt as refugees.

And in all of it, it is the in-breaking of Emmanuel. God with us.

There is a different kind of Christmas we can experience when we embrace the messiness and lean into a more realistic hope, peace, love, and joy.

Maybe that looks like a weekly pause to light the advent candles together as a family, naming where you have seen hope, or peace, or love or joy in your lives.



Maybe it looks like setting aside time to join others in the zoom Bible study Pastor Ross and I are leading to deepen the experience of advent.

Maybe it looks like inviting someone you know to the Longest Night service on Dec. 21 in Edgerton to lament their grief in this season.


Maybe it just looks like taking a little time each morning or evening in the light of your Christmas tree with the tv off, to ask God to keep you centered in this season.

Opening

Nancy called the meeting to order at 7:06 p.m.

Minutes

Linda moved to approve the minutes of the previous meeting, and Doug seconded the motion. The motion carried.

Finances

Brad shared that finances are generally positive at this time. In terms of the capital campaign, \$53,00 of \$60,000 has been obtained or pledged. Brad presented the budget for 2022. The committee feels comfortable with the 2021 budget with a few modifications: \$73,232.50 will be applied to staff compensation, the budget for apportionments will be increased to \$20,000, and church administration will be increased to compensate for increases in operating expenses. Brad moved that we accept the budget of \$159,300 for 2022; Donna seconded. The motion carried.

SPPRC

The committee is in the midst of wrapping up staff appreciation and is working on the recommendation form for retention of staff. They will be meeting with Ives representatives in November.

Caregivers

Caregivers will meet again in November. The group will have new representation in the coming months. Regular attendees are from 4-6 each meeting.

Missions

Laura shared that Missions continues outreach via the food pantry. Financial contributions are needed at this time. Activities in conjunction with Ives are being planned for the care centers for Thanksgiving and Christmas. Blast Crew will be involved. Link is Nov. 6

Worship

Kathleen has new volunteers to serve as liturgists. She is still seeking help with children's time.

UMW

The ladies have a full month of activities

- Rededication of the kitchen is Nov. 7 at 8:30 a.m. A list of requested items to supplement the kitchen will be made available on-line.
- · The drive-thru turkey dinner will be held on Nov. 13th.


Most Current Financial Update:
