Opening

Nancy called the meeting to order at 7:08 p.m.

Minutes

Tara asked to remove a sentence related to SPPRC. Brad moved to approve and Doug seconded the motion to accept the minutes from May 24 with the correction. The motion carried.

Finances

There was an adjustment to the budget for the second half of 2021 in light of Pastor Amanda's change in employment status. Brad moved to approve the new budget for the remainder of 2021 with two new line items at a total of \$35,823.53. Doug seconded the motion. The motion carried. A hard copy of the new budget will be made available. Doug added that we are currently meeting and exceeding our budget. Pastor Amanda will continue to gather resources to assure that we can repay the loan necessary for the boiler. Nancy asked that we contact the District Superintendent to confirm a meeting for the church conference on August 22nd.

SPPRC

Tara addressed discussions regarding how to support Pastor Amanda as she embraces her new responsibilities. The committee voted to reinstate Cat's hours and salary. Tara asked about the possibility of coordinating prayer and care teams. There is a request to have a list of weekly activities.

Missions

LINK will be served on August 28th. This will be the last of the sack lunches before returning to more traditional meal service. The Food Pantry and Maple Leaf will be discussed at the next meeting. Laura asked the council to weigh in on how they would like to proceed.

Caregivers

Linda shared that the group will meet August 4th. Eighteen sets of 'teeny tears' were delivered to LMH.

UMW

Roger White's memorial dinner is August 14th.

Worship

Kathleen is contacting liturgists for upcoming services.

Trustees

Pastor Amanda shared that the trustees have been looking into concerns. A dishwasher has been delivered to the parsonage. The gas in the kitchen has been temporarily shut off due to a leak. The door to the kitchen will remain closed until there is less humidity. Doug asked that the boiler be ordered now, and that someone check the status of the elevator.

Pastor's Moment

There have been three weeks of VBS with as many volunteers as young people. Although small, this has been an opportunity to interact on a one-to-one basis. Nine students are participating regularly in confirmation. A couple of others have joined on an occasional basis. There will be a celebration on August 15th. August offers an opportunity to join with Ives Chapel to greet Baker students.



In Remembrance of Roger White

Roger P. White was born on 27 July 1940 on a farm in Buchanan Co. Missouri to Raymond K. and Hannah (Riepe) White. He spent most of his school years on a farm outside Whitesville, MO, graduating from King City High School in 1958. After a semester at Park College in Parkville, MO, Roger joined the Navy. He served for 6 years (4 active duty and 2 reserves). After active duty, Roger moved to Baldwin to attend Baker University. He was a member of the ZX fraternity and graduated in 1965 with a BS in Physics. He met his wife, Anita, while at Baker and they shared almost 57 years of marriage. He worked for Whitaker Cable Co. (St. Joe, MO), the Naval Research Lab in MD, and then for over 28 years at the Central Intelligence Agency, retiring as a Senior Intelligence Service officer in 1989. After retiring, Roger worked for a time for Ron Haskey as a commercial building inspector for insurance companies, spent a couple of years declassifying documents for the government, and then spent over 12 years as a member of the self-professed “Old Geezer’s Patrol”, maintaining a US presence on nights and weekends in various Consulates and Embassies in Europe, Asia, Australia, Africa, and the Middle East. Through the years, Roger volunteered in various capacities with the Boy Scouts, local churches (including 6 years as a youth counselor), Rotary, Senior Wheels, and the board for the Orchard Lane Apartments. He was an avid reader and often helped with the annual mum sale at the Baldwin City Library.



He was preceded in death (May 29, 2021) by his parents, brother Dr. Raymond Milford White, sister Carol Akins and a niece. He is survived by: his wife Anita; son Patrick (wife Cindy) White, Baldwin City KS; daughter Kimberly (husband Paul) Kiechlin, Fairfax VA; grandchildren Andrew (Jillian), Taylor, Eric, Jordan, and John Kiechlin and two great-grandsons Theo and Taliesin all of Virginia; two step-granddaughters Alisha (VA) and Karia (KS) McCoy and two-step great-grandsons Ricky and Brayden; a sister, Alice Lancey (KC, MO) and numerous nieces, nephews, plus friends around the country.

Services were held at Baldwin First United Methodist Church on August 14th. Memorial contributions can be made to the Milford and Roger White Lectorship series at Baker University, Baldwin First United Methodist Church, or Senior Wheels of Baldwin City.
