The Capital Campaign committee wants to thank our many donors for their generous giving! We are well on our way to reaching Phase 4 goal with the next five years. Our target goal is \$132,000.00 and we have received \$92,600 in actual donations to date since first of October.

Upon reviewing the options, the Trustees agreed to pursue a solution that allows greater flexibility to add future technology and to give an enhance in church experience. The option increased the estimate by \$3000.00, reflected in the \$132,000.

WELVE DAYS SHRISTMAS

Dec. 25, 2021

to Jan. 6, 2022

The dates of the 12 days of Christmas have gotten fuzzy thanks to the marketing efforts to purchase Christmas presents. The actual 12 days (commencing on Christmas day through January 6, known as Three Kings Day or Epiphany) is a time on the church calendar to celebrate the birth of our savior Jesus Christ. Still, as historical legends go, the actual dates for celebration may vary from church to church, but the purpose of the celebration is the same.

Some consider this English Christmas carol "12 days of Christmas", which you have probably heard or sung recently, is a story of a series of increasingly grand gifts given on each of the twelve days of Christmas. It is suggested the song lyrics most probably served as a mnemonic device or memory game whereby each child recited a verse until someone missed a verse. Modern folklore claims that the song's lyrics were written as a "Catechism song" to help young children learn their faith, at a time when practicing Catholicism was criminalized in England (1558 until 1829).

The following is thought to suggested to represent aspects of Christianity behind each line of music:

- A partridge in a pear tree is eternal life through Jesus Christ;
- Two turtledoves are the Old and New Testament;
- Three French hens are the reminder of faith, hope, and love, others think it represents the Trinity;
- Four calling birds are the four gospels;
- Five Golden rings are the Pentateuch (first 5 chapters of Old Testament);
- Six geese allaying: the six days of creation;
- Seven Swans swimming are the gifts of the Holy Spirit (Prophetic, Ministry, teaching, exhortation, giving, leading and compassion) or it can point to Isaiah 11:2-3 of wisdom, counsel, might, knowledge, respect, delight);
- Eight maids a-milking the beatitudes in Matthew 5:2-11;
- Nine drummers drumming point to the fruit of the spirit (Gal 5:22-23) of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control;
- Ten pipers piping are the 10 commandments in Exodus 20:1-7;
- Eleven ladies dancing are for the faithful 11 disciples; and
- Twelve lords a-leaping are the points of the Apostles Creed:
- 1. I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.
- 2. I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord.
- 3. He was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary.
- 4. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried.
- 5. He descended into hell. On the third day, he rose again.
- 6. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of God the Father Almighty.
- 7. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.
- 8. I believe in the Holy Spirit,
- 9. the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints,
- 10. the forgiveness of sins,
- 11. the resurrection of the body,
- 12. and the life everlasting.
