

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
President's Message

It's time again to think about what subject might be important to expand for our members' benefit. This type of decision is the same whether one is doing a painting, writing a book or even preparing a meal. Many choices will influence the decision-making process.

My direction today is based on the recent entries for our annual Aquarius show and my personal painting. Two different items are very evident to me that need to be expanded.

The first is the quality of the paintings entered for the show when compared to previous Aquarius shows. I fully realize this is a volatile subject to approach but to improve I think it needs to be discussed. I have access to Aquarius shows on my computer from more than 10 years, hence some visual evidence.

Second, the number of entries sent to the 2023 Aquarius and our on-line virtual members only shows has been decreasing over time. I too, am not painting nearly as much as I was 3 years ago.

Maybe none of these things are related, but maybe they are *very* interrelated. Covid-19 has had a tremendous impact on our society. In my case, I know, I am not painting anywhere near the amount of time nor finishing as many paintings as I was pre-Covid. I was doing 1 or 2 paintings a week and that has dropped to 1 or 2 a month at best. I see similarities with other painters in the amount of work being completed. The quotation which we have all heard over and over, "Use It Or Lose It" applies to painting skills as well.

Another item open for discussion is the effect of "Father Time" on our ability to try to match the skills of a John Singer Sargent or a Winslow Homer. I know my ability to hold a straight line is not near what it used to be and I also know that after my recent

surgeries my body is not what it used to be. I also see this in some of the work of fellow painters when examined with a super critical eye. That's the bad news; now let's see what can be done to counteract it. I never went to my boss with a problem without having at least one solution, a process that I learned the hard way.

First, CCWS can help improve all of our member's entries. In my humble opinion, several entries this year were juried out of the show due to poor or just plain bad photography. We are committed to bringing back the demo program showing entry steps and in particular, demonstrating the "do's and don'ts" of taking your Aquarius entry photographs. This will include the lighting required to capture your painting's color and values in a jpeg.

Second, WE – meaning you and I – can start setting goals for painting. In my case a good goal is at least one ½ sheet painting a week to be finished by bed-time on Sunday night. Also, have at least one ½ sheet painting sketched at least 1 week prior to finishing the previous painting. This is so the time spent trying to decide on the subject for the next painting is out of the way making it easier to focus.

These two changes in my painting "Hobby" schedule will, I believe, help me gain back my skills and enthusiasm for using my watercolor equipment and maybe it might help you, too.

The Thursday Morning Plein Air Painters

January and February, 2023

Feb 16 - Dinosaur Rocks – Pismo Beach. Go south on highway 101 to Price Street exit. Turn right at Price St and go to Cliff. Turn left and drive just a ways down to the cliffs and parking area with lots of marine views.

Feb 23 - Port San Luis – Avila Beach. From SLO go south on 101 to Avila Beach drive. Follow it to it's end past Avila Beach and Diablo Canyon to the large parking area by the pier.

Mar 2 - Los Osos Oaks, LO- drive out LOVR and just as you drive up the hill into town the oaks are on the left- a small 1 mile walk through the preserve. Be careful as you cross LOVR as it's a busy street.

Mar 9 - Between Los Osos and Baywood Park. Drive out LOVR through town and turn right on Pine Ave. Drive down to Binscarth and turn left. Right on Doris. It's a dirt road but smooth between Baywood and Los Osos, you can park off the side with views of bay and colorful kayaks. Or behind there are fields and groupings of eucalyptus trees.

keep working with us to make it happen. I know all the artists who attended were glad we persevered. It was worth waiting for.

The format for this workshop was “step-by-step” with lots of individual help along the way.

Frank equated the art of painting to the art of creating music. Since I play piano, I understand that, regardless of how the music may be written, I make it my own composition when I play it. The same applies in painting. As Frank demonstrated over the course of two days, the art of painting is

Finally, on December 6 and 7, 2022, we were treated to a great workshop led by Frank Eber. This was the Aquarius 2022 workshop that due to COVID was scheduled and rescheduled and rescheduled. Frank was kind enough to

Sandy McNeil’s Review: “Connect”, “Contrast”, “Control”, and above all, “Squint.” These were familiar reminders to those of us who attended Frank Eber’s watercolor workshop. Right from the get-go,

learning to control value, color, and edge. In addition, as we work out the composition of a painting, we consider both the linear and the atmospheric perspectives. And we do that by being intentional with our choices of value, color, and edge. If it seems like I’m talking in circles, you’re right! All these concepts are interrelated.

Actually, there were two big takeaways for me. The first was the judicious use of “contrast.” If I want to draw attention to a dark object, I must put it against a light background. And vice versa. Furthermore, in any one painting, there may be several opportunities to create contrast. Used effectively, these areas lead the viewer through the painting.

The second insight for me was the injudicious use of DE-TAIL. I love to draw, in detail. Rarely do I ask myself, “Is this important to the overall composition? Might it detract from the main event?” It occurs to

his second layer; we did our next layer! Frank visited everyone on an individual basis, offering suggestions to enhance our work and reinforce basic painting concepts.


“What you see first is what you should paint last. What you see last is what you should paint first.” – Frank Eber

Bob Norwood: Frank's artist's statement reads: "Painting should go deeper than copying nature as it is. ...atmosphere and light are just the first steps. As shapes dissolve in patterns of value and light, the painting

me that my propensity for detail derives not only from being an accountant but, more to the point, from using a small format art journal. My journal style doesn't necessarily translate well when I take on a half-sheet painting where it might be preferable to let the viewer fill in the details.

By the end of the second day of the workshop, my brain needed a rest. This was, after all, a paint-along: Frank did one layer; we did one layer. He did



During this workshop, you'll learn how to use value and temperature change, as well as transparent glazing to allow the glow of the paper to shine through. By balancing colors and weaving lights and darks, you will be able to achieve successful painterly paintings.

The workshop will include daily demos and time for individual painting with critiques. Be prepared for an art intensive 3 days.

CCWS Signature Member Larry Kappen holds a Master's degree in Art and has taught in Santa Barbara and Monterey. An avid hiker and backpacker, now living in Los Osos, he has explored and painted the breath of California's central coastal area.

In his biography he states "Impressionism may be the term that first describes my landscape paintings, but a closer observation reveals that I move beyond just recording the landscapes. Although my paintings are

done from direct observation of nature in the plein air style, they develop their detail and focus through my interactions with the paintings themselves, so that the landscape and the discoveries made through painting it merge to create the art. The act of painting takes over from the observed reality, so that colors change, and shapes alter. The result is my unique response to what I see in nature, and my own individual expression of what I see."


