
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President's Message

However, even if you do not have a career ambition to support yourself as an artist, most of us want to be successful at producing unique art just for ourselves. When we enter a show we all would like to have some recognition for the painting we worked so hard to complete.

Our regular **May and June Meetings** have been cancelled. Our church venue is closed until further notice.

The **May and June Monday Morning Paint-Ins** have been cancelled. This venue is also closed until further notice.

The **Fall Members Only Show** originally scheduled to start August 5 and run through September 14, 2020 with Robert Burrige as the judge and juror has been **cancelled**.

NEW PLAN for the Fall Members Only Show: The show will transition to a virtual online show. We will keep the same theme as originally planned, "Outside the Box" Try Something Different. **Entries will open on June 1 and will close June 23 at midnight.** All members can enter and there is no entry fee. Does the saying, "Quality comes from Quantity" apply to your work over time? Sometimes just painting 365 paintings in 365 days may work for improvement, but more often than not it will not achieve the improvement goal you have set for yourself. The true answer may be found within yourself.

I have had many people say to me, you painted another landscape, don't you paint anything else? The answer is sometimes, but I really love landscapes. I believe the key word here is "Love" and that is the true answer to improving your art. Paint what you love. If you do not love flowers then why are you trying to express yourself by painting a fresh-cut bouquet? If you love people, then your paintings should be about people.

The winner of the April virtual show was Chuck Crotser with his painting of a building/landscape. Chuck is an architect so he just may have a real love of buildings. Paint what you love and watch your paintings start to express more of you and they will improve.

In other words this is your chance "To boldly go where no one has gone before" because your paintings will be expressing yourself to the viewer. This expression is very key when looking at the 5 winners in our first virtual show.

How to Enter

Members can enter the show by sending a JPEG of a recent painting to: membersonlyshow@ccwsart.com

Each entrant will be sent a return email when their entry is received. If the member does not receive a return email this means their entry did not transmit.

These JPEG's will be posted anonymously by number to our virtual online gallery so members can view all of the paintings. Members can then make their selection by jotting down the number on the paintings they wish to vote for. There will be a link to a form with five spaces to enter the number of each painting you are voting for and its ranking.

The first, second and three honorable mention winners will be identified in the virtual online gallery once voting closes.

The Challenge

This year we are encouraging members to stretch their creative talents and try something they don't normally paint. For example: If you consider yourself a landscape artist, maybe think about trying an abstract landscape or even something completely non-representational. You get the idea. Or stretch even farther if you are up for the challenge. Try a portrait!

Artists may use subjects, materials and techniques, from experimental to traditional, to represent the theme. The goal is to encourage support for watermedia painting as a vital, enduring and expressive medium.

Basic Show Rules

1. One (1) painting for each member.
2. Original work only.
3. No size requirements.
4. Entry by members only.
5. Members will judge the show
6. Email the digital submission of your painting – jpeg and the name of your painting. You do not need to rename your jpeg identification.
7. Image should be cropped to show only the painting; no matting, background or frame allowed.
8. Image must represent the painting exactly. No computer modifications.

The Things I Learned

A good portion of our morning each day was spent in lecture.

In February CCWS sponsored a three-day workshop with Mike Bailey who also juried this year's Aquarius Show. Well-attended with 24 artists taking part, we learned a lot in three days. Though intense, I thoroughly enjoyed the workshop! I took 11 pages of notes, which I have narrowed down to the areas we covered in most depth. I had watched a workshop

of his online and practiced some of his learning techniques ahead of the workshop like painting 25 paintings of a still-life and making each one different. Since the workshop I've started working on a "One-Year Series Challenge," inspired by Mike. Hopefully you will be able to relate to some of his words of wisdom and use some of his ideas in one of your next paintings.

Value Lessons

The majority of the workshop concentrated on lessons in value. Values define your shapes. Variations in value define texture and form as well. Value also provides balance and weight in your painting. Composition is the arrangement of the value masses

in the picture space. The most important tool you can cultivate is the ability to simplify a subject into shapes of value. Mike strongly believes that doing value studies is the path to understanding and making a successful composition. He does many value sketches reversing the darks and the lights. By doing this, he is creating a plan for the painting.

Guide to Value Sketching

- Decide where your lightest light will be
- Draw it and place it in the rectangle (your paper)
- Shade in entire rectangle, except the light shape(s) with a medium value
- Add the dark shapes
- Assess the sizes of Light, Medium, and Dark
- Are similar values connected?
- Which value is Papa? Mama? and Baby?

A very thorough slide presentation was a good review and tied everything together.

He also recommends pushing your values from the mundane to the extraordinary and exaggerating the lights. But by the same token, don't be afraid of the darks.

Shape Lessons

Stop naming things in your painting. They are just shapes. The area behind the objects are shapes too,

often negative shapes, with the MOST IMPORTANT SHAPE being the shape of the paper. A good shape is asymmetrical and has direction. Shape is the underlying compositional structure of your entire painting. How you connect your shapes makes a BIG difference. Make your painting more interesting by congregating masses of light or dark shapes.

Design Lessons

Design is all about where your eye goes in the painting and where it rests. Give the viewer something for the eye to follow.

As an artist, it is not necessarily your job to explain everything in your painting. Sometimes it is more interesting to imply what you are trying to say.

Memorizing the 7 Elements of Design allows you to call on them when creating and analyzing your painting.

The 7 Elements of Design

- 1) Line
- 2) Size
- 3) Shape
- 4) Direction
- 5) Value
- 6) Texture
- 7) Color



Mike brought dozens of visual aids to clarify and help him make his points.

Some Important Thoughts from Mike Bailey

**Plan Thoughtfully! Paint Audaciously!
Arrest the viewer!**



We looked at those signs for three days. Hopefully they are burned into our collective memories.

Mike paints wet-into-very wet so "Wetter is Better" is one of his mottos. He also paints standing at an easel and lets his color washes run all over the paper. Somehow it comes out great.

Part of being a watercolor painter is being able to simplify! He is not a photo-realistic painter. He strongly believes you should imply what you are painting and let the viewer fill in the rest. His order

of painting is to plan the lights, paint the mediums around the lights, then add the darks. And his parting words to us were:

"Paint, paint, paint, paint, paint, paint, paint, paint, and then paint some more."

Seek the extraordinary and remember **CREATIVITY** trumps all!"

On day three, we quit at noon and drove to Morro Bay to view the Aquarius Show from Mike's point of view. He critiqued all the paintings including why he chose them.

Many, many thanks to our extraordinary workshop team for breakfast, lunch and snacks all three days as well as pulling together all the details that it takes to host such a well run event.

President Jerry Smith, Aquarius Chair Diann Johnston, Treasurer Elaine Tillman, and Hospitality Chair Linda Denton. Great job!

So this is a first for the newsletter, but each winning painting has a story to go along with it, written by the artist. Enjoy!

Our 1st Place Winner, Chuck Croster

I'm always inspired by travel. I regularly carry my sketchbook to try to capture some of that inspiration. The Isle of Skye region of Scotland is particularly beautiful with its incredible landscape: the forms, textures and ever-changing quality of light. . . . So much to draw . . . So little time!

The subject of my painting was based on a quick pencil sketch done during a day of grey and light rain. I tend to enjoy the juxtaposition of rural buildings set within the landscape, and I try to imagine

the occupants and their daily lifestyle. Aside from the wonderful hills and water, the simple structure provided a nice focal point and contrast to the otherwise organic forms. I also enjoyed the overlapping of landscape shapes to achieve depth in this composition. I admittedly like to draw, thus I began this painting by very quickly sketching the outlines of key elements in ink, but not wanting the line-work to overpower the final painting.

Because it was a rather dreary day when I did the original sketch, I wanted the painting to express what it might have been like under more pleasant conditions. I also attempted to describe the subtle variation in the natural colors that one might normally think of as more uniform. There really is much more color variation within the elements we see than we might realize.


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The ONLINE "1-Nite Only Member Show" Results

If I were to paint this subject again, I really think it would be fun to paint it in a very different mood. Perhaps similar to the day I came upon this scene. . . chilly, cool colors, foreboding sky, and perhaps I might slightly animate the painting with some figures or animals. I would also paint a larger version than the current 9" x 12" piece.

"Cocktail Hour"

was an Austrian symbolist painter in the late 1800s and a prominent member of the Vienna Secession movement.)

This painting is of lovely ladies of color, dressed in their finest and having cocktails. I utilized rubber stamps in the clothing they are wearing. These are from my days as a Rubber Stamp Image Designer; a vocation that I am trying to revive again.

The painting speaks to the fact that I enjoy having a cocktail (or two) with friends and hope others do too and that we can do that again in the near future. The series I painted is fun, but "Cocktail Hour" is my favorite.

This painting is part of a series I started on Yupo, whose subject matter all deals with people at gatherings having drinks. My first one of the series was "Champagne Hour" and it has a sort of "Klimt" feel to it. I love Klimt's work.

by the way the sunlight bathed the red headed figure from head to toe. The subject relaxes naturally inside the external environment of rock and sand. This overall image held a quiet balance and serenity that caught my eye.

Luckily the compositional and color design of the photo used seemed complete, so I didn't feel the need to change much in making a watercolor version of it. I used 11" x 15" Arches 140 lb cold press, and a palette of Daniel Smith Extra Fine Watercolors: Alizarin Crimson, Yellow Ochre, Quinacridone Gold and Burnt Orange, Cobalt Blue, and French Ultramarine Blue. Typically I use a Richard Simmons 1" oval brush, and a #8 Black Velvet Squirrel brush.

I was trying to convey the thought that the carefree young enjoy their days in the sun, and in moments of beauty and grace create a pretty picture.

When an artist friend saw this work, she smiled and referred to it as the California Girl. Her remark reminded me of the Beach Boys song that was a "sixties" favorite.

If I were to repaint this work, I might take more time with the rendering of the subject's hair, and the background rocks.

"California Girl" is based on a 2017 photo I took while taking a walk on Pismo Beach. I spotted this young woman lying on a rock, basking in the sun. I was awed

"End of the Day" was done from photographs I took in Shreveport, Louisiana many years ago. I used a limited palette, with a wet-into-wet technique.

The painting process was quick and simple.

The design elements were arranged to set the mood, and the shapes were specifically placed as an invitation to the viewer to weave through the design of the painting.

If I had to do this painting over again I would leave more whites.

Some friends were coming to visit from the Bay area. I was serving brunch and bought flowers for the table. They bought a painting when they were here. I painted a quick little painting of the flowers and wrote a thank you on the back and sent it to them.

Flowers always excite me and make me want to grab a paintbrush! Really more than most other subject matter. I loved the bouquet which was still fresh from the brunch table so I set up a still life.

I must admit I did get very carried away. That bouquet kept growing larger and larger but the original flowers are in there somewhere. The two pink flowers in the front were lilies in the bouquet but didn't work in the painting so I scrubbed them out and turned them into a different flower. What kind of flower? Who knows? They were the right color and shape I felt the painting needed.

I feel so blessed in this life. I want people to feel the joy I feel as I am painting.

As soon as I get a painting framed I see things I want to change. Even if I looked at it and critiqued it for days before it was framed. In this painting I wish I had put more contrast in the light and shadow areas with deeper shadows.

Judy Gittelsohn, Presented Golden Products in February

Judy Gittelsohn is a Golden Paints Certified Working Artist and teaches about the properties and application of the outstanding Golden product line.

At the February meeting, she gave a great presentation on the many ways to use these innovative materials. Golden offers a huge number of products for artists. Most of them are acrylics and gels,

mediums and grounds, but they also have an interesting line of watercolors referred to as “modern” watercolors. Qor paints use a unique binder called Aquazol. This binder is able to hold more pigment than traditional gum arabic which allows for a very

rich, vibrant color that is lightfast and safe to work with. The beautiful thing about Qor paints is how easily they rewet.

This presentation was very fast paced and even if you were there, you might want to explore the Golden Website for more information. Qor has a Facebook page as well with lots of fun video clips.

Each person received a folder with lots information on all the Golden products.

Some of the gels and grounds would be a lot of fun to experiment with. The interference and iridescent colors are pretty amazing as well.
