


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President's Message

Important COVID Information

As we gradually return to our previously normal CCWS activities, it is incumbent on all of us to behave responsibly in light of the fact that the pandemic is not really over. (We just would like it to be.)

CCWS requires all attendees for ANY CCWS activity to be fully vaccinated and boosted at least 2 weeks prior to the event. That includes: Monthly Meetings, Paint-Ins, and Workshops, etc. Our church venue in Nipomo is allowing us back for Monday Morning Painting and our May workshop. Masks are optional but social distancing is required.

Our church venue in San Luis Obispo is also allowing us back for monthly meetings. Hopefully as we continue to learn to live with this disease we can continue to meet together without infecting each other.

Thursday Morning Plein Air Painters Information

May 19 - Back Bay Inn, Baywood Park: From SLO, go west on Los Osos Valley Rd. Turn right onto South Bay Blvd. turn left onto Santa Ysabel and turn left on Second St. and go to bay. Park at the Back Bay Inn parking lot or turn west on Santa Maria and left into parking area – this is on the other side of the Inn and out of the way of their guests. Views of the bay and the gardens which are SPECTACULAR! They grow every kind of bulb, including tulips, daffodils.

May 26 - T-Pier, Morro Bay: 1185 Embarcadero, Morro Bay. From SLO drive north on Hwy 1 to Main St. (exit #279A). At stop sign turn right on Main St. Right on Beach Street to end. Right on Embarcadero. The T-Pier is a working pier located near parking lots and public restroom. The Great American Fish Company Restaurant is at the foot of the pier and others are nearby. There is a Fish Market behind Dockside Cafe. Boats, harbor, Morro Rock, water views. We might get lucky and see otters near the pier.

June 2 - Hollister Peak, Morro Bay: From SLO drive north on highway 1 and turn left across the highway on to Canet Road. Plenty of places to park off this country road with close up views of Hollister.

Artists typically bring a lunch and something to sit on for a lunch-time critique. **Rain cancels the Paint-out.**

Chuck Croster's Demo on Plein Air Equipment and Philosophy



finished ½ sheet or in some cases a full-size sheet, Chuck limits his to a size that can be painted on a ¼ sheet or less. He often paints with the backed paper resting on his knees.

Next is his decision of what equipment to transport to the paint site. He starts with a selection of only 9 colors of paint in his palette. This sounds like an easy choice, but for the rest of the story one has to look much deeper into how he has selected those colors and how much work was in-volved. He has, over several years, created numerous color studies by mixing colors together to eventually develop his idea of a pleasing mix of 9 standard tube colors. These colors lead to the heart of his painting methods which center on mixing colors on the paper or wet into wet.

Chuck Crotser, a long-time member of CCWS and Instructor at Cal Poly's School of Architecture, presented his approach to selecting plein air painting equipment combined with the set-up he uses when painting in the field. His approach to what to utilize in plein air painting can, in my opinion, be characterized as "Simplistic." This is very important when trying to lug equipment for painting plein air.

The decision of the paper size will influence his next range of equipment required and that is how to transport "his stuff" to the selected painting site. Where many artists try to do a Chuck limits his use of brushes to 3 or 4. His core brush is what most would call a mop. He tends to enjoy the PROCESS of sketching, painting and experimenting far more than developing that FINAL painting. His equipment also includes a small spray bottle and a folding table.

He repeated this statement, "Although there is tremendous satisfac-

tion in planning and executing a finished painting to frame and exhibit, there is something about quick, loose and expressive studies which are simply FUN to do. I find that I'm much less judgmental about a sketch, or series of studies than I am of a 'finished' work."

Chuck's demonstration of the use of his equipment showed how quickly an excellent sketch can be cre-

ated by an artist that has mastered the application of watermedia. I for one will no longer try to do a ½ sheet in a plein air setting. *Reviewed by Jerry Smith*


CONGRATULATIONS! to the WINNERS of the Spring Show!




