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Why do we paint? Have you ever asked yourself that question? I obviously don't need another painting to display in my home. I don't need another painting to sit in a drawer that is already filled with finished paintings. Yet, I continue to paint, order supplies, and study what other artists have created. Why?

In the New York Times bestselling book, *Your Brain on Art*, by Susan Magsamen and Ivy Ross, they discuss the research currently being conducted on the effect the arts have on improving our well-being. They show how engaging in an art project for as little as 45 minutes a day reduces the stress hormone cortisol, no matter your skill level, and how just one art experience per month can extend your life by as much as ten years.

This growing field is called 'neuroarts'. They share stories of people who live and work in very stressful situations and how they are retraining their brains through being involved in the arts. They talk about how the act of drawing and painting is helping many veterans who suffer from PTSD. Patients who have

been diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease are being encouraged to attend dance classes. They discovered that when PD patients started dancing, their tremors decreased. In treating patients with dementia, they have found the patients will remember the words to songs when they don't even remember their own names.

With the large amount of research currently being conducted, we are learning more and more about the human brain. The arts – be it dancing, painting, drawing, singing, or playing a musical Instrument – involve many parts of the brain. As the brain is engaged it forms new dendrites and new pathways. These new pathways create a sense of wellbeing and improve brain function.

So, next time you feel guilty about sitting down with your watercolors and painting, just relax, and enjoy the exercise you are giving your brain. Know that you are reducing the amount of cortisol in your blood stream which will lower your heart rate and blood pressure. There will always be plenty of work that needs to get done, but you won't always be around to relax and paint or go for a walk.

Congratulations to our new Signature Members!

So...what is the big deal about Signature status? I asked myself that question. Perhaps you have asked as well. More than just awarding you bragging rights, the purpose is to recognize the evolution of your artistic skill as a watermedia artist. The process to Signature status may be quite rigorous, as with the National Watercolor Society. In the CCWS, you must be juried into three Aquarius shows within a 10-year period. To retain Signature status for any given year, you must be current with your dues. The designation also allows artists to include CCWS as part of their signature on their art.

don't learn from it!"

These words from Joe Cibere, self-proclaimed "Master of the Universe." For 3 days in January, 29 watercolor artists assembled to watch, listen, and do from one of the best. We used big brushes and



small paper because we had a lot to cover. Three paintings every day, interspersed with occasional Joe statements, like, "I'm not a painter; I am a designer" and

"Fill in the big shapes and let the watercolor paint itself."

Day 1 was about simplifying an image into large graphic shapes defined by values. Day 2 was about the effective use of backlight to create contrast. Joe credited artist Nita Engle for his brilliant "bullseye" approach. Finally, Day 3 was all about water – crashing, sparkling, moving or still and reflective. We loved the vibrancy of what we were creating – nothing washed out about our paintings. And here, Joe instructed, "Remember, this is watercolor, NOT colored water!" So much joie de vivre! Personally, I enjoyed leafing through what Joe calls his "10-

minute sketchbooks": spiral-bound watercolor

journals, approximately 5x8, with spaces taped off for 4 tiny paintings/ sketches to a page. Over the 3 days, I heard comments

like "Wow!" "Fun!" "Inspiring!" Or, in Joe's words, "FUN-STRA-TION": fun with a lot of frustration!

- 1. One (1) original work per member.
- 2. No size requirements.
- 3. Members will vote for the winners.
- 4. Email a jpeg (at least 200 dpi), include your name and the name of your painting.
- 5. Your image should be cropped to show only the painting; no matting, background or frame in the photo.
- 6. No computer modifications.

February 20 – Linda Cunningham's Demo – Inktense Watercolor Pencils


At our February meeting, local artist Linda Cunningham demoed Derwent Inktense Watercolor Pencils. Most of us, it seems, as we

endeavor to master paint, paper, and values, give little or no thought to other watermedia such as these professionalgrade Inktense pencils. As she was painting, Linda explained that these watercolor pencils are wax-based and water-activated. On the Derwent website,

wax-based means that the wax core lends itself to soft, smooth, and blendable color. Water-activated means that with added water, the color intensifies and becomes permanent. Linda demonstrated different ways to activate the pencil





how colors can then be layered. The colors ARE bold and intense, but when applied lightly and with more water, soft shadows and shapes may be created. Interestingly, the pencils work well on fabric. Following her

March 26 – Tricia Reichert Demo - Keeping an Artist Sketchbook

I've only ever met one person who NEVER took photos of his travels. Photos are what we do to record and remember. But then, what to do with the thousands of photos of a lifetime! Photobooks, photo calendars, etc. abound. But how unique and memorable are the journals an artist like YOU might keep.

Journals and sketchbooks come in many different



sizes and configurations. Once you settle on one, here are a few tips to get you started.

• The first page in your journal

seems to be the hardest to get by, so Tricia recommends, "paint your paints" - your palette, tubes of paint, brushes.

• If you're outdoors, home in on what first attracts you. Everything else is clutter. That's where photos can be our worst enemy-TMI!

• Don't put your image in the center of the page. Rather, place it toward the side or corner so other images or details might be added to move the eye around the page.

Blaire was raised in New Mexico, in a fertile, creative familial environment. While throughout her life she always created art, her professional life took her down the path of academia. Blaire has



studied various forms of art in New Mexico, California, Colorado, Mexico, Spain, France, and Japan. Now retired from teaching at an art institute in San Francisco, she resides in San Luis Obispo. Blaire is drawn into having intuitive conversations with the canvas and seeing what emerges: mostly colorful abstracts, but also hints of the figurative.

She paints mostly in acrylic, encaustic, inks, pastels, and bits of mixed media. Brushes, twigs, and fingers are some of the tools Blaire uses to create layers upon layers, adding textures and depth to the summoning worlds.



Monday Morning





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Some interesting insight about...

At a recent Monday Morning Paint-in, our CCWS secretary, **Leslie Parsons**, shared some interesting facts based on numbers the CCWS routinely tracks.

Leslie began by noting that "Monday Morning Painters is free to all CCWS members, and there is typically no instruction provided. You just bring your current project, or start a new one, and paint anything you feel like, any way you

feel like doing it. There is a voluntary critique that you can participate in, or not. Some people may think that there's no value in doing something like this, but the facts say something different.

"There are currently approximately 150 CCWS members. So you, by yourself, represent less than 1% of the entire membership. But, consider this:

"92 paintings were entered into Aquarius 2024, which was open to artists living in California. Out



of those 92 paintings entered, 38 were juried into the show. Of those 38 paintings, 13 of them were

painted by Monday Morning Painters*.

"In other words, Monday Morning Painters represented 34% of the Aquarius show. So if you were a regular Monday Morning Painter and were one of the chosen, you went from being one in 150, to being approximately 1 in 3. That's a huge leap!

"There is value in painting with other likeminded artists." Where to find them? Studio space on Monday Mornings. Plein air opportunities Wednesday and Thursday. (See below).

"*BIG NOTE: The submission process was anonymous; the juror did not know who painted what and did not know or care who belonged to Monday Morning Painters."
