View the show and jot down the number on the paintings you wish to vote for. There will be a link to a form with spaces to enter the number of each painting and its ranking.

Winners will be identified in the gallery once voting closes, midnight August 30th.

Basic Show Rules

- 1. One (1) painting for each CCWS Member
- 2. Original work only
- 3. No size requirements
- 4. Entry by members only
- 5. CCWS members will judge the show for winners
- 6. Email the digital submission of your painting jpeg and the name of your painting. You do not need to rename your jpeg identification.
- 7. Image should be cropped to show only the painting; no matting, background or frame allowed on the image.
- 8. Image must represent the painting exactly. No computer modifications please.



CCWS 2020 Membership Extended Through 2021!

No doubt the above headline captured your attention since the continuation of your annual CCWS membership is unprecedented in our operating history. Also unprecedented is the effect of an event such as COVID-19. We can only hope the current outbreak of COVID-19 can be controlled soon with research and vaccines.

This pandemic has impacted our lives in many ways directly and indirectly and CCWS activities have not escaped its horrible effects. All CCWS events have been cancelled due to membership safety considerations.

The CCWS Board of Directors reviewed the impact of the COVID-19 to our planned programs, meet-

ings, shows and group activities. The board then projected a one-year loss of all of these activities in consideration of published timetables for the development of any vaccines. It was concluded that it will be at least Spring 2021 before CCWS and our venues will be able to expect to resume normal activities.

The development and use of virtual shows for both Members Only Shows and Aquarius 2021 are the only safe activities we can hold until COVID-19 is under total control.

If you are currently a dues paid member of CCWS for 2020 you are now paid through December 31, 2021. Say safe, stay tuned and keep painting!

Aquarius 2020 Artwork Jail Break

The opening reception for the CCWS Aquarius 2020 show was a wonderful afternoon event. It was held at the Morro Bay Art Center in Morro Bay on a warm sunny day typical of February on the Central Coast.

The reception was well attended by the show artists, their families and guests. The sweet and savory food provided by CCWS members along with the hospitality of the Morro Bay Art Association hostesses made the afternoon just delightful. Awards were presented to the winners and artists and their guests departed the gallery with a warm glow of an excellent show.

Nobody had a hint of what would happen next to suddenly close the show to all. The appearance by President, Jerry Smith

of COVID-19 and its impact on our society was like a tsunami sweeping across the coastline. The closure of the Morro Bay Gallery quickly followed the pandemic's arrival.

This closure literally jailed the Aquarius 2020 show which was still hanging and caused the artists to lose access to their work and blocked any removal of the paintings by the artists or their artwork buyers. All was in limbo until the Governor of California relaxed lockdown restrictions imposed on small businesses which allowed the opening of art galleries. This relaxation allowed the gallery to schedule a takeout for the show on June 23rd, however new rules were in effect.

The first rule was, one-way traf-

fic only. So, the artists picking up their work needed to enter through a side door, pick up their painting, and depart through the gallery's front door. Face masks were required by all, and the sign-out paperwork was done outside. All went like clockwork; the entire takeout was completed in less than 90 minutes.

Because the show closed early, our webmaster, Jerry Smith, installed all the paintings in a virtual online gallery at ccwsart. com. If you missed it, the show will reside on the website until Aquarius 2021 replaces it.

Thanks to all the artists for participating in Aquarius 2020 and please know that Aquarius 2021 will be a virtual show. See previous two pages for more info!

CCWS is very lucky to have such talented artists in its membership. The quality of the work entered in the June Members Only Show was top notch. Keep in mind that this was not a "juried" show. Everyone who entered had their work shown. In viewing the show, it is quite obvious that the current situation our country finds itself in is weighing on people's minds, but they haven't let it stop them from being creative.

Thank you to the 39 members who participated by entering a painting, and thanks also to the 70 members who took the time to vote for your favorites. For this show, the theme was "Outside the Box, Try Something Different." Members were encouraged to stretch a bit and try something they wouldn't normally paint. As near as we can tell, quite a few of you did just that. Congratulations!

A 1st, 2nd, and 5 Honorable Mention prizes were awarded. First Place won \$50, Second Place won \$25, and each Honorable Mention received a check for \$10. As we did with the last online show, we asked each winner to tell us a little something about their painting. Here are their stories.

Our 1st Place Winner and Signature Member, Shirley Horacek

I recently moved to Arroyo Grande, which is famous for the Arroyo Grande Creek roosters in the Village area. Since moving here, I have discovered the crows of Arroyo Grande, many, many of them. They are fun to observe as they are very smart birds. Historically, the area was covered with walnut groves

and many walnut trees remain. The clever crows love walnuts and have figured out how to drop them from light poles and rooftops to break the shells open, then swoop down and consume the tasty walnuts. I decided the crows of Arroyo Grande needed to be highlighted as well as the roosters.

For me "Outside The Box" was trying a new set of design techniques that included collage and abstraction. I used techniques learned from Karen Knutson whose work often features crows and other birds painted in an abstracted style with lots of textural elements, positive and negative painting, pathways of light and the inclusion of colorful collage.

If I were to paint this again, I would make the "light" pathways slightly smaller and lighter, and I would add additional branches to the background creating more positive and negative spaces.

June 2020 – Virtual Online Member's Show

"Quarantine Blues"

I painted "Quarantine Blues" before receiving the theme for the show, but the concept of being boxed in motivated my painting and the communication I hoped to establish between it and its viewers.

A friend of mine, with underlying health conditions, had to take quarantine seriously. He was suddenly unable to visit family hundreds of miles away, play tennis, bridge, or go to the gym, dine out, or have cocktails with friends. His spacious home, while a safe, refuge, indeed became a box.

Interested in visually exploring the relationship between my friend and the world outside, I asked him to text me a selfie, wearing a mask. As soon as I saw the photo, I wanted to paint the portrait. The real subject is the expression in his eyes, poignant and resigned, a marked contrast with the light, undefined trees and the entic-

"Differences of Opinion"

My inspiration for this painting is loosely based upon our current social milieu. In keeping with the theme, I really wanted to try something non-representational for a change.

Although there's visual tension, the overall painting remains light in tone and expresses optimism.

The first marks that I placed were the dark curved ones, which were to represent current social frustrations and disturbing occurrences that have recently dominated our news and our lives. The intermediate colors, mostly ing sunshine outside the box. I was challenged to bounce the yellows of springtime seen through the window to the interior of the dining room, while retaining the contrast inside and outside the box.

When I first posted this painting on my Flickr site, the mask looked to me like a World War I era gas mask, so I changed it by adding some colorful shadows to portray a generic mask of the type we see every day. I considered defining the foliage better on the right side by adding some more darks, but I decided to keep that area as the high key, outside-the-box ideal which eludes the captive.

Many thanks to CCWS for sponsoring these online galleries! The work they contain is excellent, and I find the paintings that my fellow artists do to be inspiring.

blues and reds (no political reference intended) represented the conversations taking place surrounding these concerns. Some are constrained by the dark lines (bias) and some flow beneath those lines (dialog). Finally, the underlying yellow/orange rectangular shape represents unity and order, whether it be governance, faith, or perhaps empathy, ... ultimately a hopeful conclusion.


If I were to repaint this subject, I might try it in mixed-media; perhaps watercolor and collage. I was quite intrigued by the winner, "Backyard Buddies."

I've driven by this beautiful church in Montecito dozens of times over the years and finally stopped and went inside, walked all around it, and took several photos resolving to finally paint it.


I don't like painting buildings from photos, (I usually paint plein-air), but decided to do the best I

could by doing several value studies and a small test painting. My test painting looked too much like the photo so I started over again with somewhat more abstracted value studies. I chose a limited palette of very different colors from the actual local color.

I was trying to show the beauty of the church in a way that was even more dramatic than the actual scene. If I were to paint it over again, I would make it more abstract with fewer hard edges. My inspiration for this painting was the fact that Dale was staring at me. I'm not a portrait artist, so this was an "Outside the Box" challenge. I found it really interesting to try and capture a likeness.

This painting was completely unplanned. I just did the portrait and then winged it . . . not my normal approach.

If I were to repaint this subject, I would make it bigger and include more Asian aesthetics.

One More June 2020 – Honorable Mention Winner

In January of this year, Ingrid Brink did a demo at our meeting showing us her technique of creating new works of art by tearing up old paintings and reassembling the torn pieces into a collage. This was an "out of the box" approach to my more traditional

painting style and this was the inspiration for my entry. A poem by Kitti O'Meara (emailed to me by Marti Fast) referenced the present pandemic crisis. The poem inspired me to name my painting "And The People Stayed Home."

This piece was done before I knew about the show's "Out of the Box" theme. I entered my work in this particular show confident that it's "Out of the Box" technique was a good thematic match.

I had been working on a watercolor of the Disney Music Center, painting its dynamic architectural curves with a broad brushstroke. Realizing the detail involved to complete this project, I put it aside. Then I started a different watercolor whose subject became four improvised figures painted in silhouette. I set this painting aside as well. The next day I noticed both of these unfinished paintings lying on a table. Individually each had a spontaneity and movement I thought might visually work well together. In vertical strips I tore up my painting with the four figures and glued the strips onto the blue-gray background that was the "Music Center" painting. The overall design, color, and movement produced something stronger and "Out of the Box."

The first line of O'Meara's poem reads "And the people stayed home." I saw my watercolor and imagined that it illustrated the emotional mix that people are feeling now amid turbulent change. The present pandemic is forcing us to create new ways to live and heal.

If I were to repaint this subject, I might try to pay closer attention to the anatomical correctness of the silhouetted figures.

The prose poem by Kitti O'Meara reads like a cross between a proverb, an Instagram poem, and, if you're feeling optimistic, a psychic prediction. It's gone viral with thousands of posts on Instagram, Twitter and YouTube. It was most widely shared by Deepak Chopra, and has been around the world.

And the people stayed home.

And read books, and listened, and rested, and exercised, and made art, and played games, and learned new ways of being, and were still.

And listened more deeply.

Some meditated, some prayed, some danced.

Some met their shadows.

And the people began to think differently.

And, in the absence of people living in ignorant, dangerous, mindless, and heartless ways, the earth began to heal.

And when the danger passed, and the people joined together again, they grieved their losses, and made new choices, and dreamed new images, and created new ways to live and heal the earth fully, as they had been healed.

Sue Sevier, CCWS Signature Member, CCWS Membership Chairperson



Sue is currently our Membership Chairperson and most likely you have spoken with her at our reception table at the start of our normal monthly meetings. She will have you sign in and make sure you have a name tag and a ticket for the monthly art book drawing. She answers questions about joining the group and makes everyone feel welcome, always with a cheery attitude and a smile.

Having been a member since 1988, Sue has made many contributions to our group over the years, having

held most of the offices on the board at one time or another including President. Sue is the perfect person to share with our newer members a little bit of history about what the watercolor society was like back in the day. The group had only been in existence for 12 years when she joined.

This is a story about Sue's journey in art and a little bit about the role CCWS might have played in that journey.

Q. You grew up in Southern California, so tell us a little bit about how you landed on the Central Coast, how long you've lived here, and how you got started in art?

A. I grew up in Burbank across from Disney Studios with artists as neighbors. They were some of my earliest

influences. Art was a favorite subject in school and I still have school friends that somehow remember my artistic skills at that early age. My husband of 58 years and I raised our children in La Canada. We then decided we needed to "live by the ocean," which brought us to Shell Beach. We've enjoyed 32 years here and no regrets.

Q. Who are some of the artists you have studied with, and which ones had the most influence on your career?

A. While in Southern California, I studied oil painting with Joyce Pike for several years. At that time, there was only one watercolor workshop

artist available in our area. Zoltan Szabo was my first watercolor instructor. Since living here, I have attended workshops with the many fine artists who come to our area. I usually come away inspired and excited to try something new.

Q. What was CCWS like when you joined 30 years ago? Over the years, how large was the group, and what kind of activities did you do?

A. CCWS was affiliated with the Art Center when I joined (now San Luis Obispo Museum of Art). During that time CCWS had

over 100 members at one point.

After joining the CCWS Board at the Art Center, my first job was to head up the annual Aquarius Show along with a co-chair. From there I handled the newsletter and was also Secretary before I became President for 2 years. From there, I joined the Art Center Board of Direc-

tors and helped with planning fundraising benefits. Another learning experience!

Q. Having been an active member of CCWS for such a long time, is there anything the group used to do back in the day that we should consider reviving when we meet again?

"Do Not Disturb"

A. I am grateful for the energy that the current CCWS has created and proud to still be a part of it. Many benefits outweigh what was offered in the past. I hope the energy continues as we look forward to being able to meet sometime in the future.

Q. You have a lovely studio in your home, and have taught watercolor classes there in the past. How many years did you teach classes?

A. I began teaching here in 1994 at an artist studio in Squire Canyon. Next, I taught at the Shell Beach Vets Hall until Pismo Beach's budget forced it to discontinue art classes. That's when I invited students to join me for classes in my home studio. Over the years I have met many artists while teaching and developed lasting friendships that I am so grateful for. I taught for approximately 25 years and enjoyed passing on to others what has been my passion.

Q. You have participated in "Open Studios" and you sell your work. Do you actively sell your work other than through exhibitions and the open studio tours?

A. The Open Studio Tour presented a new way to show my artwork and I entered many times. I always look forward to participating and am sorry that like so many other things, it won't be taking place this year.

Q. Our records show that you attained Signature Membership in 2005. When did you start entering your paintings in shows and what shows besides ours have you entered?

A. One of my very first art show experiences was at a park in Glendale, CA. To my surprise, I was presented with an award. Something you don't forget! Other

shows at the time were held in outdoor shopping malls and sidewalks. We hauled paintings to shows all over Southern California.

Q. Do you have any advice for our members that may not have shown their work yet and might be intimidated by the thought of doing so for the first time?

A. "Remember, not all paintings entered in a show can be chosen." For

instance, 5 paintings of pears is too many. Some must be eliminated even if they are fine paintings. The show must hang well together. Don't be discouraged if your painting is not chosen the first time. Keep trying.

Q. Do you do any art other than water-color?

A. I am a member of SACCC (Silk Artists Central Coast California). My silk paintings are matted and framed like my watercolors. Some members make beautiful silk clothing.
