The trail is accessed through Montaña de Oro, but according to Sarah, "from that view-point you can't see both arches at the same time." She really likes the shadows on the beach from the cliffs so she just fudged the scene to show both of the arches making that the focal point, and the beach

shadows lead the eye into the painting and to the focal point. The park rangers don't let anyone paint there unless they are a member of SLOPE so Sarah combined imagery from several of her many photos.

Most of her photos were from bright sunny days, but she liked the idea of the distant, ominous clouds. The rendering of foam on the beach included some masking, scraping and also some layering. Congrats on your award-winning painting Sarah!

Retiring Officers will be honored at an upcoming meeting. Watch for news.





Nov 16, Tiber Canyon Ranch, 280 W. Ormonde Rd. SLO, (805) 781-0827 From SLO go south on Hwy 101 to Pismo Beach. Take Hinds Ave/Price Canyon Rd (exit #190B). Turn left at stop sign and go east on Price Canyon Rd. Turn right on West Ormonde Rd to #280 West Ormonde Rd (on left).

Nov 30, Park Street, Pismo Beach – From SLO, go south on Hwy 101 to Hwy 1/Pismo Beach exit (exit #191A). Go straight through onto Dolliver St (Hwy 1). Continue south on Dolliver and turn right onto Park Ave. Go to the end and park in the large parking lot on the left.

Dec 6, San Luis Obispo Mission de la Tolosa / Murray Adobe-downtown SLO – views from the front of the mission and inside the garden courtyard. The Murray Adobe is the very small building close by to the Mission. It's easily overlooked.

Dec 13, Deborah Veldkamp' s home and gardens, 240 Oconnor Way, SLO. From 101 take LOVR drive out LOVR west and yield right onto Foothill Blvd at the light. Turn left onto Oconnor Way. House is about .4 of a mile on the right.



Workshop Review

Kathy Miller COAST WATERCOLOR

Inspired by Nature

Kathy Miller's workshop titled, "The Way of Water" was held October 3rd and 4th 2023.

Kathy is primarily a self taught artist and has taken classes at Bakersfield College. She credits taking workshops with established artists as being helpful in her development as an artist. Her main objective is to get fresh brilliant colors and gestures while maintaining an impressionistic, yet representational image.

Kathy prefers to paint plein air whenever she can, and her favorite subjects are landscapes and seaside views. She has many funny stories about plein

air painting, one of which includes tips on how to get sand and saltwater out of a watercolor palette. You'll have to ask her...

In addition to examples of her work, Kathy shared some of her sketchbooks. She makes many of the actual books herself and may be sketching and painting in as many as 6 at the same time.

Day 1 started with a water scene such as a lake, creek, marshland or waterfall.

Students were free to use their own subject matter or use any of the many references that Kathy provided.

Day 2 focused on waves, rocks, and ocean scenes.

All the demos were very informative and included lots of useful tips about technique and color. It was a productive two days with plenty of time to paint. There was also plenty of one-on-one input from Kathy. I felt that I came away with a new understanding of shadows and reflections in water and acquired many helpful tips for future painting.

Each day ended with a really helpful group critique.

Meeting Presenters Reviewed

Joan Brown - August's Presenter



Joan shared that she painted this river in small wet-into-wet sections.

Joan taught Art at the Community College level in Ashland, Oregon. Two years ago she moved here to the Central Coast. Accustomed to speaking to a room full of students, she did just that for her presentation. Joan, who was formally trained by out-

standing contemporary artists,

has been painting for over 20 years. She brought some of her paintings and brought digital images of the rest on her laptop. She spoke about her compositions, shadows, darks against lights for emphasis and impressed upon us to spend

our discretionary art money on good quality paper and good brushes.

Joan belongs to The Painters Group which is part of the Central Coast

Art Collective. She does beautiful work in oils as well as watercolor.

Joan seems to paint a lot of horses. Not sure what

the back story is there, but I asked her to send me this one that she had on her computer. I love the colors in the shadows and the humor in the title.

Mike Grahek - September's Surprise Meeting Presenter

Thank you to Pat Soenke and Jerry Smith for help with this review.

Judy Ann Maynard was originally scheduled to do a presentation about Alcohol Inks on Yupo. Due to an accident which required recovery time, Judy Ann was not able to give her planned program.

In her place, Michael Grahek, CCWS Vice President and Program Chair was able to step in and show attendees how he achieves soft edges to cre-



ate better atmospheric perspective in his paintings.

He started the demo by wetting the paper on both sides, so wet that the paper stuck to

the board without the need of clips or tape.

Michael emphasized that in a wet-in- wet painting, "timing is everything." He started with some washes of interesting colors, indigo, orange and even yellow and was not concerned about getting a bit of green sky. He even put in a little green for good measure and the results were stunning. He avoids blooms by adding stronger pigments to each layer.

He emphasized the need for strong darks and strong lights and good composition. He uses a limited palette and demonstrated the need for good contrast between cools and warms.

Mike paints in a style

similar to the California School Painters, and has developed his own style often using ink and watercolors together. He studied under Milford Zornes for a dozen years and traveled with him for extended painting excursions to Spain, Cuba, Death Valley, New Orleans, Utah, and Arizona. He continues to refine his watercolor style by trying out new ways to communicate his impressions of the world to the viewer. He has been painting for over 25 years.

To finish up the painting, he created a small area of hard edges to give contrast and texture, but overall, the painting was created using soft edges.


