Palouse Doodles Guardian Home Program Details

The Palouse Doodles Guardian Home program is designed to give doodles a loving family environment from puppyhood, ensuring a happy and healthy life while minimizing the need for kennel-raising. Families receive a high-quality dog at no upfront cost, committing to care for and breed the dog under the program guidelines.

Why Guardian Homes?

- Humane Breeding: Dogs avoid kennel environments, growing up as beloved family pets.
- Limited Breeding: 2 Litters (or a half price doodle for 1 litter)
- **Cost Savings**: Families gain ownership of an expensive dog in exchange for their partnership with Palouse Doodles.

Guardian Family Responsibilities

1. Basic Care:

- o Feed a high-quality dog food rated 4+ stars on <u>Dog Food Advisor</u>.
- o Provide regular grooming and veterinarian care.
- o Maintain a safe and loving home environment.
- Agree to the read the book Bernedoodles: A Head to Tail Guide by Sherry Rupke and abide by limited exercise guidelines in first year of growth for preventative health

2. Financial Commitment:

- Cover routine expenses: food, grooming, vaccinations, general vet care, flea and heartworm prevention.
- o Notify the breeder of any illness or injury for guidance on treatment.

3. **Breeding Requirements**:

- o Track the dog's heat cycles. There will be two per year beginning at age 11-13 months. Notify the breeder of the first heat around 9-12 months. Breeding will occur typically on 2nd or 3rd heat cycle, depending on the best fit for family and breeder.
- Transport to stud service during the 2nd or 3rd heat (typically days 11, 13, and 15).
 Stud fees are covered by the breeder.

4. Pregnancy and Whelping:

- Limit physical activity during the second half of pregnancy.
- o Groom the dog before Day 50 for hygiene during whelping.
- Change dogfood to a "Puppy" version of food your dog is eating by 4th week of pregnancy.

- o Meet breeder for whelping and postnatal care at an agreed location.
 - Optionally, families can whelp the litter at home with breeder guidance, receiving \$1,500 per litter for your services (\$2,500 for litters of 9+ puppies).
 Breeder pays for food, setup, and all costs associated with whelping that are required for whelping and raising litter.

Breeder Responsibilities

1. Cover Breeding Costs:

- o All expenses related to breeding, pregnancy, and whelping.
- o Veterinary care for pregnancy and litters.
- o Puppy food, deworming, and vaccinations for the litter.

2. Guidance and Support:

- o Provide step-by-step guides for breeding, pregnancy, and whelping.
- o Offer phone, video, or in-person assistance as needed.

3. Transportation and Care:

- Arrange and cover transportation for whelping and postnatal care.
- o Ensure the dog's comfort and well-being during their stay.

Frequently Asked Questions

1. Can we whelp the litter at home?

Yes, families can choose to whelp at home with breeder support. Compensation and step-by-step instructions will be provided.

2. How does the dog adjust to whelping away from home?

Dogs typically settle in within hours. The breeder ensures their comfort and reduces stress to protect the puppies.

3. What if the dog gets sick or injured?

Routine care apart from pregnancy is the guardian family's responsibility. If issues arise during pregnancy or whelping, the breeder assumes financial responsibility.

4. Can we visit during whelping?

Visits are limited to short, supervised interactions after the puppies are 1-2 weeks old, prioritizing the mother's comfort.

5. How long does the dog stay with the breeder?

The dog stays for approximately 7-8 weeks postpartum until the puppies are weaned and ready for adoption.

6. What happens after the breeding commitment is fulfilled?

The dog is fully owned by the guardian family, free of further breeding obligations.

Program Philosophy

This program aims to balance ethical breeding practices with the well-being of both dogs and families. By rejecting puppy mills and supporting humane, family-centered breeding, Palouse Doodles ensures every dog gets the care and love they deserve, with a maximum of two litters whelped by each of our dams.
