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Executive Summary

For: Executive Administrations, Family Medicine Academy, and Dental Academy in Riyadh Second Health Cluster.

Reporting Period: October- December 2024

This report analyzes training activity within the Riyadh Second Health Cluster during Q4 2024. While a 7% increase in training activities was observed, learner participation dipped 4% compared to Q3. Despite this, October saw peak engagement, hinting at potential seasonal influences. SCFHS CPD and simulation-based courses led in popularity, reflecting a strong demand for practical, competency-driven training. Notably, service utilization rose 2.7%, suggesting more focused training engagement among participants.

Significant Findings

- Overall Training Activities: The activities increased modestly by 7% in Q4 (n=11,137) compared to Q3 (n=524), with simulation courses ranking the highest in number of courses, and CPD programs exhibiting the highest participation in learners.
- SCFHS CPD Programs: Demonstrated a 57.5% increase in the number of programs (n=63) and an 18.9% increase in CME hours (n=452) in Q4 compared to Q3. October saw the highest number of programs (n=39) and a significant increase in CME hours (n=223), while November exhibited the lowest figures for both.
- SCFHS CPD Programs Learners: Q4 witnessed a 21% increase in learners for SCFHS CPD programs (n=3260) compared to Q3 (n=2695), establishing them as the most preferred training activity in Q4.
- **Professional Certificates:** Three professional certificate programs were maintained in Q4, the highest across all quarters, with 28 learners participating.
- **Skill-Based Training:** Simulation courses remained the most prevalent in Q4 (n=249), despite a slight 0.8% decrease compared to Q3 (n=251). This corresponded with a 24% decrease in learners (n=2575) compared to Q3 (n=3390).
- Life Support Courses: While life support courses increased by 23% in Q4 (n=64) compared to Q3 (n=52), they remained 14.7% below the peak performance in Q1 (n=75). Conversely, Q4 (n=433) recorded the highest number of learners, demonstrating a 63.4% growth from Q3 (n=265).
- Learning Institute (LI) Programs: Exhibited a steady 0.6% increase across all four quarters (Q1=173, Q2=177, Q3=180, Q4=181). However, Q4 experienced a 27.7% decrease in learners (n=580) compared to Q3 (n=802).
- Scientific Articles: This service saw a 15.8% increase in Q4 (n=205) compared to Q3 (n=177), although it remained 3% below its peak performance in Q1.
- Library Visits: A 2.6% decrease in library visits was observed in Q4 (n=1840) compared to Q3 (n=1889), representing a 24% decline from the peak in Q1 (n=2421), potentially indicating seasonal trends or accessibility issues.
- Educational Consultancy: This service experienced a 28.6% decrease in Q4 (n=10) compared to Q3 (n=14), falling 66.7% below its peak in Q2 (n=30). This suggests potential seasonal trends, manpower limitations, or inadequate awareness among potential users, necessitating improved service promotion.




Training Activities and Services Report

- Internal Visits (Program Evaluation): Program evaluation remained the least utilized service across all quarters. No evaluations were conducted in Q4 (n=0) compared to Q1 (n=2) and Q3 (n=2), highlighting the urgent need to address this critical area through evaluator recruitment.
- **Professional Leaves:** A significant increase in professional leaves was observed in Q4 (n=166), the highest across all quarters, likely attributed to seasonal trends related to conference and symposium attendance.
- Educational Agreements: The number of educational agreements remained consistent across all four quarters (n=14).


