#### **SOCIETY OBJECTIVES**

PG 6 VERSION: 2025-04-01

The objectives of this Society shall be to encourage interest, promote improvements in and advance the standards of agriculture, domestic industry and rural life by:

- 1. Researching the needs of the agricultural community and developing programs to meet those needs.
- 2. Promoting the conservation of natural resources and encouraging the beautification of the agricultural community.
- 3. Supporting and providing facilities to encourage activities intended to enrich rural life.
- 4. Holding an agricultural fair annually, featuring competitions for which prizes may be awarded.
- 5. Develop & promote educational programs & competitions for the purpose of creating youth awareness of local agricultural history, current activities, and future opportunities.

#### **RULES & REGULATIONS**

#### **Membership**

- 1. An annual membership of \$15.00 is payable to the D.D.A.S. Annual membership is January to December.
- 2. Membership can be paid:
  - a. in person at the Fairgrounds Office, or
  - b. by mailing a cheque (payable to DDAS) to RR # 3, Site 300, Box 4, Dryden, ON P8N 3G2, or
  - c. by sending an E-transfer to <a href="mailto:ddastreasurer@gmail.com">ddastreasurer@gmail.com</a> with your name and contact information.
- 3. Membership is considered complete once the signed membership form and payment is received at the office. A membership card is available from the office upon request.
- 4. Membership is required for adults (age 17 and over) to exhibit at the fair, unless otherwise specified in class description. No membership fee is required of youth (age 16 and under) and seniors (age 65 and over) if exhibiting solely within the youth and senior classes. If youth or seniors are competing in Adult classes, a membership is required. All ages are as of January 1 of the current year.
- 5. The following years Membership fees will be deducted from winning prize money where payout is equal or above \$15.00.

#### **General Entry Rules**

- 1. Entry forms can be submitted as per the following:
  - a. from the website www.drydenfair.ca under Menu>Fair Info>Submit Entry Forms
  - b. by mail: RR # 3, Site 300, Box 4, Dryden, ON P8N 3G2
  - c. by email ddasinfo2@gmail.com, or
  - d. in person at the Fairgrounds Office
- 2. A handling fee of \$5.00 for each entry may be charged for mailed in exhibits.
- 3. You can only enter an item once at our fair.
- 4. Exhibitors are limited to one entry per section in the EXHIBIT HALL, except in the Charity Class. One item is regarded as a single entry, not multiple entries; if entered multiple times item may be forfeited for judging.

- 5. Exhibits must be the property (made or grown) of the exhibitor unless otherwise stated with the class rules.
- 6. No judge shall exhibit in any class he/she is to judge.
- 7. Exhibit hall entries must have all distinguishing marks covered.
- 8. Entries made in the wrong class/section may be moved to the appropriate one at the discretion of the Exhibit Hall Coordinator. Articles will be brought to the office to have tags checked and entries changed accordingly.
- 9. Entry tags must be closed (to cover name of exhibitor) and attached to articles prior to bringing articles to the exhibition hall. Be sure tags are firmly attached to prevent loss in transportation or placement of items.
- 10. A Class asking for the article/entry to be named is the responsibility of the exhibitor to write the information on the entry tag.
- 11. No exhibitors/spectators are allowed in the exhibit hall during judging.
- 12. Any person interfering with the judge will forfeit any premiums to which the exhibitor might be entitled.
- 13. The Society will as far as possible, take care of all exhibits but no responsibility is assumed in case of theft, damage, or loss.
- 14. **Prize money** will be distributed by the DDAS Office and be available at the Annual Appreciation and Awards Night; other pick-up times will be advertised on our social media page (Facebook) or please call the office after the Awards Night to make alternate arrangements. Prize money that is not picked up by December 1<sup>st</sup> and under \$20.00 will be forfeited and donated back to the DDAS. *If prize money is to be won by a minor, please advise who's name the cheque should be payable to upon submitting Entry Forms*.
- 15. A committee of no fewer than three (3) Directors including an Executive member may handle issues arising related to the fair.
- 16. Written grievances must be submitted to the Secretary within 2 weeks of the last day of the fair.
- 17. Infringement of the rules may result in loss of prizes and exhibitor privilege.

#### LIVESTOCK, SMALL ANIMAL & POULTRY ENTRIES:

- 1. Exhibitors may enter a maximum of two entries per section where noted in Class/Section.
- 2. Entries must be the property of the exhibitor unless otherwise stated with the class rules.
- 3. Entry forms can be submitted
  - a. from the website www.drydenfair.ca under Menu>Fair Info>Sumit Entry Forms;
  - **b.** mailed to: D.D.A.S., R R # 3, Ste 300, Box 4, Dryden, ON, P8N 3G2
  - c. emailed ddasinfo2@gmail.com; or
  - d. brought directly to the Fair Office
- 4. All calves entered must be at least 2 months old.
- 5. Cows entered in the cattle classes must have produced a calf.
- 6. Bulls one year and over must have a nose ring or show humbug. Handler must be an adult (17 yrs of age and older)
- 7. 4-H calves may be entered in the open classes provided the exhibitor has completed an entry form and submitted it to the office by the date listed below.
- 8. Exhibitor is responsible for livestock and small animal care, feeding, bedding, and keeping area clean. Bedding (straw or shavings) will be provided by DDAS; all other feed/supplements supplied by the exhibitor.
- 9. Livestock coordinator will ensure exhibitors keep all feed buckets closed during the judging as they are a distraction to the animals being led out to the ring.
- 10. Purebred animals must be registered in the Canadian National Records. Those under one year must be eligible for registration. Exhibitors must produce proof of verified registration upon request.
- 11. All Livestock and small animal entries **must** be on the fairgrounds according to the timeline schedule below.
- 12. Judging will take place on the Thursday morning of the Fair. Aunt Sally's and livestock barns will be closed during judging. No exhibitors/spectators allowed during the judging or for safety reasons.
- 13. Cattle Show, Small Animal, & Horseshow Coordinators are responsible and in charge of all activities in the barn & show ring areas. Any problems or changes must be taken to them, and they will assist the exhibitors.
- 14. For insurance reasons, only persons with paid memberships can exhibit livestock.
- 15. An Exhibitor will be charged up to \$50.00 stall clean up fee for any stall, livestock area or small animal pens not cleaned up by noon on the Sunday after the Fair.

Please check the rules for each competition. Some qualify locally, then at District level, and then to OAAS; others will go direct from the local level to the OAAS Convention.

Arrangements will be made by the DDAS to have the winning items delivered to District Level and / or OAAS convention as required.

#### **GENERAL COMPETITION RULES**

- 1. Competition is open to all exhibitors of member societies of the OAAS.
- 2. All work on the entry must be completed by the exhibitor entering the competition.
- 3. By entering an OAAS competition, the exhibitor agrees to allow their name and exhibit to be part of any promotional activities related to the competition.

#### **DISTRICT 15 COMPETITION**

- 1. Each local fair is entitled to send one entry into each category of the District Competition. Where the Fair is unable to send the 1<sup>st</sup> place winner to the district meeting, then the 2<sup>nd</sup> place winner will be eligible to enter.
- 2. Judging at the District Competitions is the responsibility of each OAAS District. Prize money paid by the district.
- 3. All district entries must be registered on the relevant OAAS Championship Entry Form, and returned to the OAAS Convention Administrator, by December 1st.
- 4. Note there are no district competitions for photography.

# **PROVINCIAL COMPETITION**

- 1. Each district is entitled to send one entry into each category of the Provincial Competition. In the case where the district is unable to send the 1st place winner to the convention, then the 2nd place winner is eligible to enter.
- 2. Judges who officiate the Competition at the Annual Convention will be appointed by the OAAS.

- 3. All entries must be received for judging by the Competition Committee in the designated area by 5pm on the Thursday afternoon of the Annual Convention of the OAAS. Please retain the ticket issued, to claim the entry when the viewing rooms close.
- 4. A number is assigned to each entry. Entries are only identified by this number during the judging process.
- 5. Please remove all tags, ribbons, or any other fair/exhibition identification from the entries.
- 6. No persons other than the judges and designated officials will be permitted to enter the designated judging room until after the judging and winners have been announced.
- 7. Any exhibitor or any person acting on behalf of the exhibitor who violates any of the Rules and Regulations or who interferes with the judges or the judging process, shall be disqualified and the entry will be removed from the competition.
- 8. No entry may be removed from the display area until the official closing of the viewing room and designated time of pick up.
- 9. The OAAS shall not be held liable for any loss occasioned by fire, theft, accident or the negligence of other exhibitors, officials or otherwise.
- 10. Any protests must be made to the Competition Committee of the OAAS in writing within 5 working days after the last day of the convention.
- 11. All entries will be judged using the OAAS Judging Standards. Copies of the OAAS Judging Standards can be purchased from the OAAS store at https://oaasfairs.org/agricultural-society-info/store.

## **BUTTER TART COMPETITION-Section 6000**

#### Rules:

- 1. Please review the General Competition Rules document.
- 2. Entry must be made solely by the person entering the competition. (including the pastry)
- 3. Number of butter tarts to be shown at local fair/exhibition to be determined by each individual fair/exhibition.
- 4. A new batch of same recipe butter tarts is required to be made for each competition level to ensure freshness.
- 5. **Judging Standards** at all levels: 20% General Appearance; 40% Crust; 40% Filling

#### District Competition

- 1. A total of 6 tarts will be required to be shown.
- 2. Tarts must be on a clean, sturdy plate (no paper plates) inside of a clear plastic bag with the exhibitor's name, mailing address and fair represented.
- 3. The size of the tarts must be full size tarts. (no mini or bite size tarts) and must not contain fruit or nuts (ie. no raisins, no pecans)
- 4. If the exhibitor has won at more than one fair, the one closest to the exhibitor's home address is the agricultural society from which the entry will be sent to the district competition. The other agricultural societies may send their second place winner into the district competition. An exhibitor may only enter one district competition.
- 5. **District 15 Prize**: 1st .. \$25.00; 2nd .. \$15.00; 3rd .. \$10.00

#### **Provincial Competition**

- 1. A total of 6 tarts will be required to be shown. Tarts must be on a clean, sturdy plate (no paper plates) inside of a clear plastic bag with the exhibitor's name, mailing address and district represented.

- 3. If the exhibitor has won at more than one fair, the one closest to the exhibitor's home address is the agricultural society from which the entry will be sent to the district competition. - 2. Entries from each society to be submitted on a memory stick, identifying each image with class number and fair name
- 3. Images must be taken in the current year by members, volunteers or visitors.
- 4. Images from professional photographers cannot be submitted
- 5. Absolutely no digital image enhancement allowed. All enhanced images will be disqualified
- 6. Judging will be done by a committee approved by the Convention Administrator
- 7. Images will be shown, and awards presented at the upcoming OAAS Convention
- 8. Prize money will be distributed to each winning society

- 1. Please review all preceding General, District and Provincial Competition Rules.
- 2. The quilt must be solely made, and machine quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition.
- 3. Quilts to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches. Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All four sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.
- 4. The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.
- 5. The winning OAAS Machine Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future OAAS fair, district and/or provincial competitions.
- 6. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules.
- 7. The use of domestic, mid arm and/or long arm equipment is permitted on hand or computer guided machine quilt entries.
- 8. Quilts will be returned to the exhibitor.
- 9. **Judging Standards**: 25% General Appearance & Design, 20% Colour & Materials, 30% Quilting, 10% Borders, 15% Binding and Picots

# **District Competition**

- 1. Each local fair is entitled to send their best of show of all eligible machine quilts to the district competition.
- 2. If the fair's best of show machine quilt classes has won at more than one fair, the exhibitor must consider their own agricultural society as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the district meeting, otherwise it should be sent from the agricultural society nearest his/her home address. The other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, may enter their second best of show machine quilt in the district competition.
- 3. An exhibitor who wins more than one best of show title with different machine quilts at different fairs is entitled to enter each winning quilt in the district competition.
- 4. If an exhibitor is exhibiting in more than one district, they are entitled to enter different winning quilts at different district competitions but cannot enter the same quilt at more than one district competition.
- 5. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning machine quilts at each district competition.
- 6. A photo of the top three placed machine quilts at the district competition must accompany the "OAAS Championship Quilt Entry Form"
- 7. **District 15 Prize**: 1st .. \$25.00; 2nd .. \$15.00; 3rd .. \$10.00

#### **Provincial Competition**

- 1. All quilts entered in the competition must be machine quilted.
- 2. A \$500.00 GRAND PRIZE and rosette will be awarded. The exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.
- 3. A \$100 RESERVE GRAND PRIZE will be awarded. The exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.

#### **HAND QUILTED COMPETITION-Section 6004**

#### Rules:

- 1. Please review all preceding General, District and Provincial Competition Rules.
- 2. The quilt must be solely made, and hand quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition.
- 3. Quilts to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches. Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All 4 sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.
- 4. The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.

- 5. The winning OAAS Hand Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future OAAS fair, district and/or provincial competitions.
- 6. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules.
- 7. Quilts will be returned to the exhibitor.
- 8. **Judging Standards**: 25% General Appearance & Design, 20% Colour & Materials, 30% Quilting, 10% Borders, 15% Binding and Picots

#### District Competition

- 1. Each local fair is entitled to send their best of show of all eligible hand quilts to the district competition.
- 2. If the fair's best of show hand quilt has won at more than one fair, the exhibitor must consider their own agricultural society as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the district meeting, otherwise it should be sent from the agricultural society nearest his/her home address. The other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, may enter their second best of show hand quilt into the district competition.
- 3. An exhibitor who wins more than one best of show title with different hand quilts at different fairs is entitled to enter each winning quilt in the district competition.
- 4. If an exhibitor is exhibiting in more than one district, they are entitled to enter different winning quilts at different district competitions but cannot enter the same quilt at more than one district competition.
- 5. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning hand quilts at each district competition.
- 6. A photo of the top three placed hand quilts at the district competition must accompany the "OAAS Championship Quilt Entry Form"
- 7. **District 15 Prize**: 1st .. \$25.00; 2nd .. \$15.00; 3rd .. \$10.00

#### **Provincial Competition**

- 1. A \$500.00 GRAND PRIZE and rosette will be awarded. The exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.
- 2. A \$100 RESERVE GRAND PRIZE will be awarded. The exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.

### **MAPLE SYRUP COMPETITION-Section 6005**

- 3. Entry must be made solely by the person or family entering the competition.

- 5. **Judging Standards** 40 points Flavour; 30 points Density; 20 points Colour; 10 points Clarity

- 1. Maple syrup exhibits shall consist of one (1) curved Kent style glass bottle (D&G #505188 Syrup Bottle with Handle), or equivalent, of Maple Syrup, Canada Grade A Amber, having a capacity of 250 mL.
- 2. Each agricultural society is entitled to send their best of show to the district competition
- 3. If the exhibitor has won at more than one fair, the one closest to the exhibitor's home address is the agricultural society from which the entry will be sent to the district competition. The other agricultural societies may send their second-place winner into the district competition. An exhibitor may only enter into one district competition. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning entries at each district competition.
- 4. **District 15 Prize:** 1st ...\$25.00; 2nd ...\$15.00; 3rd ...\$10.00

#### **Provincial Competition**

- 1. Maple syrup exhibits shall consist of two (2) curved Kent style glass bottles (D&G #505188 Syrup Bottle with Handle), or equivalent, of Maple Syrup, Canada Grade A Amber, each having a capacity of 250 mL.
- 2. Entries must be labelled on the BOTTOM of the containers only with a supplied entry number or identifier. No other labels will be permitted.
- 3. All maple syrup should have a flavour characteristic of its respective colour class and be free from any objectionable odour or taste. It is best to sample from the same lot before submitting your entries to the OAAS.
- 4. Any maple syrup entry containing any form of foreign material will be disqualified from the competition.
- 5. Maple syrup will be judged using the standards published by the OAAS in Agriculture & Horticulture Judging Standards for Ontario Fairs. An approved maple syrup colorimeter will be used to assess the colour.
- 6. 1 st and 2nd place entries will be placed up for auction at the convention. Other entries will be returned
- 7. **Provincial Prize**: 1<sup>st</sup>...\$50.00 2<sup>nd</sup>...\$30.00; 3<sup>rd</sup>...\$20.00

#### **LIQUID HONEY COMPETITION-Section 6006**

#### Rules:

- 1. Category for Pure Liquid Honey; Ontario #1, White
- 2. Please review all preceding General, District and Provincial Competition Rules.
- 3. Exhibitors of honey must be registered beekeepers and the exhibits shown by them must be pure honey from floral sources in their apiaries.
- 4. Entry must be made solely by the person or family entering the competition.
- 5. The entries at the fair level, district level and provincial level must be from the same batch.
- 6. Judging Standards:
  - a. **Appearance 45 points:** 15 Density (moisture content), 10 Brightness, 10 Flavour and aroma, 5 Uniformity of honey, 5 Colour
  - b. Clarity 45 points: 15 Free from crystals, 15 Free from pollen, wax, etc., 15 Free from air bubbles either in suspension or as froth
  - c. Containers 10 points: 5 pleasant appearance, of equal size and shape, 5 Uniform level of fill

#### District Competition

- 1. Liquid Honey exhibits shall consist of one (1) clear glass container, having a capacity of 500 grams (375 ml).
- 2. Each agricultural society is entitled to send their best of show to the district competition.
- 3. If the exhibitor has won at more than one fair, the one closest to the exhibitor's home address is the agricultural society from which the entry will be sent to the district competition. The other agricultural societies may send their second place winner into the district competition. An exhibitor may only enter into one district competition
- 4. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning entries at each district competition.
- 5. **District 15 Prize**: 1st .. \$25.00; 2nd .. \$15.00; 3rd .. \$10.00

#### **Provincial Competition**

- 1. Liquid Honey exhibits shall consist of two clear glass containers, each having a capacity of 500 grams (375 ml).
- 2. Entries must be labelled on the BOTTOM of the containers only with a supplied entry number or identifier No other labels will be permitted.
- 3. Any honey entry containing any form of foreign material will be disqualified from the competition.
- 4. Honey will be judged using the standards printed in the OAAS *Agriculture & Horticulture Judging Standards for Ontario Fairs*. An approved colorimeter will be used to assess the colour.
- 5. 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place entries will be placed up for auction at the convention.
- 6. **Provincial Prize**: 1st...\$50.00 2nd...\$30.00; 3rd...\$20.00 sponsored by Ontario's Beekeepers Association

# **HORSE SHOW**

# See the fair program for show schedule

#### **General Rules:**

- 1. Canadian Equestrian Federation Rules will be followed, however, the Judge and/or Ring Steward decisions are final.
- 2. Proper riding attire is required for all classes, both days.
- 3. All riders must wear proper riding footwear when on horseback on DDAS property. All riders 18 years of age and under must wear a riding helmet when on horseback on DDAS property. No exceptions.
- 4. Current DDAS membership is required for all exhibitors aged 17 years of age and older (16 and under has no membership fee. All persons riding on horses on DDAS property must have a signed waiver on file.
- 5. Entries will be taken at the fair office Monday and Tuesday, August 11 & 12th from 2pm to 7pm; A separate entry must be completed for each horse and rider combination. A \$20 late fee per horse and rider combination will be charged after this deadline.
- 6. Stalls in the barn are limited to out-of-town competitors and must be booked by Friday August 15<sup>th</sup>. Outside stalls will be available to be booked after that on a first come first serve basis. Please book your stalls directly with the Horse Show Coordinator by emailing <a href="mailto:ddasinfo2@gmail.com">ddasinfo2@gmail.com</a> Attention: Horse Show Coordinator
- 7. Horses are confined to show area and are not to be ridden around the fairgrounds. Riding outside designated area can result in disqualification.
- 8. Age divisions are as of January 1st of the Fair Year:
  - Class 400-Junior 12 and under
  - Class 410- Youth 13-16 years
  - Class 420-Adult 17-39 years

- Class 430-Senior 40+ years
- Class 440-Open to all Ages
- 9. Points will be awarded towards high point awards on the first 6 placings in all classes except for Specials and Stake Classes. Awards will be presented at the Annual Appreciation and Awards Night. Payouts for first to fourth place will be mailed to the exhibitor so please provide current mailing address. Ribbons and payout for Specials and Stake classes will be awarded following each respective class.
