SOCIETY OBJECTIVES

The objectives of this Society shall be to encourage interest, promote improvements in and advance the standards of agriculture, domestic industry and rural life by:

1. Researching the needs of the agricultural community and developing programs to meet those needs.
2. Promoting the conservation of natural resources and encouraging the beautification of the agricultural community.
3. Supporting and providing facilities to encourage activities intended to enrich rural life.
4. Holding an annual agricultural fair, featuring competitions for which prizes may be awarded.
5. Develop and promote educational programs and competitions for the purpose of creating youth awareness of local agricultural history, current activities and future opportunities.

RULES & REGULATIONS

Membership

1. All members must fill out an annual membership form with waiver, even if they have no associated fee for their age. Annual membership term is November 1 – October 31.
2. A membership fee of \$15.00 is required for adults (age 17 and over) to exhibit at the fair unless otherwise specified in class description. No membership fee is required for youth (age 16 and under) and seniors (age 65 and over) regardless of Classes entered. **All ages are as of January 1st of the current year.**
3. Membership can be paid by:
 - a. E-transfer to ddastryer@gmail.com with **your name, contact information and what payment is for.**
 - b. in person at the Fairgrounds Office
 - c. mailing a cheque (payable to DDAS) to RR # 3, Site 300, Box 4, Dryden, ON P8N 3G2
4. Membership is considered complete once the signed membership form and waiver, and payment where required is received at the DDAS office. A membership card is available from the office upon request.
5. A paid membership is required for all ages to be eligible to vote at the DDAS Annual General Meeting (AGM).

General Entry Rules

1. Entry forms can be submitted by:
 - a. Entering on the DDAS website at www.drydenfair.ca under Menu>Fair Info>Submit Entry Forms
 - b. Email to ddasinfo2@gmail.com
 - c. Mail to RR # 3, Site 300, Box 4, Dryden, ON P8N 3G2
 - d. In person at the Fairgrounds Office
2. Exhibit Hall Exhibitors will receive free one Day Admission Pass and one Day Parking to view their exhibit success.
3. A handling fee of \$5.00 for each entry may be charged for mailed in exhibits.
4. You can only enter an item once at our fair.
5. Exhibitors are limited to one entry per section in the EXHIBIT HALL, except in the Charity Class.
6. Exhibits must be the property (made or grown) of the exhibitor, unless specifically stated in description of the class rules.
7. No judge shall exhibit in any class he/she is to judge.
8. Entry tags must be closed to cover name of exhibitor and attached to articles prior to bringing articles to the exhibition hall. Be sure tags are firmly attached to prevent loss in transportation or placement of items. All other distinguishing marks must be covered to hide the identity of the exhibitor.
9. When a Class asks for the article/entry to be described, it is the **responsibility of the exhibitor** to write this information on the entry tag. Entries without this description may cause the entry to be disqualified.

10. Entries made in the wrong class/section may be moved to the appropriate one at the discretion of either the Judging or Exhibit Hall Coordinators. Articles will be brought to the office to confirm decision and entries changed accordingly.
11. No exhibitors/spectators are allowed in any of the exhibit areas during judging.
12. The Society will, as far as possible, take care of all exhibits but no responsibility is assumed in case of theft, damage or loss.
13. A committee of no fewer than three (3) Directors, including an Executive member, may handle issues arising related to the fair.
14. Written grievances must be submitted to the Secretary within 2 weeks of the last day of the fair.
15. Infringement of the rules may result in loss of prizes and exhibitor privilege.

Prizes

1. Ensure to identify on the Entry Form who's name the cheque should be payable to for all minors.
2. Prize money will be distributed by the DDAS Office and be available at the Annual Appreciation and Awards Night held in October.
3. Other pick-up times will be advertised on our social media page (Facebook) or please call the office after the Awards Night to make alternate arrangements.
4. Prizes not picked up by December 1st and under \$20.00 will be forfeited and donated back to the DDAS.
5. No replacement cheques will be issued after December 1st for lost or stale dated items.

LIVESTOCK, SMALL ANIMAL & POULTRY RULES:

1. Exhibitors may enter a maximum of two entries per section where noted in Class/Section.
2. Entries must be the property of the exhibitor unless specifically stated in description within the class rules.
3. Entry forms can be submitted by:
 - a. Entering on the DDAS website at www.drydenfair.ca under Menu>Fair Info>Submit Entry Forms
 - b. Email to ddasinfo2@gmail.com
 - c. Mail to RR # 3, Site 300, Box 4, Dryden, ON P8N 3G2
 - d. In person at the Fairgrounds Office
4. All Animal Exhibitors will receive free a 3-Day Admission Pass and a 3-Day Parking to attend to their animals.
5. All calves entered must be at least 2 months old.
6. Cows entered in the cattle classes must have produced a calf.
7. Bulls one year and over must have a nose ring or show humbug. Handler must be an adult (17 yrs of age and older).
8. 4-H calves may be entered in the open classes, provided the exhibitor has completed an entry form and submitted it to the office by the date listed below.
9. Exhibitor is responsible for livestock and small animal care, feeding, bedding and keeping area clean. Bedding (straw or shavings) will be provided by DDAS. All other feed/supplements are to be supplied by the exhibitor.
10. Livestock Coordinator will ensure exhibitors keep all feed buckets closed during the judging as they are a distraction to the animals being led out to the ring.
11. Purebred animals must be registered in the Canadian National Records. Those under one year must be eligible for registration. Exhibitors must produce proof of verified registration upon request.
12. All Livestock, small animal and poultry entries **must** follow the timeline schedule below.
13. Judging will take place on the Thursday morning of the Fair. Aunt Sally's and livestock barns will be closed during judging. No exhibitors/spectators allowed during the judging for safety reasons.
14. Cattle Show, Small Animal and Horseshow Coordinators are responsible and in charge of all activities in the barn and show ring areas. Any problems or changes must be taken to them, and they will assist the exhibitors.
15. For insurance reasons, only persons with paid memberships can exhibit livestock.
16. Exhibitor must clean stalls, livestock areas and small animal pens by 12:00 pm on the Sunday after the Fair. Failure to comply will result in up to a \$50.00 charge per exhibitor.

Ranch Trail Description: showcases the horse’s ability to navigate obstacles typically found while working on a ranch, such as gates, logs, bridge work, side-passing, backing through obstacles and ground-tying. Performance should reflect a willing attitude, demonstrating correctness, confidence and practicality with emphasis on smoothness, responsiveness and a calm forward working demeanor rather than speed or extreme precision.

Ranch Riding: highlights versatility and movement of the working ranch horse by travelling freely forward with natural, ground covering gaits to reflect capability of working long hours in the pasture. Riders are to perform transitions, extended and collected gaits, stops and turns. Horse should appear relaxed, balanced and responsive with emphasis on quality of movement, correctness and overall usefulness.

Ranch Rail: a rail-only class that evaluates horse movement and manners at the walk, jog and lope in both directions of the arena, while demonstrating a natural forward moving ranch gait with correct form and a calm, willing attitude. Emphasis is on consistency, correctness and suitability as a working ranch horse rather than exaggerated movement or headset.

OAAS COMPETITIONS

The Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) hosts several annual competitions that begin at the local fair level and progress to District and Provincial level competitions.

Thereby, successful winners from the following Dryden Exhibit Classes have the chance to advance to these OAAS competitions:

The local winners from each category can first chose to participate at the **District Competition**. Then, first place winners at the District Competition have the opportunity to enter the **Provincial Competition**. Arrangements are made by the DDAS to have the winning items delivered to District and Provincial Competitions, as required.

All work on the entry **must be completed by the exhibitor** entering the competition. By entering an OAAS competition, the exhibitor agrees to allow their name and exhibit to be part of any promotional activities related to the competition.

Entries are judged using the same OAAS standards used by the Local Fair.

General rules for the District and Provincial competition are as follows, however, **full details** can be found on *OAAS District and Provincial Competition Rules* website:

1. **LIQUID HONEY COMPETITION**

Category is for Pure Liquid Honey, Ontario #1, White. Exhibitors must be registered beekeepers and the exhibits shown by them must be pure honey from floral sources in their apiaries. The entries at the local fair level, district level and provincial level must be from the same batch.

Rules for District Competition (specific)

- a. Liquid Honey exhibits shall consist of one (1) clear glass container, having a capacity of 500 grams (375 ml).
- b. **District 15 Prize:** 1st ...\$25.00 2nd ...\$15.00 3rd ...\$10.00

Rules for Provincial Competition (specific)

- a. Liquid Honey exhibits shall consist of two clear glass containers, each having a capacity of 500 grams (375 ml).
- b. Entries must be labelled on the **BOTTOM** of the containers only with a supplied entry number or identifier. No other labels will be permitted.
- c. 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place entries will be placed up for auction at the convention.
- d. **Provincial Prize:** 1st...\$50.00 2nd...\$30.00 3rd...\$20.00 sponsored by **Ontario's Beekeepers Association**

2. BUTTER TART COMPETITION

A new batch of the same recipe butter tarts is required to be made for each competition level to ensure freshness.

- c. **Provincial Prize:** Both a \$500.00 GRAND PRIZE with rosette and \$100 RESERVE GRAND PRIZE will be awarded.

4. MACHINE QUILTED COMPETITION

5. PLAIN CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIE COMPETITION

A new batch of the same winning chocolate chip cookie recipe is required to be made for each competition level to ensure freshness.

Rules for both District and Provincial Competitions

- a. Entry consists of 6 plain chocolate chip cookies displayed on a clean, sturdy plate (no paper plates) inside of a clear plastic bag with the exhibitor's name, mailing address and fair represented.
- b. Cookies must be no larger than 2.5" (6.5 cm) and no smaller than 2" (5 cm)
- c. **District 15 Prize:** 1st ...\$25.00 2nd ...\$15.00 3rd ...\$10.00
- d. **Provincial Prize:** 1st...\$20.00 2nd...\$15.00 3rd...\$10.00 12 prizes of \$5.00

Note: OAAS also has a **Canada Grade A Maple Syrup Competition**. Currently it is not a product produced in the Dryden District, therefore, not included in the Fair Book at this time.

Images will be shown and winners announced at the annual OAAS Convention.
