Dear DoD, Federal, IC, and Allied Community Leaders,

Marcantonio Global is excited to launch the 2024 Initiative, a public-private partnership with NAVSEA, supported by the Defense Logistics Agency, Combatant Commands, and OSD A-S. This year 2 initiative will kick off with the Defense Future Logistics Innovations Forum and Virtual Event on Feb 2nd at 1100 ET. Building on the former DTIP program and a highly disruptive 2023, it aims to foster collaboration among DoD, federal government, intelligence community, and allied nations to tackle supply chain challenges.

The second virtual NAVSEA-sponsored Future Logistics Innovation Forum will unite over 155 organizations and 5500 SES Flag Officers and CIOs to identify innovative solutions for supply chain challenges. Aligned with RADM Selby's hedge strategy of small, agile, and many, this event encourages collaboration, joint problem-solving, and innovation among DoD components. By leveraging technology, the community aims to streamline logistics operations, reduce redundancies, and increase efficiencies across the DoD, federal government, intelligence community, and allied nations.
