NTSS 2015

The American Topical Association held its 66th annual National Topical Stamp Show at the Monarch Hotel and Conference Center on 31 July through 2 August 2015, in Clackamas, Oregon, a suburb of Portland. The NTSS is the largest topical stamp show in the world.

This year the show featured 17 dealers and 116 frames of competitive exhibits. Originally, the show planned to have 134 competitive frames, but two exhibits were forced to drop out too late to obtain replacements.

As a World Series of Philately national level show, the winner of the Grand Award is invited to compete for the Champion of Champions Award with the grand award winners of the other more than thirty national exhibitions at the annual American Philatelic Society Stamp Show.

Because the total quantity of competitive frames was below the minimum 125, NTSS was granted a one-time waiver by the Chairman of the Committee on Accreditation of National Exhibitions and Judges (CANEJ) to enable the Grand Award winner to compete.

The show offered many other events including tours and a first day of issue ceremony for the "Fanciful Flowers" postal card.

Yours truly was asked to speak briefly at the first day ceremony about collectflowers stamps. But as I do not collect flowers, instead I spoke about the different viewpoints on collecting identifiable species versus stylized depictions on stamps

The Thursday tour offered a chance to explore part of Portland. Among the sights was a tour of the Pittock Mansion and Powell's City of Books. I noted that several peo-

ple (including me) added to their libraries during their visit to this huge store that occupies an entire city block

This year, NTSS instituted a trial "Free Style" non-competitive category to allow exhibits that ordinarily would not fit into a standard competitive division. This category attracted five frames from four exhibitors.

Personally, I like having this type of exhibiting opportunity. Most collectors start by collecting the material they like without concern for making it into an exhibit. These displays enable such collectors to show us what they collect and to arrange it as they like. Perhaps the experience will encourage them to move into competitive exhibiting.

The ATA has about 50 study units whose members collect a certain topic. I belong to the Biology Study Unit. It was the featured study unit at this year's show.

No fewer than eleven of the exhibits featured a biological theme.


Over all there were 19 exhibits from ten different exhibitors.

Club Auctions

What is the best way to hold a club auction? Reviewing newsletters from several Federation Clubs, I noticed that many hold auctions at club meetings.

The **Sno-King Stamp Club** President suggested that members, "Pick your prize duplicates and present them in some manner that will make for an attractive auction item...recommend focusing on items with a reserve value from \$1 to \$10. A good rule of thumb is to set the reserve value at one-third of the Scott catalog value...for older stamps; you can offer them in sets or singles. For modern material, I recommend offering them in lots."

The club uses individual auction slips with each item.

The **Salem Stamp Society** had a "Bid Board" in April. There were 50 lots on the board and a listing of the lots and scans of some of the lots were listed in the newsletter.

In May, they held a swap night where "Every Member is a Dealer" and members brought material to sell or trade. In June, they held a "Club Auction" and used it to raise funds for the club.

In July they held a "Members Auction" with items posted prior to the meeting on the website along with the member auction worksheets (*salemstampsociety.org*). In addition their club has a designated club "Auction Director" which sounds like a fun and beneficial position to hold.

The **Inland Empire Philatelic Society** held a joint meeting on 2 May 2015, with the Garden City Stamp Club from Missoula, Montana. They held a silent auction as well as a floor auction.

They asked that items be identified by catalog number, easily visible to the potential buyer, and started at a price that would sell the item. Seller numbers were assigned at the April club meeting(s). Payment and payout was held just before a joint dinner.

The **Tacoma Stamp Club** holds an auction at their fourth Tuesday meeting with more than 50 lots provided by club members.

The **Collector's Club of Seattle** has an auction at their first Friday club meeting usually featuring more than 100 lots.

The **Edmonton Stamp Club** held a big auction at their July Summer Meeting.

The **Greater Eugene Stamp Society** also held a club auction at their March and July meetings.

The **Oregon Stamp Society** held a "mini-auction" at their July meeting. The club also offers continuing consignment sales for their membership.

It look like July was a popular month for club auctions. Sounds like a lot of fun and a way to get different material for your collection.

Does your club hold its own auction, or have a joint auction with another club nearby?

SEAPEX 2015

The Seattle Philatelic Exhibition (SEAPEX) will present its annual exhibition at the Tukwila Community Center, located just north of the SeaTac Airport at 12424 42nd Avenue South, Tukwila, Washington.



This will be the show's inaugural year as a World Series of Philately national exhibition, after successfully completing a four year probationary period and receiving unanimous approval from the American Philatelic Society board of directors—the first new WSP show in 15 years.

The theme of the show this year celebrates the 75th

anniversary of the Tacoma Narrows bridge. It was the third longest suspension bridge in the world when it opened in July 1940. It famously collapsed later that year.

The show will have a special display of Galloping Gertie memorabilia and other bridge-themed elements. It will also offer special cachets and pictorial cancellations for sale with the Tacoma Narrows Bridge theme.

The head of the Mega Projects section from the Bridge and Structures Office of the Washington State Department of Transportation will give a presentation on Friday afternoon about the history of the bridge and the cause of its collapse.

The bourse will feature 27 stamp dealers with several coming from beyond the Pacific Northwest.

There will be more than 180 frames of competitive exhibits as well as several club and society exhibits.

The winner of the Grand Award for the multi-frame philatelic exhibits will have the opportunity to compete with the Grand Award winners of the other WSP national-level shows for the Champion of Champions Award at the American Philatelic Society annual APS Stamp Show to be held next year in Portland, Oregon.

The One Frame Grand Award winner will be able to compete with other WSP One Frame Grand winners at the APS AmeriStamp Expo to be held in Atlanta, Georgia.

The show hotel is the Residence Inn Seattle South/Tukwila, 16201 West Valley Highway, Tukwila. The hotel

is close to SeaTac International Airport and offers free shuttle service to and from the airport. The hotel also offers free shuttle service to and from the show venue.

This year we have the APS Stamp Buddy booth to help new and returning adult collectors. We also have our regular "What's in Your Attic?" free stamp evaluation service.

A Youth and Educators Activities booth will operate throughout the show providing free stamps and many projects and activities.

On Saturday from 10 AM to 3 PM, the show will host a Boy Scout stamp collecting merit badge seminar.

Both the US Postal Service and the UN Postal Administration will have sales booths at the show.

On Thursday, September 10, before the show, we are offering an afternoon tour of the Boeing Museum of Flight where among the world-class aviation displays, we will get a look at Bill Boeing's collection of covers.



Publication Precursor

I received the document shown above and on the following page from Cathie Osborne of the Strait Stamp Society. She did not recall where she had found it, but thought I would find it interesting as a forerunner of *The Federated Philatelist*, as indeed I do.

According to the banner, this is Volume Number 1, Edition Number 0 of *The Northwest Miniature Pane*, dated October 1939.

Amusingly, the editor subtitles it, "The World's Smallest Stamp Publication." I suspect that it would be in the running for that appellation for both its physical size and its content.

This four-page document, with each page measuring $4\frac{1}{8} \times 5\frac{1}{2}$ inches, was created by multigraph printing as the editor describes on page 3.

Several varieties of multigraph systems existed in the 1930s. Before the advent of photocopying, businesses used these machines to produce form letters that appeared to be individually typewritten.

Generally, the operator would compose the publication by setting type matching the typewriter font on a drum, either by hand or by using a typesetter machine.

When this was complete, the drum was transferred to a printing machine to print the publication using a large inked ribbon.

These systems cost between \$150 and \$800, depending on the model. In 1939, the average annual income in the United States was \$1,368. Thus, the cost of one of these systems was out of reach of most people.

It seems likely that this editor was able to borrow the use of a multigraph system, perhaps from a school or an employer, to start up this small publication.

For his 25-cent subscription, the subscriber was to receive 12 copies per year. At that time, postage for third-class material was one cent, so subscriptions alone were not going to earn this entrepreneur much money.

Perhaps that is the reason for the seemingly high costs of the proposed advertising rates listed on page 2.

The editor identifies himself as Robert Andrus. According to the searches I conducted, there was more than one Robert Andrus living in Seattle in 1939. One was a 15-year-old boy. Another was Robert C. Andrus, who, according

to the 1940 Seattle City Directory, was employed as a clerk. There may have been still others.

The address, 4026 Linden Avenue in Seattle, is a single family house located in the Fremont neighborhood. It was built in 1907. This would appear to make this enterprise a one-person, home-based operation.

Unfortunately, this venture seems to have been unsuccessful. I have been unable to find any other record of this publication. This provides us with another meaning to the sub-heading of the world's smallest stamp publication.

If any readers know more details about this publication, its editor, or have additional copies. Please send the information to me and I will publish updates in future editions.

PIPEX Labels

In the last edition I reported on a cover from 1949 that included a label promoting the Pacific International Philatelic Exhibition held that year in Bellingham, Washington.

That label was for the "Ninth Annual Pacific International Philatelic Exhibition and Congress," and showed an image of Mount Baker.

The article also displayed an image of a label from the fifth PIPEX held in Vancouver, British Columbia 30 May –2 June 1940, showing the Lion's Gate Bridge.

A third label was also illustrated depicting the Peach Arch located in Blaine, Washington, and promoting the Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs and the "Seventh Pacific International Exhibition" held in New Westminster, British Columbia 28–30 May 1948.

Because of the disconnect between the count of the annual shows and the year dates, I asked our readers to provide information about the early history of the PIPEX shows.

Eric Ranger responded with a listing of the exhibition sponsored by the Northwest Federation that he has been compiling.

He also confirmed that the New Westminster label erroneously declared itself as the seventh PIPEX exhibition when it was in fact the eighth.

This added to further information that I had and have uncovered, I think I will soon have a complete listing of all the Northwest Federation exhibitions that I will publish in an upcoming edition.

In the meantime, two more labels have come to hand.



PIPEX 1948 Label New Westminster, BC May 28, 29, 30, 1948

The first is a perforated version of the PIPEX 1948 label. The former label was imperforate and somewhat larger with marginal inscriptions.

The second label is from the 17th Pacific International Philatelic Exhibition, held May 31 to June 2, 1957, again in Bellingham, Washington.

It depicts an image of the Pickett House. This is the oldest house in the city of Bellingham. It is even more famous because it was built by Captain George Pickett in 1856, while he was stationed there with the U.S. Army.

Pickett later became legendary for leading the disastrous "Pickett's Charge" while serving as a Confederate Army general at the Battle of Gettysburg during the Civil War.



All of these labels are appealing for many reasons. First of all they provide an excellent souvenir of the event that collectors can easily store and display. These might even make an interesting cinderella exhibit.

Second, they help to document the history of the Northwest Federation and the exhibitions it has sponsored.

Third, they provide historical and cultural information about the places and sites where these events took place.

Several philatelic shows and exhibition continue to produce these cinderella labels and offer them for sale or as souvenirs at their event.

I wonder why we do not see these any more at PIPEX, or other shows in the Pacific Northwest.

This year, SEAPEX is offering a label promoting its show. It is not as elaborate as these shown here, but it does have an elegant image of the show's logo (see page 7).



If you look in Google to find out what, or where, is Bong, it will tell you it is a water pipe used for smoking cannabis (or according to the urban dictionary, "what you put flowers in when the cops drive by").

Secondarily, it means the deep resonant sound of a bell.

What the Internet search will not tell you is that it was the name of a post office. Not an ordinary post office, but one serving the military on the grounds of the Spokane Air Force Base.

This office was named in honor of Major Richard I. Bong, a top-scoring World War II flying ace with 40 Japanese aircraft kills to his credit.

Bong was presented with the Medal of Honor by General Douglas MacArthur.

Major Bong died at age 25 while flying a P-60 fighter aircraft on August 6, 1945, the same day the United States dropped the historic atomic bomb on the Japanese city of Hiroshima.

The Bong post office was established on September 1, 1948, and operated for less than two years.

On July 1, 1950, the name was changed to Fairchild to correspond with the new name of the Air Force base. On March 31, 1956, it was renamed to become the Fairchild Air Force Base post office.

How to Get Philatelic Exhibits for Your Show

[Ed. note: The author is Chairperson of the Exhibits Committee for the Seattle Philatelic Exhibition (SEAPEX). This year SEAPEX, which is a small show just beginning its foray into the arena of national-level exhibitions, has filled 182 frames of competitive philatelic exhibits—far beyond the minimum of 125 required by the APS.]

Obtaining sufficient participation for a philatelic exhibition can be a challenging, but rewarding, experience for an exhibit chair.

This year all of the SEAPEX exhibit frames were filled prior to the entry deadline due to the show's new status as a World Series of Philately exhibition, the support of the philatelic community, and I like to believe in part due to diligence and hard work.

To be successful in obtaining exhibits, I follow the acronym STAMP, which stands for: Share, Time, Ask, Marketing, and Promotion.

Share

I believe that Sharing the hobby of philately and the excitement of exhibiting with others is the most direct route to a successful exhibition.

Enter an exhibit and attend local, regional, and WSP shows. While there, volunteer, offer to assist the exhibits chair and observe the process.

Network with other exhibitors, hand out prospectuses and entry forms for your show and invite them to exhibit.

Because exhibit chairpersons are often discouraged from entering exhibits in their own show, they may be open to swapping, "I'll send you mine, if you send me yours". Additionally, being a mentor for new exhibitors ensures exhibits will be available in future years.

Time

The role of exhibits chair is a time consuming one including hours spent networking, typing, e-mailing, and at the post office.

It is important to respond to requests for information from both exhibitors and the jury in a timely and enthusiastic manner.

Carry the prospectus and entry forms with you to hand out at club meetings, bourses, and other exhibitions, in addition to making them available on the show website.

Have next year's forms available at the current exhibition and include copies in the exhibitor's return packets.

Schedule time on a weekly basis (daily closer to the opening date) to be in your office sending invitations, reading palmares, writing news releases, responding to e-mails, and planning your next step.

Ask

Asking for anything is often not easy for many persons, so make an effort to encourage others to participate in exhibiting. Thank prior exhibitors for their participation and invite them back

If an exhibitor says they cannot participate this year, but may next year, write yourself a reminder and send them an invitation when it is time for next year's entry

Help the show manager pursue convening societies to gain exhibits from their members.

Review palmares of other exhibitions throughout the year and send invitations for specific exhibits to ensure a wellbalanced and quality exhibition.

If you do not have the contact information for exhibitors, request it from the exhibit chair, or ask the chair to forward the invitation and entry form to the exhibitor.

You may also request a mailing list of regional exhibitors from the American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors.

Marketing

Marketing the exhibition involves assistance from all board members and other committees, but the exhibit chair can assist by sending requests for exhibitors to club newsletters, speaking at local clubs, and taking the advertising cards everywhere.

Swapping advertisements with other exhibitions is an affordable way to ensure that information is seen by people, including exhibitors, who attend other shows.

Promotion

Promoting the exhibition includes all of the aforementioned topics. In addition, I wear a SEAPEX T-shirt, name tag, and lanyard to all philatelic activities. Other promotional items may include hats or pins.

If anyone has any questions, they will know who to ask.

In addition, use social media sites and bulletin boards to post philatelic photos, reminders, and reasons to attend your show.

Most importantly, hold a fun and inviting show that people want to attend.


