PIPEX 2017

The Pacific International Philatelic Exhibition (PIPEX) for 2017 was conducted by the Portland Philatelic Exhibitions (PPE) supported by the Oregon Stamp Society (OSS) and sponsored by the Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs on 12–14 May. The show took place at its usual venue, the Red Lion Hotel on the River at Jantzen Beach in Portland.

The Mobile Post Office Society, Scouts on Stamps Society International, and International Machine Cancel Society held their annual conventions at the show. Women Exhibitors held a regional meeting.

The Pacific Northwest Postal History Society and the Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs also held meetings. See the report on the Federation meeting on page 14.

Harmer-Schau Auctions held a live auction on Sunday.

The Red Lion Hotel provides a very nice location for this show, the second largest World Series of Philately (WSP) exhibition on the west coast. The show floor is spacious and this year hosted 36 dealers while providing well-lighted space for 240 frames of philatelic exhibits.

The NWFSC, PPE, and OSS have negotiated a contract to continue to hold the show at this location through 2019.

In addition to competitive exhibits, PIPEX encouraged the member organizations of the NWFSC to enter club exhibits that compete for the PIPEX Cup. This year the cup was won by the OSS exhibit. See the story on page 16 for more information about this exhibit and a picture of the Cup.

The jury for the competitive philatelic exhibits included Timothy Bartshe from Colorado (chair), Jeff Shapiro and Nancy Clark both from Massachusetts, Ed Kroft from British Columbia, and Robert Hohertz from Minnesota.

As a WSP exhibition, the winners of the Grand Awards for both the One Frame and Multi-frame exhibits become eligible to compete for the Champion of Champions award in each of these categories sponsored by the American Philatelic Society (APS). The CoC are the highest national level philatelic exhibition awards presented in the United States each year.

Treasurer Alex Hadden from British Columbia offers many years of knowledge of the Federation as well as a Canadian viewpoint we need to advance the Northwest unity. Portland Philatelic Exhibitions through the leadership of Tony Wawrukiewicz gives us a strong World Series of Philately (WSP) show and national recognition.

The Oregon Stamp Society with Eric Hummel as President offers local support for that show. Jack Congrove gives us a unified voice via this journal, *The Federated Philatelist*.

Ruth and Lyman Caswell, Anne Harris, and others have provided us with a well-run second WSP show. Eric Knapp, Cathie Osborne, and Lisa Foster have worked on local shows that will provide a base of show attendees and exhibitors for the two WSP shows.

These individuals give the Federation a strong foundation. What I hope I can do is to strengthen ties between our two countries and among the nine states and provinces.

I attended this last April an activity that has promoted that unity for many years, the John D. Arn Philatelic Symposium in Moses Lake, organized now by David Harris. I am excited by it and want to encourage more Federation club members to attend. The symposium is a place to showcase our enthusiasm for stamp collecting. It is a time and place to talk stamps, to learn about others and their collections, and to go beyond the rush of stamp shows.

I also hope to encourage bringing back local stamp shows with exhibits. (There are five towns that I can count readily in Oregon that no longer have exhibitions.) We have started to build a base of local judges with the help of the Council of Northern California Philatelic Societies.

To further this, the general meeting at PIPEX (see the report on this meeting on page 14) authorized a Thunderbird "Ribbon" to be awarded to an exhibit of merit in any judged exhibition within the Federation's nine areas.

The PIPEX Grand Awards were handsome carved wooden bowls made by master craftsman Jerry Johnson who was also an exhibitor at the show.

Louis Pataki received the One Frame Grand Award for his exhibit, "Along the Shantung Railway, China: German Postal Administration 1900-1914." This exhibit also won a Large Gold and the Mobile Post Office Society President's Award.

Robert Forster received the Reserve Grand Award for his multi-frame exhibit, "Nova Scotia Postal History to 1868." His exhibit also won a Large Gold and the Northwest Philatelic Library Tom Current British Exhibit Award.

The multi-frame exhibit Grand Award went to Roger Heath for "Swiss Flexible-head Razor Cancellers." This exhibit also won a Large Gold and the Postal History Society Medal.

Cathie Stumpenhaus won the People's Choice Award for her Silver-Bronze multi -frame exhibit, "Lovely as a Tree." She also hauled in the American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors (AAPE) Award of Honor for excellence in presentation, the AAPE Novice Award, and the American Topical Association (ATA) 3rd Place Medal.

PIPEX traditionally hosts a seminar for the Boy Scout collecting stamp merit badge. Unfortunately this Cathie Stumpenhaus & her haul year the Boy Scout Council



dropped the ball and did not get out the information to all the Scout troops. As a result only two Scouts attended.

The Women Exhibitors group held a regional meeting at PIPEX and on Friday evening, they had a group dinner at a local restaurant. The Northwest Federation is well represented in the WE leadership. Lisa Foster from the Evergreen Stamp Club is the WE President and Carol Edholm from the Sno-King Stamp Club is the Membership Chair.

There was an incident early on Saturday morning involving the theft of material from both the ATA society table and the Youth Activities table. Both of these tables were located in the hallway outside the show floor. The security personnel were then only monitoring inside the show area.

The stolen material was mostly common stamps and packets. However, one of the bins taken from the Youth area contained a Youth exhibit valued at about \$1,000.

After the security chief was informed of the incident, he immediately began an investigation. Impressively, he was able to identify the suspected thieves using the hotel security tapes and detective work. They were employees at a local fast food restaurant that had just gotten off shift.

Apparently, these folks had been coming to the hotel to catch rides and had been roving the halls over some period of time without the hotel's awareness.

The security team is pursuing the investigation.

Chairman's Farewell

Way back in February 2011, I had already been the Chairman of the Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs (NWFSC) for a year or so when Bill Geijsbeek resigned as Executive Secretary of the NWFSC. So I was thrust into the role of Acting Executive Secretary for what I assumed would be a short period of time until a replacement was found.

Well, just over six years later, Larry Crain of the Southern Oregon Philatelic Society accepted the position of Executive Secretary of the NWFSC effective with the end of the NWFSC annual general meeting at PIPEX 2017 on 13 May 2017

I send my sincere appreciation to Larry for assuming this important position. I am confident that, with your help, his tenure will be very successful.

A PIPEX show was not held in 2011, due to the lack of a sponsoring organization or city. An interested group in the Portland area approached me with the idea of holding future PIPEX shows solely in Portland.

Thus, Portland Philatelic Exhibitions (PPE) led by Michael Dixon was founded. After considerable negotiations, PPE was approved as the host for PIPEX shows in Portland starting in 2012. Under their leadership, PIPEX became one of the leading World Series of Philately (WSP) shows in the United States.

Further negotiations with PPE and the Oregon Stamp Society have resulted in PIPEX shows being scheduled through 2019. Under the leadership of Tony Wawrukiewicz, I expect that PIPEX will continue to be successful.

A major goal of the NWFSC is to promote philately in the Pacific Northwest. After a one-year gap following John Arn's death, the Moses Lake Philatelic Day was restarted under the leadership of David and Anne Harris and renamed as the John D. Arn Philatelic Symposium. The NWFSC supported their efforts and now underwrites this outstanding event.

Also, SEAPEX in Seattle needed assistance to continue in their pursuit of attaining WSP status. The NWFSC loaned SEAPEX \$2,000 to help. SEAPEX has gained WSP status and has repaid \$1,500 of the loan.


Finally, the awards sponsored by NWFSC have been continued with several outstanding Distinguished Philatelist awards being presented. The NWFSC member clubs were reminded of the Member Club Service Award and quite a number of deserving local club members were recognized.

I want to thank everyone who helped me in the past six years, particularly the NWFSC Treasurer Alex Hadden and Webmaster David Harris. Also, Jack Congrove has done a

super job of editing *The Federated Philatelist* and received a Vermeil in the 2016 Chicagopex literature competition.

As I said at the beginning of this article, the NWFSC is incapable hands with Larry Crain and will be able to continue its outstanding support of philately in the Pacific Northwest of the United States and Canada.

Youth in Philately

Since 2007, Anchorage Junior Academy, a private school, has partnered with Anchorage Philatelic Society (APS) to provide Junior Exhibits each year for the annual Alaska Philatelic Exhibition (APEX) in Anchorage, Alaska. Students work under the guidance of APS member, Ruth Farnsworth, a former Anchorage Junior Academy teacher, currently retired.

At the beginning, a few students participated after school hours, but soon classroom teachers began to realize what a wonderful educational opportunity the stamp exhibits provided. So, it was included in the school curriculum for the older students.

A couple of years ago Ruth read in this column about one page topical exhibits for younger students. Because many members of the APS have generously donated an abundance of stamps and other philatelic materials to the school for use by the students, Ruth suggested the one page topical displays would be suitable for the younger students and first time exhibiting students.

The classroom teachers and students wholeheartedly agreed, so for the past two years all students in grades 1–8 participate in APEX. This year for the 65th APEX, held 3–5 March, thirty-six students presented one-page topical exhibits and eleven students presented full-frame, nine-page exhibits. Two students are planning exhibits for the SEAPEX show later this year.

The students are excited to participate and look forward anxiously to Mrs. Farnsworth's appearance each school year to begin work on their topical stamp exhibits. The teachers are very supportive and thrilled to see the students' enthusiasm as they prepare their presentations for APEX.

During the school's end-of-the-year awards program, the students receive their stamp exhibits in a notebook with certificates, ribbons, and other philatelic prizes along with a coupon for an ice cream cone at McDonalds.

AmeriStamp Expo 2017

The American Philatelic Society (APS) held its 60th annual winter meeting and stamp show, AmeriStamp Expo (ASE), at the Reno-Sparks Convention Center in Reno, Nevada, on 3–5 March 2017. This show was originally planned to be held in Las Vegas. However, the venue that the APS had arranged became unavailable, so they were forced to relocate to Reno.

This change affected the show adversely in some ways. There were only 37 dealers at the show, which usually attracts a much higher quantity. One dealer told me that several dealers decided not to attend because of concerns about the likelihood of bad weather that would prevent many collectors from California from attending.

The APS offered added incentives to attract more dealers, but this appeared to have limited success. The weather concern turned out to be valid as there was obviously low attendance compared to similar shows and some of this could have been attributed to the weather since it did snow on Saturday and some routes were closed because of it.

In any case, the low attendance did not seem to harm the bourse sales. Several dealers I spoke with on Sunday indicated that they had good results. So apparently the collectors who did attend came to spend money and did so.

The APS partnered with the National Association of Letter Carriers (NALC) to help kick off their 25th annual Stamp Out Hunger® Food Drive. To mark this event, the NALC produced a PhotoStamps.com personalized postage souvenir sheet that was dedicated at a ceremony on Saturday.

Also participating was artist Jeff Keane. Keane's father Bil Keane, created the syndicated comic strip *The Family Circus* that has been part of the fight-hunger campaign from

the beginning. Bil Keane passed away in 2011 at age 89, and Jeff now carries on the legacy in helping create the strip. Keane attended several autograph sessions during the show.

In addition to the ceremony, NALC had a booth at the show where they accepted food and monetary donations. The proceeds for the sale of the souvenir sheets will directly benefit the Food Bank of Northern Nevada.

Both the United States Postal Service (USPS) and the Marshall Islands issued new postal items and held first day ceremonies at the show.

The USPS issued a Barn Swallow forever stamped envelope in multiple sizes and configurations at an 11:00 AM ceremony on Friday, 3 March.

The stamped envelopes were produced in three sizes: No. $6\frac{3}{4}$, No. 9, and No. 10. Each size came either with or without an address window. In addition, each came with either a moisture-activated seal or self-adhesive flap. The USPS booth had packets of six for sale containing the self-adhesive versions in each size and window configuration.





Pompeys Pillar, Montana

Pompeys Pillar, Montana, is, I understand, an elusive cancel. I happened on it and bought it simply because it was different and certainly had a story connected to it. It was mailed on 1 August 1931, to Ogden, Utah.

And the story? Pompeys Pillar was named by Captain William Clark on his return from Astoria in 1806. On 3 July, he and Meriweather Lewis split up, Clark taking a more southerly route. On 25 July, the Clark group traveled by a prominent rock formation on the south side of the Yellowstone River.

Clark wrote in his journal, "At 4PM [I] arrived at the remarkable rock situated in an extensive bottom. This rock I ascended and from its top had a most extensive view in every direction. This rock which I shall call Pompy's Tower is 200 feet high and 400 paces in secumpherance and only axcessible on one side which is from the N.E. the other parts of it being a perpendicular clift of lightish coloured gritty rock. The Indians have made 2 piles of stone on the top of this tower. The nativs have ingraved on the face of this rock the figures of animals &c."

In 1814 the name was changed to Pompeys Pillar. And Pompey? He was Jean Baptiste Charbonneau, the son of Sacagawea. The child was born 11 February 1805, at Fort Mandan, North Dakota, and was taken on the expedition along with his mother.

Clark nicknamed the boy "Pomp." Later Pomp lived in St. Louis with Clark who saw to his education. He spoke French, English, Spanish, German, Shoshone, and other western American Indian languages.

Charbonneau, Oregon is also named for him.

The show was held at the Anchorage Senior Activity Center. This was our fourth year in the new space and we are getting it figured out.



What to Do with Those Extra Stamps

Jim VanderPlaat from the Greater Eugene Stamp Society recently provided a document with examples of several ideas for using all those extra stamps that we collectors seem to accumulate. These include donating them to various charities and schools and using them for craft and other projects.

Jim's club prepares boxes of donations to "Stamps for the Wounded," a service activity of Lions Clubs (SFTW, P.O. Box 297, Dunn Loring, VA 22041). They want unsorted on-paper stamps, but will also accept mint stamps, collecting supplies, and cash donations.

These donations help lift spirits and provide therapeutic activities for veterans in hospitals and convalescent sites.

There are other groups that also accept donated extra stamps. Many large stamp shows have a Youth Activities program that can use stamps for their projects. Often these organizations are non-profit and can provide the donor with a receipt for tax deduction purposes.

One interesting project that Jim came up with is to use those extra stamps to make bookmarks. These make nice gifts for holidays, birthdays, anniversaries, and other occasions. You can pick a theme that fits the occasion or the recipient. You could also use them for prizes at your club, show, or other event.

The initial investment is a laminator and pouches that enable you to laminate whatever you want. Here are the materials needed, all of which you can find at craft stores, or retailers such as Walmart: Laminator (8½×11) (\$19.95), Pouches (50ea 8½×11) (\$22.50). Pouches also come in packages with various other sizes.

You can make 12–14 bookmarks with one 8½×11 sheet depending on the stamp sizes you use. You will also need colored paper, glue or hinges, and a cutter or scissors.



Arrange and attach the selected stamps in rows on both sides of the paper. Place the paper inside the pouch and run it through the laminator. Then cut the laminated paper into strips of the desired size. These bookmarks easily lend themselves to topical designs. The example above shows one using Fruit as its theme.

The John D. Arn Moses Lake Philatelic Symposium was held at the Best Western Lake Front Hotel and Conference Center in Moses Lake, Washington, on 1 April 2017.

It is always exciting to see a project exceed your expectations. So it happened this year at the 27th annual running of the philatelists at the Arn Symposium. We had 41 attendees from four states throughout the Pacific Northwest and without question a good time was had by all.

Four speakers gave entertaining presentations on various aspects of philately. The diversity of their presentations added to our philatelic knowledge. In addition, the event hosted both a silent and a live auction.

Northwest Federation Annual Meeting

As is the custom, the Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs (NWFSC) held its annual general meeting in conjunction with the PIPEX 2017 exhibition. The meeting took place starting at 9:00 AM on Saturday, 13 May.



The meeting, which drew more than 25 attendees, was opened by Chairman and Acting Executive Secretary Lawrence Clay. After introductions, Chairman Clay, in accordance with tradition, announced the names of Federation club members who had passed away during the previous year. Following the announcement, the group held a moment of silence in their memory.

"Closed albums" were: Jacqueline Manikian and Byron Birdsail (Anchorage); Frank Stark and Ron Hagadone (Eagle); Henry Stevens (Tri-Cities); Chuck Fisk (IEPS); Lil Geddes, Don Milne, Siegfried Osterwoldt, Raymond Smith, Garry Hamilton, and David McFee (Edmonton); Marcel Loriz, Dick Boyle, and Robert Tompkins (Salem); Louis Parker (USCS); Win Lora (SOPS); Karen McKee (Strait), and George Holland (Eugene).

The meeting minutes from the 2016 meeting were approved. Treasurer Alex Hadden presented his report. The treasury balance as of 31 December 2016, was \$17,076.42 in Canadian dollars.

Chairman Clay reported on the status of PIPEX and commended the Portland Philatelic Exhibitions (PPE) for their operation of the show. The NWFSC, PPE, and Oregon Stamp Society have negotiated a contract to continue the show at the current venue through 2019.

Clay reported that the Seattle Philatelic Exhibition (SEAPEX) has repaid \$1,500 of the \$2.000 Federation loan and that they expect to pay the balance following the show this year.

Jack Congrove, editor of *The Federated Philatelist*, announced that the journal had received a Vermeil award at the Chicagopex Literature exhibition. He also encouraged

all members to submit articles for publication. These can include descriptions of a favorite or notable item in their collection, or reports on their club activities, especially those that are upcoming so that we can publicize them in the journal and on the Federation Facebook page.

Clay then gave a report of the status of the Federation. The Federation's mission is to promote philately in the Pacific Northwest. In that role, it supports three significant philatelic activities: PIPEX, SEAPEX, and the Arn Philatelic Symposium.

Clay announced that the Federation will continue to underwrite the Arn Symposium with a grant of \$700, if needed for expenses.

Two clubs have dropped from Federation membership: North

Shore Stamp Club and Bellingham Stamp Club.

The Fraser Valley Stamp Club from Abbotsford, British Columbia, and the Lynden Stamp Club from Lynden, Washington, are the newest Federation members.

Clay next announced the recipients of the Member Club Service Awards. This award is presented to members of a Federation club who have performed outstanding service to their club over a period of time. The awardees for 2017:

David Schwantes (APS). He has been a member of the Anchorage Philatelic Society for many decades. He is the long-time cover committee chair and has been the driving force behind the club's high quality show and special event covers.

Pat Hoffmann (APS): He has for many years taken on the great challenge of keeping the club straight by serving as its Treasurer. He organized the books and inventory into the best condition they have been for years. He has also taken the lead role in the disposition of collections that were left to the club by several members.

Jerry Rottman (OSS): As Secretary, and most recently Treasurer of OSS, he has been a key member of the management team for more than a decade. He was also a driving force behind the formation of the Oregon Stamp Society Foundation, and its first President.

Leonard Lukens (SOPS): He has served as the club Vice President and Program Director and has been an active supporter of SOPEX. Len is also the only person who has been honored by receiving all three of the Federation's major awards. He received the Northwest Distinguished Philatelist Award in 1995, and the Federation Meritorious Achievement Award in 2005.

The final portion of the meeting involved a "change in command" of the Federation. The Northwest Federation has an unusual leadership hierarchy. The Chairman of the Board of Directors is actually not the head of the organization. That position is held by the Executive Secretary.


The genesis for this goes back to the time when the PIPEX show moved to different cities in the Federation from year to year. Each year the President was named from the club hosting PIPEX for that year. The First Vice President was the person who had been President the previous year. And the Second Vice President was from the club slated to host PIPEX the following year.

Because these officers did not serve in their position for very long, they often came to rely on the Federation Secretary, who typically held that position for lengthy periods, to provide them with guidance on the way operations had worked in the past and how problems had ben resolved.

Eventually, the Federation reorganized and the Executive Secretary position was created to provide continuity in the leadership position.

During the past several years, Lawrence Clay, who had been serving as Chairman, also took over as Acting Executive Secretary when Bill Geijsbeek, the previous Executive Secretary, resigned.

Clay himself had decided to resign following PIPEX this year, which meant that the Federation needed a new Executive Secretary. Larry Crain from the Southern Oregon Philatelic Society was named to take this position.



Clay, in his resignation speech, thanked all members of the Federation for their support during the past six years he has held office. He briefly recapped some of the actions and events during his tenure and asked all to give their support to his successor.

Bill Geijsbeek, the past Executive Secretary, stood to publicly thank Clay for his leadership and to welcome Crain to the new position. The audience gave Clay a standing ovation for his contributions to the Federation and Pacific Northwest philately.

Larry Crain then took the floor to briefly speak about his ideas for the future of the Federation. One area he wants to encourage is exhibiting. He proposed reinstituting the Thunderbird Award to be presented at every show in the Federation that features exhibits. This award would be presented to the best exhibit of any type by a member of a Federation organization.

It is interesting to note that Crain is also the current President of the Council of Northern California Philatelic Societies, the Federation equivalent for that area.

The meeting adjourned at 10:12 AM.

PIPEX Special Award

At the PIPEX 2017 award dinner on Saturday, 13 May, the show committee made a special presentation. Tony Wawrukiewicz, President of Portland Philatelic Exhibitions (PPE) and Chairman of the PIPEX Organizing Committee announced a special award for Lawrence Clay, the outgoing Chairman of the Northwest Federation.

The Philatelic Ambassador Award was created to honor Clay for his outstanding leadership of the NWFSC during the past six years.

In 2011, at the beginning of this period, the PIPEX show was not held because no club was willing to be the host. The tradition up until that time was that the show moved from city to city within the Federation each year. The previous year the show was held in Spokane, Washington, and hosted by the Inland Empire Philatelic Society.

Clay coordinated with the PPE, which was formed to host the event in Portland, to rejuvenate the show. PIPEX has emerged from this situation to be one of the top World Series of Philately shows in the US.

Piercey Receives Pratt Award

The Collectors Club of Chicago has announced David Piercey of the Edmonton Stamp Club as the 2016 recipient of the Pratt award for the best-judged article or other publication related to the philately of Newfoundland.

Piercey received the award for three articles about Newfoundland's postal history: "Late Letters and the Newfoundland Mails," published in the winter 2015-2016 issue of the *Postal History Society of Canada Journal*; "Early Packet Steamer Services on Placentia Bay: 1888-1900" in the April 2016 issue of *Maple Leaves*; and "The St. John's East Post Office" in the first quarter 2016 issue of *BNA Topics*.

Initiated in 1997, the Pratt award is named for Col. Robert H. Pratt, the preeminent Newfoundland stamp and postal history collector, researcher, and author.

The award consists of a \$1,000 honorarium to be shared by the recipients. The recipients are determined by the Collectors Club of Chicago Pratt award committee.

The club solicits published original research related to Newfoundland philately for consideration of the annual Pratt award. Submissions to be considered should be sent to George P. 

Philatelic Outreach

The American Philatelic Society held a Summit on the Future of Philately at its headquarters in Bellefonte, Pennsylvania, on 28 October 2016. Fifty-six leaders within the industry participated in person, or by phone.

One result of this summit was the formation of a council to pursue ideas and policies to grow the philatelic hobby and increase the quantity of stamp collectors. The summit participants and the council members agreed that one key area to promote is Topical Collecting.

A suggestion that many supported was to focus on related special interest groups by submitting articles with topical hooks to non-philatelic publications that deal with related topics. For example, a story about Cats on Stamps in Catster (formerly Cat Fancier) magazine.

Cathie Osborne from the Strait Stamp Society has just accomplished this scheme with an article in *The Bell Tower*: Official Publication of The American Bell Association International. Inc.

In her four-page article, she discusses how she got started in stamp collecting and how her interest in collecting small bells led to collecting stamps showing this subject.

She illustrates her articles with many images of various types of bells on stamps and describes other types of related philatelic material.

Articles such as this can inspire others to branch out to stamp collecting. Topical stamps are almost always less expensive than the actual items they depict. You could have a collection that shows many varieties of church bells whereas an actual church bell would take up a lot of room on your bookshelf.

Bells on Stamps

I was nine when my uncle gave me my first stamp al- 1. Liberty Bells bum, and probably ten when my grandmother gave me my first bell—a brass bobby hat from England.

The stamps were put on hold when I got my first teenage job. And the job gave me money that I occasionally used for a new bell from the dime store (Josef Originals).

Fast forward past marriage and work to the first baby. We lived out in the country, and I was a housewife.
The baby took REALLY long naps so I had time on my hands. Out came the old stamp collection and I was hooked. The only problem was a low budget, and to fill the album with the older stamps took more money than I had.

About that time, I found out there was more to stam collecting than I had realized: weekly newspapers, a national organization i—and another national group for people who wanted to collect stamps by their top ic, 2 Collecting by topic sounded like a way to put a financial limit on my collection, but still have fun.

But what topic to collect? You've guessed it: the bells!

I RHEW ADOUT THE United States Liberty Bell stamp, and thought that there CANT be that many bell stamps. I also thought, since bells typically cost more, unit to unit than stamps that the hobby would be manageable.

There was the period of searching the Scott Pastage Stamp catalog,² page by page, for pictures of bell stamps. And then I found out that the topical group had a checklist of bell stamps. 


