ATA-APS Joint Show

The American Topical Association (ATA), held its annual National Topical Stamp Show (NTSS) in a joint venture with the American Philatelic Society (APS) StampShow on 9–12 August 2018, at the Greater Columbus Convention Center in Columbus, Ohio. Both the NTSS and StampShow are American Philatelic Society sponsored World Series of Philately (WSP) national-level exhibitions.

If I attend 100 stamp shows in my life, it will be hard to top this one. This was the largest stamp show in the United States in 2018. The bourse contained 111 dealers and there were almost 1,000 frames of philatelic exhibits. In addition, there were four postal agencies including the United States Postal Service and the United Nations Postal Administration. More than 40 societies and other philatelic organizations were in attendance.

There was a lot of excitement and energy on the show floor during the whole weekend. On Friday morning after the first day, there was a meeting of the dealers and the show organizers. One dealer who attended reported to the ATA that without exception, the dealers were very pleased with the energy on the show floor and attendance and also were very impressed with the results of the joint effort by the APS and the ATA.

Attendance was strong on all four days and dealers I spoke with all reported excellent sales. At least one dealer even exceeded his sales at the eight-day New York 2016 show.

The USPS went all out to support the show and built a castle right in the middle of the show floor. One side held the sales counter and on the other side clerks from the Kansas City Distribution Center expertly applied cancellations. One said after the first day, she felt her arm was going to fall off.

The USPS had a busy week also with new issues. On Tuesday, before the start of the show, they issued five

designs in a pane of 20 stamps and a souvenir sheet of three for the Art of Magic in Las Vegas, Nevada.



On Thursday, at the APS-NTSS, they held a first day ceremony to issue a pane of 16 stamps with four different designs depicting stylized dragons. The APS and ATA used the dragon theme throughout the entire show. Hence the USPS castle. See the story on page 6 about a major error found at the show.

On Saturday, the USPS issued the second of their airmail stamps celebrating the 100th anniversary of the US Airmail Service in College Park, Maryland. Each of these new stamps, plus all of the current issues, were on sale at the show. The USPS ran out of each new issue at show and had to reorder/restock multiple times.

The USPS brought in sales clerks from Cincinnati to supplement the local Columbus district. All clerks were very professional and efficient. I spoke with one on Sunday who was from the Columbus district. She told me that all the clerks had really enjoyed the show.

I kiddingly asked her if the USPS had covered their expenses and she just smiled. But she added that she had spent half of her extra pay on stamps. I asked her what she collected and she said she was not a collector, but she really liked the new designs. I think she, like many others, got caught up in the enjoyment happening all over the show.

The UN Postal Administration held a pre-launch ceremony where they unveiled the designs for the next issue in the UN Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) World Heritage stamp series. The six designs, two each for the UN offices in New York, Geneva, and Vienna, depict scenes throughout England. The UNPA offered the stamps for sale starting on 9 August in advance of their official 15 August official release date.

Both the APS and the ATA spent a lot of effort on publicizing the show and this work appeared to pay off hand-somely. Early on Thursday morning, a crew from the ABC television station and its affiliates came to the show hall and conducted live interviews with many of the ATA and

APS organizers. This feature, Good Day Columbus, has a big following and the host, Cameron Fontana, is a popular local personality. You can find these interviews recorded on line at www.gooddaycolumbus.com.

All during the show, there were costumed characters present to greet attendees and provide photo opportunities. They also handed out the Dragon passports.

The Ebony Society of Philatelic Events and Reflections (ESPER) was the ATA featured study unit. They had their own society booth at the show. Other study units that manned individual booths were the Christmas Philatelic Club, Penguins on Stamps Study Unit, Space Unit, and United Nations Philatelists. Several units displayed single frame exhibits. The ATA signed up an unprecedented 65 new and reinstated members.

The ATA's newest publication, *What's First?*, was offered for the first time. This 335-page handbook seeks to answer the question, "What was the first stamp to feature each topic?" It covers more than 800 topics and contains high-quality images of more than 700 stamps. Did you know that the first stamp to feature the Statue of Liberty was issued by neither the US nor France? It was Uruguay (Sc#217) issued in 1919.

This show was a combined philatelic exhibition. The APS StampShow is always the venue for the annual World Series Champion of Champions competition among all the Grand Award winners from the 30+ national WSP shows that take place around the US and Canada. This year there were 25 exhibits in the competition. The CoC prize this year went to James Allen representing the St. Louis Expo show for *The First United States 12¢ Stamp Series of 1851–1861*.

In addition to the CoC exhibits, there were separate sections for the NTSS and the APS Open exhibitions. Each section received its own medal awards and its own Grand, Reserve Grand, and Most Popular awards. But the special awards from the various societies and other sponsors were shared across both sections.

In the APS Open section, Mark Thompson won the Most Popular Award and a Large Vermeil medal for *Women of the Black Heritage Series – From the Fields of Slavery to the Halls of Congress.* This exhibit will be at SEAPEX.

The APS Open offered two Reserve Grand Awards. Ian Gibson-Smith received one for The Hong Kong "China" Overprints. Daniel Knowles received the other for *The Confederate States of America (CSA) Postal Initiative*, which also won the Postal History Society award.

Charles C. Wooster won the APS Open Grand Award for *The Postage Due Issues of Peru 1874–1948*, which also received the APS Research Award.

On the NTSS side, Dawn Hamman won the Most Popular Award and a Large Gold for *Backyard Chickens – Raising Chickens at Home, Then and Now.*, which also won the Biology First Award.

Carl Jennings won the NTSS Reserve Grand Award for *Ancient Egypt: The Time of the Pharaohs*, which also received the American Association of Philatelic Exhibitors Award for Excellence – Epilogue.

Jack Congrove received the NTSS Grand Award for *Alexander Hamilton: Soldier, Financier, Statesman, Founder*. Both the APS Open and the NTSS Grand Award winners are eligible to compete in the Champion of Champions event next year in Omaha, Nebraska.

Other exhibitors from the Northwest Federation in the Open section included Michael Bloom who received a

Gold for Guatemala's Master Designer/Engraver: Arnoldo Chavarry, and Ralph Nafziger who received a Gold for The 3 cent 1934 Perforated Wisconsin Tercentenary Issue.

In the NTSS section, Lisa Foster received a Large Silver for *The Great American Eclipse 2017*, and Laurie Anderson received a Silver for *Go for the Gold! The Introduction of Women in the Olympic Games*.

The Grand Award in the Philatelic Literature exhibition went to Hugh V. Feldman for the handbook *U.S. Contract Mail Routes by Railroad (1832–1875)*.

From the Northwest Federation, Louis Fiset received a Large Gold for the handbook *Prexie Era: Stamp Production and Postal History, 1938–1962*. Angela Watson received a Vermeil for the journal *The Alaskan Philatelist* and your present journal *The Federated Philatelist* also received a Vermeil award.

The success of this show and the cordial relationship that has developed between the APS and the ATA has influenced both organizations to try the joint show concept again next year in Omaha, Nebraska. The show is scheduled for 1–4 August.

Next year the ATA will be celebrating its 70th anniversary and there are big plans in the works already to make this a must attend event. Next year is also the 150th anniversary of the First Transcontinental Railroad and the show theme is going to be Trains.

Error Discovery

On 9 August 2018, at the APS-ATA joint show in Columbus, Ohio, the US Postal Service issued a self-adhesive pane of 16 stamps containing four different designs depicting stylized dragons. I was third in line at the postal station when it opened at 10:00 AM and purchased 15 panes for use on some cacheted covers I had prepared.

After my purchase, I went to help at the ATA booth. The ATA had also prepared sets of cachets with different designs for sale on each day.

Because Vera Felts, the ATA Executive Director, was busy organizing the booth, she had not yet purchased stamps placing on the covers. To save time and speed up getting them cancelled and ready for sale at the booth, I began using my stamps to place on the covers.

Shortly thereafter Vera brought about 70 panes that she had purchased for their covers. I replaced the

stamps I had used from my purchase with those and began using the ATA's stamps on the rest of the covers.

By then Larry Davidson, another ATA member, was also helping apply the stamps. After using perhaps five or six panes, I picked a new pane and tried to remove one of the stamps from the bottom row. It would not peel away and I looked closely to find that the die cuts had shifted about 60 millimeters toward the top if the pane and into the top margin. This left the bottom row of stamps totally imperforate.

I showed the pane to Larry and we agreed that it was an error. We searched the pile of remaining panes and found the next 13 panes with similar die cut shifts, some of which were not as severe.

With Vera's permission, I took the panes to the nearby Scott Publishing booth to show to Jay Bigalke, the Editor of *Linn's Stamp News*. He was speaking with another per-

son and when he finished, he turned to me and saw I was holding several of the panes.

"Please don't tell me they omitted the metallic ink," he said.

"I can't tell you that, but they omitted the die cuts," I replied.

He took one of the panes and his eyes widened. He turned to me and said, "This looks like a major error," to which I agreed.

"I'm trying to contain my excitement," he said. So was I.

He asked permission to hold on to one of the panes to scan for a report on the discovery in *Linn's*, which Vera granted. The ATA plans to sell the panes to raise funds for the organization.

Some might say that discovering a major error on a US stamp is a once-in-a-lifetime event. It certainly was a highlight of the show for me, especially since it occurred only an hour after the stamps were issued. SEAPEX 2018 Events Planned

The Seattle Philatelic Exhibition (SEAPEX) will take place on 14–16 September 2018, at the Tukwila Community Center located just north of the SeaTac Airport at 12424 42nd Avenue South, Tukwila, Washington.

SEAPEX is celebrating the 75th anniversary of the Women's Army Corps (WAC). The WAC was created as an auxiliary unit in 1942, and converted as the active duty women's branch of the United States Army on 1 July 1943. About 150,000 American women served in the WAC during World War II. They performed mainly administrative duties in order to release men for combat related positions. The WAC was disbanded and women were integrated into other Army branches in 1978.

The show will host a special ceremony on Saturday honoring all women who have served in US military uniform. A special postmark and illustrated souvenir covers will also be available.

The show will feature 25 stamp dealers and 3,000+ pages of competitive exhibits. As a World Series of Philately show, the Grand Award winners for the one-frame and multi-frame exhibits will be eligible to compete at the APS

Champion of Champions competitions against winners from other national WSP shows next year in Mesa, Arizona, and Omaha, Nebraska.

In correspondence with the national tour of the hit musical *Hamilton* and the current Alexander Hamilton exhibit at the national Postal Museum, an award winning exhibit on the life of Hamilton will be on display at the show.

Members of the philatelic jury are: Robert Ziegler, Jeffrey Shapiro, Christopher Dahle, David Piercey, and Mark Banchik. Igor Grigorian will serve as an apprentice.

The American Helvetia Philatelic Society and the United Postal Stationery Society will hold conventions.

The event will also host free activities for youth and educators throughout the weekend. Starting at 10 AM on Saturday, the show will hold a full-day Boy Scout stamp collecting merit badge seminar.

The US Postal Service and United Nations Postal Administration will be on hand to sell current postal items.

SEAPEX 2018 will be celebrating the 75th anniversary of the **United States Women's Army Corps**. The show will have special souvenir cachets and pictorial cancels for each of its three days.

There will be a special ceremony on Saturday starting at 12:00 PM honoring all women who have served in US military uniform regardless of branch or service.



Closed Album: Corless Clay

[Ed. note: Corless Clay was the wife of the Federation's former Executive Secretary, Lawrence Clay. You could say that she was the Secretary's secretary. She contributed greatly to the Federation and to her club. She received the Member Club Service Award in 2013.]

Corliss Louise Clay passed away on 7 August 2018, at Kadlec Hospital in Richland, Washington. She was born on 6 April 1935, in North Platte, Nebraska, the only child of Louis Charles Frederick and Marcia Pauline (Marlenee) Kruse.

She moved to Omaha with her parents at a young age and graduated from Omaha Benson High School in 1952 as salutatorian. She received a degree in Business Administration from the University of Nebraska–Lincoln in 1956, where she was a member of Kappa Delta sorority.

She met her future husband, Lawrence Clay in freshman English at the University of Nebraska in 1953. They were married on 17 December 1958, in St. Louis, Missouri while she was in graduate school.

She was involved in many civic activities in every place she lived. She received the Deer Park, Texas, Citizen of the Year Award for her work in developing their library.

While living in Beatrice, Nebraska from 1965 to 1983, she received an Ak-Sar-Ben Award for Volunteer work for her many civic activities including organizing a T-ball softball league for 8-year old girls.

After moving to Kennewick, Washington, she helped establish a pre-school at the Lutheran Church. Corliss was an active member of the Homemakers Club and helped organize trips to national tournaments for a 16-18 girls slow pitch softball team.

She also was active in the Tri-Cities Genealogical Society and edited the Tri-City Stamp Club newsletter for more than 20 years.

When Lawrence started a stamp and cover business in 1987, Corliss was an integral part doing most of the record keeping and traveling to stamp shows.

Corliss is survived by her husband, their daughter Christa Lynn Clay of Kennewick, and son Michael Edward Clay of Mesa, Arizona. She was preceded in death by her parents.

Distinguished Philatelist Award History

The Northwest Distinguished Philatelist Award is the highest honor bestowed by the Northwest Federation. This award was instituted at the 1960 Federation annual meeting at Eugene, Oregon, and was the conception and creation of Cecil F. Blogg (1894–1973) from Tacoma.

Mr. Blogg was a long-time officer and delegate from the Tacoma Stamp Club and served as Federation President in 1954.

Reprinted here is the pertinent portion of the minutes of the 1960 meeting that reveal the genesis of this award:

"Cecil F. Blogg, of Tacoma, was granted the privilege of the floor. He stated that the Federation is now 25 years old. It has grown from five to 32 member clubs. This record is due to the hard work, friendly cooperation, and philatelic knowledge of many men and women collectors over the years. Proper honor and credit to those who have done so much for our Federation should be given. Therefore, Mr. Blogg requested the Federation to accept a 'Distinguished Philatelist Award' plaque he wished to present for this purpose with the added proviso that he name ten people (including two joint awards) to start the awards.

"He suggested the following rules be approved or adopted and amended to suit the will of the delegates in making future awards beginning in 1961:


The Distinguished Philatelist Award

- (1) To be awarded annually to that person, who is a member of a member club of the Federation, who in the opinion of the delegates has shown himself worthy of the honor through his knowledge of philately, participation in Federation exhibitions, and other activities for the benefit of philately.
- Any member is eligible, living or dead, regardless of age or sex.
- (3) Nominations may be made by any member club and must be received by the Federation Executive Secretary not later than March 1st of each year. Each nomination must be accompanied by a philatelic biography of the nominee to explain why he or she is considered worthy of this honor.
- (4) These nominations and accompanying biographies shall be submitted to the delegates as soon thereafter as possible.
- (5) The winner, limited to one each year, shall be elected by a secret written ballot by a majority of the delegates at each annual meeting.
- (6) Each winner shall receive a suitable certificate signed by the proper Federation officers. Each annual winner, if living, shall hold the plaque until the next award is made. If the one elected is deceased, the certificate shall be mailed to the surviving widow or widower and the winner's member club shall hold the plaque until the next award is made.
- (7) Beginning in 1961, the cost of engraving the winner's name on the appropriate tablet shall be paid by the Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs.

"Mr. Blogg then placed into nomination the following names to be honored in 1960:

the late R. R. Thiele of Tacoma Washington the late Henry C. Hitt of Bremerton, Washington Arlene and the late Al Van Dahl of Albany, Oregon William C. Wylie of Albany, Oregon Gerald E. Wellburn of Duncan, British Columbia Edwin R. Payne of Salem, Oregon Bury C. Binks of Vancouver, British Columbia Fred E and Margaret R. Carver of Yakima, Washington

"Sterling Taylor moved we accept the Distinguished Philatelist plaque, with deep appreciation to Mr. Blogg for his presentation of the plaque to the Federation. Motion seconded by Mr. Chickering and carried unanimously."

The original plaque was filled to capacity in the 1970s and in 1973, Mr. Blogg presented a second plaque to the Federation to sustain the award. The original plaque was presented to charter recipients Fred and Margaret Carver for safekeeping in 1977. Its whereabouts are not known.

The presentation of "a suitable certificate" seems to have been only sporadically employed.

Initially, only a single award was made each year. Nominees were submitted to the Executive Secretary and a vote was held by the delegates at the annual Federation meeting to select the awardee.

There have been ten years when no awards were made. Multiple awards were made in 1974 and 1985 because at least one award was posthumous. Possibly because of the multiple awards in 1985, the policy was changed (or forgotten) and multiple awards have been presented in subsequent years.

The current criteria for the Northwest Distinguished Philatelist Award is spelled out in the Federation By-Laws:

"The achievement criteria for the Northwest Distinguished Philatelist Award shall be having rendered outstanding and distinguished service to philately in general in one or more of the following areas:

- 1. Published research and study in some aspect of philately.
- 2. Assembling a world-class collection.
- 3. Significant furthering of philately on a national scale.

"Eligibility

- 1. A nominee for the Northwest Distinguished Philatelist Award must have been a resident within the geographic area of the Federation for a substantial period of time.
- A nominee need not be a member of a Federation member organization.
- 3. A candidate can be honored with the award posthumously.
- 4. This is a one-time award. No person may receive it more than once.
- 5. More than one awardee may be honored each year.
- If the Board of Directors determines that there is no eligible candidate, no award needs to be granted for a particular year."

Awardees are determined by a two-thirds majority vote of the Federation Board of Directors.

Nominations may be made by a member organization or by a Federation officer or director and should be submitted to the Executive Secretary no later than 120 days prior to the next PIPEX show.

Recommendations are limited to 350 words and should address the nominee's achievements and qualifications in accordance with the criteria described above.

PIPEX 1947

In 1947, the Pacific International Philatelic Exhibition (PIPEX) was held at the Olympic Hotel in Seattle, Washington. It was sponsored and hosted by the Washington State Philatelic Society, one of the five founding member clubs from 1935.

This was the seventh annual exhibition and the first one held following the suspension of shows during the period of World War II. It was a three-day event that ran from 30 August to 1 September.

Possibly because of the break in holding stamp shows during the war, the host club and the Federation went all out to make this an exceptional event. Special publicity labels were prepared in two colors, red and blue. A distinctive totem pole cachet was designed, and a philatelic congress was organized where a number of papers were presented by noted regional philatelists.

At right is a cover I discovered recently while sorting through the Federation historical files. It is an advertising envelope from the host hotel franked with a five-cent United Nations Conference issue that overpaid the three-cent first class rate. It is postmarked on the first day of the show, and this stamp was more than two years old by that time.

Also on the cover is a tête-bêche pair of the red show souvenir labels. They also include an image of the cachet design.

However, the most interesting part of this envelope is the 19 autographs that cover it. These are names of men and women who were among the most notable philatelists in the Pacific Northwest in the mid-twentieth century.


Space does not permit describing each individual, let alone giving complete details of selected persons, so I will highlight just a few in this article and deal with them and others in more detail in a series of articles I am preparing on the history of the Federation.

It is not clear who collected the signatures on this item.

The third and fourth signatures below the labels are those of a wife and husband: Arlene and Al Van Dahl from Albany, Oregon. They were the publishers of *Western Stamp Collector*, a bi-weekly stamp magazine that printed articles and news about the hobby from across the country. Arlene operated the paper after her husband's death until 1976, when she sold it and it became *Stamp Collector*.

The Van Dahls were charter recipients of the Northwest Distinguished Philatelist award in 1960.

Skipping to the ninth name below the labels we see Winnifred H. Young from Bellingham, Washington. Young was elected as the very first Secretary of the Federation when it was founded in 1936. The following year, she became the Federation Treasurer, a position in which she served until 1977, an astounding



period of 40 years. In addition, she served as President in 1949, when PIPEX was held in Bellingham.

Young received the Northwest Distinguished Philatelist award in 1971.

Just below Young's signature is that of Fred E Carver of Yakima, Washington. Carver had been

elected Permanent (now called Executive) Secretary in 1941, when the position was created, and has been the longest-serving individual in that position, holding it until 1969.

During the war years between 1942 and 1946, Carver and Young were the two persons who held the Federation together while its annual meeting and exhibition were interrupted.

Carver simultaneously held the positions of Federation President and Permanent Secretary in 1956, when PIPEX was held in Yakima.

Fred and his wife, Margaret, were also charter recipients of the Northwest Distinguished Philatelist award.

The final signature I will highlight is the one at the bottom of the list, John F. Snypp of Bremerton, Washington. Snypp was the winner of the Grand Award at this show for his exhibit of Jamaica.

Exhibits in those days were completely different than the ones you will see at shows today. Basically they were the person's collection. There was very little story telling. The owners put up their best stuff in a spiffy arrangement and had their albums standing by for inspection.

Snypp's exhibit consisted of eight (six-page) frames and two albums. There is no record of what the exhibit looked like, but it must have included all the rare and expensive varieties in order to receive the highest award.

It certainly was true then, even if perhaps less so now, that the exhibitors with the deepest pockets won the highest medals.

New 3c 1851-57 Plating Website

The first of July was the launch date of a new plating website on the US 3c 1851–57 issue (www.StampPlating.com) created by Oregon Stamp Society member Bryan O'Doherty. He used Excel, SQL, and web design and development tools to present his database of the complete plating of this stamp.

All 2,600 stamps from the Rob Lund collection were scanned in, as were the original black and white Chase photos, which have been the primary resource for platers up to this point.

The most useful part of the website for many will be the Plating Wizard, which navigates the user through plate identification, reliefs, guide dots, frame lines, recuts and other distinctive aspects to present possible stamp plating solutions. It is a simple matter of two mouse clicks to then compare the subject stamp to the corresponding Lund or Chase plated examples.

O'Doherty was excited to have recently acquired the plating notes of DeVere Card, whose 52 charts contain extra clues. He plans to have them integrated into the Plating Wizard by the end of the year.

The website is loaded with historical and background information on the issue, and it has been endorsed by the U.S. Philatelic Classics Society Inc. You will see a link to their website at the top right-hand corner of every page.

Well, what are you waiting for? Get your glassines of unplated Scott number 10s and 11s out and start *StampPlating.com*!

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Canada-US Detente

There are many examples of international cooperation and coexistence along the 49th parallel, which separates Canada and the United States over what has become known as the longest undefended international border in the world. It is a significant relationship that has developed over our two respective histories; one that may well be the envy of many other nations closely tied. Nowhere is this symbiotic relationship more evident than in the small community of Surrey-White Rock, British Columbia, and its neighboring town of Blaine, Washington.

That international cooperation is embodied in the Peace Arch Stamp Club, which was founded on 9 April 1989. That is when a small, dedicated group of stamp collectors gathered in a tiny back room at the local hockey arena. The inaugural meeting included an advanced collector named James (Jim) Longbourne, and a modest group of 17 like-minded individuals. Both Canadians and Americans attended this first meeting, thanks to the club's proximity to the US border on the Strait of Georgia across from Vancouver Island.

The Peace Arch Stamp Club was originally called the White Rock Stamp Club, given its location in the small sea-side city of White Rock, British Columbia. The club was renamed in 1992, because many members resided in the neighboring communities of both Washington State and British Columbia. The name "Peace Arch" was chosen because of the white arched monument situated near the western-most point on the mainland of the Canada-United States border, between the communities of Blaine, Washington, and Surrey-White Rock, British Columbia.

This unique arched structure, on the US-Canada border, was built in 1921, and commemorates the signing of the Treaty of Ghent in 1814, which sort of settled the War of 1812. The striking 20.5 meter (67 foot) structure straddles the 49th parallel and is found in both a British Columbia provincial park and a Washington state park.

The Peace Arch is famous for its flags of Canada and the USA on its crown, and two inscriptions on its walls, which read, "Children of a Common Mother and Brethren Dwelling Together In Unity." It is much the same as the members of our stamp club.

The actual traffic border of both nations is located within the confines of both parks. People of the world can visit these parks without a passport and straddle the actual border line, so that one foot is in Canada, and the other in the USA.

Stressing the bond between the two countries, the Peace Arch has gates that are permanently open. The American side of the arch contains a piece of the famous *Mayflower*, while the Canadian side contains a piece of our equally famous HMS *Beaver*, both ships having been instrumental in the founding of the two nations.

The Peace Arch Stamp Club celebrated its 25th anniversary in April 2016, with two of the original members in attendance. Both collectors were awarded life-time memberships on this auspicious occasion. Over the years, the club has grown in attendance, attracting members of all levels of expertise, and colleagues from many other local stamp clubs. Membership continues to grow as we attract an active group of 60 like-minded and friendly collectors.

Our monthly meetings include an hour of fellowship and robust inter-member trading and buying. We have several tables set up for our live auction, and most nights see 150 or more lots that members have contributed for sale.

Our three witty auctioneers contribute to the lively action, and our auction directors balance the "pay in and pay out" immediately after the auction ends. Auction directors settle with both buyers and sellers within 15 minutes of the close, and the club takes no commission for this service.

The club has received many donations of collections from the local community, allowing us to support many worthy causes such as the Alzheimer Society, senior support groups, and the Surrey Seniors Come Share Society. The proceeds benefit both sides of our international border belying the friendship and camaraderie of Canadians and Americans that has always existed since the War of 1812.




Figure 1. Exhibit Title Poster

Figure 2 shows a 5 January 1852, folded letter from a German who enlisted in the U.S. Army and was stationed at Camp Drum, which would soon become Fort Dalles. It is the earliest recorded postal marking from any Oregon town east of the Cascades.




Figure 3. "Deliver in Haste"

Figure 3 shows an express envelope from the Canyon City mines (also known as the John Day mines) carried by Buchanan's Express into The Dalles, then by Wells Fargo to Idaho City. Note that sender marked it "Please Have Delivered in Haste" and so used an express company rather than the notoriously slow U.S. Mail.

Each edition of this journal lists the meeting times and locations for the member organizations.

The Federation sponsors the annual Pacific International Philatelic Exhibition (PIPEX) and the Arn Philatelic Symposium. 
