Northwest Federation History

— by Jack R. Congrove, Northwest Federation

[Ed. note: This article is the introduction to the history of the Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs and the activities of the Pacific International Philatelic Exhibition. I had originally planned to serialize this report, but that would take too long. So, the entire rich and varied history will be published in an upcoming special edition of The Federated Philatelist.]

Today the Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs incorporates by far the largest operational area of any of the stamp federations in North America. It is the only federation that crosses an international boundary. It has responsibility for philatelic organizations in Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Washington, Alberta, British Columbia, Saskatchewan, and Yukon.

This region encompasses 2.122 million square miles (5.497 million km²). If the Federation were its own country, it would be the world's seventh largest in area.

Throughout its history, a total of 105 different clubs and other organizations have been Federation members, including at least one club from each of the states, provinces, and territory in the Federation area of operations.

The Northwest Federation was established primarily to organize and operate an annual philatelic exhibition that would bring together members of the many philatelic groups in the Pacific Northwest and to advance philately in the region.

The exhibition begun by the organizers was named the Pacific International Philatelic Exhibition (PIPEX). This show initially was open only to members of the Federation and did not accept exhibits or exhibitors from outside. Later this exclusion would be lifted and ultimately PIPEX would become one of the premier philatelic exhibitions in North America and be qualified as one of the few World Series of Philately (WSP) national level stamp shows by the American Philatelic Society. PIPEX was also recognized as a national Canadian show when it was held there.

The seed for what would become the Northwest Federation was planted on 23 May 1934. On that date, delegates from Tacoma, Seattle, Bellingham, Spokane, Yakima, and Everett met at the Gowman Hotel in Seattle to discuss the formation of a proposed Washington Federation. The original idea for such an organization was that of Dr. C. T. Jones of Seattle.

America at that time was still in the process of trying to recover from the Great Depression. Unemployment in the United States was greater than 30 percent, Franklin Roosevelt was beginning the second year of his first term as President, and John Dillinger was robbing banks in the Midwest. Despite all of this, stamp collecting was flourishing and, according to John Apfelbaum,

Newsletter editors, please make sure I am on your distribution list so I can report your news to others in the Federation.



Executive Secretary's Notes

In just a little over a year, I have visited three foreign countries and spent some time looking for stamps. Here are observations and reflections.

In January 2018, I was in Colombia. I met a stamp collector friend and went to a stamp store I have visited before. From what I saw, Colombians are mostly interested in the stamps



mostly interested in the stamps of Colombia, including new issues. What was available were mint stamps, first day covers, a small selection of used stamps and general mail. There were foreign stamps and covers available. I think there is a small, but sincere collector base.

In June 2018, I was in Iceland for the NORDIA stamp show. There were four dealers, two from Iceland. Available were classics and a few FDCs and general mail for Iceland and some for other Scandinavian countries. Still, for what we expect from a stamp show, there was little buying. There was much interest in the exhibits, and most exhibitors were present at the frames to talk about their exhibits. Most surprising to me, however, was a buffet lunch available for all when the show opened. It was set out between the rows of frames.

In January 2019, I was in Peru. I visited two post offices. Both had only two windows open and at one, stamps would not be sold until an hour after I was there. In Lima, the capital, in the passageway leading to the post office (cut through the middle of the block) there were kiosks with many small souvenirs, postcards, stamps, and coins. It was very near the main plaza.

On Sunday, there were also about five vest-pocket dealers who set up at tables. Their selection was almost exclusively Peru. There were mint and used stamps, sets and FDC or special event covers. All were enthusiastic about Peru stamps.

The visits were enjoyable and I picked up a few items. Still, those items were of general interest only. Items for a specialized collection, I am sure, could be available through contact with the local clubs. Several years ago I was able to pick up some very nice postal history covers when I was in Colombia and went a few times to the club house of the Bogota stamp club.

Call for Award Nominations

It is late, but not too late, for member clubs and their members to suggest (nominate) individuals for three Federation awards:

Member Club Service Award: Clubs may honor a member of their group who is important for the organization of their club. The award is a certificate to be handed out at PIPEX in May.

Federation Meritorious Achievement Award: Recipient are honored for having rendered outstanding and distinguished service directly to the Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs and its member organizations. Specific criteria are in the By-laws, Article XIII, Section 2. Nominees need to be made before 10 April in order to allow time for all nominees' information to be distributed to member clubs which vote yes/no. A letter of 100–200 words should accompany each nomination. Nominations can be made by any club in good standing, or any Federation Officer.

Northwest Distinguished Philatelist Award: Recipients are honored for having rendered outstanding and distinguished service to philately in general. Specific criteria are in the By-laws, Article XIII, Section 1. Nominees need to be made before 10 April in order to allow time for all nominees' information to be distributed to member clubs which vote yes/no. A letter of 100–200 words should accompany each nomination. Nominations can be made by any club in good standing, or any Federation Officer.

In addition, there will be an election for three Federation officers at the Annual General Meeting during PIPEX in Portland on Sunday, 12 May. Nominations should also be made by 10 April because absentee ballots will be mailed out prior to the 12 May meeting. Clubs not represented at the meeting will have their absentee ballot counted. The following positions are up for election.

Executive Secretary: The primary function of the Executive Secretary is to oversee the Federation on a day-to-day basis consistent with policies set by the Board of Directors and the Annual General Meeting. It is a three-year term

Directors (2): One Canadian and one United States resident shall be elected each year and shall serve a term of two years. Each Director shall support the operation of the Federation and attend the annual meeting at PIPEX.

"...in fact made its first foray into mainstream America. Led by the H. E. Harris Company, which produced the Captain Tim radio show that promoted philately, Harris offered a wide range of inexpensive packets and albums to introduce people to the hobby. And philately was a great hobby for people with lots of time on their hands and little money. It was cheap, required no monthly fees, and the travel it offered was in the collector's mind. It was informative and educational and inculcated the values of thrift and study, which a fearful and economically distressed population desired. Probably a higher percentage of Americans collected stamps during the 1930s than at any time before or since."

The attendees at the initial meeting began planning to set up this organization and decided to hold a formal meeting the following year at the annual Tacoma Philatelic Society Exhibition.

The Tacoma Philatelic Society had been established in 1918, and was then one of the largest stamp clubs in the Pacific Northwest. They held their annual exhibition on the weekend of 27–28 April-1935: All of the stamp societies in the states of Washington, Oregon, Idaho, and western Montana, plus the province of British Columbia had been invited to send representatives to the organizational meeting held at the show on Saturday, 27 April.

At the meeting, the representatives from the Bellingham Stamp Club, Everett Stamp Club, Inland Empire Stamp Society, Tacoma Philatelic Society, and Washington State Philatelic Society organized the **Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs**. These five societies became the Founding members.

A committee had been appointed to draw up a constitution and by-laws with the object that it be brief, liberal, and flexible to permit ease of operation, and not abrogate any provisions of the constitutions of the member organizations. The delegates at the organizational meeting adopted the draft documents.

Because several clubs in the region were unable to have delegates at the original meeting, the organizers decided to send an invitation to them offering to admit them as Charter members if they accepted the invitation by joining before the end of 1936. The five clubs that accepted this offer were: Bremerton Stamp Society, British Columbia Philatelic Society, Seattle Stamp Society, Vancouver Island Philatelic Society, and Wenatchee Stamp Society.

A meeting was called to be held at the Gowman Hotel in Seattle on 1 September 1935, for the election of officers and to decide where and when the Federation would hold its first exhibition. Harold W. Flansburgh from Bellingham, Washington, was elected President. Frank M. Kellogg of the Tacoma Philatelic Society, who had been serving as the pro tem Secretary, was elected Treasurer.

Upon assuming duties as President, Mr. Flansburgh appointed Winnifred H. Young of the Bellingham Stamp Club as Secretary. The following Directors were named:

- H. E. M. Bradshaw, British Columbia Philatelic Society
- Fred E. Carver, Wenatchee Stamp Society
- G. P. Bainbridge, British Columbia Philatelic Society

Bellingham, Washington was selected to be the host city for the first PIPEX, to take place at the Hotel Bellingham on 30–31 May 1936. Dues were set at five cents per capita within each organization in the Federation.

The next meeting of the delegates of the Federation was called for 22 February 1936, at the Gowman Hotel in Seattle, the site of annual exhibition of the Washington State Philatelic Society. At this meeting, the Seattle Stamp Society, one of the charter members, submitted their resignation from the Federation. This decision was in protest of the policy of the Federation (and amendment to the Constitution) to bar specialty societies from membership. The reason cited for this ban was concern that there would be double representation when persons belonged to both a member club and a specialty society.

It is unclear from the point of view of today why this would have been a concern, but back then, there seems to have been more of an attitude of exclusivity, despite the objectives stated in the By-Laws.

The Constitution established a rather unusual executive organization for the Federation. The initial designated officer positions were President, Secretary, and Treasurer. Following the first exhibition, the office of Vice President was added. After World War II, the offices of First Vice President and Second Vice President were created.

The Constitution dictated that the President be selected from the organization hosting the next PIPEX, to hold that

post until the end of that show. Following the show, the new President would take office and the outgoing President would assume the office of First Vice President. The Second Vice President would be chosen from the club scheduled to host the following year's show. This arrangement was instituted to provide some continuity in the leadership.

Because of the Constitutional requirements, only the Secretary and Treasurer were elected each year. The other officers were appointed based on the show schedule. As a result of this arrangement, the board became very dependent on the Secretary, who tended to hold the position for a long term, to provide leadership continuity and this evolved into the Secretary becoming the leading executive instead of the President.

In recognition of this fact, in 1941, the delegates changed the title of the Secretary office to "Permanent Secretary," and made the arrangement formal. In 1950, at the suggestion of Fred E. Carver, who was serving as the Permanent Secretary, delegates voted to change the title to "Executive Secretary."

SEAPEX 2019 Theme

This year the Seattle Philatelic Exhibition (SEAPEX) will be celebrating the 50th anniversary of the first manned moon landing. The show will be held at the Tukwila Community Center just south of Boeing Field and north of SeaTac Airport on 13–15 September.

SEAPEX is seeking an exhibit on the moon landing subject to display at the show. This exhibit could be entered in competition if the exhibitor desires, or it could be shown as a special non-competitive educational display.

If any members of the Northwest Federation have this astrophilatelic material and if they would be willing to display it at SEAPEX 2019, please contact the editor at the addresses shown on page 2.

If the exhibitor wishes to enter the exhibit in competition, then normal exhibit fees would apply. However, there will be no fees if they want to show it as the non-competitive display.

SEAPEX is also seeking competitive exhibits in both the General and One-Frame classes. The cutoff for entries is 26 July 2019.

This year the show is encouraging the entry of One-Frame exhibits by placing no limit on the total number of single frame entries and allowing individual exhibitors to enter as many as three separate one-frame exhibits.

SEAPEX is a World Series of Philately national-level exhibition. The Grand award winners for both the multiframe and single frame classes are eligible to enter the APS Champion of Champions competition. In addition, there are many other awards that will be presented.

SEAPEX also will be hosting the annual convention of the Scandinavian Collectors Club.

AmeriStamp Expo 2019

On 15–17 February 2019, the American Philatelic Society held its AmeriStamp Expo (ASE) winter show at the Mesa Convention Center in Mesa, Arizona. This year's event was the last winter show that the APS plans to hold. These events have been operating at a deficit for the past several years. This was a joint show in conjunction with ARIPEX.

The ASE has been the venue for the World Series of Philately Single Frame Champion of Champions (CoC) competition. The Single Frame CoC will continue, and hence forward be held in conjunction with a selected WSP show. Starting next year for the next three years, this show will be the St. Louis Stamp Expo.

The US Postal Service and APS held an official First Day of Issue ceremony for the Cactus Flowers stamp booklet. The event took place in the Mesa Convention Center theater starting at 11:00 AM on Friday, 15 February.

William J. Gicker, Acting Director of Stamp Services for the USPS, served as Master of Ceremonies.

Following the Presentation of Colors by the Mesa Police Honor Guard and the singing of the National Anthem by students for Arcadia High School, Scott English, Executive Director of the APS, made opening remarks.

John DiPeri, Operations & Support Manager for the USPS Western Area, dedicated and unveiled the stamp designs with the assistance of the other noted guests. The ten colorful designs are based on actual photographs by Dr. John P. Schaefer.

Following the unveiling, Kenneth Schutz, the Dr. William Huizingh Executive Director of the Desert Botanical Garden, offered remarks on the subjects of the stamp designs including how well the images of the blossoms had been captured. He included a plea for the conservation of these plants, many of which are endangered due to loss of habitat and illegal harvesting.

The final speaker was Dr. John P. Schaefer, the photographer whose designs were used for the stamp images. Dr. Schaefer is a former professor of photography and Presi-

dent Emeritus of the University of Arizona. He and Ansel Adams founded the Center for Creative Photography at the University of Arizona. Additionally, he helped to organize the Tucson Audubon Society and found the Nature Conservancy in Arizona and is the author of three best-selling books on photographic techniques.

Despite all these significant accomplishments, he told the attendees that having his photographs selected for these stamps was the highlight of his career, since these images will travel all around the world and display the beauty of these exceptional plants.

The typically large bourse included 44 dealers, mostly from the western US. The dealers had a good crowd on Friday and the ones I spoke with said they did well. The attendance was disappointing on the other two days.

The ASE specializes in one-frame exhibits, but also has a small quantity of multi-frame exhibits. There were 44 one-frame and 25 multi-frame exhibits for a total of 179 frames in the open competition. Including the CoC and Most Popular Championship brought the total quantity of frames on view to 250.

Several exhibitors from the Northwest Federation entered their exhibits at the show.

Michael Bloom from Portland represented PIPEX in the CoC exhibition with his *Resplendent Quetzals* exhibit. Lisa Foster from Kent, Washington, had her *Great American Eclipse 2017* in the Most Popular championship.



Two Federation members picked up top prizes. Dale E. Forster from the Pacific Northwest Postal History Society won the **General Class Grand** Award and the Postal History Society Award for *Filling a Void–Private Mail Service in the Oregon Country*. Louis Fiset from the Puget Sound Collectors Club won the **Single Frame Reserve Grand** Award for *1871 Commune of Paris Prisoners' Mail*.

Other awards for Federation members: Gold medal for Guatemala's Master Designer/Engraver: Arnoldo Chavarry Arrué, by Michael Bloom; Large Vermeil for Bosnia Herzegovina Tobacco Tax Paid Revenues, by James W. Busse from the Central Oregon Postal Collective; Large Vermeil for Chantecler—A Play in Four Acts by Edmond Rostand, by Anne B. Harris from the Inland Empire Phila-

telic Society; Vermeil for The Great American Eclipse 2017, by Lisa D. Foster from Evergreen Stamp Club; Vermeil for 15th World Jamboree WJ'83 Held in Kananaska, Alberta, by J. Alex Hadden from British Columbia Philatelic Society; Large Silver for Go for the Gold! The Introduction of Women in the Olympic Games, by Laurie Anderson from the Evergreen Stamp Club; and Large Silver for The Grundy Center, Iowa Post Office, by Ralph H. Nafziger from Southern Oregon Philatelic Society.

Doug Weisz from New Orleans, won the **Single Frame CoC** Award for *New Orleans in the Confederate Mail System*.

The **Most Popular CoC** Award went to Greg A Hopkins, Sr. for \$2 Inverted Jenny.

Kristine McIntosh received the **Most Popular** Award in the open competition for *The 3¢ Susan B. Anthony Issue*.

The ASE also holds a competition among teams of five members using the aggregate scores for each exhibit based on the jury score and bonus points for new exhibits and variety of exhibit types. The winning team this year was "Oldies But Goodies" composed of Richard E. Drews, Robert D. Hohertz, Stephen Knapp, Nigel Mohammed, and Dan Undersander.

Arn Philatelic Symposium

Do not miss the 29th John D. Arn Philatelic Symposium that will take place on 6 April 2019, at the Best Western Plus Lake Front Hotel located in Moses Lake, Washington. The Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs supports this event by paying for the rental of the conference assembly rooms.

This gathering of philatelists from throughout the Pacific Northwest is a terrific opportunity to learn about different collecting areas and experiences and to meet other members of the stamp collecting community.

The speakers this year are Myron Molnau from the Inland Empire Philatelic Society, Ina Inklebarger who is a well-known Northwest stamp dealer, Lisa Foster from the Evergreen Stamp Club and Women Exhibitors, and Richard Sola from the Inland Empire Philatelic Society.

In addition to the philatelic presentations, there will be both a live and silent auction as well as some short "clothesline" presentations. A luncheon and dinner are also included.

The cost for participation including lunch is \$36. The cost for registration, lunch, and dinner is \$65.




Launch Cover for AMS-167 and AMS-168

Two wooden minesweepers, AMS-167 and AMS-168, were launched at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard (PSNS) in Bremerton, Washington, on 17 October 1953.

Although launched (the ship's hull was given a number), the AMS-167 was not completed until 11 December 1953. The AMS-168 was completed on 8 January 1954. These were the only two wooden minesweepers assembled by the PSNS of a total of 254 built.

The AMS-167 frame was built with white oak (laminated straight, steam bent to shape) while the AMS-168 frame was of Douglas Fir (laminated to shape). AMS-168 was the first Douglas fir framed ship ever turned out at the PSNS.

The nonmagnetic minesweepers were 144 feet in length, with a 27-foot beam, and had a displacement of 405 tons. Because of their small size, wood rather than steel construction, and slow speed (14 knots) the minesweepers were considered too fragile and slow to operate on the high seas with the fleet and were relegated to costal use.




These minesweepers were built for the Netherlands under the Mutual Defense Assistance Act. The Act was signed by President Truman on 6 October 1949, to provide for the defense and general welfare of the United States by furnishing military assistance to foreign nations.

The AMS-167 was transferred to the Netherlands on 29 December 1954, and placed in service as *Brielle* (M 854). It was reclassified by the U.S. Navy as a Coastal Minesweeper MSC-167 on 7 February 1955. The ship was placed out of service on 21 March 1975, struck from the Naval Register on 13 August 1975, and sold for scrap to Pounds Marine Shipping of Havant, United Kingdom.

The AMS-168 was transferred to the Netherlands on 21 January 1955, and named *Bruinisse* (M 856). It was reclassified by the U.S. Navy as a Coastal Minesweeper MSC-168 on 7 February 1955. The ship was placed out of service on 16 June 1972, struck from the Naval Register on 18 September 1972, and returned to U.S. Navy (on paper only). It was sold for scrap on 17 January 1974, to Pounds Marine Shipping of Havant, United Kingdom.

The launch cover cachet pictures Paul Bunyan, a giant lumberjack in American folklore, standing over the two AMS ships commemorating the launch. The Sagamore Hill stamp (Sc#1023) was issued on 14 September 1953, and pictures a large copper beech tree in front of Theodore Roosevelt's home. Roosevelt, in addition to being President, was previously an Assistant Secretary of the Navy.

Did You Know?

Maps can be deceiving. What appears to be a straight line often is anything but.

Take for example the 49th parallel, which for more than 1,200 miles forms the international border between the U.S. and Canada. Rather than being a straight line, it zigzags among the 912 boundary monuments established by successive teams of surveyors (the last ones in 1872–74). The markers deviate by as much as 575 feet north and 784 feet south of the actual parallel line.

It would be interesting to determine which country has control over more of the other country's theoretical land.

My Experience in the Champion of Champions Competition

If an owner of a multi-frame exhibit has the good fortune to win a Grand award in a World Series of Philately (WSP) show like SEAPEX or PIPEX, s/he is eligible to, and expected to, enter the Champion of Champions (C-of-C) competition at the next American Philatelic Society StampShow. Since there are about 30 WSP shows, there can be as many as 30 exhibits entered into that competition.

I have had the honor of winning a few Grand awards, so Jack Congrove asked me to recount my experience in an article. Jack recently won a Grand award at the National Topical Stamp Show, which qualifies him to enter the Cof-C competition, so we all congratulate him and wish him a great experience at the StampShow this summer.

First, the exhibitor must send his/her entry form for StampShow. At least once, I received an invitation from APS, but in 2017, I did not. If the entry is submitted in time, it is guaranteed acceptance into the show. The entry form is the same as that used for other exhibits, and so is the entry fee. There are a few shows—PIPEX, INDYPEX, and maybe some others—that pay the entry fee for their Grand award winner to enter the C-of-C competition.

At StampShow, the C-of-C entries are mounted together, unpolluted by proximity to less exalted exhibits. I noticed that few visitors to StampShow bothered to look at the C-of-C exhibits. The "lesser" exhibits get much more attention. Why? I dunno! The C-of-C entries get much less attention from the judges, too.

Regular open exhibits receive an informative evaluation sheet, listing point totals and comments in several categories. At the judges' feedback session on Saturday, the open exhibitor can get an oral critique and ask questions, then continue a conference with a judge in front of the exhibit.

C-of-C competitors get none of that. The judges are only asked to choose the champion. They each submit their first choice, and then conversations among the judges determine the winner. If a C-of-C exhibitor asks a judge for feedback, the most likely outcome is a blank look.

At the awards banquet, after all the speeches and other awards, the C-of-C award is the last thing. All the competitors are invited up to the stage, which usually is not quite big enough, so some competitors get to stand behind others. Then the Champion is announced, and all attention focuses on the Champion, while the other competitors disappear back to their seats.

There is a very nice and splashy trophy for the champion. I am not clear what the champion gets to take home. Maybe the big trophy stays with APS. The other competitors are rewarded with "*Prix d'honneur*," which apparently is

French for "also ran" or maybe "booby prize;" my French is rusty. At one show a number of years ago, I believe my "prix d'honneur" came with a nice glass candy dish, but nothing distinguished it from some other candy dish I might have found at a garage sale.

Most of the C-of-C competitors do come in person to the StampShow. As usual, the APS is willing to accept mail-in exhibits and mail them back. I believe my name badge at the StampShow identified me as a C-of-C contestant. That prestige plus \$5.00 could get me a cup of coffee.

Jack asked me, "Are there reasons why an eligible winner would not want to participate?" Well, yes. First is the expense, in time and money, of making the trip to wherever the StampShow will be. And if I were to mail my exhibit instead, there is still the expense of the entry fee plus shipping both directions—and the risk of loss in transit.

Second, I am disappointed not to receive an evaluation of my exhibit. Third is the near certainty that I have zero chance of winning. I have 20th century exhibits. Do you know how long it has been since anything but a 19th century exhibit has won C-of-C? Would you believe **never**?

There is always some stunning exhibit of U.S. Postmaster Provisionals, or German stampless covers of the 1830s, or South Africa something or other. Of course those exhibits earn the Champion prize, and they should. This is why I am excited about the George Brett Competition, which is sort of parallel to the C-of-C, but for exhibits after the 19th century.

Both my exhibits qualified for that competition in 2017. They did not win, but I could feel they had a chance—and one did win the grand award at that show. Which qualified that exhibit again for the C-of-C competition, but I did not send it. Is there a penalty for not sending your exhibit to the C-of-C competition if it is eligible? Not that I know of, but I may find out some day.

Jack also asked whether any benefits of winning the C-of-C reflect back on the show at which the winning exhibit earned the qualifying grand. None that I am aware of. Are there shows that lobby the judges in favor of their grand award winner? Like University athletic departments hyping their Heisman Trophy candidates? It is a charming, but also disconcerting idea. The conspiracy theorist in me points out that if some shows do that, they would not want other shows to know and do it too, so of course I would be unaware!

Winning a Grand award and thereby becoming eligible for the C-of-C competition is a nice honor. I continue to strive for that. Actually participating in the C-of-C is nice too at least once!

Time for a Scavenger Hunt?

The Oregon Stamp Society recently held a scavenger hunt for its program in January 2019. The hunt comprised 40 topics ranging from something easy (postage due stamp, a stamp with a bridge on it, a stamp from a French colony) to rather difficult (a stamp showing five musical instruments being played, a philatelic Zeppelin related item, a stamp with a lighthouse and a bridge on it).

Whilst all that was needed was a stamp or cover of each topic, to be handed in by the meeting on 8 January, a couple of entrants showed items primarily on cover, or on exhibit pages. That evening, member "judges" had a lot of fun reviewing items that were called into question.

Each entrant had some item that was eventually disallowed (a stamp classified as an error, freak or oddity; an occupation stamp; a slogan cancel about an event in Oregon). No one found a stamp with one tree, including flowers, fruit, seeds, roots, branches, trunk, and leaves.

The main prizes were a Penny Black and cash prizes of \$25 and \$10. At the 22 January meeting, the four winning entries with their prizes were displayed in exhibit frames. The winners each gave a short talk about their items and how they went about the hunt.

First prize winner Win Bohme told us that he took it seriously from the start and enlisted the help of other members and even family members. His efforts paid off, as with a top score of 36 he easily won the Penny Black.

Informal prizes were awarded for ingenuity in the choice of item, or how impressive it was. One entrant chose a stamp with a lighthouse and a covered walkway serving as a bridge. Another showed the Alaska Statehood stamp with a musher in the annual Iditarod Trail sled dog race as their entry for a living person on a stamp.

A piece of balloon mail from the Siege of Paris was impressive, as was a whole page of stamps showing the various criteria for living persons to appear on Australian stamps issued since 1997.

Your Federation Officers

[Ed. note: With the Northwest Federation encompassing five U.S. states and four Canadian provinces, and including almost 40 member organizations, it is practically impossible for our membership to meet our Federation leaders, or to know much about them. I am sure all of the officers and Board members would like to meet and to get to know the Federation members, but since this seems an unlikely achievement, I thought it would be useful to provide information about them. So, I have asked each one to provide me some brief biographical information.]

Michael P. Anderson, Canadian Director

Michael was born in 1946, in Hamilton, Ontario. He lived and worked in Ontario (with exception of 1980–84 when he worked in New York City) until May 2014, when he and his wife Sharon moved to British Columbia.

He started collecting "the world" at age nine because of the influence of his aunt; and started to specialize in well centered MNH of Canada at age of 15.

As life happened, he sold collections only to start over; eventually specializing in and exhibiting the "Stamps and Postal History of the Cape of Good Hope."

Michael was an active member in several stamp clubs and organizations in Ontario; including the Grand River Valley Philatelic Association and the Hamilton Stamp Club (Life Member) among others.

In 2008, he began specializing in the stamps and postal history of Hawaii, which he has exhibited in Rochester, New York, and will exhibit at PIPEX 2019.

He is a member of British Columbia Philatelic Society, Fraser Valley Stamp Club, and Peace Arch Stamp Club.

He has been a frequent contributor to *The Federated Philatelist*.

Dr. Darin P. Cherniwchan, Canadian Director

Darin was raised in Coquitlam, British Columbia. He joined the Centennial Junior Stamp Club as a nine-year old. He started collecting using the H.E. Harris U.S. Album and the Ambassador Album with CTO approvals from the Littleton Stamp Company.

His collection of worldwide is much like it was when he was young, but his passion now is the small queens of Canada 1c, 2c,, and 3c for fancy cancels, varieties, and reentries. He is interested in postal history of this era as well.

He is preparing an extensive exhibit on the 2c small queen from much of the original material Dr. George Dewey from Montreal had in the 1950s.

Dr. Cherniwchan is a member of the Fraser Valley Philatelic Club and a Fellow of the College of Family Physicians of Canada.

Lawrence R. Crain, Executive Secretary

Larry was a Peace Corps volunteer in Colombia in 1965–67. He is a retired high school teacher: Spanish mostly, and English, math, and world cultures. He is divorced with two children and five grandchildren.

He is a member of the Southern Oregon Philatelic Society, APS, ATA, AAPE, and other philatelic organizations.

He collects used from countries: US, Colombia, Iceland, Mozambique Co. and Nyassa, Tanna Tuva, New Zealand, and a few eclectic series from various countries. He also collects the following topics: New World archeology, astronomy (not space), stamp shapes, "numbers," baseball, Feb. 29, "history," geysers, Easter Island, and fun covers.

He exhibits both locally and nationally with one-frame and multi-frame exhibits.

He is past-President of Rogue Valley Soccer Club, Council of Oregon Foreign Language Teachers, Southern Oregon Philatelic Society, and current President of the Council of Northern California Philatelic Societies.

Larry received the Northwest Distinguished Philatelist Award in 2017.

J. Alex Hadden, Treasurer

Alex was born and raised in Ottawa, Ontario, and first started collecting stamps soon after he joined the Wolf Cubs in order to earn the Collectors Badge. He started collecting mainly Canada, but on a visit to the World Scout Bureau (located in Ottawa at the time), he met General Spry who got him interested in Scout stamps.

Over the years the Scout collection became his prime focus. Two major exhibits he has shown recently were the Canadian Scout and Guide Cancellations and the 1983 World Jamboree at Kananaskis, Alberta, (the latter won Large Vermeil at PIPEX 2017). He has exhibited at various shows in Canada and the U.S. as well as EuroScout in the UK.

Alex is a member of the BC Philatelic Society, Scouts on Stamps Society International (SOSSI), Scout and Guide Stamp Club, Royal Philatelic Society of Canada, and British North America Philatelic Society.

He is currently Treasurer of both SOSSI and the Northwest Federation of Stamp Clubs. He is also active in Scouting and is currently Area Commissioner for Richmond. Alex received the Federation Meritorious Achievement Award in 2012.

Dr. James J. Hirstein, U.S. Director

Jim grew up in central Illinois and started collecting stamps, mostly used U.S., when he was in high school in 1961. There was an article in the local paper about how to

order first day covers. He started buying and organizing mixtures. He loved finding new stamps, then digging to learn their stories: why were there different perforations? why watermarks? why subtle design changes?

His philatelic life completely changed in 1975, when he was a graduate student at the University of Georgia. A friend asked him to help sell her grandfather's stamp collection. It included three envelopes packed with precancels. He had no idea what these were, so he found the Precancel Stamp Society (PSS) and asked for help.

They were so helpful that he joined PSS and has been a precancel collector now for more than 40 years, with particular interest in Georgia and later Montana (after moving there in 1989). Around 1980, a friend introduced him to dated precancels and the many stories there. He developed a keen interest in Sears-Roebuck and their use of precancels in the mail order business.

Jim served as PSS Secretary for 19 years and currently serves as Vice President. He has worked on many catalog committees, written journal articles, and given talks. Because many of the U.S. transportation coils were precanceled, his U.S. collection expanded to include plate number coils.

He joined and found a great deal of help in the Plate Number Coil Collectors Club. So his interests continue to grow. New finds often send him in a new direction. He always appreciates the collectors and writers of the past who saved the stamps and stories that we can study today.

He has been a member and often an officer in stamp clubs wherever he lived—Georgia, Illinois, and now Montana. Jim received the Northwest Distinguished Philatelist Award in 2012.

Eric R. Knapp, Chairman of the Board

Eric was born in Anchorage, Alaska. He is a lifelong Alaskan. He was one year old when the 1964 Good Friday earthquake struck. He showed his collecting instincts even then by continuing to hold on to the cookie he was holding when the quake began. He graduated from Robert Service High School in Anchorage and then from the University of Alaska Anchorage.

He has been a stamp collector since he was nine years old. His grandmother was a stamp and coin collector. She had other grandchildren who went into Scouting and she knew about the Stamp Collecting and Coin Collecting merit badges. She got Eric started and he has not stopped. He did earn both merit badges. Today he dabbles in coins, but stamps are what grabbed his imagination.

Eric collects United States, the Baltic States, and dabbles in Canada. He also collects Alaska Postal History, Scouts on Stamps, and the occasional other thing that grabs his attention. He has exhibited at the local and national level. Most of his exhibiting has been related to the study of World War II in Alaska, but he is developing other exhibits.

He has been a member of the Anchorage Philatelic Society since he was a junior, and has held several offices in the club. He is currently the Secretary. He is a member of the Alaska Collectors' Club and has held several offices. He is currently the Secretary/Treasurer.

He is a member of the American Philatelic Society, the American Topical Association, Scouts on Stamps Society International, the Military Postal History Society, American Society of Polar Philatelists, and several other clubs. Eric received the Member Club Service Award in 2015, and the Northwest Distinguished Philatelist Award in 2016.

Dr. George W. Struble, U.S. Director

George was born in Pennsylvania while Herbert Hoover was running for reelection. He started collecting stamps at around age nine, and like many of us, was rather naïve about it for many years. He homed in on several countries, then on just Switzerland, and finally on Swiss airmail. He has shown his exhibits, *Development of Swiss Airmail up to 1939* and *SCADTA Mail to and from Switzerland*, many times. Both have won Grand Awards, and both recently received Gold awards at the highest level national show in Switzerland.

George was a professor of computer science at the University of Oregon and Willamette University; he started teaching computing in 1958, and retired in 1997. In addition to philately, he plays cello regularly in chamber music ensembles; is president of *Camerata Musica*, the chamber music organization of the mid-Willamette Valley; and leads hikes for the Chemeketans, the outdoor club in Salem. He and his wife Elsa met in the Swarthmore College orchestra and have been married 63 years. They have three children, all of whom have put aside their stamp collections.

His current philatelic service includes editing *TELL*, the journal of the American Helvetia Philatelic Society; Exhibits Chair for PIPEX; organizer of the Willamette Valley Stamp Exhibition, the two-day-two-city show in Eugene and Salem; and webmaster of the Salem Stamp Society.

George has also written philatelic articles, most recently in the *Philatelic Exhibitor*. He is something of a missionary about philatelic exhibiting. He says it has provided focus for his collecting, and deepened his interest and knowledge of philately, and he believes everyone should share the same benefits. George received the Northwest Distinguished Philatelist Award in 2017.

Sinclair Mills, British Columbia

Sinclair Mills is a small farming community located on the north bank of the Fraser River between McGregor and Longworth in the Prince George district of British Columbia. Its post office was established on 15 May 1926, in the business office of the local lumber mill with Henry George Newman as postmaster.

Newman resigned as postmaster in October 1928, and it was not until August of the following year, that John Fraser Drummond took over the position. Drummond held the job until his death in July 1934.

Between January 1935 and September 1941, the postmaster was William Bell Irving. Irving resigned and Archie McLeod was appointed to the position in December 1941, and held it until his death on 8 March 1952. The following day, the post office moved to a local store and Ivan Emil Anderson took over as acting postmaster. He was appointed to the permanent position in December, which he held until resigning in August 1959.

A succession of postmasters followed and the post office today occupies a lone building on Upper Fraser Road. Currently, there are about 50 people living in the quiet rural community and they rely on logging, trapping, hunting, mixed farming, and tourism for their livelihoods.

The town site was noted for the quality of its worker housing facilities, saw mills and the fact that it was a station on the Canadian National Railway. It is currently serviced by Via Rail. The nearest town of any size is Prince George, about 60 miles to the west.

According to a 1 September 2016 article by Kathy Nadalin in the *Prince George Citizen*, the town site of Sinclair

Mills was named after F.N. Sinclair, a railroad construction engineer. All the surrounding small sawmills closed down in 1966 when the big companies bought up all the timber rights. There are no longer any industries and no employment in the area other than outfitting tours.

The illustrated cover was sent from Sinclair Mills on 3 April 1930, by a sixteen year old boy named William R. Sawkins to Norman F. Grant, another sixteen year old, living in Newburyport, Massachusetts. There is an apparent receiving mark dated 6 April 1930, on the front in the lower left-hand corner.

The cover is franked with a 2c King George V definitive (Sc#164) that had recently been released. It is postmarked with a broken circle Sinclair Mills date stamp and the stamp is cancelled with a circular horizontal unbroken bar obliterator.

Perhaps some member of the Pacific Northwest Postal History Society can describe the route this letter would have taken to get from Sinclair Mills to Massachusetts. I suspect several railway lines were involved.

William Robert Sawkins was born on 12 March 1914, in Swan River, Manitoba. He was the oldest of six children. His family moved to British Columbia about four years prior to this letter, presumably for his father to work in the timber industry there.

In his letter, he mentions that he left public school in July of the previous year and did not go to high school because he would have had to go to Prince George. It was typical at the time not only in Canada, but also in the US that few students in rural areas were able to attend high school.

He also writes that he was considering taking a correspondence course to continue his education.

William went into the timber industry working as a mill foreman. He married Bernice Turner in about 1926, and they had five children. He died in Abbotsford on 20 February 2009, at age 95.

Norman Francis Grant was born in Newburyport, Massachusetts on 5 June 1913, the second oldest of five children. His father was Canadian and worked as a farmer.

As a young man, Norman was involved with the Pilgrim Fellowship, a youth organization headquartered in Boston and under the advice and guidance of the Congregational Education Society of the Congregational Church. However, I have been unable to find out any more information about him.

The enclosed letter from Sawkins was in response to a letter he had just received from Grant. One wonders how these two young men from opposite sides of the continent became acquainted.

In his letter, Sawkins wrote about his life on the farm. He raised chickens for the market and also delivered papers for four different newspapers. He was looking forward to starting to work at the local sawmill that month.

He also mentioned some things he liked to do for recreation including fishing and ice skating on the frozen river.

In his letter, he writes, "I do not collect coins nor stamps. I once started but gave it up."

This is just a simple letter of little consequence, but it does give us a glimpse of the way life was in rural Canada almost 90 years ago.

Stewart's Bluing

— by Jack R. Congrove, Puget Sound Collectors' Club

On 2 November 1939, the US Post Office Department issued a stamp to commemorate the 50th anniversary of statehood for four western states that had entered the Union in 1889. The location and date of the official first day of issue was staggered in each affected state based on its date of entrance into the Union.

The stamp was released in Bismarck, North Dakota, and Pierre, South Dakota, on 2 November. The next issue date was in Helena, Montana, on 8 November. And the final issue date was in Olympia, Washington, on 11 November.




Statehood Anniversary USA, 1939, Sc#858

This is the only US issue so far to celebrate the anniversary of more than one state.

It was not long before someone was making fun of the design of the "wash line" stamp.

Allyn Ford of Minneapolis was a collector who also was the owner of a company that manufactured "Mrs. Stewart's Bluing." MSB is a brand of liquid fabric bluing agent that whitens fabrics with a proprietary blue pigment, primarily made of a colloid of "Prussian blue" and water. Its only official use is for whitening fabrics. However, there have been many reports of customers finding interesting new ways to use it.





Ford produced a cinderella souvenir sheet that modified the stamp design to show the states hanging down from the 49th parallel like clothes on Monday's wash line.

He produced several versions using this concept. The first was a huge label measuring 8½×3 inches with a top mar-

ginal inscription "Mrs. Stewart gets a stamp." This item was only given to his friends and associates.

Later in 1939, he produced a perforated sheet of four with top and bottom marginal inscriptions and a label at right. Note that he also changed the date from the original 1889 to 1883, which was the year that MSB was first sold.



Next Ford got the idea to make a pun on the fact that Monday was wash day throughout the US. So he adjusted the state abbreviations for Washington and Montana to "WASH MON."

Needless to say, these satirical labels proved very popular. The following year during the centenary of the Penny Black, Ford had the idea of commemorating a group of "Famous Queens," including Victoria, Eve (Queen of Eden), the Queen of Hearts, and of course, Mrs. Stewart.


