

A Well-Deserved Honor for Saxophonist André Leroux

"For over 40 years, André Leroux has earned his place among the most essential saxophonists on the Quebec music scene, having worked as a sideman with many of the province's leading artists. But it is at the helm of his own project that he was recognized on March 30th with the Juno Award for Jazz Album of the Year (Solo) for his record Montreal Jazz Series 1 (Échanges synaptiques).

Though long associated with Montreal's jazz scene, André Leroux grew up in the Vallée-du-Richelieu region, spending several years in Otterburn Park and attending Ozias-Leduc High School, where he played his very first notes on the tenor saxophone—his instrument of choice. He still remembers teachers like Carmen Lafontaine and Marcel St-Maurice, who quickly spotted his musical talent. In his early years, he was very active locally, playing during masses in Mont-Saint-Hilaire and performing with the Saint-Hyacinthe Philharmonic Orchestra. As a teenager, Leroux recalls spending countless hours jamming to Breakfast in America by Supertramp, quickly developing a passion for improvisation.

According to Leroux, his musical gift comes directly from his father, an engineer by profession, but also a one-man band equally talented on the piano and harmonica. "But he wanted me to get a 'real job,' so I enrolled in Pure Sciences at Cégep de Saint-Hyacinthe. Eventually, my musician friends convinced me to switch and study music instead, at Cégep de Saint-Laurent!" That's where he met Pierre Tremblay, who "made him fall in love with classical saxophone" and helped him become equally comfortable playing both classical music and in a big band. He later pursued classical studies at the Université de Montréal, but never completed his degree, leaving school to play music on Caribbean cruise ships and later with Cirque du Soleil."

"Since then, André Leroux's name has been everywhere. He founded the saxophone quartet Quasar 30 years ago and has played in groups like Michel Cusson's Wild Unit, Vic Vogel's big band, and the François Bourassa Quartet (with whom he won a Juno Award in 2002), to name just a few. "I've always been comfortable being a chameleon, able to blend in pretty easily with just about any artist. One of my strengths is sight-reading, so I can step in at the last minute and no one will even notice," says the saxophonist, who considers himself better as a sideman than a bandleader, a title he never felt the need to claim. That hasn't stopped him from accepting invitations to record a few albums under his own name, the first of which came out in 2009.

Carte blanche

That's exactly what happened with Échanges Synaptiques, when his friend Benoît Gagné approached him with the idea of creating a series of albums featuring his favorite jazz musicians on his new label. "He gave me total creative freedom, and that gave me the chance to fulfill a fantasy of mine: to play with the rhythm section that used to accompany Steve Grossman. The first half of the album was a tribute to John Coltrane and to Grossman—the musician who came closest to Coltrane that I've ever heard live. The second half, with other musicians, gave me space to explore different grooves." The result was an hour-long album with two very distinct energies—even presenting a few technical challenges when recording the B-side.

"I had no expectations for this record, but I was surprised by the positive reviews when it came out. The Juno was a total surprise, I couldn't even attend the ceremony to accept it in person!" He humbly adds that there are countless incredibly talented musicians all over the world, many of whom will never receive the recognition they deserve."

"André Leroux has received a flood of congratulations since the announcement, but he doesn't believe the award will drastically change his career. "I'm 61 years old. If I were still 35, it might be a different story! For me, life goes on, even if I do consider myself lucky to have received this award. Of course, it could help when applying for grants for future projects, for example."

Like many other musicians, André Leroux acknowledges that making a living doesn't come from recording albums, but rather from paid live performances and, especially, teaching, sharing his passion and knowledge with the next generation. "Jazz is a beautiful hobby," he says with a laugh. After a series of particularly busy months working on various projects, he admits he's looking forward to the summer, especially for some time on the golf course.

But before that, he still has a few shows ahead, including two performances at the Montreal International Jazz Festival, on June 30 with his own project, and July 5 with François Bourassa. Closer to home, André Leroux will be performing with Joe Sullivan's big band, as part of the Cabaret jazz d'Yvan Belleau, held at the Centre culturel et communautaire de la Pointe-Valaine on May 1st. "I never thought I'd be back playing in Otterburn Park! I'll probably keep a low profile during the show... unless I'm given the green light," he concludes, a smile in his voice."




The French-Canadian Connection

Language, politics and economics have historically divided the province of Quebec from the rest of Canada. Quebecois jazz has been somewhat isolated as well, with few natives besides Oscar Peterson and Paul Bley breaking through to global audiences. That hasn't stopped several tranches of musicians from building and sustaining a strong community.

Saxophonist André Leroux is a prime example of a world-class musician who has developed a singular voice and maintained a busy career without becoming as well-known as American peers like Greg Osby. The 11 pieces on Montreal Jazz Series Vol. 1: Échanges Synaptiques (Disques BG; ****/2 66:21) present Leroux with two distinct quartets — one with pianist Fred Henke, bassist Frédéric Alarie and drummer André White: the other with Francois Bourassa, Rémi-Jean Leblanc, and John Hollenbeck in the same positions — ably showcasing some of the best players in Quebec. Fluent in the language of Coltrane, Rollins and Shorter, 62-year-old Leroux leads both bands through a program that slides easily between the surging aggression of Steve Grossman's "Take The D Train" and Leblanc's "Up And Up," which is reminiscent of early Weather Report. The two quartets match up well, although the expressive work of Alarie gives an edge of electric urgency to the batch of performances he's on.

Leroux returns as one of six musicians on bassist Jean Cyr's Montreal Jazz Series Vol. 2: Car tu existes (Disques BG; ★★★1/2 39:47) but the musical setting couldn't be more different. The 67-year-old leader is best known for long stints with popular Quebecois musicians like the late Bob Walsh and Stephen Faulkner. but Car tu existes gives him an opportunity to assemble his own program. As experienced as these players are, the brief mixed bag of tunes doesn't give them many opportunities to shine. Consequently, the results sound like a very skilled band picking up some wedding gig money: a 1930s-style dance number, a tango showcase for trumpeter Benoit Gagné, a leader's showcase on "Georgia On My Mind" and a rousing, funky closer that echoes Blood, Sweat & Tears. It might make for a fun night on the dance floor, it's less engaging for dedicated listening.

While Jean Cyr's sextet sounds like a skilled band-for-hire — with a dash of breezy swing and a soupçon of late-career Miles Davis, the quartet Straight Ahead sounds like its members might be competing against a top-flight college music unit for DB's Student Music Awards. That's not a knock on the skills of trombonist Muhammad Abdul Al-Khabyyr, pianist Luc Beaugrand, bassist Mathieu McConnell-Enright and drummer Martin Auguste, but Montreal Jazz Series Vol. 3: Gentle Soul (Disgues BG; ★★★



84:20) covers so much territory, with so much facility, that the band sounds overly performative. Relentlessly upbeat, chestnuts like "Moon River," "All The Things You Are" and "What A Wonderful World" seem superfluous on an album this long and provide pretty arid soil for expressive improvisation.

On their seventh album, bassist Alain Bédard's Auguste Quartet rolls as confidently as Max Verstappen at the Montreal Grand Prix. With fellow veteran Michel Lambert on drums and younger players Marie Fatima Rudolf and Mario Allard on piano and reeds respectively, Particules sonores (Effendi; *** 55:08) exhibits a broad range of approaches: lively interaction on "Compte-Rendu III," energetic outside blowing on "A Goose Story" and a more relaxed feel on "II Cappello de mia Sorello." On each of these, Allard demonstrates his expansive vocabulary on several members of the reed family. If Particules sonores has an overarching weakness. it's the lack of unpredictable solo placement.

A mashup of Canadian franco- and anglophones, Haitians, Africans and people of other ethnicities, Montreal's creative music scene has been a hot house for numerous pan-stylistic bands. Guitarist Simon Angell, a protégé of Marc Ribot, and drummer Tommy Crane have worked extensively in rock and jazz. Now, on Angell & Crane (For The Living And The Dead: *** 41:36) the two have distilled 40 hours of wide-ranging improvisation into a 40-minute swirl of socially oriented pieces. The work slides from the intense to the ethereal and back with seamless flow — even with extremes like the idyllic blend of Angell's acoustic guitar and Charlotte Greve's flute and the hardcore thrust of "Hesa Fredrik," with Sarah Rossy's out vocals.

Joe Alterman/ **Houston Person** Brisket For Breakfast JOE ALTERMAN MUSIC

"The Savannah Music Festival ... has become a magnet for those of us who like to have our listening borders stretched," one leading journal noted, and with the appearance of tenor saxophonist Houston Person and pianist Joe Alterman in the 2023 lineup, attendees had their borders stretched and their emotions lifted higher than a Georgia pine. Fortunately, Person and Alterman had their moments recorded and it was a combustive connection between them and an enthusiatic audience. The high point occurred on "Since I Fell for You," and Person's husky, robust horn seemed to summon those who knew the lyrics to sing along with him.

Hearing the roar of the crowd for the quartet, including Kevin Smith on bass and drummer Justin Chesarek, suggests that several moments of the date were done outdoors, and that made a lot of sense given the room needed for the group's explosive sound. And in keeping with the album's title Brisket for Breakfast, there are some tasty licks from Chesarek on "Only Trust Your Heart."

Also, there is space where the four of them tone things down, expressing themselves intimately as they did on "Namely You," though here and elsewhere it is hard for Alterman to contain his spirited romps on the keyboard, particularly his way of getting behind Person and pushing his imaginative thunder. Invariably, listening to Person's tuneful iterations of memories of him with Etta Jones surface, and on "The Second Time Around," Alterman takes her place, answering Person's plea for another chance.



The Power of the Duo

JAN. 24, 2025 — **PUTTING THE WORD** "Fire!" on the cover of this issue may seem like an odd choice, given that the L.A. fires have caused so much dispair on the West Coast — even within our jazz community, as writer Gary Fukushima documents on page 13.

Maybe subliminally, it was a way to take back the word for the good: a campfire, sitting by the fireplace on a cold winter's day. Or maybe it's just the best way to describe the work of clarinetist Anat Cohen, an artist who exudes joy, the best this music has to offer and a fiery performance style that is downright infectious.

It's been fun to watch her rise to the top of the jazz world, building a true community to make her art glow — from her brothers Avishai and Yuval, who with Anat constitute the amazing 3 Cohens; to the south-of-the-border leanings of Quartetinho; to the Anat Cohen Tentet, an ambitious, driving large ensemble.

With all of it, Cohen seems to form and develop with groups that are mini families, each with its own particular flavor, each feeding a different part of her artistic spirit. That, of course, is especially true when she's playing with her brothers in the 3 Cohens.

But then there's the wonderful bond she has with Oded Lev-Ari, one of the most talented arrangers and composers on the scene today.

In speaking with Ashley Kahn, who wrote this month's cover article on Anat (see page 26), I suggested that Lev-Ari is the Billy Strayhorn to Anat Cohen's Ellington. But he corrected me, suggesting it might be more like he's the Gil Evans to Anat's Miles.

Aside from the fact that both artists would likely brush aside comparisons to those historic jazz partnerships, there's no doubt that their

success comes in no small measure from the work that they've done together.

Last summer, this writer had an opportunity to see them at the International Society of Jazz Arrangers & Composers Symposium at Vanderbilt University in Nashville. Speaking onstage, the two offered deep answers to interesting questions, joked, finished each other's sentences — the bond was undeniable.

And their connection goes beyond the music. When they formed Anzic Records 20 years ago to put out Anat's first record, *Place & Time*, it was Lev-Ari who first called DownBeat to figure out how the whole editorial and advertising world worked. At that time, we figured he was a business manager and had no idea he was such a gifted arranger and composer. He was the dude placing ads. We've come to recognize the entirety of his role in Anat's universe, and we hope to bring his name to an even wider audience.

Speaking of families, and circling back to the L.A. fires, everyone at DownBeat wishes to express our love and sympathy for those whose houses and studios perished during those horrific few weeks in January. As our article reports, John Clayton, Bennie Maupin, Hailey Niswanger and so many others lost their family homes, many more were displaced for days or weeks, and even more simply lived in a state of fear for their own livelihoods and well-being.

This note is being written from The NAMM Show, safely down the road in Anaheim, where the convention is thriving, but many attendees and exhibitors have those artists on their minds. The organization, which embodies the global musical products industry, is helping the relief effort. Go to namm.com to find out more.

JAZZ AROUND TOWN - BY SCOTT YANOW The Montreal Jazz Series

"Jazz has been an international music ever since recordings became widely available in the early 1920s. Canada has long had a rich if underrated jazz scene. BG Records, in the first three releases in their Montreal Jazz Series (available as Lps), documents some of the many talents who are active in Montreal today.

The most intriguing of these albums is André Leroux's Echanges Synaptiques. The tenor and soprano-saxophonist is featured with two different rhythm sections on a pair of sessions. The first three selections have him displaying the influence of John Coltrane circa 1961 in a group with pianist Fred Henke (who sometimes sounds very close to that of early McCoy Tyner), bassist Frédéric Alaire, and drummer André K. White. They perform an uptempo "The Night Has A Thousand Eyes," the title cut (a ballad by Alaire), and Steve Grossman's "Take The D Train" which is highlighted by Leroux's tenor playing over the closing vamp.

The four originals with pianist Francois Bourassa, bassist Rémi-Jean Leblanc and the notable drummer John Hollenbeck are quite a bit different. The Coltrane influence is dropped, the music is much freer (with "E.M." is quite mystical) and Leroux sounds much more original. The music often swings (particularly the closing "Up and Up") but is much more unpredictable and adventurous."

"When Disques BG's Benoit Gagné offered me a listen to the tempting email that arrived, "A New Exploration of Quebec Jazz," I was all ears. I plopped it into my to-do list. Enter, Échanges Synaptiques', "The Night Has a Thousand Eyes'," ethereal meditative deep sonorous droning and André Leroux's saxophone glides towards the stars.

The Montreal Jazz Series' Vol.1 shows leader Leroux leading two commanding quartets. Leroux's vibrant colorful and playful saxophone leads the first quartet band with smoking keys sizzling from the ivories from none other than pianist Fred Henke. This impresses. Steaming rhythm section flow of bassist Frédéric Alarie and drummer André White with Leroux is a true pleasure to listen to.

The second quartet featuring André Leroux's supportive band interplay of François Bourassa, piano, Remi-Jean Leblanc, bass, and the one and only John Hollenbeck on drums, does not disappoint and is a not-to-miss powerhouse of soulful improvisation."

Sorties Jazznights - BY CHRISTOPHE RODRIGUEZ André Leroux - Échanges Synaptiques

"On Wednesday, October 23, BG Records launched, under the title Montreal Jazz Series, three vinyl and digital albums reflecting the vitality of jazz in Montreal and Quebec. Alongside bassist Jean Cyr and Straight Ahead led by trombonist Muhammad Abdul-Al Kabyyr, we also found the powerful tenor saxophonist André Leroux with Échanges Synaptiques (2024).

For this all-star event, our friend Leroux didn't hold back. On Side A of the vinyl, he was joined by pianist Fred Henke, bassist Frédéric Alarie, and drummer André White. On Side B, he reunited with his longtime collaborator, pianist François Bourassa, bassist Rémi-Jean LeBlanc, and drummer John Hollenbeck."

Side A – Échanges Synaptiques

"It's safe to say this is a bold new release with Coltrane-esque accents, opening with a beautiful tribute to legendary tenor saxophonist Sonny Rollins, via the track Night Has a Thousand Eyes, which once served as the theme for Bernard Pivot's cult TV show Bouillon de culture. Without adhering to the tune's typical slow tempo, Leroux delivers a virtuosic argument with a warm, sometimes biting tone, in harmony with his bandmates who skillfully toss ideas back his way.

Échanges Synaptiques, composed by bassist Frédéric Alarie, is a gorgeous and enchanting ballad that gives the saxophonist another chance to showcase his talents on soprano sax. Then comes Take The D Train, paired with Katonah by the eminent horn player Steve Grossman, a burst of dynamic energy. The result is jazz with just the right touch of tartness: explosive, with each musician taking their turn in the spotlight. We could even say this performance is representative of André Leroux's musical style, having fully mastered the codes of this timeless genre. Side A concludes with Virgo, a sublime ballad delivered by a soprano saxophonist whose sound strongly evokes the world of Bill Evans, especially when we listen to Rémi-Jean LeBlanc's bass playing, which closely resembles the tone of Eddie Gomez."

"Side B plunges us into a completely different universe, much more experimental. John Hollenbeck's piece Forced Empathy is defined by short phrases wrapped in a fractal-like atmosphere. It feels as though André Leroux has reunited with his old companions from the Quasar ensemble. Admittedly, it takes a trained ear! With Last Minutes by pianist François Bourassa, we remain in a similar vein. A lunar "blue note," off-center, plays with timing and harmony, driven by a drummer, let's say, possessed!

We continue with the metaphorical and funky Up and Up, where François Bourassa takes over the synthesizer. This track is truly delightful, evoking the groovy vibe of the 1970s, reminiscent of John Patton and Larry Young. This familiar ground for passionate jazz lovers is another great discovery. When Rémi-Jean LeBlanc's double bass briefly transforms into a kora, the piece Last Minute becomes a mystical experience for everyone. All it takes is to perceive the blue note from truly new perspectives, and you'll get chills."


