This November is a season of endings and beginnings. We are ending our stewardship season and the season of Pentecost and beginning the season of Advent.

More Than Enough is the theme of our stewardship season this year. During this time, we have listened to sermons, read weekly meditations, and prayed over our pledge cards - committing our labor to the continued work of the church. Through your contribution, you are first and foremost giving thanks to God for all you have received and offering a portion of it back to God through the Church in gratitude. You are also saying that you believe in the mission and ministry of St. Francis. For these gifts, we are grateful. Remember that even though the season may be over, giving is year-round.

The season of Pentecost is a long season and is sometimes referred to as 'Ordinary' time because the weeks after Pentecost are numbered. Remember - Pentecost is the day we celebrated the Holy Spirit being poured upon the Apostles. This anointing was for the Apostles to continue Jesus' work and spread the Good News to the world. Like the summer season, the season of

Pentecost is associated with growth, and ends on the Last Day of Pentecost, also known as Christ the King Sunday. This year the Last Day of Pentecost falls on November 20th.

The Sunday following the Last Day of Pentecost we begin a new liturgical year with the First Sunday of Advent. The First Sunday of Advent falls on November 27th this year. There are four Sundays in the Advent season. We concentrate on the Gospel of Matthew, with 2023 being year "A" of three -year liturgical cycle. Advent is a time in our world were the days get shorter and we head towards Christmas. It is a time when we anticipate the coming of Jesus. We use an Advent wreath in the church to mark off the weeks, lighting one more each Sunday until, on Christmas Eve, we light the center Christ candle.

In these endings and beginnings, we have the end of one liturgical cycle and the beginning of another. We move from seeing what God has provided through the people and resources to applying those gifts to further the Kingdom on earth. We end a season of growth and begin a season of anticipation, a season of Emanuel, of God with us.

#### AS YOU, I AM A BELOVED CHILD OF THE MOST HIGH GOD!

Dear St. Francis, Tyler,

When I was invited to write a message to introduce myself, I thought this an honor and a simple enough task. Wait. An honor, yes. Simple, no!

As a Postulant for Bi-vocational Priesthood in the Episcopal Diocese of Texas, I am a senior at the Iona School for Ministry in Navasota, Texas, based at Camp Allen, near Houston. Who I am now bears little resemblance to who I used to be, though it is at the core of the Lord's calling now. Christ Church, Tyler, is my beloved sending church and you are my beloved interning church this year!

This is who I was. Raised in Dallas, my parents moved to East Texas after I graduated from high school. Leaving for the University of Texas at Austin, then to Pratt Institute, NY, to study architecture, I had the great opportunity to study in Rome and at New College, Oxford. Since the age of 5, I kept a diary, drew buildings, and loved books. Through a passion for art, architecture, history, and literature, I knew that I was right where God would have me. For twenty years, I lived in NYC, Oxford, and Italy, 1981-2001. Becoming sick with an auto immune illness, I would need to stop working for a time. Traveling to Europe, especially Italy whenever possible, I began the journey of writing *THE ECOLOGY OF ARCHITECTURE*. I rested, healed, and chaired a Board of Directors. The book became a textbook at Harvard, University of Texas, and for most American universities with a curriculum on Sustainability. I went on to lecture and consult for the City and State of New York, the Cooper Hewitt Smithsonian Museum of Design, the American Institute of Architects to name a few. Getting engaged, we moved to Maryland. I landed positions with the US Green Building Council and the Governor of Maryland right before 9/11 happened. Communication shut down immediately in NYC and Washington, DC. Many people I knew died in the Twin Towers and the Pentagon.

Everything ceased. The government, the funding, the jobs, the engagement. Instead of moving mother to the East Coast which felt so dangerous then, I moved back to Texas. The story of Ruth had much influence on that decision. Who I used to be was centered on bricks and mortar, adventure, accomplishment. The years I spent helping my mother are a testimony to God's revealing the truly important parts of life. Caring for her, hearing stories I never knew. These days, God shows me successes disguised as blessings!

God changed me into who I am and will mold us into who we are to become. God has called me to teach, to write, to priesthood. Being a student in the priesthood is a liminal, threshold, kind of space. I continue to be molded, more than I could have imagined. The pandemic added difficult challenges. This year I get to be with you all, to serve with Fr. Mitch as your intern, to learn what God will reveal, to make a difference as God would have it. Not bricks and mortar, but hearts, minds, and souls. To see a great clarity of the Lord, now and then, with deep gratitude.

I hope you'll write to me if you like, I'd love to know who YOU are!
