

The Anglican Communion.

We know St. Francis is a part of the Episcopal Diocese of Texas, and that the Episcopal Diocese of Texas is a part of the Episcopal Church, and that the Episcopal Church is a part of the Anglican Communion. What is the Anglican Communion? The

Anglican Communion, which is made up of 41 Provinces (plus 5 extra-provincial areas) and over 85 million people, is the third largest Christian communion following the Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox churches. It was founded in 1867 in London.

What is it that keeps such a large organization as the Anglican Communion together? There are a few things such as fundamental beliefs and the Instruments of Communion.

Now, as you may be aware, there is a broadness to the beliefs within the Episcopal Church as there is a broadness of beliefs throughout the Anglican Communion. This broadness is tempered by a resolution known as the Chicago-Lambeth Quadrilateral set out in 1886 and in the Lambeth Conference as resolved in 1888. This resolution pushes forward the idea of coming together rather than dividing:

That, in the opinion of this Conference, the following Articles supply a basis on which approach may be by God's blessing made

towards Home Reunion:

1. The Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments, as "containing all things necessary to salvation." and as being the rule and ultimate standard of faith. 2. The Apostles' Creed, as the Baptismal Symbol; and the Nicene Creed, as the sufficient statement of the Christian faith. 3. The two Sacraments ordained by Christ Himself--Baptism and the Supper of the Lord-ministered with unfailing use of Christ's words of Institution, and of the elements ordained by Him. 4. The Historic Episcopate, locally adapted in the methods of its administration to the varying needs of the nations and peoples called of God into the Unity of His Church.

The Instruments of Communion are symbols and gatherings that offer connection, conversation, and communion among members to maintain bond of affection. They are:

The Archbishop of Canterbury: which is viewed as the Spiritual Leader of the Anglican Communion. As of this writing the person in that position is The Most Reverend and Right Honorable Justin Welby.

Lambeth Conference: Every ten (or so) year gathering of all the bishops from around the Anglican Communion.

Primates' Meeting: The Primates of the Anglican Communion are the chief

Archbishops, Presiding Bishops, Moderators and chief pastors of the 41 provinces. Their churches are autonomous. The Archbishop of Canterbury chairs their meetings, which are held at varying intervals around the world.

Anglican Consultative Council: seeks to serve the needs of member churches. It comprises members of the laity, archbishops, bishops, priests, and deacons. Meetings take place approximately every three years.

The goal of these Lambeth Resolution of 1888 and the Instruments of Communion are to affirm Jesus' call to unity, "That we all may be one," and prevent disunity. The purpose, then, of the Anglican Community is to bring people together in Christ. I am glad to be in a tradition that struggle with diversity rather than break into silos of beliefs.
