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## Abha (अभा)

- **Meaning:** Light, Glow, Luster, Brilliance, or Radiance.
- **Context:** It symbolizes inner and outer beauty, splendor, and enlightenment. It is sometimes used to describe the divine glow of deities or nature.
- **Derivation:** Derived from the Sanskrit root *bhā* ("to shine") with the prefix *ā* (indicating direction or intensity).
- **Variants:** Aabha, Abhati (radiance).

## Asha (आशा)

- **Meaning:** Hope, Desire, Wish, or Expectation.
- **Context:** In Indian philosophy, it refers to a positive outlook, aspiration, and the anticipation of a good outcome. In a broader context, it also refers to "direction" or "quarters of the compass" in ancient texts.
- **Root:** Often linked to the Sanskrit *āśams* ("to hope" or "desire").
- **Note on Origin:** While it means "hope" in Sanskrit/Hindi, the name Asha also has separate roots in Swahili meaning "life," and Persian meaning "truth".
