10 marks and 15 marks through written and PSDA evaluation respectively as continuous assessment by the subject teacher concerned. <u>Note:</u>

1. The total number of Credits of the BA LLB (H) / BBA LLB (H) Programme is 280 Credits.

2. Each student shall be required to appear for examination in all the papers of the course **and secure 280 credits** for the award of a degree.

# **Evaluation of Tenth Semester Dissertation (Internal)**

The tenth semester dissertation shall carry 100 (70+ 30 Viva) marks. They shall be evaluated by the Board of Examiners consisting of Dean, an External Examiner, one faculty member nominated by APC and the supervisor concerned.
