function as markers and use in sacred ceremonies.

### ❖ Donations for ENMU Graduate Student Conference Travel

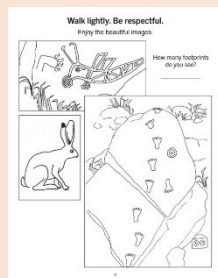

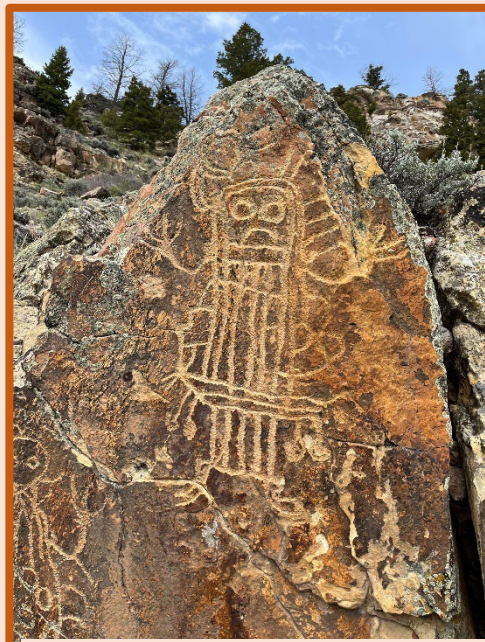

## Crow Canyon Archaeology Presents:



### Pueblo Identity & the People of Kuaua Pueblo

Online 02/13/2025

The term “Pueblo” is problematic. It was used by the Spanish to refer to many different ethnic groups living in the American Southwest at the time of European contact. All of these groups shared the trait of living in villages but had different languages and customs. This presentation explores the multi-ethnic composition of the people referred to as “Pueblo” through the lens of the occupation history of Kuaua Pueblo, known today as Coronado Historic Site. ### Staying Warm in Ice Age Wyoming: Evidence for Clothing Production at the La Prele Site

Clothing has been a crucial aspect of modern human survival, since the colonization of the northern latitudes of Eurasia over 40,000 years ago, eventually enabling humans to colonize the New World. Although clothing must have existed among Ice Age foragers, direct evidence for it is rare to non-existent in the archaeological record until only several thousand years ago. Archaeologists must instead rely upon proxy measures for clothing, like the tools used to produce it, to infer its presence and characteristics in Ice Age archaeological sites. In this presentation, Dr. Pelton will detail evidence for clothing production from the La Prele Early Paleoindian Site in Wyoming. La Prele is the oldest archaeological site thus far discovered in Wyoming and is a mammoth kill with an associated campsite. Over a decade of investigations at the site have yielded several dozen bone needle fragments indicative of clothing production. Recent zooarchaeology by mass spectrometry (ZooMS) analysis of these artifacts indicates production from fur bearing animals including foxes, cats, and hares. Spencer argues that the evidence from La Prele is among the best archaeologists have for the types of clothing worn by Ice Age foragers in North America. [Registration](#)

## **OLD BUSINESS & COMMITTEE REPORTS**

Anne suggested that the submission deadline for the January newsletter would be January 10<sup>th</sup>. Carol made a motion that the submission deadline would be January 10<sup>th</sup>, seconded by Bob, motion carried. Carol also offered to assist with this newsletter if needed.

**WEBINARS:** Carol / Jaimie The next webinar will be held on January 16 @7p, Basketry Shields in Western Rock Art by Peter Faris. The March webinar (Alma Evans) is tentatively scheduled for the 20<sup>th</sup>. More details to follow. Webinars will be held on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Thursday on the off-meeting months starting in January.





**FIELD TRIPS:** **Craig / Jerry** reports that he and Craig have plans to meet with personnel at PCMS on December 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> to discuss a 2025 field trip. They are also planning a trip to Vogel Canyon during that time to possibly plan a spring or early summer field trip there. They will utilize their drones and take videos and pictures. Jerry recently purchased an action camera that should be very helpful to video sites on field trips.

Bob is scheduling a field trip to the Gila Bend AZ area that includes the Sears Point Archeological area and the Painted Rocks area. It is scheduled for February 22 and 23. Motels are available in Casa Grande, and a BLM camp ground is available free of charge near the Painted Rocks site. Since this is BLM land, there will be a maximum of 12 participants. 10 slots are filled at this point. Tamara will send out the information again and Bob will start a wait list if necessary.

Jerry described using D Stretch on a few of the panels at Hicklin Springs and the results were amazing. He and Craig were able to view rock art with unbelievable clarity (compared to a regular photograph). Anne believes that the rock art reports may need to be updated, given the new petroglyphs that have been revealed. Craig and Jerry will go with Holly and the correct department at the state level to have the new images added.

**SCIENTIFIC ACTIVITIES:** **Jerry** No updates at this time.

He has many incredible photographs of pictographs and petroglyphs in Glen Canyon prior to it being flooded, ca 1959.

The board discussed the appropriateness of including rock art files from places other than Colorado in the Pueblo Library CRAA archives. It was decided that due to limited space, these documents and photographs would be available offline, to view in person at the library if desired.

**2024 CAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE:** CAS created trifold brochures that outlines who they are and what they do. Anne has some and they can be distributed by CRAA as needed. Anne reported that 5 of the 13 presentations given at the conference were about rock art.

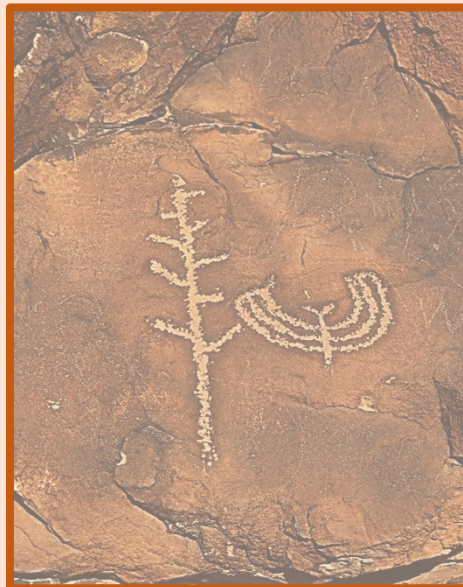
## **NEW BUSINESS**

## Field Trip Reports:

### **CRAA 2025 Field Trip Plans as of 14 Jan 2025**

#### **Field trip #1: Gila River Area of Arizona led by Bob Huestis**

The following CAS and CRAA members are registered for our February 22 and 23 Field trip.

On February 22nd we will meet at Exit 102 Interstate 8 Painted Rock Dam Road. We will proceed at 10 am on paved well surfaced and gravel roads suitable for passenger vehicles

to the Painted Rocks BLM site. You might want to pack a lunch and bring plenty of water.

Lodging and camping are available in Casa Grande and Gila Bend. There is also dry camping at the Painted Rocks BLM site.

On February 23rd we will meet at Interstate 8 Exit 78 Spot Road. We will proceed at 10am along a sandy road for 7 miles requiring high clearance and four-wheel drive. To observe these many petroglyphs we will be climbing steep basalt hillsides. Sturdy shoes and perhaps hiking poles are recommended. You may also want to carry water in a day pack since we will be hiking these buttes for a few miles.

If needed, we may be able to arrange carpooling for the sandy access road. Please let me know if this is required.

#### **Field Trip #2: Pinion Canyon Maneuver Site (PCMS), Colorado led by Craig Brazeau**

Originally planned for March of 2025, we moved the dates to April due to heavy PCMS Range activity in the early Spring and the hope that the weather would be better for a field trip. The two day field trip is now planned for Friday the 18<sup>th</sup> of April and Saturday the 19<sup>th</sup> of April.

- a. On day one we will visit Minnie Canyon within the PCMS border, Green Horn Canyon, and what they call the Nuclear Quadraped Site.
- b. On day two we will visit The Boulder Site, the 2240 site, and the Rock Crossing site.

The field trip will be a CRAA field trip and will be limited to between 12-20 people.



- a. The total number of people is dependent on transport vehicles that can be provided by the government and or CRAA personal vehicles.
- b. PCMS folks will plan to transport 12 CRAA folks in three of their vehicles.
- c. They will pursue permission to allow CRAA members to provide one or two additional vehicles to transport up to 8 more CRAA members on the field trip.
- d. We will set up a "Standby List" for members who sign up after we fill up the first 12 slots and keep folks advised if we can add field trip participation up to 20 folks.

Kari (PCMS Archaeologist) is working on permission for CRAA members to take photographs during the field trip. They will require CRAA members to sign a statement to the effect that they will not publish photographs taken on PCMS without prior approval of Fort Carson Public Affairs. This is due to the sensitive nature of the relationship between the Army and Indigenous Tribes that claim site(s) affiliation of the archaeology ruins on PCMS. Craig has drafted and provided Kari a statement for use by the PCMS archaeologists that our members (or other visitors to PCMS) could sign to acknowledge their photographic use responsibilities.

Camping and hotel accommodations are available in both Trinidad and La Junta, Colorado.

### **Field Trip #3: Ute Indian Museum and Ute Petroglyph Site, Shavano Valley in Montrose, Colorado led by Alma Evans, President of the Chipita CAS Chapter**

This field trip is scheduled for 30 Sep, and 1 Oct 2025. These dates are tentative and will be firmed up in May of 2025 by the field trip coordination team. CRAA field trip leader will be determined prior to the actual field trip.

- a. 30 September can be used for a recommended tour of the Ute Indian Museum in Montrose, Colorado.
- b. On 1 October we will visit the Ute Petroglyph Site. This field trip will consist of a 2-mile roundtrip hike requiring moderate effort. We will meet at the Ute Indian Museum at 09:00 AM and drive for approximately 20 minutes on a good road to the point where we will depart on foot. Our guide, Alma Evans, estimates that the trip in and out will take approximately 2-3 hours. Photos are permitted for non-commercial use.



- c. The number of people will be limited to 10 people with only Alma as our guide. If she can find another person to act as the second guide the maximum will be limited to 20 people. Please contact Craig to begin signing up for this field trip.

### **Potential additional field trips for 2025 or into 2026**

Craig, Jerry Grandell and Dave Froese have been working to design additional field trips to the southern Colorado area. These trips could include:

- a. "Tours" of the Pinion Canyon Maneuver Site. Not confirmed as yet, but we are close. These tours will be limited to between 1-3 individuals that will be hosted by a PCMS Archaeologist. We are hoping to set up perhaps one tour per quarter, for CRAA members. These tours will be on an available basis depending on a PCMS archaeologist availability and the schedule of PCMS training activities. If we are successful, we will set up a schedule/sign-up procedure that will make these tours available to all CRAA personnel.
- b. We are working on setting up a field trip to the San Luis Valley. As soon as the weather improves, we will work with Darwin Thompson to establish a scouting trip into the area with Darwin as our guide. The goal will be to establish procedures that will allow planning a future field trip, perhaps in 2026, or earlier if possible.
- c. We have conducted several "Wild Cat" trips into the Comanche Grasslands area that would be a good opportunity for a future field trip. These sites could include, but not be limited to, Vogel Canyon, Minnie Canyon to the west of the PCMS controlled area, and the Dinosaur Monument area. We have also established, through Dave, that we can access the private Davidson Ranch property south of La Junta along the Purgatory River. This ranch has many archaic Indian and early Spanish rock art sites. More to follow as we pursue these possibilities.

## History Colorado Report

Updates from the History Colorado Preservation Committee

CAS Representative to History Colorado and a member of the PPC Preservation Program Committee.

### **Background Information:**

The PPC is chartered by the History Colorado Board of Directors. The Committee focuses on strategic thinking, policy and evaluation relative to the organization's preservation programs. These include the functions of the Office of Archaeology and Historic Preservation, the State Historical Fund and other preservation incentive programs. The PPC appoints the State Historical Fund Council to administer the funding of preservation grants.

The State Historical Fund Council is pleased to announce that in 2024, 5,259 grants were awarded to 64 Counties of a total of \$365,439,294.00. These funds were awarded to a variety of preservation projects. The new Spring funding period for SHF will begin February 1, 2025, for both Mini and General grants.

A special Commission has been funded and charged with the responsibility of planning and development of the Celebration of the 250/150 Anniversaries. History Colorado is the Home to the America 250- Colorado 150 Commission. They are currently planning programs for the official observance of both the 250-year Anniversary of the founding of the United States and the 150 year Anniversary of Colorado's Statehood. Both occur in 2026.

CAS and CRAA are invited in assisting in this Celebration by highlighting and showcasing some of Colorado's great archaeological heritage. Ideas may be submitted to the Commission.

Colorado History, as a part of the celebration of the 250<sup>th</sup>. Anniversary is currently undertaking ambitious actions to increase community input in identifying historical sites and assistance in the preservation of such.

I recently participated in the History Colorado "Heritage for All" community program held in Monte Vista Colorado on January 14<sup>th</sup>. This meeting focused on the San Luis Valley, an area rich in historical and cultural heritage, but historically underrepresented in preservation efforts. The "SLV Heritage for All" meeting was directed by Katie Dokson, Community Engagement Manager for History Colorado. The workshop identified many of the San Luis Valley historic sites those being candidates for further study and review. The Mellon Foundation is assisting in the funding of these projects directed by History Colorado.

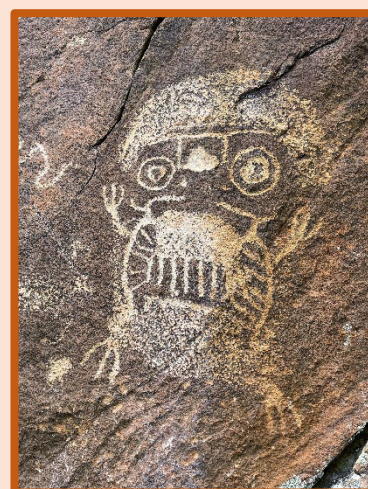
