The Architectural Committee would like to remind homeowners that an application for design approval is required when any significant change is to be made to the exterior of one's home. Applications and fees are not needed for simple replacement of already approved existing landscape items with like-for-like materials (see approved plant list on our website). This includes artificial turf, trees and gravel. No new changes to hardscape are permitted; i.e., design changes, fixtures, garage doors, gates, pavers, or other structures/walls without architectural approval and payment of fees. E-Bike Rules

What You Need to Know, Who You Need to Call

Once again residents are seeing an uptick in electric dirt bike riding in Montevista, which included a witnessed head-on crash between two bikers who luckily were not seriously hurt. Fortunately, they were wearing helmets. Regardless of what "side" one may be on in regard to e-bike use, it is important to know the rules - both here in Montevista and on our public roadways.

According to Montevista Community Association Rules & Regulations Governing Use of Common Area effective July 18, 2025:

"Vehicles defined as non-registered/non-street legal (off-road) gas and/or electric powered motorized vehicles including "Motor-Driven Cycles" **are prohibited from operating within Montevista**. Examples of these vehicles include, but are not limited to off-road UTV, ATV, Carts or Motorcycles (electric or gas powered).

Typically (but not always) these vehicles are defined as:

- Non-registered or licensed by the Department of Motor Vehicles.
- Fully throttle-powered with no functional pedals requiring rider to augment the motive capabilities of the vehicle.
- Capable of speeds in excess of 28 mph, often up to 50+ mph.
- Motor output that exceeds 750 watts (1HP).

NOTE: The Montevista Community Association observes State and Local Traffic Code, which includes adhering to a maximum speed limit of 15 mph throughout Montevista and operating motor vehicles on designated paved roadways only. All vehicles must be licensed and registered as street legal, and operators must have a valid driver's license and insurance.

NOTE: Montevista residents who invite nonresident e-bike riders into Montevista can be held responsible for non-resident violations of our community rules.

City of Phoenix Community Action Officer Kelsie Sanborn, along with her fellow officers, recently met with members of Tatum Ranch to educate them on the legalities of e-bike use and assist them with putting into place stricter e-bike rules and enforcement with education being the primary goal. Hopefully, this will deter nonresident e-bike riders from entering Montevista.

So, what should residents do if e-bike riders as previously described are seen congregating in Montevista? Per Phoenix PD, residents can call 911 in order to generate a police report and alert officers in the area who might be able to reach these riders and render the appropriate consequences for disobeying laws such as criminal trespass, harassment, and property damage - all of which have occurred in Montevista. **Confrontation is strongly discouraged.**

Taking note of times and places where electric dirt bike riders tend to congregate and giving that information to the City of Phoenix Police helps them educate residents, identify repeat offenders and increase patrols in troublesome areas. Electric bicycles are prohibited on sidewalks.

Electric bicycle age – 16 years old minimum.

DUI AND FELONY FLIGHT NOT APPLICABLE.

ELECTRIC SCOOTERS (PCC 36-300-313)

2 or 3 wheels, handlebars, floorboard, electric motor.



ENFORCEMENT

Phoenix City Code 36-304

Electric scooters are prohibited on sidewalks.

Phoenix City Code 36-308

Electric scooter age – 16 years old minimum.

DUI AND FELONY FLIGHT NOT APPLICABLE.

MOTOR DRIVEN CYCLE (ARS 28-101.48)

Treated the same as motorcycle per Title 28.

All traffic laws apply – License, Registration, Insurance

Subject to 28-3511 Tow with Supervisor approval.

Scottsdale Road Improvements

Dixileta Drive to Dynamite Boulevard

Traffic on Scottsdale Road is still shifted to the west side of Scottsdale Road with left turns restricted at Dixileta. Left turns are permitted between Dynamite and Dixileta. There is no access to Dale Lane or Via Dona Road on the east side, but there is access to Desert Foothills Lutheran and Sonrise Bible Church.

Wednesday, January 21st through approximately mid-March, Dynamite will be CLOSED on the east side of Scottsdale Road to accommodate waterline work at the intersection. North and south bound Scottsdale Road will remain open for travel and left turns for northbound Scottsdale Road to westbound Dynamite. Detour signage will be in place to direct travelers.

Scottsdale Road, Oberlin Way (south of Dynamite) to Jomax - left turns are restricted at Jomax Road. **Left turns are permitted between Jomax Road and Dynamite Blvd.** There is no access to Redbird Road, Bent Tree Drive, or Oberlin Way on the east side of Scottsdale Road.

Crews continue work on channel excavation for the drainage swale on the east side of Scottsdale Road and will soon begin work to place riprap in the channel and construct storm drain headwalls.

It's Not Just Valentine's Day Happy Birthday Arizona!

Statehood Day in Arizona has been observed every year on February 14th since 1912. Arizona was the 48th state to join the Union, the last of the contiguous states. It spans 113,998 square miles making it the 6th largest state. It is home to 22 federally recognized Native American Tribes, the Navajo Nation being the largest. The Hopi village of Oraibi is one of the oldest continuously inhabited settlements in the United States dating back to around 1100 AD.

Arizona is known for its unique natural beauty, which includes one of the Seven Natural Wonders of the World, the Grand Canyon. It is home to the only place on earth where the iconic saguaro cactus grows in the Sonoran desert and home to two of the top-rated waterfalls in the U.S. - Grand Falls and Havasu Falls.

Our state is a haven for wildlife with over 800 species calling it home. This includes the only population of jaguars in the United States. Arizona has more species of rattlesnakes than any other state. The tree frog is the state amphibian. It can be found in our mountainous regions.

Our state has more sunny days than Florida with over 300 days of sunshine annually. The hottest temperature ever recorded in Arizona was 128, which occurred in Lake Havasu City on June 29, 1994. Yes, Arizona has four seasons. They are located in Flagstaff. There are more mountains in Arizona than there are in Switzerland with over 300 mountain peaks and summits throughout, and we have the largest contiguous ponderosa pine forest in the United States.

Arizona has a ghost town called "Nothing" with a population of zero. It has a law prohibiting donkeys from sleeping in bathtubs. It is home to the world's largest solar telescope and has a museum dedicated to the history of firefighting - the Hall of Flame which features over 90 fully restored fire trucks.

Phoenix is the 5th most populous city in the United States. It produces more copper than any other state. It is also a leading producer of cotton. It is home to over 300 wineries, some of which have tasting rooms that are open to the public.

It Takes a Village

Tired of looking at the rent-a-fence, the cement drainage pipe now covered with graffiti and the dumping ground in the SE corner of Lone Mountain Park? That's your tax dollars at work! But, you do have a choice - a chance to make a difference. Lone Mountain Park was fully funded early in 2022. Surveys went out and a steering committee formed to update amenities. Groundbreaking was slated to take place in the summer of 2023. Now after multiple excuses and delays, almost three years later the proposed park sits imprisoned in a fence with illegal dumping that the City of Phoenix Parks and Recreation as well as the Public Works Department have been notified of but continue to ignore. So, what can you do? You can tell Parks and Recreation and our City Councilman, Jim Waring, that you're tired of watching our tax dollars being wasted on a fence and going towards other things such as the 11.9 million dollars Parks and Rec spent to purchase land for a future park near TSMC just prior to their latest delay last December that they blamed on "costs." It just takes a few minutes. All Aboard the Dolly Steamboat!

Situated on beautiful Canyon Lake located in the heart of the Sonoran Desert just a short drive along the Apache Trail from Phoenix, an historic steam boat ride invites visitors to relax and enjoy wildlife, secluded inner waterways and the natural wonders of the surrounding area amidst a backdrop of jagged cliffs and towering canyon walls.

Canyon Lake located is one of four man-made reservoirs created by dams along the Salt River. It is nestled in the picturesque Superstition Mountains covering approximately 950 acres. It is a prime location for boating, fishing, outdoor recreation and a delightful journey on the Dolly Steamboat.

The steamboat, named after the original "Dolly," a vessel that operated in the early 1900s, was originally a means of transportation in the rugged desert terrain. Now, the Dolly Steamboat has evolved into a luxurious way to take in the splendor of the region with a variety of cruises from daytime sightseeing to sunset dinner cruises.


A diverse array of wildlife can be seen while cruising Canyon Lake. This includes bighorn sheep climbing the steep canyon walls, bald eagles nesting in the cliffs, great blue herons stalking their prey in the shallows, and javelina roaming the desert.

One can pick from several cruises on the Dolly Steamboat from a 90-minute Scenic Nature Cruise to a more romantic Twilight Dinner Cruise as the sun sets over the Superstitions. There is also an Astronomy Cruise where one can witness the breathtaking night sky far from city lights with local astronomers often onboard to provide insight into constellations, planets and other celestial phenomena. Private charters and special events are available as well.

Recipe of the Month

Red Velvet Cheesecake Brownies

INGREDIENTS:

1 cup white sugar

½ cup unsalted butter, melted

¼ cup unsweetened cocoa powder

1 ounce red food coloring

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1 teaspoon distilled white vinegar

¼ teaspoon salt

2 large eggs, slightly beaten

¾ cup all-purpose flour

Cheesecake Filling:

1 (8 ounce) package cream cheese at room temperature

¼ cup white sugar

1 large egg

¼ teaspoon vanilla extract

DIRECTIONS:

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease an 8x8-inch baking pan.

For the red velvet brownies: Whisk 1 cup sugar and melted butter in a large mixing bowl; stir in cocoa, red food coloring, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract, vinegar, and salt, one at a time, mixing well after each addition to avoid lumps. Mix in 2 eggs until thoroughly combined.

Stir flour into cocoa mixture just until combined; set aside 1/4 cup batter. Pour remaining batter into the prepared baking dish.

For the cheesecake filling: Beat cream cheese in a bowl using an electric mixer on medium speed until light and fluffy. Add 1/4 cup sugar, 1 egg, and 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract; continue to beat until well blended and only small lumps remain, [3 to 4 minutes](#).

Spoon cream cheese mixture in dollops over the batter in pan; gently smooth tops of dollops even with batter using a knife or offset spatula. Do not overmix. Drizzle reserved 1/4 cup of batter over the dollops of cream cheese mixture. Drag a knife or skewer through the batter and cream cheese mixture to create swirls.

Bake in the preheated oven until top is dry and edges have started to pull away from the sides of the pan, about [30 to 35 minutes](#). Cool completely before cutting into bars; store covered in refrigerator.
