PUPPY SOCIALIZATION:

It is so exciting to bring home that small, cuddly puppy with bright eyes and huge feet. But before you know it, your puppy will be growing into those feet. Socializing your puppy is key to ensuring you'll have a happy, confident, and well-adjusted dog for life.

RALLY:

Rally is a team sport: You and your dog navigate a course, side-by-side, through 10-20 different signs. Each sign provides instructions regarding the next skill that is to be performed. The dog and handler move continuously throughout the course with the dog under control at the handler's left side. There is a clear sense of teamwork between the dog and handler both during and between the numbered signs. Although each performance is timed, having a good race time is not the goal; it's all about working as a team while performing the skills, with the dog under control.

SCENT WORK:

AGILITY:

Agility is a growing dog sport in the United States, with over 1 million entries to the AKC's Agility Program each year. Dogs race against a clock as they navigate an obstacle course with strong concentration and speed. Whether you just want to have fun exercising with your dog, or want to go further and enter an Agility competition, get ready for a fast-paced, rewarding experience that will get you and your dog in the best shape of your lives!

BARN HUNT:

Not everyone will understand the importance of "rat catchers," but if you live in the countryside, you sure do! Dogs and their handlers work as a team to locate and mark rats (which are always safely held in aerated tubes) hidden in a maze of straw or hay bales.

Barn Hunt events include a pass/fail instinct class for owners who want to familiarize their dog with the test. Courses are made increasingly difficult by adding more obstacles, additional diversions and more rats to find.

CANINE GOOD CITIZEN:

All dogs can be good dogs, and all owners can be great owners: all it takes is a little bit of training, lots of love, and of course, plenty of praise along the way.

The Canine Good Citizen (CGC) program is a two-part course designed to help you and your dog be the best you can be—together. Since 1989, over 1 million dogs and their owners have participated in CGC, mastering ten basic skills that instill confidence and good manners in and out of your home.

CONFORMATION:

The official term for dog shows is conformation — as in, the act of conforming or producing conformity. While a dog show may look like a beauty pageant, it's not. Dogs are not being compared to each other; they're being measured by how closely they conform to the standard of their particular breed. Why? Because the closer a dog's appearance is to the breed's standard, the better that dog's ability will be to produce puppies that meet the standard. It's also the reason why mixed breeds and spayed or neutered purebreds are ineligible to compete in conformation.

GROOMING:

HERDING:

German Shepherds were born to herd. AKC's Herding Program offers tests and trials, in a pass/fail format, conducted within a fenced arena that includes the use of livestock such as ducks, sheep or cattle. During a test, a dog must demonstrate the ability to move and control livestock by fetching or driving and be sufficiently trained to work at the proper balance point to move the stock forward on the course. Throughout all field trials the teamwork between handler/shepherd and dog is essential.

JUNIOR SHOWMANSHIP:

Junior Showmanship offers children between the ages of 9 and under 18 years of age an opportunity to develop their handling skills, learn about good sportsmanship, dogs, and dog shows. Juniors are judged on their ability to present, or handle, their dogs as they would in the breed ring.

OBEDIENCE:

Developed in the 1930s, Obedience is one of the AKC's oldest sporting events. From walking on- and off-leash to retrieving and jumping, or demonstrating your dog's ability to stay, Obedience trials feature dogs that are well-behaved at home, in public places, and in the presence of other dogs. It is essential that the obedience dog demonstrates willingness and enjoyment while it is working with the handler.

Whether or not you want to compete, every dog owner should consider some form of obedience training. It's the best way to establish good communication skills between you and your dog – and to make sure that your dog is the most well-behaved one in your neighborhood!
