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
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# A Fractured Church in Fractured Times—A Call for the Church to be Better!

Avery Stafford's New Title, <u>When Collaboration Mirrors the Trinity:</u>
<u>Leveraging Unity to Bless Our World</u>, points the way.

"That they all may be one" was Jesus' first-century prayer. With mind and emotions set towards Golgotha, he poured out his heart to the Father. But what is our twenty-first-century reality?



Local churches are siloed. Pastors do not know one another and rarely work together. Christians drive by church buildings on their way to Sunday worship and seldom pray for one another. Vitriolic disunity spews across social media in front of an onlooking world. Our culture sees our fractured reality and increasingly dismisses Christianity as a viable option for their lives. And it is time for believers to recognize that it is our fault.

But there is hope! When Collaboration Mirrors the Trinity is a timely invitation for local churches to make the practice of unity our new normal. Avery Stafford presents a biblical model to actualize this invitation. He details four rhythms that mirror the loving community of the Triune God. Each one can help pastors, lay leaders, and faith communities deepen their resolve to bless the world through effective gospel partnerships. This work is a bold call for believers to discover an untapped resource for the gospel—the believers who attend other churches in their city.

Avery Stafford is Lead Pastor at Common Ground Church in Beaverton, Oregon, and an adjunct faculty member at Multnomah Biblical Seminary in Portland. He is a graduate of Abilene Christian University (1992) and holds an MA in Pastoral Studies and a DMin from Multnomah Biblical Seminary (1998, 2020). He is also an award-winning songwriter and music recording artist with six albums to his credit.

## Interview with Avery Stafford

## Describe yourself in one word?

When describing myself in one word, I usually respond with "bridge-builder." Godly people have always been important to me. Many have poured countless time and energy into my life, which is a testament to God's grace and favor. I am committed to doing the same for others. I want people to discover the depths of the love of God in their lives. In that sense, I am a bridge-builder.

# What is your professional and educational background?

I have worked in pastoral ministries for over thirty years in California, Texas, Washington, and Oregon. Since 2015, I have served as Lead Pastor for Common Ground Church in Beaverton, OR. I hold a Bachelor of Science in Christian Ministry from Abilene Christian University (92), a Master of Arts in Pastoral Studies from Multnomah Biblical Seminary (98), and a Doctor of Ministry in Missional Leadership from Multnomah (2020).

## Why did you decide to write a book?

I want believers to take Jesus' prayer more seriously—"that they might be one." Writing my doctoral thesis presented a unique opportunity to dive into this subject, complete my doctorate, and use my work as a primer for a book.

## How did you choose church collaboration as the subject?

In 2017, Common Ground moved to a church campus where six other autonomous congregations worshiped weekly in central Beaverton. My assumption was that combining our gospel efforts would be easy for us. I was wrong. That experience over a two-year period became the case study for the thesis. Our circumstances made the subject of church collaboration an easy choice.

## What makes your book compelling?

I wrote the book that I wanted to read but could not find anywhere. It is an honest look at the big "C" Church through the eyes of an African American pastor in twenty-first-century America who is fluently bilingual in Black and White culture. This work is rooted in biblical theology. It was written during a worldwide revolution for racial justice, a global pandemic, and the most volatile presidential campaign of my generation. It acknowledges what I believe is systematic disunity in the body of Christ and our missed

opportunities to share the gospel. But it also offers hope and a way forward. Every believer or interested party will engage right away.

Our discussion will reenvision what congregations can achieve together if their leaders highly value this kind of collaboration. Such a reimagined church would recast our reputation as the people who always work together in unity.

But let us not kid ourselves . . .

We will never get to collaboration if we cannot find our way to unity—even in disagreement!

So, this work also serves as a clarion call for Christian leaders to initiate new kingdom relationships, build new trust narratives, and leverage those narratives to pursue the gospel in their cities.

Every church will not be able to collaborate with everyone, but every church should collaborate with someone! And when your collaboration mirrors the Trinity, it is a work powered by the very definition of love—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. It helps us to fulfill Jesus' desire for his believers to be one. Yes, it only took me nine minutes and twenty-nine seconds to see that the church is not one. But it also only took one prayer from Jesus to convince me that we must be one!

If you decide to read on, you will encounter moments when the Holy Spirit will tap you on the noggin. Pay close attention to his stirrings. When it happens, you can either resist and excuse away why churches silo and remain strangers, or you can press into that moment. Remember, we have arrived where we are by doing what we have done. If you believe, like me, that Christ wants something different for his people, then stay with me while we talk about doing something different. I want him to do transformative work in your life like he continues to do in mine. After all, he is in the life-transformation business. Since collaboration is so important to me, it makes sense to begin this book by telling you why. So instead of leaving you in suspense, let us get to it.
