

#### PO of the Month



On Saturday, July 8, 2023 at approximately 11:30 hours, members of the 102<sup>nd</sup> Precinct Detective Squad and Queens South Homicide were notified and responded to 108-19 Jamaica Ave. in reguards to a male shot in front of the location. Details are as follows:

Upon arrival to the scene, detectives were directed by responding officers to 108-19 Jamaica Ave. where the victim Mr. Hamod Saeidi (M/AP86) was shot one time in his back. The victim was removed to Jamaica Hospital by EMS prior to Detectives arrival. The victim was pronouced deceased at 1200 hours by DR. McKenzie. While on scene detectives were able to canvass the surrounding area and interview multiple witnesses as well as canvass for probative video. Video collected by Detectives does portray the perpetrator a male Hispanic with a green shirt drive by on a blue motorized scooter and five multiple shots towardsthe victim at approximately 1127 hours. (3) 9mm shell casings and 5 fragmented bullets were recovered from that location.

The perpetrator then proceeded westbound on Jamaica Ave.and turned northbound on 108<sup>th</sup> St. and did shoot towards civilians as he rounds the corner. (1) 9mm shell casing was recovered from that location.


The perpetrator proceeded to the intersection of Hillside Ave. and 126<sup>th</sup> St. where approximately 1135 hours, based on video collected by Detectives he discharged at least one round into a gray Toyota Sienna Mini Van and struck the victim Mr. Ozgur (M/H/44) in his left cheek. The victim was transported to Jamaica Hospital and was intubated and in critical condition. (1) 9mm shell casing, a copper fragment, and lead fragment were recovered from the scene.

The perpetrator then proceeded South towards Jamaice Ave. When he reached Jamaica Ave. he proceeded to travel eastbound. At Det. Tim Harrington , P.O. Danielle Renna & Det. Kevin Goodspeed Accept P.O. of the Month Award

approximatley 1136 hours, based off of video collected by Detectives the male perpertrator fired 3 rounds towards another civilian walking along the sidewalk at the intersection of Jamaica Ave. and 131<sup>st</sup> St. missing him. 3 shell casings were recovered from that location. The perpetrator then continued eastboundon Jamaica Ave. and when he reached the intersection of Jamaica Ave. and when he reached the intersection of Jamaica Ave. and solve and 134<sup>th</sup> St. at approximately 1137 hours, based off video collected by detectives he fired multiple rounds and struck the victim Mr. Jorge Balseca (M/H/63) in his right shoulder. The victim was transported to Jamaica Hospital.

At approximately 1310 hours Officer from the 103<sup>rd</sup> Precinctwere canvassing in regards to the numerous shootings in the 102 Precinct as well as the (1)in the confines of the 75 Precinct. At this time Officers observed a male fitting the descriptionin the vicinity of Sutphin Boulevard and Archer Ave. The male perpetraror tried to flee from police and did lose control of his scooter. After a brief foot persuit the wanted perpetrator Thomas Abreu (M/H/25) was placed under arrest at the corner of Sutphin Boulevard and 94 Ave.

The perpetrator was then transported to the 107 Precinct where Detectives interviewed him in regards to the incidents. The perpetrator did waive Miranda. The perpetrator stated in sum and substance that he did wake up at 136 Elton Ave. this morning . He stated that he was driving around on a blue motorized scooter, and did have a gun. The perpetrator stated that the Europe, The Russians and the Chinese were after him. When Detectives questioned him about shooting anyone the perpetrator then requested a lawyer. The defendent Thomas Abreu is being currently arrested, and charged with (1) Count of Murder 2, (2) counts of Attempted Murder, and (3) Counts of Criminal Possession of a Weapon -Firearm.



## **GOOD TO KNOW**

Happy New Year to all and hoping it will be a good year for everyone. The new year brings new or changes to certain laws. This year one of those changes will affect your Required Minimum Distributions (RMD) from your Individual Retirement Account (IRA).

In December 2022, the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023, was signed into law which includes the SECURE 2.0 Act of 2022. Secure 2.0 incorporates important enhancements to regulations affecting IRAs and Achieving a Better Life Experience (ABLE) accounts.

Before the Secure Act, account holders were required to begin taking RMDs at age 70½. Under the Secure Act, the age to begin taking RMDs from your retirement plans was raised to age 72. Now under Secure 2.0 individuals who become 72 after December 31, 2022, and before January 1, 2033, can postpone taking their RMDs until they reach 73. Individuals who turn 74 after December 31, 2032, are not required to begin taking RMDs until age 75.

Due to Secure 2.0, the IRS is delaying the implementation of IRA RMD rules until 2024. Previously, the agency extended the 60-day rollover of certain retirement plan distributions was prolonged to Sept. 30, 2023. Prior to the passage of Secure 2.0, the IRS imposed a 50% surcharge for failing to take the full annual RMD from a retirement account. Secure 2.0 reduces the surcharge for tax years after December 29, 2022, by half, to 25%. Also, if the full amount is distributed by the earlier of the second year after the RMD was missed or before the IRS assesses the penalty, the surcharge is reduced to 10% for plans created under traditional IRAs and 401(a), 401(k), 403(b) and 457(b) plans. A further

Peter J. Caso, Esq. point to be aware of is that any surcharge is counted as taxable income in the year in which the penalty was assessed.


Beginning this year (tax year 2024), the Secure 2.0 Act also eliminates RMDs for qualified employer Roth plan accounts. Participants in a 401(k), 403(b) and 457(b) plan with a designated Roth IRA feature will no longer have to consider the Roth accounts in their employer-sponsored calculating plan when their RMD. Previously, there was a difference in the rules that applied to Roth 401(k) accounts in employer plans versus Roth IRAs. Also, if the participant's FICA wages from the employer sponsoring the plan exceeded \$145,000 in the prior year, subject to annual cost of living adjustments in \$5,000 increments, the age 50 plus catchup deferrals can only be contributed to the Roth IRA.

Also in 2024 under the Secure 2.0 Act. you will be allowed to take an "emergency" distribution early from vour retirement account to cover unforeseeable or immediate financial needs. An emergency distribution of up to \$1,000, could only be taken once during the year, but won't be subject to the usual additional 10 % tax that applies to early distributions. But, if you choose not to repay the distribution within a certain time, you won't be allowed to take other emergency distributions for three years.
