

A year later Rich retired from the NYC Police Dept. ending an illustrious thirty-two years serving the City of New York. The year he began his police career is also the year he married his first love Joan. They had two beautiful children in Bill and Jennifer and settled into Massapequa where they raised their family. Sadly in 2001 tragedy struck as Joan became ill and died suddenly. To say Rich was devastated would be an understatement. But he had Bill and Jennifer at his side and as usual kept things together and in order. The birth of Rich's grandson Ryan put an unbelievable spark back into Rich. There is no doubt in my mind that Ryan has made Richie the most proud grandfather in the world. He loves Ryan more than life itself. He would tell great stories of Ryan, his time in college and of course his graduation.

As luck would have it, Rich met a very pretty widowed lady named Rosemary Wildeman and in 2007 they were married. Rich and Rosemary once again found true happiness. Some people never

find true happiness, Rich and Rosemary were fortunate to have found it twice. They spent eighteen years together. How wonderful !

Just a couple of things to note. I want to thank everyone for their toy donations to SCO. Luke and I delivered a car load of toys to the children at SCO. It's so rewarding to make a difference in a child's life. Thank you.

William and Richard followed the above quote from the Psalmist.




• **Police Officer Robert Morrissey, Tax# 966233**

2. On Sunday, July 20, 2025, Police Officer Robert Morrissey, Tax #966233, assigned to Field Training Officer, displayed exceptional bravery and composure and applied life saving measures to a stabbing victim. The details are as follows:

On the aforementioned date and time, Police Officer Robert Morrissey assigned as the Field Training Officer in the confines of the 115 Precinct, responded to a call of a 10-34 Assault and upon arrive encountered a crime victim who was stabbed in the neck and back. Without hesitation, Officer Morrissey quickly took control of the scene and immediately applied medical intervention to the victim, applying the necessary pressure to wounds while directing other members on the scene to help coordinate the application of medical attention while awaiting responding EMS. For over fourteen (14) minutes, Officer Morrissey applied direct pressure to wounds inflicted, while constantly ensuring the victim was breathing and repeatedly assuring him that he would be okay. Upon the arrival of EMS, Officer Morrissey gave clear and distinct medical updates to FDNY EMS personnel and assisted in the victim's rapid transportation to the hospital. Following this heroic act, Officer Morrissey was an integral part of disseminating the necessary information needed to safeguard an active crime scene and facilitating the necessary steps of the start of the investigation into this crime. Following the initial investigation, three (3) wanted individuals were arrested on August 3, 2025 by the 115 Detective Squad for the assault. It is without a doubt that Officer Morrissey's decisive and swift action, strong leadership and experience, attributed to the fact that the victim is alive and the persons wanted were brought to justice. His actions reflect the highest standards of the Department and the spirit of service that the Centurion Foundation Award seeks to honor. It is with great respect and recognition of his bravery that Police Officer Robert Morrissey is nominated for the Centurion Foundation Award. His heroism on July 20, 2025, not only saved a man's life but also reassured the community that its safety remains in the hands of dedicated and courageous officers.

3. The undersigned highly recommends Police Officer Robert Morrissey to be considered for the "Centurion Foundation Award Nominations" for the period of July 1, 2025 through September 30, 2025.

GOOD TO KNOW

Happy New Year, and may it be a healthy and prosperous one for you and your family. The New Year also commences the annual ritual, "Tax Season."

While you're busy gathering your paperwork for tax season, scammers and cybercriminals are devising schemes to steal your identity and money. Know how to protect yourself and your loved ones from these criminals. During 2024, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) identified more than \$2.12 billion in tax fraud.

There are a number of preventative measures you can take to help you protect yourself, recognize possible fraud warning signs and take action if you become a victim:

Use secure filing websites: Only trust tax-filing portals with "https:" before the URL. This indicates that data transmitted between you and the site is encrypted.

Create an ID.me Account: The IRS provides a sign-in option with ID.me, which offers access to IRS online services with a secure account that protects your privacy. New York State's Department of Finance has the Tax Online Services Portal, where you register and create your personal account to conduct tax filing and transactions.

Create strong passwords: For any portal that can access your sensitive tax information, make sure that you choose a lengthy, complex password that's different from any others you use. Concerned about remembering so many passwords? A password manager can help you create and safely store your passwords.

Take advantage of multifactor authentication: When filing your taxes online, you should only use a tax service provider that, in addition to requiring a username and password, allows you to use another factor, like a one-time

security code, to access your account.

File early: The IRS only accepts a single return for each SSN. In addition to obtaining an identity protection PIN, submitting your return early can help further limit the possibility that a criminal may use your SSN later to file a false return.

Refund deposited electronically: Fraudsters take advantage of tax season to perpetrate check fraud, stealing checks placed in the mail to alter the payee or amount. Using IRS and state-recommended electronic payment methods helps ensure your payments arrive securely and on time.

Protect your personal information: Never click on email or text message links made to look like they come from federal or state tax authorities. Fraudsters create "phishing" emails that appear to be legitimate but are simply a guise to get you to share personal or financial information. These emails may purport to be from the IRS or State and threaten you with legal or financial consequences if you fail to comply. Do not respond to such emails; instead report such activity to the IRS or NYS Dept. of Finance.

By taking these simple precautions, you can ensure your personal information and refund, if you receive one, are secure.
