



### Meet Suzie!


## SENIOR-TO-SENIOR PROGRAM.

The shelter has a wonderful program called Senior to Senior which places a senior cat (older than 5 years or has been at the shelter longer than 1 year) with a senior citizen.

The program waives the adoption fee and provides a starter kit which includes a litter box, small bag of litter, scooper and small bag of cat food. Since we started this program, we have matched dozens of cats with a senior. It is a win, win for all.

A senior will gain a companion and friend while a homeless cat finds a new home with a human to love.

### **HELPING US HELP OUR ANIMALS!**

Our shelter is becoming a little greener! As part of our ongoing efforts to reduce our carbon footprint, and to be good stewards of the environment within out community, the shelter is partnering with Consumers Energy as a participant in their Cold Climate Air Source Heat Pump Pilot Program.

This program provides the shelter with the opportunity to receive advanced equipment or services to increase the efficiency of our heating equipment. We will be upgrading and replacing some of our heating and cooling equipment with modern advanced heat pumps. These units will reduce our energy consumption, and the associated cost savings can be applied to the health and welfare of our animals. Every little bit helps.

#### **TEMPORARY ADOPTION CHANGES**

When people started to work from home due to the pandemic, shelters across the nation saw an increase in adoption rates. In addition, as people were spending more time around their pets, they became more intuitive to changes in their pet behavior and health. Both of these situations resulted in an increase in demand on veterinary services. Couple this with the issues the pandemic created for businesses in general, scheduling a vet appointment became a lengthy process and that is no exception for Homeward Bound Animal Shelter.

Currently our spay and neuter surgeries are being schedule 3-4 months out. While we are still committed to spay and neutering all our animals before adoption, the wait times for surgeries is not in the best interest of the animal when a family is interested in adopting them. Until there is a change in this situation, the Board has decided to allow adoption of non-altered animals.

To that point, the shelter will be adding a refundable \$100 fee to the normal adoption cost. The \$100 will be refunded to the adopter upon proof the animal has been spayed or neutered. While this is not how we want to adopt out our animals, the priority is the health and welfare of the animals and getting them into good homes.





## Long Range goals ~ Details in our upcoming 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter Newsletter.

Strategic planning is an integral part of the MCSH Board objectives. Through these planning sessions, the Board compiles the shelter needs and wish list type projects. While current resources may not allow for completion of all of these objectives, we continue to strive and work towards positioning the Humane Society to achieve them. Some objectives have been accomplished such as replacing the lighting to LED fixtures to reduce energy; upgrading cat caging to condos; purchasing property for future expansion; establishing endowment and investment accounts to help for future funding. Other projects like expansion of the cat rooms; creating dedicated isolation areas for sick and pregnant animals; and having a separate building to serve as an indoor play area, a meet and greet for adopters and training sessions for our dogs will not only need more funding than we currently have but we are also balancing our expansion goals with the funding to sustain it. The MCHS Board has made huge steps in achieving our strategic objectives and we are thankful for the community support to make it possible.

#### COVID Changes at the Shelter

#### Visiting the shelter... REQUIRES:

- Calling and making an appointment: 231-723-7387.
- Masks are required for all entering the building children included.
- Groups will need to be by appointment and limited to 5 or less people.
- Volunteering please make an appointment as those who have will take precedent
- We will not provide masks to the public but will sell a disposable mask for \$1 if currently in stock.
- When making an appointment and upon approval at the shelter, a few questions will be asked: Are you currently under quarantine for exposure to COVID? Are you aware of being exposed to the virus? Have you recently traveled? Do you have any of the known symptoms of the virus?
