

Life Lessons Learned from Texas Division Heritage Seminar By W. Michael Hurley

Colonel George Hugh Yarborough (1826-1899)

George Yarborough came to Tyler, TX from Alabama in1854. He soon entered into a partnership with Alfred Ferguson and opened a general merchandise store. In 1859, Yarbrough built a hand made Brick structure, which was the first three story building in the city of Tyler. The building was located at 100 East Fergusson Street in downtown Tyler. Note: The building was razed in 1978 and today the Regions bank building stands in it's place.

In 1862 Georeg Yarabough, W. Biscoe, and J.C. Short started the Tyler Ordnance Works, located near the present day location of Bergfeld Park. The factory was founded using evacuated equipment from the Little Rock, Ark arsenal. It was a private gun factory, used to make rifles for the State of Texas. The factory was purchased by the Confederate Government in 1863. The gun factory expanded into the Confederate States Ordnance Works at Tyler. The plant made around 2,233 rifles, which beacme known as "Tyler Rifles". They repaired thousands of other weapons, produced millions of small arms and cannon cartridges, and employed around 200 men and boys. It was destroyed to avoid it's use by th enemy in May 1865.

The Tyler Courier says: "In the death of Col. George Yarbrough, this community loses a prominent citizen--one whose life and works have been felt in the home, in church, in commercial affairs, and in every way that he has touched elbows with his fellow man. It has ever been for the advancement and promotion of the community and betterment of those with whom he was associated. Yarbrough was a Confederate supporter, and resident of Tyler for 46 years.. In early life he united with the Baptist denomination and remained a consistent member of this body until his demise. He was a deacon in the First Baptist Church in this city for 42 years, and was one of the original members.


From the Bookcase of Michael Hurley...

The Battle fo Chickamauga...The Terrible Sound by Peter Cozzens

When Braxton Bragg, and the Confederate Army of Tennessee assalted the Union Army of the Cumberland, under command of William Rosecrans on the hills of northwestern Georgia in September of 1863, they began one of the bloodiest and most decisive campaigns of the war.

The Battle was a Confederate victory, but it came at a high cost to both sides. The second bloodiest battle of the war, with over 125,000 total forces engaged (60,000 CSA), with an estimated total of 34,624 casualties (18,454 CSA). Interestingly, the battle included the famed "Hood's Texas Brigade" as Longstreet's Corps was transferred to the Army of the Tenessee.






This book has been in my library for many years. A favorite among my collection for it's vivid battle details and descriptions of the mental toll the fight placed on the men who participated in the battle. Cozzens writes movingly of both the heroism and the suffering of the common soliders. He also does and admirable job in his evaluation of the strengths and flaws of their commanders.

Written in 1992, it was the first study of the campaign written in more than thirty years. The book contributed greatly to a resurgence in the interest of this great battle. Offering new interpretations, that challenge the conventional wisdom on key moments of the battle. It is volume well worth the investment of your time and focus. 8

How Do I Join The Sons of Confederate Veterans?

The SCV is the direct heir of the United Confederate Veterans. Organized at Richmond, Virginia in 1896, the SCV continues to serve as a historical, patriotic, and non-political organization dedicated to ensuring that a true history of the 1861-1865 period is preserved. Membership in the Sons of Confederate Veterans is open to all male descendants of any veteran who served honorably in the Confederate armed forces. Membership can be obtained through either lineal or collateral family lines and kinship to a veteran must be documented genealogically. The minimum age for full membership is 12, but there is no minimum for Cadet membership.
