Benjamin "Nep" Napoleon Boren 1842-1903

Nep Boren was born at Nacogdoches in the Republic of Texas on January 30, 1842. His father, Samuel Hampson Boren, was an early pioneer in Smith County and was responsible for helping establish the first church of Christ congregation in Tyler. His mother was originally Miss Sara Dickson Long. His great-grandfather Nicholas Boren was a soldier in the American Revolution. His maternal greatgrandfather Gen. Joseph Dickson commanded a North Carolina brigade in the campaign against Lord Cornwallis.

Nep Boren had not finished his education when the war between the states began. He volunteered at age 20 and was made lieutenant of Co. "C" in the 14th Texas Infantry, C. S. A., and later was promoted to captain. The 14th Texas Infantry was assigned to Randal's Brigade, **Walker's "Greyhound" Division,** Army of the Trans-Mississippi. The regiment participated in the Red River Campaign in the Spring of 1864 and saw heavy action at Mansfield, LA, and Pleasant Hill, LA, on April 8-9, 1864. The regiment participated in the Battles of Jenkin's Ferry and Saline River. The unit was disbanded near Marshall, TX, in April of 1865.

His comrades said there was no braver soldier than Nep Boren, as they affectionately knew him. His older brother, James N. Boren, Lieutenant of Douglas' Artillery, was killed in the battle of Richmond, Kentucky.

After the war, Nep Boren was in business for several years in Tyler and Galveston and then became president of the First National Bank in Belton. In 1883 he removed to Dallas and established the wholesale grocery house - the Boren-Stewart Company, one of the state's most potent commercial concerns. Mr. Boren was married in 1876 to Miss Sue McKellar. Their daughter, Nonie, is the wife of Hon. Joseph P. Mahoney of Chicago, Ill., and their son S. H. Boren, Jr., followed in his Dad's footsteps and became an officer in the Boren-Stewart Company in Dallas. Capt. Boren died suddenly from heart failure at his home in Dallas on March 16, 1903, and is buried in Oakwood cemetery in Tyler. In observance of Confederate History Month Walker's Greyhounds along with the ladies of the Mollie Moore Davis 217 U.D.C. held a wreath laying ceremony before the Confederate Monument

How Do I Join The Sons of Confederate Veterans?

The SCV is the direct heir of the United Confederate Veterans. Organized at Richmond, Virginia in 1896, the SCV continues to serve as a historical, patriotic, and non-political organization dedicated to ensuring that a true history of the 1861-1865 period is preserved. Membership in the Sons of Confederate Veterans is open to all male descendants of any veteran who served honorably in the Confederate armed forces. Membership can be obtained through either lineal or collateral family lines and kinship to a veteran must be documented genealogically. The minimum age for full membership is 12, but there is no minimum for Cadet membership.
