

Oran Milo Roberts

17th Governor of Texas, US Senator, Texas Supreme Court Justice, Colonel 11th Texas Infantry "Walker's Greyhounds"

1841, settled in San Augustine, and quickly became a successful attorney. In 1844, Sam Houston, President of the Republic of Texas, appointed Oran as District Attorney. Before the War of Northern Aggression, he held positions as district attorney, district judge, and, in 1857, associate judge of the Supreme Court of Texas. A strong advocate for secession, he was elected president of the Secession Convention that met in Austin in early 1861. When Texas seceded from the Union, he raised a regiment of Confederate infantry and became its first Colonel. Later, the regiment was

designated the 11th Texas Infantry, Horace Randal's Brigade, of Walker's Greyhounds. He served with valor and distinction in the Red River Campaign, including the battles of Mansfield, Louisiana, Pleasant Hill, Louisiana, and Jenkins Ferry, Arkansas, all in 1864. While still with his command, he received notice that he had been elected Chief Justice of the Texas Supreme Court and served from late 1864 until he was removed from office following the Confederate surrender in June 1865.

After the war, Roberts was a delegate to the Texas Constitution Convention of 1866. Later, he was elected to the Texas state legislature and then elected to the US Senate in 1866. Still, the Yankee government refused his seat due to his past Confederate service. He moved to Gilmer, Texas, to practice law until he was appointed as chief justice of the Texas Supreme Court in 1874. He resigned as chief justice in 1878 after receiving a unanimous nomination from the Democratic convention to run for governor of Texas. He was elected as the governor of Texas in 1878 and served for two terms. While governor, he was instrumental in reducing high taxes and state debt imposed by Reconstruction and became known as "pay as you go Roberts". He was ultimately successful in reducing the state debt. While governor, the present Capitol in Austin was contracted, and the cornerstone for the University of Texas was laid in 1882.

After retiring from politics, Roberts joined the faculty at the University of Texas as a professor of law in 1883, a position he held for the next ten years. There, he acquired the nickname "Old Alcade." He was immensely influential in the State's legal profession, where he impacted a generation of young attorneys. To continue his legacy, the University of Texas named its alumni magazine" Alcade" in his honor, and in 1963, it built and named a residence hall after him. While living in Austin, TX, Roberts helped organize the Texas State Historical Association and became its first president in 1898.

Family - Roberts married Frances W. Edwards of Ashville, AL, in 1837. They had seven children and remained married for 46 years, until her death in 1883. Roberts then married Catherine Border in 1885. He died in Austin, TX, on 9 May 1898. Orin Roberts is buried at the Oakwood Cemetery in Austin, TX.


Cain Family Monument Cleaned



How Do I Join The Sons of Confederate Veterans?

The SCV is the direct heir of the United Confederate Veterans. Organized at Richmond, Virginia in 1896, the SCV continues to serve as a historical, patriotic, and non-political organization dedicated to ensuring that a true history of the 1861-1865 period is preserved. Membership in the Sons of Confederate Veterans is open to all male descendants of any veteran who served honorably in the Confederate armed forces. Membership can be obtained through either lineal or collateral family lines and kinship to a veteran must be documented genealogically. The minimum age for full membership is 12, but there is no minimum for Cadet membership.
