# How do I get rid of weeds? A guide for garden weed management

Struggling with weeds in your garden? This guide offers effective strategies for weed prevention, removal, and long-term management to keep your garden healthy and native plants happy.

#### What is a weed?

 A weed is an unwanted plant. Consider if the plant in question is causing a problem or if it can be tolerated.

#### How do I remove weeds?

- Hauling. Remove weeds by hand and move off site. Make sure to do this before plants set seed. Disposal may be an issue so plan ahead.
- Mulching. Place mulch over weeds to prevent their growth and spread.

### When should I mulch?

 The timing and preparation of weeding is important for planting. Remove weeds before installing a garden.

## Do I need help?

If you have too many weeds to manage yourself, consider hiring help.

## What are alternate weeding strategies?

 Alternate weed strategies are possible. For example, Goats or pigs can be used to remove heavy weed infestations.

## What do I do after I weed?

- Once weeds removed, monitor to see if they return from seeds or underground stems.
- You will likely need to remove weeds intensely for a year or two.

## What are replacements?

 Invasive plants like knotweed can be replaced by native plants such as ocean spray for bees.
