
Virtual Schooling Outreach



With all of our local schools doing online schooling we had to think of a different way to reach our military youth. We used monthly activity packets that included a resilience tip of the month, that we would send to our school counselors and the counselors would pass along to the youth. By doing this it allowed us to continue that relationship we have built over the last decade and to show the schools our continued support of our military youth. Our goal is to continue utilizing these packets once schools have resumed to continue to keep youth and families that do not attend our school groups, involved with our program.

Social Media Outreach

During Covid-19 we used our Facebook group to do a lot of at home activities such as, Kids in the kitchen, family game night, family movie nights, and at home STEM activities. With our in person events being either cancelled or postponed due to Covid-19, using our Facebook page has allowed us to still reach those families just in a different way. On top of using our Facebook page we have started to use monthly activity packets. These packets include an activity for the families to participate in together, healthy recipes, and family exercises. We plan to continue to explore new ways to reach our families virtually even once our in person events start back up.

- Our Volunteers include military kids, parents, retired community leaders and Service Members
- Most are repeat volunteers that look forward to attending the same events every year
- 94 people volunteered to support military youth and their families during FY21
- The cost saving provided by volunteer support is invaluable. The Bureau of Labor and Statistics estimates the value of a volunteer hour as \$28.54. In 2021 volunteers provided 56 hours of service, totaling \$1,598.24.
